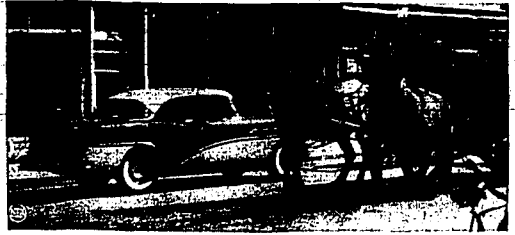

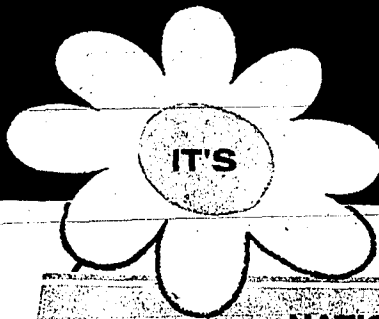
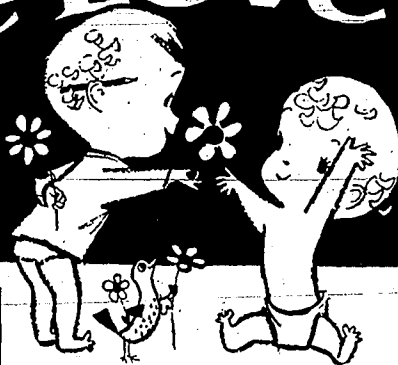

City Officials Demand "Jim Crow" Ruling

MONTGOMERY, Ala., April 25 (AP)—City officials demanded today that the U. S. Supreme Court rule against the local Jim Crow law of race court action that might affect desegregation across the South.

Mayor W. A. Gayle and Police Commissioner Guy Bell, both members of the segregationist White Citizens council, called in bus company officials this morning to lay down an ultimatum.

Gayle, who already had ordered arrests of any actual violators of the segregation law, said the Chicago firm must restore its "color boards" separate Negroes from whites or lose its franchise.

Nelson Oliver, U. S. Federal national vice president, gave advance notice that his firm considers local Jim Crow "outraged by the supreme court in the case of segregation in which it operates transit lines."

There were no reports of actual bus boycotts across the state here by the few Negroes still riding buses since the start of a city-wide rapid bus boycott of a segregationist Rapid 20 weeks ago.

The Rev. Ralph Abernathy said he and other Negro leaders had a "profitable" meeting with bus company officials yesterday but did not hold out any hope for the strikers.

Chas. Victory, The Negroes asked the supreme court gave them a victory in their demand for first-class, first-seated seating but continued the boycott in an attempt to get Negro drivers for some bus routes.

A last of the effect of the supreme court ruling outside of South Carolina, the only state directly involved, would affect the desegregation steps national and other lines in at least 23 southern cities.

In some of these cities from Texas to the coast Negroes yesterday took first timid steps across the color line on the strength of decisions by local or state officials that the court decision applies to them.

Busing Cities Before the court last Monday affirmed the unconstitutionality of bus segregation in South Carolina such steps would have brought immediate arrests in some of the cities. Others had already tacitly lowered the color barrier.

But authorities in Georgia, Florida, Mississippi and Louisiana, as well as in some of the other southern states, balked their segregation laws still in effect and warned they will be enforced.

"We stand 100 per cent together on this matter," Gayle said after conferring with the two other commission members. The bus company has a contract and will have to abide by it or be subject to court action.

One weak spot is about 13 miles west of Boise in Ada county, where crushed rock will be dumped along 700 feet of the north bank of the river.

The other is about five miles west of Caldwell, where the river has washed out a few acres of farmland. The engineers said work would begin there immediately on a 600-foot gravel and lava rock levy.

Citrus Crops May Be Hurt By Fruit Fly

MIAMI, April 25 (AP)—Agricultural specialists reported today that so far an invasion of Texas, California and Florida's billion-dollar citrus industry.

They warned, however, that Florida truck farmers face a possible federal embargo, which could result in a loss of crop profits up to five million dollars.

Robert W. Rullage, general manager of the Florida Citrus Mutual, assured citrus owners that the fruit fly, "as far as can be determined," is presently confined to a 10- or 12-square mile area in the north part of Miami.

"I'm afraid we are going to see some sort of an embargo and we don't like it," he said. "If the federal fly-exterminating expert, Dr. O. Berry, is reporting directly to the agriculture authorities in Washington and an embargo decision will be made there."

He also pointed to the possibility that several other states may have Florida fruit. He said he received numerous inquiries from the Florida and Arizona during the day asking about the fruit fly situation.

Body of Soldier Found in Tunnel

VERDUN, France, April 26 (AP)—The U. S. Army's 7th Engineers found the battered body of one of their buddies today under tons of rock in a collapsed shaft of an ancient fort.

The victim was Specialist 2/c Gerald Dunnington, 22, Woodstock, Va., father of two infant boys. He was killed in action on the night of April 21, 1918, during the battle of the Meuse-Argonne.

He was last seen by his wife late Saturday afternoon when he walked over the green hillside around the bunker fort that has served France in wars since the era of the Roman legions.

He told his wife to wait outside while he went in the fort for a "quick look around." He never came out. After waiting four hours, she notified authorities.

Irrigation Water Supply Will Be Plentiful for South Idaho

By The Associated Press
Irrigation water supplies will be plentiful this summer in southern Idaho and eastern Oregon according to the bureau of reclamation, geological survey and other agencies.

In the drought areas of last year, storage facilities well filled this week. Reservoir current levels are being kept below those of a year ago where possible to make way for the heavy spring runoff still to come.

Lynn Randall, Idaho Falls, Snake river watermaster, said in his weekly report on the Snake that there was quite a heavy runoff from the low drainage areas during the last week. He said this was about two weeks earlier than usual.

Randall said it was welcomed this year to get the low drainage discharge out of the area before the higher elevation runoff starts.

Randall added that 228,000 acre-feet have been spilled from Jackson Lake to make way for the runoff. "And he said that unless rainfall is deficient the next two months, it seems likely an additional 100,000 acre-feet will have to be spilled."

That was true in several other southern Idaho water storage facilities. The Boise river flow was many times that recorded at this time last year because of water being spilled

U.S. Tests Made on Russian Vaccine for Conquering Flu

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—U. S. scientists soon will know how much truth there is to Russia's claim of a vaccine which is conquering the National Institute of Health Bethesda, Md., is now making elaborate laboratory tests of a dozen lots of live virus flu vaccine which a group of Russian scientists presented to the NIH on a recent tour of the United States.

If the vaccine is as effective as the Russians claim, it could open up a new approach for U. S. work in this field, NIH officials said.

It might also broaden the base of immunity of vaccines against the mysterious virus "X" which causes national and worldwide flu epidemics.

More than 200 mice are being used in the complex evaluation tests. Some time in late spring NIH will make its first report on the live virus vaccine.

It will be at least two years before U. S. citizens can enjoy the benefits of this Soviet vaccine—if the tests are successful. Regulations dictate careful procedures in developing vaccines new to the United States.

U. S. virus experts have been generally aware of the Russian vaccine. Now that they have supplies they need for research.

The Russian visitors who delivered it are internationally recognized experts in virus disease research. The two most prominent are Dr. Anatoli A. Smorodintsev and Mikhail P. Chumakov, both of the USSR Academy of Medical Sciences. Two other researchers accompanied them.

The U. S. has a flu vaccine, now given to military personnel, which is 50 to 70 per cent effective. Dr. Chumakov reported that the Russian vaccine is used widely with "great success" and that it had "great therapeutic value."

Previous red government reports claimed the vaccine was practically eliminating flu in the Soviet Union. The Russian vaccine is the live virus type. The U. S. vaccine is the killed virus type.

Many years ago, NIH spokesman said, U. S. scientists decided the killed virus type held the most promise and concentrated on its development. Among other things the killed virus type has less side-effects, although U. S. doctors do use live

U. S. virus vaccines against some diseases. Dr. Chumakov told NIH experts that they had embarked on the live virus line of work because the Russian people do not like to be stuck with needles. Killed-virus vaccines must be administered that way.

The Russian live virus flu vaccine is inhaled through the nose with an atomizer. Dr. Chumakov admitted it was not given to children because of the danger of serious side-effects to them.

However, the fact that the Russian vaccine is the live virus type could give it the potential of providing a broader base of immunity, NIH experts admit. It has more of a shotgun effect against many types of flu virus. The killed vaccine has a rifle effect against a specific flu virus.

NIH officials are generally pleased by the results of the Russian visit. Information was exchanged freely on a whole range of virus diseases. It is claimed, with both the Russian and U. S. doctors benefitting.

The land, known as acquired lands, is not subject to the usual mining laws.

DENVER, April 26 (AP)—A "very considerable amount of fraud" has accompanied the uranium boom in the ore-rich Colorado plateau.

Chairman J. Sinclair Armstrong of the securities and exchange commission said today.

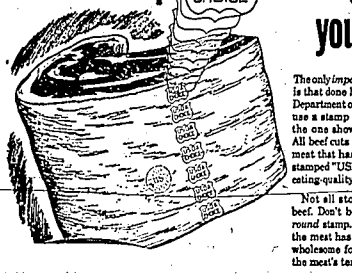

NEW YORK, April 28.—Time and the weather are expected to be some of the factors that could mess up the U.S. economy.

Nothing you say about the weather can ever apply to all parts of the country. But time and economically important factors are having a cold and wet spring.

This delay in the crop and weather means a slow start for the wheat and corn crop and a delay in the cotton and soybean harvest.

Time—rather, man's tinkering with nature—will affect conditions in some industries. Last Sunday when many industrial and financial centers will go on daylight saving time.

It will bring the usual headache for transportation services which will have to decide where and how much to alter schedules between places that do and places that don't change over for the summer.

News services will also be reporting some things—like the New York stock market—your favorite papers in standard time cities, and other things—like sport events and radio programs—your favorite papers going to press on new time.

Television and radio programs will have to be arranged, at best as possible, for a mixed audience—some on new time, some on old.

Time changes where they have a sort of local option on daylight time—some industrial centers switching over and other parts of the state leaving the clocks alone—things can get really confused.

LAGUNA BEACH, Calif., April 27.—Mark Edwards, 2, isn't fully aware how close he came to death.

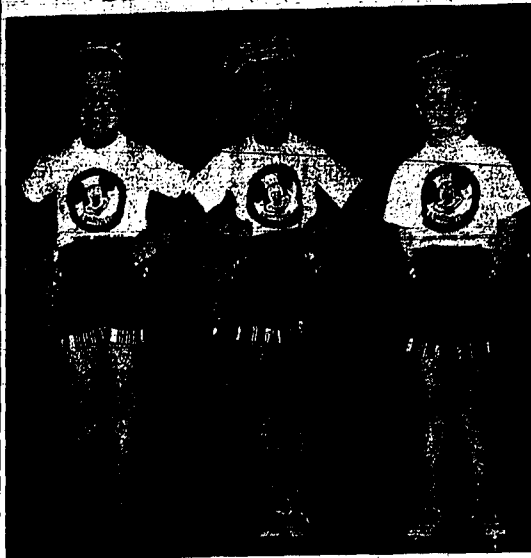

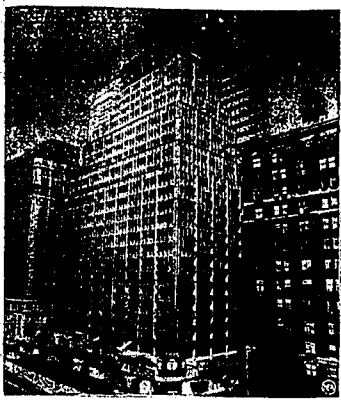

Aluminum Provides U.S. With Major Revolution in Building

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Want to see a revolution? Look in your freezer. Inspect your new house. Check your new car. Notice the office building going up downtown. You won't have to look hard to see a revolution in American living being caused by light, shiny aluminum. Aluminum production has doubled during each 10-year period since 1900 to become second in the world only to iron and steel. There's no end in sight to its expansion. Heaviest current uses are in aluminum food packages. A wide range of frozen foods and whole meals, sold in aluminum containers which also serve as the cooking pan are on the market. A big section of the fishing industry is shifting to aluminum cans. It has now been established that aluminum does not cause vitamin D deficiencies. The building business is the biggest user of aluminum and fastest to expand its use of the light metal. Today there are 70 "skyscrapers" under construction which will have aluminum "skins" or "curtain walls." In homes aluminum screens, trim, gutters, furniture, screen doors and awnings and blinds are also enjoying immense popularity. About 40 per cent of all window frames made today are aluminum. For many years high tension transmission lines have been aluminum. Newest advance is in the use of aluminum low-tension transmission lines, including home wiring. Telephone lines are beginning to be made of aluminum.

Report Eyes Curb for Big Yankee Firm

WASHINGTON (APR 26)—A staff report to the senate's "big business" subcommittee questioned whether General Motors should be allowed to expand freely into any new fields. It also says GM should cut prices of its cars and other products in view of what it says were the company's "extremely high profits" over the past eight years. The report, made public Tuesday night by Sen. O'Mahoney, D., Wyo., suggests further study by congress and the justice department to see if action is called for to curb what is described as a trend toward monopoly in the six-billion-dollar corporation, world's largest manufacturing concern. O'Mahoney heads the judiciary subcommittee on anti-trust and monopoly, which recently completed a report on General Motors as a "case history" in an inquiry to determine whether changes are needed in the nation's anti-trust laws. In Detroit, a GM spokesman said company officials have not had a chance to study the report. "However," he added, "it is the law that the entire record before the committee, the staff's conclusions as published are unassailable."

U. N. Reveals Atomic-Peace Code Project

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., April 24 (AP)—A worldwide atomic code to make life into President Eleanor Roosevelt's atom-for-peace plan was made public today. The United States is working for full approval of the program at a huge conference to be convened here around Sept. 24.

Blancher—broached the idea of using atoms for peaceful purposes in his speech to the U.N. assembly on Dec. 8, 1943. He is expected here to make the opening address at the world conference next fall. The American hope the code will be signed at the end of that conference and will be in operation in 1947.

The United States, Russia and 10 other countries approved the program last Wednesday after weeks of negotiations. It would create an international atomic energy agency to see that peaceful nations around the globe share benefits of the atomic age. It contains provisions barring war-like use of atomic material, pooled—with the agency and creates and inspection system to make this certain.

Despite the unusual agreement among the 12 countries on the broad outlines of the code, a fight looms in the conference next fall in Red China.

James J. Wadsworth, a U.S. delegate, told reporters the United States is opposed to giving Red China a seat and chance of helping getting a place are reserved. On the other hand, a Soviet spokesman said Russia, backed by India and Czechoslovakia, would demand a place for Red China on the board of governors of the proposed agency.

The truth is that we are both reformed thumb suckers who, for social reasons, have turned to substitute adult satisfactions. You probably had a small thumb, so

Barrett said the existence of 120 million pounds of surplus wool is a "drain over the market," depressing prices and costing the government 25 million dollars in additional payments to growers.

Envoy of U.N. Asks Jordan's Help in Peace

JERUSALEM, April 26 (AP)—Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld sought Jordan's help yesterday in his three-week-old U. N. mission to pacify the armistice line between Israel and the United Nations official had his first talk with President King today for 1 1/2 hours. A committee spokesman said they would meet again Thursday morning.

Gene Jordan said he went to the Jordan sector of Jerusalem for a three-hour visit to holy places in the walled city. He said he was criticized by the Arab press for talking with him for having talked with the Israeli side. He said he had met with Israeli leaders in the Jordan sector last week. The U. N. plan for a partition plan was not formalized. The U. N.-Jordan mixed armistice commission found that both Israel and Jordan had violated their 1949 armistice by firing across the armistice line a week ago. One Israeli soldier and one of Jordan's national guardsmen were killed in the incident.

Wen's Vote The commission chairman, an American U. N. observer, attempted to pass paragraphs that attempted to say which side opened fire. In a pending complaint to the same commission, Israel says Arab gunmen killed four Israelis Monday night near the Jordan border. Porting Minister Moab Barak has brought this to Hammarskjöld's attention.

See No Long Talks Despite such incidents, spokesman said the secretary general fore- saw no such long technical talks in human as were necessary at previous stops. He held that the problem of the armistice line is usually involve a "simple yes" or "no" by both sides. Hammarskjöld has already visited Israel and the other three Arab countries it borders—Egypt, Lebanon and Syria. A visit also he got a Egyptian-Israeli cease-fire.

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—The United States today expelled two members of the Soviet United Nations delegation, calling them "no longer desirable" because of their part in the sudden "re-defection" of five Soviet seamen. A note handed Soviet Ambassador Georgi Zarubin also chided Arkady Sobolev, head of Russia's U. N. delegation, for his conduct in the incident. However, Sobolev's expulsion was not demanded. The note, made public by the state department, charged the two members of the Soviet delegation, Alexander K. Gouzenov and Nikolai Turkin, had behaved in "particularly objectionable manner."

Reports Say Polish Reds Eye War's Katyn Forest Slayings

NEW YORK, April 26 (AP)—A report has leaked across the Iron curtain that the Polish Communist government is investigating the Katyn forest massacre. Analysts here doubt the suggestion the Polish Reds might dare raise this hot issue. Still, the report deserves attention because the Polish Communist side are going much further these days in their denunciation of Stalin and his works than other Soviet satellites. Katyn forest, in western Russian near Mlyensk, was the scene of the

mass murder in 1940 of more than 20,000 Polish army officers who had been missing since the Polish Red first in 1919. The Germans, who first reported the massacre during World War II, said the Russians did it. The Soviet government blamed the Nazis. An American congressional committee held hearings for nine months in 1951-52 and laid the massacre at the door of the Russians. The new report from Poland says the Warsaw government has released a group to investigate and can be expected to make a report

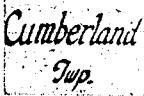

Key, Not Beer, Is Real King Of Germany; Place Locks Up

PLANNING: Germany, April 26 (AP)—Don't let anybody tell you that in Germany, beer is king. The real king of the federal republic is the key.

Keys are everywhere. You start getting a key to the door of every apartment house without one. The German housewife would not know where to begin her day without her key.

She carries around at least a dozen of them, and sometimes a score or more.

First there's the key to the front door. Next there's the key to the apartment house.

Then there's the key to the apartment door. In each door of the house, whether it be a two-room flat or a 20-room mansion, there is the familiar key. Many Germans still lock themselves into their bedroom at night.

But this is only the beginning of the key business. There are keys to the back door, too; to the basement, to the attic; to the china closet, the desk, even to the fuse box.

And, strange as it may seem, Germans even lock up their refrigerators.

Beer, of course, is a German institution, too. The ministry of foods announced this month that 10 million gallons of beer were consumed in the federal republic in 1955. This averages out, the ministry said, to 20 gallons per person, including women, children, and "people and refugees."

And they all use keys, an indefinite number, since there is not yet a federal ministry of keys to keep score.

If anybody happens to lock the key inside a room or a refrigerator, he'll send out a call for the "schlosser" or keymaker. A key follows in this country.

No self-respecting German motorist would ever leave his car in a locked, even for a quick dash into the grocery store. And the quality of the key is important. The living room and the keys in the car shock German sensibility.

Not long ago an American businessman in Frankfurt bought a house and went on an inspection tour of his land. The living room was locked and no key was available.

"It's in the basement," said the landlord. "Let's go get it."

But the basement was locked, too. The call went out for the "Schlosser."

Sociologists have an explanation for the German key consciousness. They explain that the German people are more security conscious than any other people in the world.

Parley Is Held For Pacifying Tense Region

LONDON, April 26 (AP)—Soviet and British leaders ended their London talks in a somber mood tonight. But there were indications both sides will halt the conference as a limited success toward easing world tensions.

Premier Nikolai Bulganin and communist boss Nikita Khrushchev tramped grimly out of No. 10 Downing street after a final emergency session. Prime Minister Winston Churchill stood behind them, managed a thin smile. His deputy, Richard Butler, was red-faced and looked tense.

A 31-word British communiqué rang down the curtain on further bargaining.

Announcement: Results later.

The final stage of the Anglo-Soviet discussions was completed this afternoon. The results will be announced after the return of the Soviet leader from the visit to Scotland tomorrow evening.

Word spread in diplomatic circles that the two-power announcement will report no sweeping achievements, but claim advances in several relatively minor spheres.

Summit on Progress

For instance, there was a rumor progress had been made on ruble exchange rates. The Russians now pay the ruble at four to the dollar, a figure unusually high on the world market.

Both sides are likely to represent the conference as having revived the old "spirit of Geneva" in a minor key.

Public Outburst

But public outbursts by Khrushchev midway in the visit had already demonstrated fading chances for any solid agreement in the major fields of difference—the Middle East, German reunification, disarmament and east-west trade.

After a day which saw a long conference, the two Russians took bus seats tonight at Covent Garden Opera house and watched "Mercury Fountains," England's most famed ballet, dance "Swan Lake," a Russian favorite.

Thursday they pay a flying visit to Edinburgh and return in the evening. They plan a news conference Friday morning. Then they will go to Bournemouth, board a Soviet cruiser or jetliner and sail for home.

Idaho Judge Dies After Resigning

ALAMOGADO, Ida., April 26 (AP)—Chauncey T. Tolman, 57, died yesterday less than a week after he resigned as Alamogado police judge because of illness.

A retired railroad boilermaker, Tolman worked as an Alamogado city council member for eight years and became police judge last May.

He is survived by his widow and two daughters.

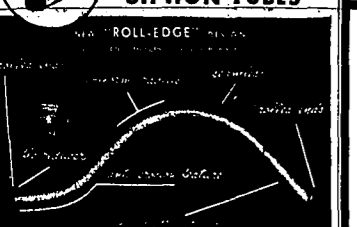
