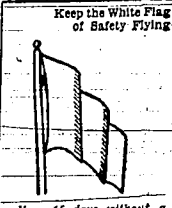

Club Meeting Features Talk About Timber

The cooperation of all United States citizens is needed to meet an ever-increasing demand for timber, members of the Twin Falls Rotary club heard Wednesday.

"We have the potential to supply our needs. What is needed is to develop sound programs to conserve and preserve our supply of timber," Maurice Pickett, forester general of the Sawtooth national forest, told the club following the weekly luncheon at American Legion hall.

A timber resource survey conducted by the U. S. forest service shows that 24 per cent of the timber in the United States is held by persons owning less than 100 acres of land, Pickett says. The recent re-estimate of the forest service took three and a half years to complete.

"The federal government and state and local governments control only 21 per cent of the commercial timber," Pickett says. "Approximately 400 million acres of timberland comprise the source of our future supply."

Pickett says that while fire destroys a great amount of timber, the greatest destructive factors are insects and disease.

Under a program now in operation, cuttings of timber are about even in the amount cut and grown. The growth of eastern hardwoods exceeds the amount cut in the west, cut and growth figures are out of proportion.

"The cut of timber in the west at present far exceeds the growth. What is needed is a sound program of replanting and the commercial timber," Pickett says. Since 1930 around five million acres of cut forest land has been replanted.

Following his talk, members saw a U. S. department of agriculture film on a timber survey.

Early readings included an icy 5 above zero at Mt. Washington, N. H., 40 at New York, 36 at Washington, D. C., Boston and Detroit, 41 at Chicago, and 75 at Miami, Fla.

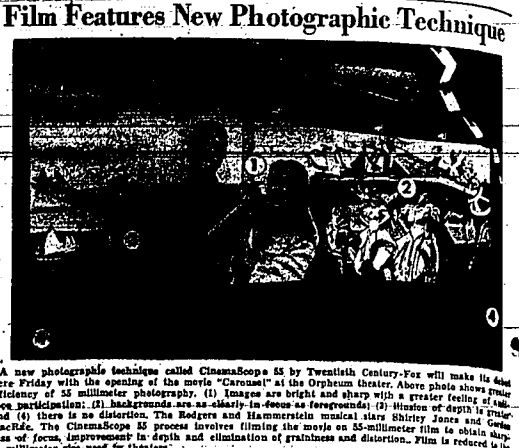

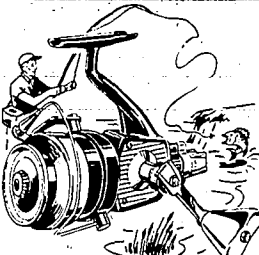

Anyone over 7 years of age is eligible. Animals can be borrowed for up to a week. If you don't bring your own cage or rabbit hutch, you are charged a fine of 10 cents a day.

Stock of 300

Fred O. Evenden, a Ph.D. from Oregon State is in charge of the unique museum which pioneered the animal lending service for children, but is finding it patronized by teachers and adults, too. There are 300 animals in all.

The usual procedure is to start young borrowers out with one of the more domesticated animals, like a rabbit, a hamster, or a white mouse. As the borrower proves his ability to handle animals he can borrow a snake (molested), or a porcupine (with quills).

Gila monsters and rattlesnakes are loaned out only to teachers or special student groups. The most experienced borrowers can have a raccoon or a "coyote named Snippy."

Loss Is Small

"We haven't lost one-tenth of one percent of our animals and we haven't had any accidents," Evenden said. "One of our biggest problems is getting the turn-around on a stock a 300." Just recently he said he had a snake which he had not thought of as one of 30.

At least one still has been lost. A man found a snake which he presumed had been doctored and was a pet gone astray.

Turned over to new junior museum. Not for several days was it discovered the snake was loaded.

Parents have borrowed animals from the museum with the specification that the animal be pregnant for the purpose of sex education at home.

"This is mostly sympathy picketing," said White. He explained there was a "combined effort" by unions here and at Durango and in Wyoming, Utah, Oregon and Washington to support the Pipeliners union in its attempt to place union men in jobs on the multi-million-dollar pipeline.

The gas line is being built from the San Juan basin of southwestern Colorado and northeastern New Mexico along a 1,466-mile route to the Pacific Northwest.

Negroes Slate Speed-ups for Race Equality

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Nearly 75 top Negro leaders declared yesterday that progress toward school desegregation has been too slow. They set up a national steering committee to work by all practical means to speed up the process.

The action was taken at an all-day closed session held under auspices of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

The statement issued at the conclusion of the meeting flatly rejected "gradualism" as an approach to the equality of civil rights. It was in effect a reply to the manifesto recently issued by nearly all southern members of congress pleading for a fight against desegregation by all legal means.

The conference went on to endorse in favor of a nationwide campaign to increase NAACP membership from 400,000 to one million in the next two years. In addition, it was decided to raise a two million dollar fund for the association's legal and educational branch.

A. Philip Randolph, head of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, was named chairman of the "coordinating" committee. He will convene one of the group's first assignments will be to seek a meeting with President Eisenhower "with a view to placing before him the nature of the problems of the present civil rights crisis."

Montana Judge Disqualifies Self

GREAT FALLS, Mont., April 23 (AP)—Federal Judge Charles N. Pray disqualifies himself yesterday from presiding at the trial of John Cyril Hillman, 34, Butte, accused of Communist party membership.

Pray referred the case to Montana's other U. S. judge, W. D. Murray, Butte, who earlier criticized Pray's disqualification as "un-American tactics" in "apparently attempting to try the Hillman case out of court."

Murray, a son of Senator Murray D. Mont., in a statement made his court earlier this month, said: "If this case had been in my division... Mr. Hoover and his agents would have been called before me to account for such un-American tactics..."

There has been no comment from Hoover.

Soviet Leader Given Lesson, History Made

LONDON, April 23 (AP)—Nikola Khrushchov, peasant-born rough and tumble initiator of international politics, got a lesson in diplomacy this week from some old professional statesmen in London.

The turn taken by the Anglo-American talks here could have far-reaching consequences. It might even mean the western world will succeed in making the offensive in the cold war from the Communists.

Beam Changed

The British actually maneuvered Khrushchov and his suave companion, Premier Nikolai Bulganin, into a snare. They changed the smile offensive, into a Stalin-like score. They made him act and talk like Stalin. And it was the belligerence of Stalin after World War II which solidified the western front against the spread of communism.

For Hugh Gaitskell, leader of the Labor party, it was a coup. But Gaitskell could not and would not have done it alone. The government must have gone along with him.

Badgered

There is scarcely a doubt that Gaitskell carefully badgered Khrushchov into a display of bad manners Monday night by politely asking him to explain Soviet and Communist persecution of former Soviet leaders Khrushchov blew up and said things he probably regretted.

This blowup strengthened the hand of the Conservative government of Anthony Eden. It also had the effect of strengthening Gaitskell's own position in the Labor party. Even the extreme left-wingers, as represented by Aneurin Bevan, were shocked and angry at the Khrushchov outburst.

Kissing of Statue To Be Forbidden

RAVENNA, Italy, April 23 (AP)—Romantic lady courtes will no longer be allowed to kiss the cold marble lips of a young Renaissance warrior.

Officials of the abbey of this city imposed the ban on kissing the statue of handsome Gualdarello Ouldarrelli who has been dead for the past 425 years.

They said although it has been a custom for 100 years for woman tourists to kiss the statue it is undignified and the lipstick marks are difficult to wipe away.

No NAACP attorneys attended the brief hearing, but without advance press announcement or notice to the NAACP.

MEKSBOROUGH, England, April 23 (AP)—More than 100 young coal haulers are on strike at the Denaby colliery because in the spring's young man's fancy, etc. At issue is the starting time for the afternoon shift.

The shift now ends at 9:30 p. m., which leaves very little time for after-work courting. The young haulers say they are losing their girls to youths whose jobs end earlier.

The young haulers accordingly asked Nathaniel Irving, the pit manager, to start their shift 90 minutes earlier so they could be off to their wooing at a reasonable hour. Irving, conceding spring is here, but said the shift change would disrupt the whole colliery working schedule. The young miners then walked out.

He said he deplored the Swedish contribution to Arab armament.

"One frequently gets the impression that there are strong forces working in the Arab states aiming to destroy Israel," he said.

"The situation in the Palestine area is a cause of grave concern in Sweden."

Neutral Sweden has a considerable war materiel export industry, Erlander said. But the government policy is to deny export permits for weapons designed for trouble-ridden areas.

Liberty Faces Slow Threats; Editor Claims

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Dr. Alberto Galina, publisher of the Buenos Aires newspaper La Prensa after five years of detention by the Peron government, said today that in some other American nations liberty is under a creeping attack.

His address prepared for delivery to the American Newspaper Publishers association convention in Dr. Galina said that "both restoration of the Argentine government and of his newspaper are the work of the moral reserves of his country's people with the spiritual help of their sister peoples."

Not Corrupted Easily

"People are not corrupted as easily as dictators and demagogues think," he said. "The silence which fear imposes does not mean that actually trade silence announces that rebellion is hatching."

"That is the way it came about here. So it will always occur whenever tyranny tries to perpetrate itself. I am sure that Jose G. Sison, the great human cause, and never let us deny them our own. I can well understand the desire to raise the cry of alarm and show how the suppression of a free press is a danger to the police state, how the destruction of independent newspapers has opened the way to all other liberties."

Example Seen

"Without a free press the people were deaf, dumb and blind. Argentina's oppression was thus a tragic example to some other American nations, where liberty is under a creeping attack. But in Argentina, Argentina's liberation offers us new proof of the possibility of liberating a nation. Argentina's situation is a warning to all nations of freedom in Argentina. He thanked the ANPA for raising its voice in condemning the Peron attack on La Prensa."

Living Germs Used to Keep Teeth Sound

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25 (AP)—A method of coating the teeth with living microbes which destroy the little key crystals in the enamel and mucus secreted in the mouth quickly covers them. They live on saliva and they will remain in the mouth at least seven months.

These microbes, said Dr. Charles E. Scribner, create an ecology which interferes with the growth of various kinds of bacteria associated with dental decay.

Dr. Scribner, who is associate dean of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, San Francisco dental school, said about 50 persons have been treated experimentally so far.

One of these, he added, was a student in whom the decay process has been stopped for more than two years.

Nash Has New Style, Motors



The 1956 Nash models are highlighted by new "speed-line" styling, two new engines and luxurious interiors. This Ambassador Custom Country Club has a new Jeffre V-8 engine that develops 228 horsepower. A massive taillight assembly has been incorporated on 1956 Nash models.

Styling, Two New Engines Reported As Highlights for 1956 Nash Models

The 1956 Nash is highlighted by new "speed-line" styling and two new engines.

Nash offers four horsepower ratings on its 1956 Ambassador and Statesman models—220, 145, 135 and 120, at the same time, Nash economy of operation has been retained.

The new styling treatment on the Ambassador Ambassador begins at the front where new parking-running lights set off the front fenders.

From the side of the Ambassador's front fenders a cove spear outlined in chrome trim sweeps back to the rear fender, widening to a modified "Y" and then sweeping up and over the rear deck. The "speed-line" which gives the feeling of movement, allows three-tone paint combinations to be used on the new cars. On the Statesman, a single chrome trim line is used.

The new Ambassador Jeffre V-8 engine with Twin Ultramatic transmission develops 220 horsepower, compared with 202 last year. The V-8 also has a higher torque rating, a boosted compression ratio and more piston displacement.

A new Statesman Typhoon over-head-valve engine, developing 130 horsepower, replaces the 1955 6-cylinder engine which had 100 horsepower with a single carburetor and 110 with dual carburetors. The Ambassador Super Jeffre 6 now has 135 horsepower and the optional LeMay Peak Jeffre 6 is increased to 146 horsepower.

Nash continues to have the double-seat single-body construction, deep-coil ride, airline reclining seats and twin travel beds, all-season air conditioning, air intake below the windshield, bonded baked enamel finishes and economical operation.

The popular reclining seats can be adjusted to five different positions and can be made into a bed, quickly and easily.

The models are offered in the Ambassador V-8 Custom Country Club hardtop, Ambassador V-8 Custom four-door sedan, Ambassador V-8 Super four-door sedan, Ambassador Super four-door sedan and Statesman Super four-door sedan.

The restyled interiors come in blue, green or gray to match the exterior. All interiors are beautifully color-keyed and special custom trim is standard on Custom models and optional on the Ambassador Super four-door. That trim consists of genuine leather and nylon silverleaf cloth. Other smart new fabrics also will be used.

The non-die instrument panel has a crash pad made of vinyl-covered plywood, a plastic tooth which is said to be more protective than iron rubber.

Front seats of the Ambassador and Statesman measure 35 inches the widest in the industry, while the rear seats measure 34 1/2 inches. All 1956 Nash models utilize a 22-volt electrical system.

Ambassador wheel discs are new and incorporate a Nash modification center design.

The wrap-around windshield which with the gracefully low hood and "road guide" fenders, provides unsurpassed visibility. The squeeze-type door handles permit releasing of the lock mechanism with a light touch. Mexico Chief Sees Hike in Top Industry

MEXICO CITY 26—A bright future for Mexico's oil industry is foreseen by President Adolfo Ruiz Cortines, who says this year's record output will be greatly increased by newly opened plants and two major pipelines scheduled to go into operation before 1956.

The president praised the government-owned monopoly's program of exploration, drilling and production which resulted in discovery of 11 new oilfields and drilling of 354 wells in the past 12 months.

Production for this period was 21,400,000 barrels—up 18,000,000 over the previous year, Ruiz Cortines said.

The chief executive pointed out that Mexico's oil income from 29,200,000 barrels exported the past 12 months totaled \$45,040,000, an increase of \$17,500,000 over the previous year's total.

In his third annual state of the nation address, Ruiz Cortines lauded the oil economic recovery and said \$4,500,000 from petroleum income was spent for school, medical and social services for employes.

Looking to the future, the president said the government's oil program calls for "capital" investments of \$61,400,000 during the next 12 months, an increase of \$12,000,000 over last year.

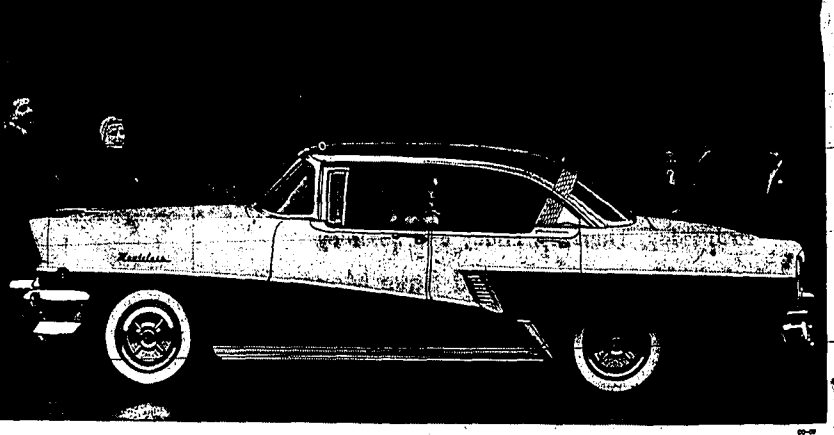

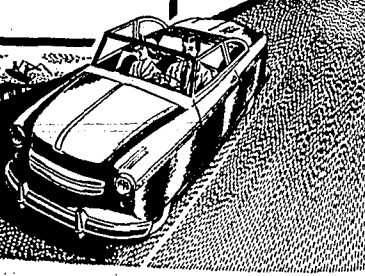

Decision Set For Alaska's Mental Cases

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—A Senate interior subcommittee tentatively decided to turn over to the Alaska territorial government control over a broad range of commitment and treatment of mentally ill residents.

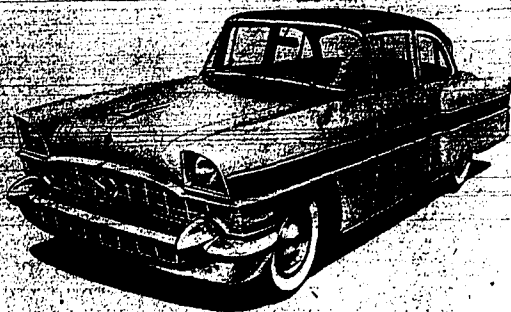
Chairman Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., said the subcommittee would submit detailed procedural provisions from an "Alaskan mental health bill" which have drawn criticism from some groups. In that place, he said, it is a simple statement giving the "state power the states have" to handle its mental cases.

Jackson said another subcommittee meeting will be necessary to complete action on the house-approved bill.

It will retain provisions authorizing \$5 million dollars for construction of mental institutions in the territory and \$ million dollars over a 10-year period to aid in support of the institutions. A grant of one million acres of public land also will be retained, Jackson said.

He said the subcommittee did not set a time for turning the program over to the territory. The bill originally would have been effective six months after approval.

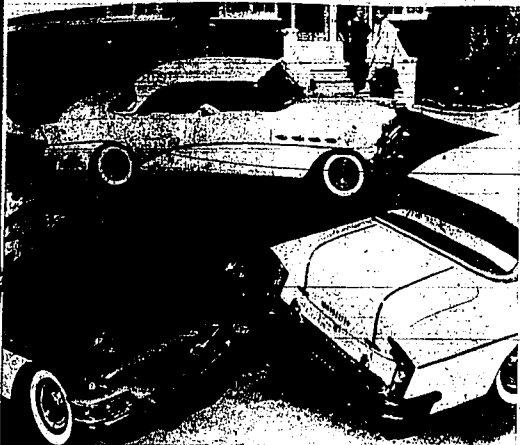

Advanced new styling is in the same bold design that has made Buick the third best seller in the nation the last two years. The new front end features a wide-screen grille in a new design, a headlight with a new bumper and a new hood ornament resembling a sweeping jet bomber.

Rear end styling is a refinement of the classic motif introduced with such success in 1955, featuring wrap-back taillamps, a new double tail bumper and a new emblem on the trunk lid. The full rear wheel cover, pioneered by Buick two years ago, has been extended to all models in 1956. Previously it was offered only on two-door models.

The 28-cubic inch engine, used on the Roadmaster, Super and Century last year, has been extended to the Special series for the first time in 1956. On the top three series, the horsepower has been increased to 235 with a compression ratio of 9.5 to 1. The horsepower rating in the Special series has been boosted from 184 to 228, with compression ratio raised to 8.9 to 1.

Safety features built into the 1956 Buick include a four-point rubber pad atop the instrument panel, seat belts which are available as dealer-installed equipment on all models, improved power brakes for faster stopping, and improved acceleration in the driving range to minimize the danger in passing. Door latches have an interlocking feature that prevents them from flying open in event of a collision.

The new line comes in four series with 18 body styles mounted on two wheelbases. Dynaflo has been made standard equipment on all but the Special series.

All models feature new interiors with richer fabrics in a wide choice of colors that harmonize with the exterior of the car. All trim is in long-wearing nylon and corduroy, except the Roadmaster and Century convertibles which are trimmed in leather.

Colored carpets matching the interior are available on all models. And for the first time, brake and accelerator pedals are available in harmonizing colors.

Dual exhausts are standard equipment on the Roadmaster and optional on all other models.

A new instrument panel, identical to all series, has been designed for 1956 with the AO Redliner speedometer standard on all models. All instruments are located directly in front of the steering wheel within the direct view of the driver.

The new V-shaped grille has a wide screen which is chrome-plated and buffed to a high luster and is centered with a large medallion carrying the name—Buick, year and series. KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)—Registration of purebred whiteface cattle passed the half-million mark this year, more than twice the number of combined registrations for all other breeds.

The American Hereford association, with national headquarters here, said 522,629 purebred animals were registered during the breeding year ended Aug. 31. This total was the third highest on record.

The association said the number of farms and ranches maintaining registered Hereford herds climbed to 80,000 this year, a world's record for any single breed.

Statistics on the Hereford breed are compiled in the modernistic association headquarters set off by a huge plastic and steel replica of a Hereford bull atop a 60-foot pylon. The figure is illuminated at night. President Eisenhower, in a tribute to the cattle-breeding industry, dedicated the one-million dollar structure in October, 1953.

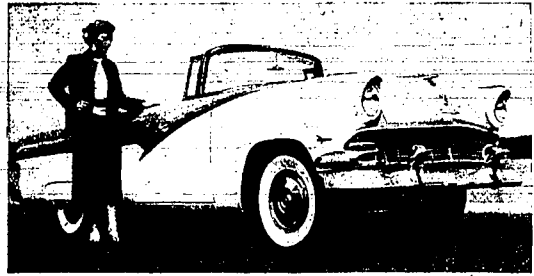

To keep the driver's chest from hitting the steering column in a crash, the new three-stroke steering wheel, available only on Ford in its price class, has its center hub recessed 3 1/2 inches below the wheel rim.

Rear view mirrors have a special harking designed to prevent shattering. Front and rear seat mountings have been strengthened so they

will resist greater impact.

In addition, Ford offers two optional safety devices. Seat belts, designed to withstand pull up to 4,000 pounds, will help to hold occupants inside cars, and prevent forward motion. 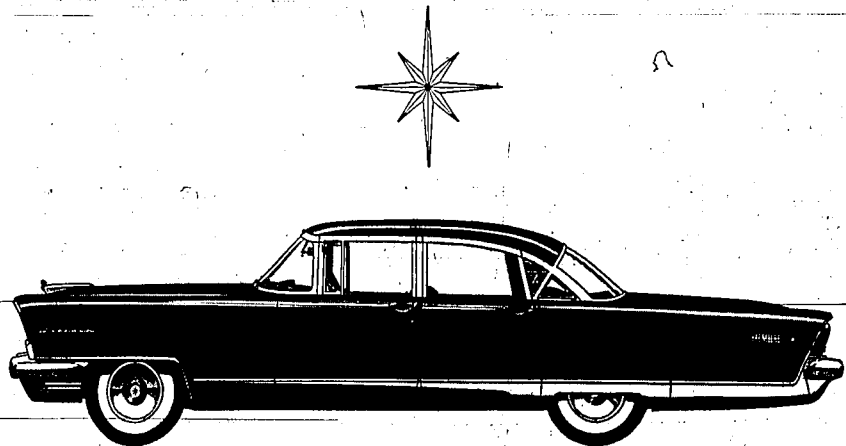

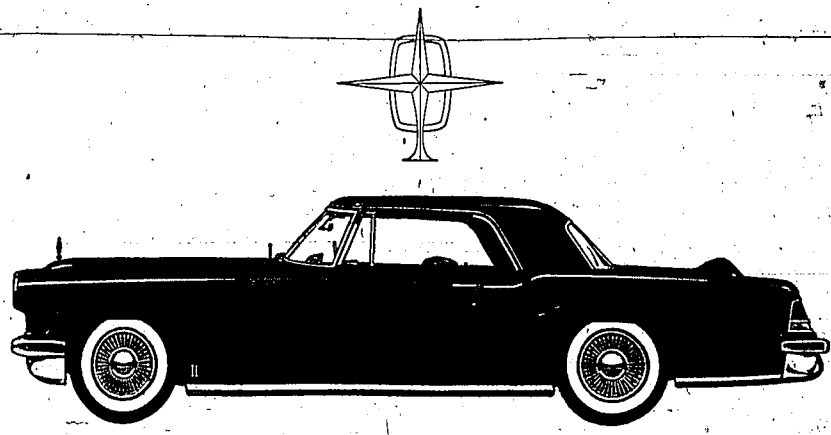

Parchment Is Possible Clue To Old Bible

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—This is the answer to those who say we can't have the Old Testament in its original form.

It is now nearly nine years since an archbishop of the Byrran Church, near Alexandria, Egypt, discovered a first held in his hands a brittle, dusty roll of parchment. He did not know what it was. He could not read the script which was partially visible where the edges had broken.

Yet, something gripped his interest and impelled him to find out about the strange object.

Jerusalem in 1942

The place was Jerusalem in the summer of 1941.

Even today the archbishop's dark eyes burn with a deep intensity when he describes that moment.

For the cylinder of parchment, together with other rolls, and uncounted thousands of fragments of all others—all found together—have come to be known as the "Dead Sea scrolls."

Archbishop Samuel, who now administers the Byrran Church in the United States and Canada, was one of the first to take an interest in the scrolls. They were taken from the caves near the Dead Sea where they had been buried for centuries.

More Found

Since the original finds, other caves yielded up still more scrolls and fragments. Evidently, long ago, a whole library was hidden away in the remote, uninhabited gorges on the shores of the Dead sea.

Who did this? Why? How did they find the scrolls? What writings did they contain?

Questions sprung up on every hand. The first shadowy indications of what the scrolls might be established the archaeologists and Biblical scholars.

Some Identified

For some books of the Old Testament were quickly identified, along with some of the so-called apocryphal writings.

The most thrilling fact was their age—which was hotly disputed. They were 2,000 years old, and more—that is, written during the era of the Christ.

Thus, they provide "undreamed of illumination to the study of Biblical literature," said Dr. Frank Cross, distinguished American scholar who is in Jerusalem working on the scrolls.

Point Stressed

To Archbishop Samuel, the important point is:

"They establish the fact that the Bible was written before and during the time of Christ, not in the Middle Ages as some have claimed. This proves that the Bible in our hands today is the true Bible."

It will be long years before all the writings found in the caves have been translated and evaluated. Optimistic scholars estimate 10 to 20 years. Others, however, say enough material is at hand to keep them working at top speed for the next 50 years.

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Postal Racket Is Exposed by U.S. Workers

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—Chief Inspector David Stephens of the U. S. postoffice department read the teletype message and shook his head wearily.

"It's a vicious racket... vicious. The wonder is that people are still falling for it."

The message came from Chicago. It told four postal inspectors had arrested a swindler who preyed on scores of bereaved families by trying them cheap bibles addressed to the deceased—for \$3 a copy.

But the Chicago incident is just a drop in the nationwide bucket as the fast-buck boys, charity racketeers, mail-order operators, "holier-than-thou" crews and other fly-by-night operators fleece the American public out of millions of dollars a year.

The charity field alone, the Better Business Bureau estimates at least 120 million dollars falls into the hands of charlatans and slick-trick-quick promoters. A total of four billion dollars is contributed annually to legitimate U. S. charities.

That means 120 million dollars is going into the pockets of racketeers which should be going to aid legitimate charities, Inspector Stephens said.

The Chicago "Bible swindler" the culprit watched obituary notices published in newspapers and sent out by mail. He then mailed the reputed \$3 Bibles cost \$1 apiece.

Police squads and postal authorities are making a nationwide drive to alert for such "charity chasers," as these parasites of the underworld are known. Around 15 million Americans die annually. That is the grim harvest they feed on.

Business-wide force of 1,000 postal inspectors investigate through the mail crimes ranging from an estimated \$1 million a year to mail theft, said the charity racket is the most lucrative of all the myriad traps baited for kind-hearted but gullible citizens.

A recent case, he said, involved an outfit which billed a nationwide "Department of California Handicapped War Veterans"—implying it was an official state agency—and solicited funds for alleged hospital care of veterans.

In three months he said, the promoters took in \$138,000 and pocketed \$97,000 for expenses. Ten firms were indicted for mail fraud and conspiracy after postal inspectors cracked down.

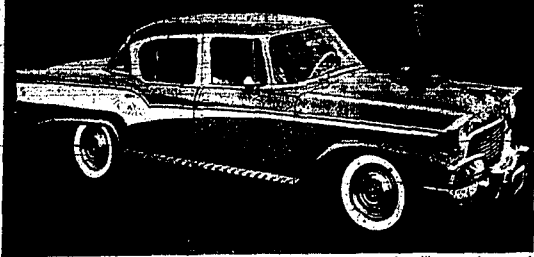
In another case, Stephens said, the Pittsburgh man sent out 158,000 letters a month containing cheap plastic crucifixes along with an emotional appeal for \$1 to aid Catholic charity. He was raking in \$1200 a day when postal inspectors tapped on his door. He is now under mail-order return orders.

Chairman John Dowdy, D. Tex., said his house postoffice subcommittee is making a study of the entire situation as a basis for proposed new laws to curb unscrupulous "junk" sent through the mail. The lawmakers may also consider legislation requiring charity fund-raisers to submit detailed reports on how much money is raised and how it is used.

Leland S. McCarthy, managing director of the Washington Better Business Bureau, offers this advice: "There is a possibility to help obligeation—no return—anything you didn't order, even if it's accompanied by stamps to cover return postage. You can keep the stamps or give them to some worthy charity."

MOSCOW, April 25 (AP)—The official organ of Russia's ministry of foreign affairs today charged that Joseph Stalin let the Soviet Union wide open to Nazi attack despite the warnings of the Soviet intelligence service.

Stevenson's friends in California are not sure that he will win, but they are counting heavily on the May 20 primary in California.

He has scattered delegate strength already earned in some other states. That would seem to assure him 300 or more. Nomination requires 688 1/2 votes.

Kefauver Lagging in Florida Kefauver should win all Florida's 28 votes and Oregon's 12, he seems unlikely to reach 300 on the first ballot. His present strength lies primarily in Minnesota with 26 votes, New Hampshire with 16, Wisconsin with 26 and Tennessee 12. California victory, however, would make Kefauver the first ballot leader if many states cast "faithful" votes.

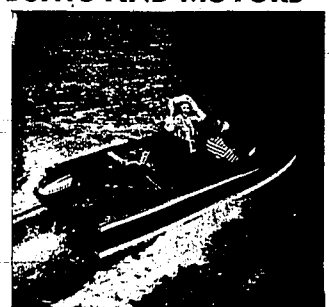

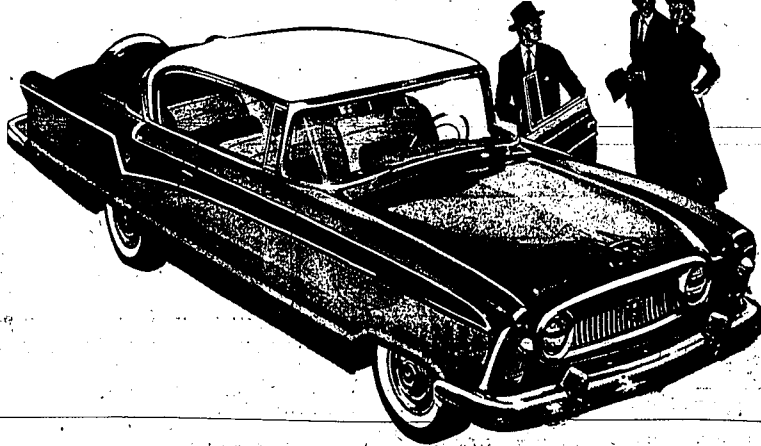

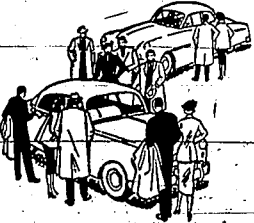

But there are many industry analysts who foresee the time when automatic transmissions and most of the power actuated accessories will be standard equipment on all makes.

Most buyers in the lower price bracket are ordering automatic transmissions. Makers in the medium price field say up to 95 percent of their 1956 models are being equipped with customer-ordered transmissions.

The ratio is not quite so high in the demand for power steering and power brakes, but the record shows a steady upward movement in the market for these refinements.

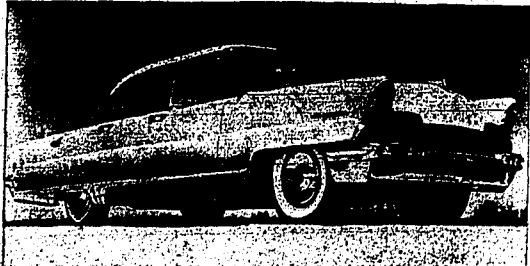
It is a matter of record that most of the long-established convenience of the modern motorcar were developed as optional extra cost items. Windshields and electric turn buttons once were in that category.

The industry experts predicting standardization of the more modern extras say the time will come when it will be more economical for the car maker to provide them than to omit them. Meanwhile, they say, the cost of such items as power brakes and power steering will go down as over-all output increases.

This has not been true of automatic transmissions; they cost more today in some instances than they did five years ago. The industry answer to that, of course, is that the automatic transmission has undergone more engineering improvement than most of the other optional equipment items offered with the car.

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Oil Sought at Scene of War Across Egypt

CAIRO, April 25 (AP)—The world's most extensive search for oil is taking place in the Egyptian desert over one of the most famous battlefields of World War II.

It is a dangerous search because of false reports of sudden death. There are still nearly 600,000 land mines, boobytraps and unexploded shells littering the area where British "Blacks" and Germany's Afrika Korps fought.

But underneath could be one of the world's richest oil fields. Its discovery would change the economic face of Egypt and might affect her policy toward both Russia and the western world.

The search is being conducted by the American-owned Sahara Petroleum company, representing four of the biggest United States oil companies—the Continental Oil company, Ohio Oil company, Cities Service company and Richfield Oil corporation.

No Oil Found Yet
Already the search has cost nearly twenty million dollars in an exploration which extends over 30,000 square miles from the Nile to Libya. No oil has been found yet but research has confirmed the presence of rock formations which could contain oil deposits comparable to the other great midwest fields.

The search was by one company official as the "most intensive ever" carried out in the "history of oil." There are 12 ground parties in the field and complete aerial surveys have been made. It is unique in that every foot of land has first to be cleared of mines laid in a criss cross pattern by British, German and Italian. As one engineer put it, "You play out in that desert and it's like you're in a nest of rattlesnakes."

Area Well Mined
Around El Alamein alone where thousands of war dead lie in two giant cemeteries beside the desert road, there are 900,000 unexploded mines. Thousands more surround such battlefields as El Dami and Mersa Matruh—every one of them still deadly after 11 years beneath the desert sands.

The mine clearing is being conducted by a crack team of American demolition experts who learned their trade from Germany to Guadalcanal. Already they have destroyed 80,000 tons of mines and shells in a year.

The area cleared represents a 30-foot wide strip 3700 miles long—more than the distance across the United States.

No Casualties Yet
"So far we have not had any casualties," says one "but it's a job where you can't afford to get careless."

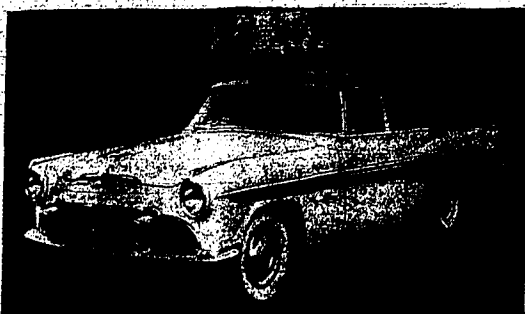
"At first we used to lift the mines by hand but booby traps and uncertain effects of age and weather made that too dangerous. Now we blow them up with dynamite as we find them."

The chance of discovering oil makes this worthwhile since it could completely change Egypt's rocky economy and provide Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser with the money he needs for such projects as the great Aswan dam.

It would also make him independent of both East and West and confirm Egypt's leadership of the Arab world.

While his smile face Israel in Egypt's eastern desert, the real solution of his problems may be buried beneath the old battlefields where thousands already have died.

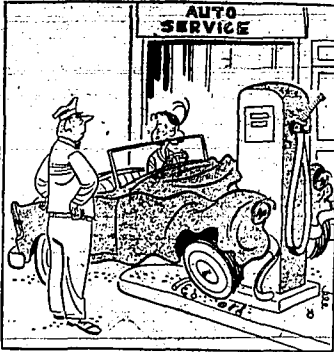
