AR Favors Firm, Strong Alien Check

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The House of Representatives today passed a bill to strengthen the alien registration law, which requires that all aliens in the United States be registered with the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The bill, known as the McCarran-Walter Immigration and Nationality Act, was passed by a vote of 317 to 107.

The bill was introduced by Senator William McCarran of Nevada and Representative Charles McNichols of California.

High Court Rules Employer Right in Contractual Dispute

BOISE, April 20.—The Idaho supreme court ruled yesterday that an employer who enters a contract for remodeling of its plant may have his own employees do some of the remodeling work.

In a unanimous four-man decision, the court held that the Pocatello Building and Construction Trades council and affiliated unions violated Idaho's secondary boycott law when they threatened a picket line at the Simplot Fertilizer plant at Don, Ida., in 1952.

Justice William D. Keeton, who wrote the opinion, stated that Simplot's employees were members of the CIO Oil Workers union. The Pocatello council and Construction Trades council—an AFL group, represented workmen employed by the C. H. Elle Construction company, which was doing a conversion job for Simplot.

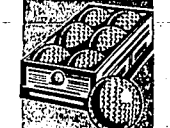

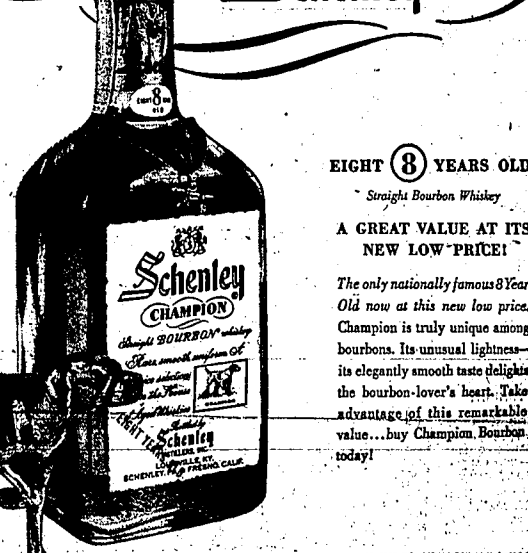

Two Counties May Hit 1956 Bonds' Quotas

Only two counties in district three have maintained a schedule that will carry them up to their 1956 bonds quotas, reports Guy H. Oberer, district chairman. They are Twin Falls and Minidoka.

"Quarterly reports from across the state show only 21.5 per cent or \$230,821 has been accounted for, March national sales of series 2 and 3 bonds totaled \$448,644,000, he said. With \$62,448 invested last month, Twin Falls county has \$234,976 toward its \$1,000,700 goal.

Cassia county reports March sales totaled \$1,463 giving it \$40,853 of its \$1,000 quota.

Of the \$735,000 expected from Jerome county, \$41,878 is in with last month's sales totaling \$19,941. In Minidoka county, \$19,825 worth of bonds were purchased in March giving it a quarterly total of \$60,253. Its 1956 goal is \$725,600.

Gooding county accounted for almost half of its three month total, \$425,000, by purchasing \$10,211, last month. Its quota has been set at \$1,015,000.

Blaine county showed a good increase in investments with \$1,000 put in bonds last month. It reports \$27,110 of its \$153,000 quota is in. In Lincoln county \$1,209 was put in bonds last month to raise its quarterly total to \$17,767. The set quota is \$101,200.

Top Red Trio Is Purged by Poland Party

LONDON, April 20—Poland's Communist regime said today it had fired three top government officials in the second satellite purge of leaders who committed the sin of Stalinism.

It listed them as: Stanislaw Radziewicz, minister of state farms; Stefan Kalinowski, prosecutor general; Stanislaw Zarakowski, the chief military prosecutor general.

Warsaw radio announced the men were being relieved of their posts "in connection with the discovery of serious deficiencies which have occurred in recent years."

"It said the government had discovered 'distortions' in the military prosecutor's office and that there was an 'intolerable' lack of supervision of the investigative functions of the organs of information of the Polish army.

It used almost the same words to describe the faults of Kalinowski.

The purge came only a week after Bulgarian Premier Vukto Chervenkov resigned after admitting he had committed errors of Stalinism—following too closely the teachings of the late dictator.

The broadcast said the Polish council of state (cabinet), relieved the minister of state farms but did not specify the exact charges.

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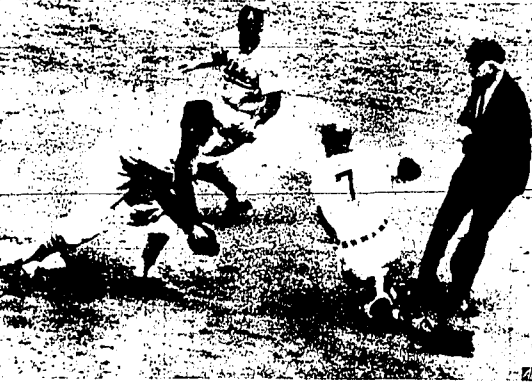
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Losing Effort in Opening Game

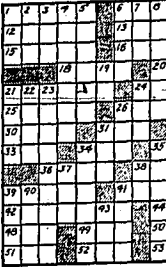

U.S. Will Give Aid, Supports To Pact Area

TEHRAN, Iran, April 20 (AP)—The United States promised yesterday to give both moral and material support to the five-nation Baghdad alliance created to protect the Middle East from possible communist aggression.

This undertaking, announced by U.S. Undersecretary of State Loy Henderson, appears to be the first step in a policy of containment of the Soviet Union in the Middle East as closely as possible to the defense alliance without actually signing and enjoining the Baghdad treaty.

Henderson made his announcement at the close of his four-day conference here of ministers of the Baghdad pact government—Britain, Turkey, Iraq, Iran and Pakistan. He was the chief U.S. observer at the meeting.

The United States has displayed reluctance to become a member of the alliance. But Henderson said it had joined the pact on condition that it would not be a military liaison office at present headquarters and would contribute to the cost of the permanent secretariat. With these moves, it seemed the U.S. is now expected to be larger if it had full membership.

Egypt leads a bloc of Arab nations which has denounced the alliance and objected especially to membership of Iran, the only Arab nation which has assumed Washington holds back from full membership because it seeks to avoid offending Egypt and Saudi Arabia. However, they regarded the U.S. participation announced by Henderson as a definite rebuff to leaders of those countries.

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Point 4 Plan Is Asked for U. S. Indians

NEW YORK, April 20 (U. S. Press)—The Association on Indian Affairs yesterday urged a domestic "Point Four" program for American Indian communities.

In a resolution approved at its annual meeting, the association said "this program should be offered to the American Indian communities without expecting termination of federal protection of Indian property or of any other Indian rights as a price."

The resolution requested the secretary of the interior to review programs of the bureau of Indian affairs with a view towards developing such a "Point Four" program for Indians.

Cliff La Forge, author and president of the association, said the group is guided by one basic principle—"the Indians themselves must be satisfied, that in this democracy we don't do things for people, we do things with people."

More Money Is Given to Help Flood Control

PORTLAND, April 20 (U. S. Army)—Engineers gained another \$225,000 yesterday for emergency dike use, running up the total to \$1,100,000 available for flood protection use in the Pacific Northwest this spring.

Army engineers headquarters in Washington, D. C., approved the additional funds on request of the North Pacific division, said Brig. Gen. L. H. Foote, division engineer. He said the additional money will allow work at these sites:

Pend Oreille river at Quilch, Wash.; seven districts along the Kootenai river at Bonanza Ferry and in the Kootenai Plateau area of Idaho; near Midvale, Unity Bridge and Phil Ford along the Weiser river in Idaho; Leila Bridge and Victory locations along the Payette river in Idaho; Wolf and Packets locations along the Boise river in Idaho; along the Clearwater river at Kootana, Ida. Funds authorized earlier are being used to bolster dikes in the lower Columbia river area.

Latin America Expert Is Final Speaker of Season for Group

BURLEY, April 20—Edward Tomlinson, expert on Latin American affairs, addressed members of the Burley-Rupert Knife and Fork club at their final meeting of the season in the Elks lodge here Tuesday night.

The speaker said he had only recently returned from his 50th trip through all the countries of South and Central America, having completed three such trips in the last six months. He said very few people give any thought to the 20 nations in this hemisphere. These countries not only have a tremendous population but have many resources and products this country needs, he said.

Tomlinson said the power of communism is present in a number of these countries, having made great progress during and after World War II. He said communism got its start during the war when the United States suggested that these countries establish diplomatic relations with the Soviets. He said that many of them never got around to accepting their representatives but that Russia was quick to establish her men. He said 13 of these countries have abolished communism and that Central America is the only place where it is really active now.

Tomlinson described the progress made in Mexico in recent years. He said that although nearly all the people eat corn in some form al-

to begin to think about the potential trade with the 100 million people who are just next door. Population is growing rapidly and the cities are congested.

Tomlinson concluded, "If you want to promote democracy, promote private enterprise. The people next door are just like ourselves. They will respect us when we start to respect them as equals to ourselves."

He said the people have by-passed the railroad age and that airways are doing the work, railways and highways are doing in other parts of the world.
