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Noted Writer, Madcap Dead; Rites Are Set

NEW YORK, April 21 (AP)—Charles MacArthur, husband of actress Helen Hayes and playwright chronicler of the morning "30s of which he was a madcap poet, died at New York hospital today at the age of 60. MacArthur entered the hospital April 17 suffering from nephritis, a kidney ailment, and severe anemia.

Miss Hayes, who had been maintaining a vigil at the hospital for several days, was at her husband's bedside when death came.

In 1928 he wrote, with Ben Hecht, "Front Page"—a wild, hard-boiled smash-hit drama of the newspaper business. It set a pattern for motion picture, radio and later, television, portrayal of newspapermen that real newsmen still are trying to live down.

He and Hecht were authors also of "20th Century," first produced in 1932 and recently revived on the stage, in the movies and on television.

In recent years MacArthur had been a producer as well as a playwright. At the time of his death he was understood to have completed a new play, based on the life of Lady Mendl, in which Miss Hayes was scheduled to star.

Funeral services were scheduled for Monday at the Frank Campbell funeral home here followed by private burial. Hecht will deliver a eulogy at the funeral.

Kruschev Issues New Call to Abolish War, Adopt Peaceful Coexistence Bid

LONDON, April 21 (AP)—Communist boss Nikita S. Khrushchev linked Russia's familiar appeal for "peaceful coexistence" last night with a call to the West to outlaw war and abolish armies.

One London newspaper speculated that the speech was so expertly timed and written to appeal to Britons that it might have been drafted by turncoat Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean.

Khrushchev told an array of Britain's top-ranking generals, admirals and air marshals at a naval college banquet that an arms race in the modern world is "like a fox trying to catch its own tail."

"That which is first rate this year may be out of date next year," he said. "I read a press report today that the Americans have produced a fighter which can fly with double the speed. But what can a fighter like that do against a guided missile or rocket?"

"At one time, all fighting was done along some definite front line... in the case of a new war, it would not be possible to find any definite front line."

"There can be only one way out—to give up war altogether, to agree to a reduction of arms as a first step... and then to abolish the armed forces."

The skillful timing and the persuasive wording of Khrushchev's "off the cuff" speech increased official pressure on Prime Minister Anthony Eden to match the Russian's propaganda tactics.

So far, Eden has lived up to an agreement to keep his talks with Khrushchev and Premier N. A. Bulganin secret... while the Russian embassy has been handing out texts of the Soviet leader's remarks to all comers.

Last night was the second time during the three days he has spent in Britain that Khrushchev has made a speech at midnight, assuring its major headlines play in the British papers before the government can hope to reply.

The wording of his speeches, especially calculated to appeal to the British mind, has created belief here that they may have been "ghosted" for him by Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean, the turncoat diplomats who fled to Moscow five years ago. The London Daily Mail voiced the opinion publicly.

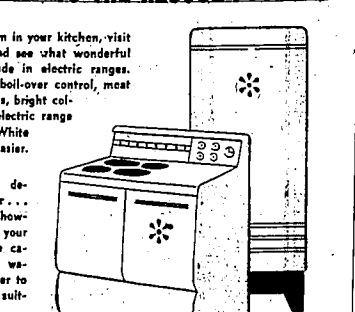

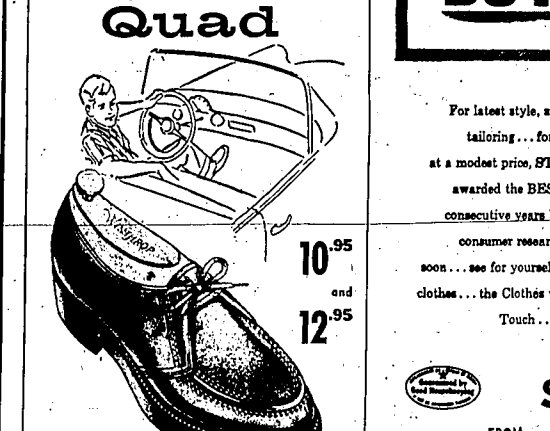

Reds Win on Cheap Bomb, Report Avers

TOKYO, April 21 (AP)—A Japanese scientist said today that he may have beaten the United States to a hydrogen bomb made with thorium, a cheaper and more lethal material than uranium.

Prof. Betaroya Koyama, physicist at Niigata university, said his research on recent radioactive rainfall in Japan led him to believe Russia exploded a thorium bomb last month.

More Thorium Available—The earth contains 10 times more thorium than uranium, he said. It is more lethal, he added, because it releases larger quantities of strontium, one of the most dangerous and persistent radioactive elements known.

Dr. Koyama said his findings were preliminary rather than conclusive, based on studies up to April 10, an estimated 25 days after the "atomic bomb" was dropped.

He said he found in radioactive rain which fell on Niigata March 21 and 24 two per cent of rubidium-86, an element obtained from the fission of thorium-232.

Recent Discovery—Japanese scientists have not been able to discover this element in detectable quantities until now.

Koyama said the Soviet nuclear bomb tested in autumn of 1944 was not as advanced as the hydrogen bomb tested at Bikini that same spring by the United States.

Idaho Engineers Urge Change to Appointments for County Surveyors

The Idaho Society of Professional Engineers will recommend that legislation be enacted by the state legislature making the office of county surveyor an appointive office rather than an elective office, members of the organization decided during their quarterly meeting here Saturday.

The engineers noted that as the law now reads almost anyone can be a county surveyor. The engineers said "the welfare of the people would be best served" by having county surveyors who can locate corners and property lines, and "be fully equipped for the job."

Of 28 Idaho counties having full-time surveyors, the engineers reported, 11 aren't registered engineers.

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People Differ On Serving of Drinks in Air

WASHINGTON, April 21 (U.)—Commercial airlines and their pilots and stewards differ on whether alcoholic drinks should be served during flights in airplanes. Some airlines have changed their policy and now serve drinks, while others have refused to do so.

The pilots and stewards are protesting to congress yesterday that serving alcoholic drinks to passengers during flights is dangerous. They said drunken passengers often become unruly, troublesome and create a safety hazard.

But an airline spokesman denied that serving passengers drinks was dangerous to the plane's safety. He said eight million of the 10 million persons using commercial airlines last year wanted to be able to have a drink aloft.

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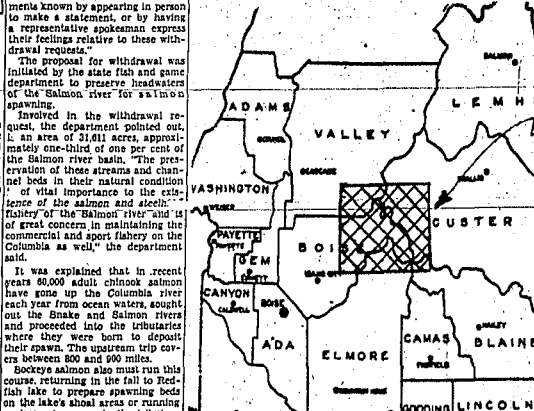

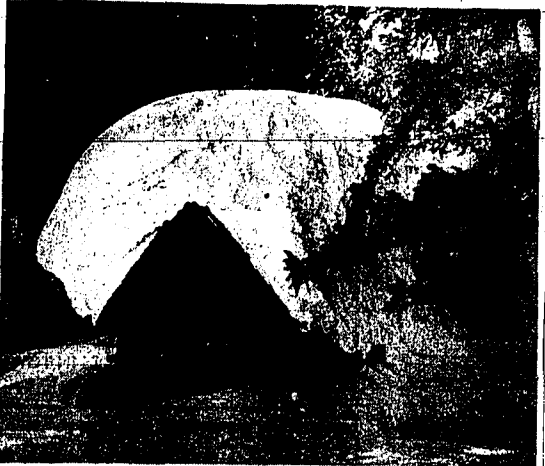

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

New persons are as conscious of the part history plays in their lives as U. N. Terry, TWIN FALLS insurance man. He knows he owes his existence to the fact Indians did not attack his grandfather's wagon train as it passed through the "Cane of Death" near American Falls, more than 100 years ago.

Terry's indirect connection with Massacre Rock came to light as a result of the Magic Valley tour to the historic landmark several weeks ago. In his possession is the personal account of his great-grandfather, Mrs. C. W. Walton, of the train's passage through the Cane of Death in 1827.

The train in which his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Walton, traveled originally was a part of the train that was attacked and all but annihilated at the pass on Aug. 10, 1827. Why the Utmers and their companions were permitted to pass through the gate unharmed while the next section of the train was attacked probably never will be known. It is possible, though, the Indians were seeking revenge upon only a portion of the emigrants.

Mrs. Walton's account of the trip was in a covered wagon bound in Grant county, Wisconsin, in 1833 when her sister and her husband left for the gold fields in California. The sister died on the trip across the country and was buried along the Humboldt river in what is now Nevada.

In 1831 her father, Andrew Gregg, sold his farm and began to prepare for the long trip west. Terry's grandparents lived in Georgetown, Wis., and his grandfather, a blacksmith, was prevailed upon to join the wagon train.

Mrs. Walton's account of how friends and neighbors gathered to see relatives before they went on their way to California and how a wagon train was formed is graphic in detail. At the time Mrs. Walton was only 15 years old and while she did not complete the account of the trip across country until 1921, when she was 84, her memory of events remained in sharp focus.

The train that left Wisconsin contained 15 men, women and children. At Omaha, Neb., they joined another train that was preparing to start across the great plains. Mrs. Walton did not tell the number of wagons in the train but pointed out "you could hardly see from one end to the other."

Most of Mrs. Walton's account is given over to details which would be of interest to a girl of 15, the dances in camp at night, the preparation of food, the things women and children did during the tire-some hours and days and weeks on the trail.

At one point, though, she explained how a camp was fortified at night with a double ring of wagons. How the men stood watch and how some of the rivers were crossed. The children walked out of the way from Omaha to Oregon, writing their names on just about every flat rock and buffalo skull they could find along the way.

"Life in a wagon train" was not wholly devoid of pleasure," she wrote. "The young of both sexes always were ready for anything—a dance, a candy pulling or even a kissing bee."

She also explained how some of the young men in the train "courted" the young women.

In the train was a man by the name of Young. All along the trail he was expecting to meet his younger brother, who had gone west seven years before.

Just before the train entered what now is Idaho the emigrants came to a camp in which the brother was staying. He had an arrow in his shoulder and was "itching" for revenge upon the Indians who had shot him. He said he would stop until he had killed every Indian in their camp—if he could find the camp.

In Month of Big Marriages, This Couple Shocks Scales

NEW YORK, April 21 (AP)—This is a month of big marriages. A bride and groom who came here on their honeymoon — and stayed for breakfast—are right in stride. Their combined weight is 1,005 pounds.

At a time when much of America is at war with the calorie, it is a pleasure to report that some tracheotomies are left—and more of a pleasure when one of them mates with a tracheotomist.

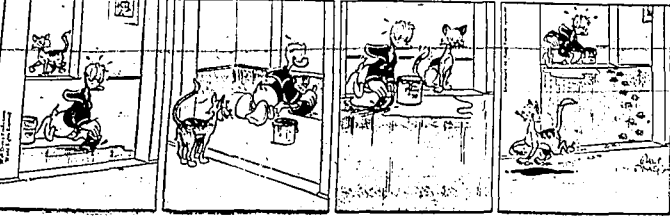

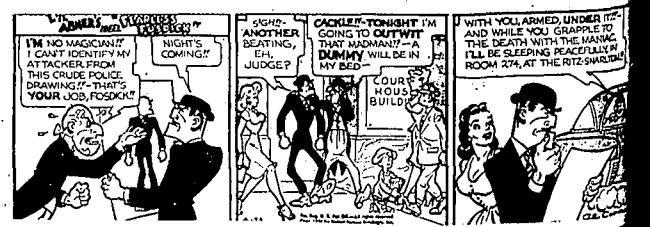

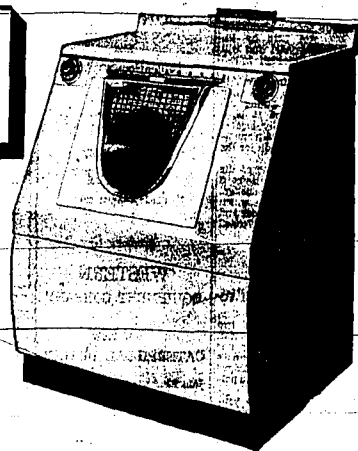
