# Oral Arguments Wind up Before Supreme Court on Ogden's "Gateway" Case

## Teaching Staff for Blind Inadequate

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—A half-hour or so of comments from an attorney for the interstate commerce commission today was to wind up oral arguments before the U. S. supreme court on the Ogden Gateway case. It's a case stemming from a six-year effort by Denver and Rio-Grand Western railroad to win joint competitive rates to the Pacific Northwest on a four-mile spur with Union Pacific railroad.

The high tribunal heard most of the arguments yesterday. It got the case on appeals from two decisions of special three-judge districts courts at Omaha and Denver. These rulings followed an ICC order of January, 1953, requiring UP to set up a transfer-rate agreement with D&RGW on connecting shipments at Ogden, considering the railroad gateway to the Northwest.

In its 1953 order, the ICC directed the railroads to set up through rates and joint rates on various commodities, including perishables and livestock.

The order's effect was to establish the rates on shipments on through routes—which would be competitive with the prevailing rate if the commodities were carried by the UP route without participation by Rio-Grand.

D and RGW originally asked the ICC to establish joint competitive rates for the gateway route. The ICC rejected the ICC's own rates for the gateway route, but the ICC later changed its mind and ordered the railroads to set up joint competitive rates for the gateway route.

### Migrant Plan Discussed for Club Meeting

Plans and purpose of the migratory program were discussed by Kurt Moss at the Twin Falls Ex-Club meeting Monday night. Moss noted there are many purposes in the plan. ### Movie Shown Of Mysterious Objects in Sky

**HOLLYWOOD, April 24.**—Pictures taken in Utah, Montana and Colorado are included in what is called the first full-scale movie treatment of unidentified flying objects. The 10-minute film, described as an official Pentagon movie of "unidentified flying objects" was previewed for the press here yesterday.

### Called flying saucers appeared to be bright, white and highly elliptical. The objects were seen in a line of about 100 miles in length, according to a blue key—the real meat of the movie.

Pin No. 1 was taken Aug. 15, 1935, by Nicholas Mariana, general manager of the Great Falls, Mont., baseball club, at the ball park. The film shows two white apherical objects moving laterally and at the same distance from each other.

Pin No. 2 was photographed on the Utah desert July 2, 1933, by Navy Chief Photographer, Delbert O. Newhouse. It shows "a dancing formation of 7 to 15 white spots. As do the Montana pictures, these appear to be in the shape of two spheres in a line."

### Explanation Declined

Producers Clarence Green and Russel Brown declined to explain how the films were released to the public. They said that the Pentagon decided these objects were "mysterious, strange, balloons, meteors or unidentified flying saucers." The first and official on their identities is "unknown."

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



### France Needs 'Strong Man' To Fix Nation

**By United Press**  
There is growing talk in Paris that a "strong man" may be needed to fix France out of its political and economic difficulties. France suffered severely from the war and has been hampered by the years of recurrent cabinet crises and resulting instability.

Socialist Leader Guy Mollet took office Feb. 1 as premier of France's postwar government.

The long-reigning cabinet is for a period of uncertainty because the coalition lacks a majority in parliament.

Because the coalition itself is shaky, there comes the renewed talk that a "strong man" might be in sight. If the only candidate in sight, it is Gen. Charles de Gaulle, wartime leader of free France.

De Gaulle certainly is the "strong man" type. He holds that the only way out of France's plight is to dissolve the national assembly, elect a constituent assembly and write a new constitution.

Under the present constitution, De Gaulle sees it. France would have an American-type constitution. This American-type constitution, which would be a strong executive, headed by a man who would wield the power of France's president and supported by a strong parliamentary majority under a new voting system.

### Cash Receipts For U.S. Farm Show Decline

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Cash receipts from farm marketings in the first three months of 1956 totaled \$5,900,000,000, a drop of five per cent from the same period in 1955, the agriculture department said yesterday.

In a report on the demand and price situation, the department forecast that the price gap will likely diminish as the year progresses but cash receipts for the year may total somewhat under 1955.

Farm prices as a whole during the first three months of this year have declined seven per cent below a year ago, the department said. The total volume of products marketed was a little larger than a year ago, however.

Prices of most farm products have risen from lows of last December but are generally below those of a year earlier. The department said there are indications the gains since December have been maintained in April.

With prospects that current high domestic demand and foreign takings of U. S. farm products will persist through 1956, the department said, the general level of prices received by farmers should continue much as at present.

## Poor Richard Credited With U. S. Industry

CHICAGO, April 24 (AP)—Historical research by the nation's broom manufacturers has credited the daddy of their industry as Benjamin Franklin.

The old Ben is credited with planting the first broom in the United States.

It was a friend sent him a crude twig broom from abroad, and Franklin used it to broom his house.

One day he noticed three tiny seeds clinging to the fibers. Old Ben was a man of great curiosity, and he wondered what sort of plant would produce such tough pliable fibers.

**Plant Seeds**

So he planted the seeds in his garden. One of them produced a plant similar to Indian corn, but taller and more graceful, instead of tassels, the top fluted a crest of fiber with 40 or 50 strands.

Ben's neighbors became curious so he gave them some seed and they began raising broomcorn for themselves. The stuff wasn't fit to use until it became quite the red around Philadelphia to raise it as a decorative plant.

But it wasn't until 1797 that the first broom was grown commercially in this country. One John Pidgeon planted a patch in his garden at North Hadley, Mass., and the "broom" of the fibers to make 10 brooms.

**Birth of Industry**

This according to the National Broom Manufacturers and Allied Industries association, was the birth of the American broom industry. It is an industry that has survived the carpet sweeper, the vacuum cleaner and the use of plastic and man-made fibers. Most brooms still are made of broomcorn.

The craftsmanship still plays a big part in broom manufacture. A skilled broom maker works so fast it's hard for the eye to follow the movements. His manual dexterity takes years to acquire.

**Quality Broom**

Brooms of one type or another go back to antiquity, and so does the use of the new broom. The fact it's found in the "lots" of many peoples.

But the broom manufacturers are saddened to note that the slogan in America has become for the most part "cheap".

They would prefer to keep it a safe pitch for brooms.

Poland Opens New Drive on Rehabilitation

Then Sunday came the announcement that the government planned to release 10,000 political prisoners and reduction of sentences for 700 more. Cyrankiewicz stated that was the first notice that the rehabilitation was underway.

Spring Floods and Winter Hit Portions of U. S. and Canada

By United Press Spring floods mingled with a winter onslaught across the nation and Canada today.

In North Dakota, a flash flood triggered by melting snow sent 10 families scurrying from their homes.

LAB VEGAS, Nev., April 24 (AP)—Atomic energy commission plans yesterday to expand Nevada test site for future nuclear tests.

The AEC office here disclosed that the Nevada test site is under way for expansion to include an area of 400 square miles adjacent to the western boundary of the Nevada test site.

Development of the Nevada test site is part of the air force's long-range bombing and nuclear weapons program and it will be developed in experimental projects of the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory of California and the Lawrence Livermore Laboratory at Livermore, Calif.

Regular detonations will continue to be confined to the original test site. A 100-square mile plot will be the range.

A new fact of AEC testing in Nevada was indicated. The commission said that negotiations are proceeding for use of an additional 100 square miles of the Nevada test site.

Beating Range

The AEC said, would be used as a temporary bombing range for ballistic test programs—testing nuclear weapons—developed by the Sandia Corporation, the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory and the Sandia Corporation.

The Sandia Corporation is conducting nuclear tests in the Nevada test site. No test dates were announced. Tests are expected that nuclear tests will be conducted in Nevada until late fall or spring. Large-scale tests are scheduled at Eisenhower in May.

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### Demo Attacks Big Business, Ike's Policies

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Sen. Charles McNary, D., Ore., acting as "leader" of a group of anti-Communist demonstrators today, declaring that "profiteering in general" he urged a congressional investigation of the activities of the Senate Republican Leader Knowledge of California countered that the whole of America depends on a profitable industry. "If you regulate profits, he said, you wind up regulating prices, wages and the right to strike—and that means the end of the free labor movement."

Two K. K. K. Klansmen and Knowland tangled in a staged political debate, along with Sen. Arthur Humphrey, D., Minn., and Senator Curtis R. Nye, at a Washington conference of the United Auto Workers (UAW).

At 10:30 a. m. McNary, who is a member of the UAW, and Knowland, who is a member of the K. K. K., met at the UAW headquarters for a debate on the subject of "The Right to Strike."

McNary, who wants to succeed Knowland as president, told the conference:

"Not since the days of Coolidge and Hoover has there been such a tender situation in the White House for giant corporations as there has been under Dwight D. Eisenhower. The front door is wide open to them and the back door has the welcome mat laid out for them."

Cites Profits

The senator said "something has gone wrong" when General Knowledge could make more than a billion dollars last year or about 50 percent on his investment. McNary said prices are too high, wages too low, and there is a combination of both, he said.

McNary said General Knowledge is "the biggest target, but the philosophy is general. We ought to investigate why it is that a man's fortune to buy a 'free price' can't."

### U. S. Diplomat Lauds Job for Italian People

MILAN, Italy, April 24 (AP)—U. S. Ambassador Clark Booth Luce says Italy's postwar progress has been astounding.

Luce said that Italy and her own country are becoming comparable in the face of relative prosperity.

Mrs. Luce spoke to the American Chamber of Commerce here last night. It was the third anniversary of her arrival in Italy and "American day" at the Milan industrial fair.

"Italy's progress in the last 10 years is astounding, well-nigh miraculous," Mrs. Luce said. "Thirty years ago Italy was a backward, feudalistic country. Today she has made a decade after another progress that has enabled her to stand on the threshold of the most prosperous decade of her entire history."

With crucial nationwide local elections only 34 days away, she sounded a note of caution.

"A line of victory, which leads to a hot, highly competitive election," Mrs. Luce said. "There is a frustrating paradox of human affairs in that when things go well and when problems could be most easily solved, they are not often solved—the catastrophe, greater or less, strikes and men are forced to do to pain and confusion what they might have done in ease and in reason."

### Idea Offered To Cut Down Aid Program

NEW YORK, April 24 (AP)—Here's an idea for a foreign aid program that wouldn't cost the U. S. government a penny.

Instead, we would all help out the economy of foreign countries by buying such things as stationery, pens and pencils, jewelry and what-not items from their native craftsmen.

"This scheme is a pet project right now of David Margulies, 31, who has spent the last three and a half years working the work-benches of the world for interesting do-oda. He is president of "Around the World Shoppers club" and buys gifts for his 100,000 members in 45 different countries every month.

"I'm hoping to get the international cooperation administration interested," Margulies said. "The cost would be nothing compared with most aid programs. It would mostly be a matter of education."

Margulies has figured out the success of his club that there is a healthy market in America for authentic bits-of-handicrafts—from mysterious and far-off lands. Members of his club get one item a month, costing about \$12 mailed directly to them from the country where it was made.

"In some countries one American dollar is the equivalent of two days wages," he said. "When we place an order for 1,000 or 2,000 items it can practically keep a whole village of craftsmen going for the next six months."

Margulies would like to see the international cooperation administration or some other U. S. government agency take an active role in promoting this contact between county-buying Americans and the foreign craftsmen. At it is now, an American seldom gets a chance to buy, say, a piece of alabaster work from San Marino without visiting that country as a tourist.

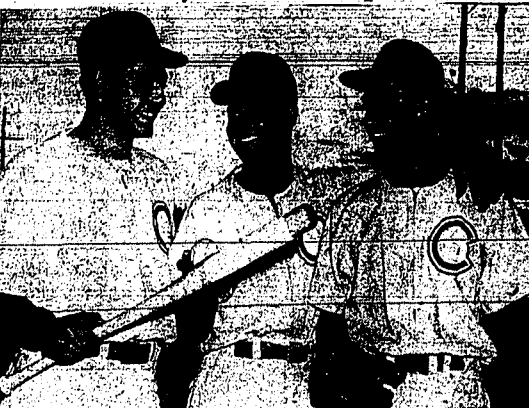
