Urban Revolt Is Halted by Royal Federal Troops

HAVANA, April 30 (UP)—The Cuban government announced today it had crushed a revolutionary outbreak in Havana. It reported today 60 miles east, and that 11 soldiers had been killed. The government suspended constitutional guarantees to choke off further revolutionary threats and arrested former President Fulgencio Batista. Charges he had been organizing. He was later released. Troops were posted at strategic points in Havana and public buildings were under heavy guard. President Gen. Fulgencio Batista was at his Camp Columbia military headquarters.

The suspension of constitutional guarantees—ending the right of public assembly and freedom of press—was invoked for the first time since the abortive revolt at Santa Clara, July 1953.

Government authorities said 11 persons were known dead and at least 100 wounded in the Matanzas fighting between government and rebel forces. The army said 100 rebels were wounded and that none were killed.

The fighting started at 10:30 a. m. today when 100 rebels, including 100 civilians, attempted a frontal attack on the infantry garrison at Matanzas. The rebels were repulsed. The army said the attack led by Reynold Garcia, a former commander of the department of Matanzas, was a military operation. Hours after the fighting army parades moved through Matanzas and the suburbs setting the scene of a rebel force. Unconfirmed reports said suspected revolutionaries in Havana were being arrested.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHORLIGIG

WASHINGTON—A flat and noisy defiance of the northern Democrats will be hurled by the southern and Rooseveltian faction of the party when the annual convention here on May 11 to 13. The stage has been set for an intra-party row which will make a November victory impossible.

With seemingly studied deliberation, the two groups are being organized so as to transform it into an outright fight of the politics and persons of the party. The Democrats are being organized into a single prominent figure from that section has been invited to participate, or to present the southern viewpoint.

Instead of President Eisenhower, the principal target of attack will be the so-called "four big names" according to Joseph L. Rauh, Jr., ADA national chairman, the Democrats have forfeited their right to ask for the basis of the Rayburn-Johnson legislative record.

In Rauh's opinion, they have flouted and antagonized "the coalition of labor, small business, farmers and the middle class created the new deal and sustained the foundation of the country."

ADA HEAD ATTACKS JOHNSON—"What record has Rauh," ran Johnson late to the country in support of his party's claim to the right of executive leadership?

Rauh's attack particularly the natural gas bill sponsored by the Texas, denouncing it as a "million-billion giveaway." He characterized the pro-segregation manifesto signed by 107 southern members of congress as "infamous."

Ironically, Rauh's blast against the senate majority leader was issued simultaneously with public endorsement of Gov. Nathan P. Davis of Georgia, and Senators Byrd and Robertson of Virginia. In fact, it is expected that Johnson will be the man around whom almost all the Dixie defectors will rally, which should give him an early-ballot tally of more than 300 delegates.

WEAPONS RACE CRUCIAL

There was a time when the free world scoffed at many of Russia's boasts in the weapons field. It has learned not to take them lightly. And it will not shrug off the latest claim that the Soviet military scientists have solved the mystery of H-bomb warheads capable of striking any spot on earth.

This particular boast may well represent substantial exaggeration. After all, the globe is a pretty big place. And even though the Soviet Union spreads across 6,000 miles and has the world's largest military arsenal, it is not clear that it has the potential command of vast additional areas, that still leaves a lot of territory a long way from Communist-held soil.

Furthermore, as the Russians define it, "soon" may be quite a ways in the future. It may not spell it out in terms of years or months.

Yet there is no reason for us in America, or for our friends abroad, to take great comfort from these likely exaggerations. Cut away a good deal from what Wladimir K. Kozlov said and you still have plenty to worry about.

He talked, of course, about the so-called intercontinental ballistic missile which the experts believe can be perfected to deliver an H-bomb warhead to a range of some 5,000 miles.

Some of our own lawmakers are convinced Russia is indeed ahead of the United States in the race to produce such a weapon. And President Eisenhower has acknowledged that we trail Moscow in some aspects of the guided missile race, though he does not specify which aspects.

In any event, there can be no doubt whatsoever that the Kremlin is pressing hard to beat us to this all-important goal. Whether or not the Russians are ahead today, we know quite well we have not won this vital contest.

Every uncommitted nation and many of the weaker free world countries are watching to see who will be second, however narrowly. If the front-runner is Russia, the "neutrals" pressures will become intense. The world will be going to war in quarters to seek peace with the Kremlin's terms.

That is what Khrushchev is playing for when he boasts now. He knows Russia has convinced the toughest skeptics that it doesn't often deal in wholly empty claims regarding weapons. Thus he knows that even exaggerated boasts will be at least partly believed by many men.

The Soviet leaders came to Britain speaking again of "peace," as they have so often in recent times. But it is utterly plain from Khrushchev's digression into military matters that Russia is thinking in peace terms, but in its own defense—not the free world's.

This is a lesson that ought not to be lost on us if we should dare at this juncture to be complacent about our position in the crucial guided missile race.

NO LONGER 1818 FOR VETS

Veterans' organization lobbies aren't going to like the big report just filed by President Truman's commission on veterans' benefits, headed by Gen. of the Armies Omar N. Bradley.

After a year of study, the Bradley commission makes 40 recommendations for changes in existing veterans' legislation. There is no doubt that these recommendations will be accepted by Congress. They will form the basis for an overhaul by the next congress.

The Bradley commission is not recommending a general cutting down of all benefits. It is recommending that benefits be increased for those with low incomes. But it would realistically curb the pressure for a \$100-a-month pension at age 65 for all veterans, including those who age 65 face enemy fire.

Establishing that times are a changing, the first pension law was passed in 1818.

Some major considerations influenced the commission in its recommendations. It is that future generations will be benefited by being in keeping with benefits now paid under existing social security law.

As of today, eight out of 10 veterans are in the social security system. By 1965 it will be nine out of 10. It is a very high and tenth generation and the men with service-connected disabilities for whom the Bradley commission recommends some extra consideration.

SWITCH IN NATO

It is sad news for NATO and the free world that Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther is retiring after this year as NATO commander. He is a man of a brilliant record, eminently qualified for the vital post, one of the most commendable officers the United States has ever projected onto the world stage.

But the bad news is tempered with good news. His replacement will be Gen. Lauris Norstad, NATO's only four-star general. His selection is the logical one, and seems to be popular not only here but with our allies in Western Europe.

2 Russ Chiefs Arrive Home, Are Welcome

MOSEOW, April 30 (AP)—Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Communist Party Chief Nikhruzhov returned home from their trip to Britain today to a warm welcome by a crowd of thousands.

The Soviet leaders disembarked this morning from the cruiser Orizont which brought them to Moscow, Russia, the port of Koenigsberg. They left from Koenigsberg.

Bulganin and Khrushchev returned from their trip to Britain and the Soviet Union where they conferred with Prime Minister Winston Churchill and other British leaders.

Earlier, Moscow radio reported that the two Soviet leaders said they had returned to the British view that the British view "reaffirmed the correctness of Lenin's foreign policy."

They made no mention on the radio of the foreign policy that the Soviet Union has adopted since the death of Lenin.

Arrive at Port The broadcast said Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Party Secretary Nikhruzhov arrived from Portsmouth aboard the Soviet transport Orizont at 10:30 a.m. at the port of Koenigsberg.

The cruiser Orizont fired 19 flowers and showers of confetti as the broadcast said, crowds greeted them when they appeared on deck, Moscow radio said.

The broadcast said a welcome meeting was held aboard the Orizont and that the secretary of the local party committee welcomed Bulganin and Khrushchev and spoke about the "great significance of the Anglo-Soviet friendship."

Other Reply "In reply to Bulganin warmly thanked those present for the cordial welcome and said the visit of the Soviet leaders to Britain and their talks with British leaders reaffirm the correctness of Lenin's foreign policy of peace and friendship between people, a policy of peaceful co-existence."

Children draped garlands of flowers over the Soviet leaders as they came ashore. The Soviet leaders drove to Koenigsberg.

Authorities were particularly concerned because they had clamped the tight security on the Orizont at the air field after the four-jet Hermes was blown up with a time bomb several weeks ago.

The Orizont was the Hermes had gone off a few minutes later. It would have claimed as its victims the two Soviet leaders and their children who were about to board it.

The Orizont air force took over the field after the first bombing and permitted only highly screened Orizonts to work in the area. Passengers were X-rayed for bombs.

British officials labeled the first bombing an act of terrorism. They were unwilling to label last night's explosion pending an investigation.

Troop Plane Cracks up; 2 People Dead

STANSTED, England, April 30 (AP)—A four-engine troop plane crashed on takeoff with 46 persons aboard today. Four aircrew were trapped inside the smashed fuselage for two hours as fire threatened to break while rescuers worked feverishly to free them.

The rescuers finally cut their way through the crumpled metalwork of the plane and pulled the four survivors to safety in a tense, dramatic rescue operation.

The four persons trapped inside which they suffered slight injuries, were: 48 Escape Injury

But the other 48 persons aboard the four-engine troop plane which was bound for Cyprus by way of Malta with British servicemen and their families, escaped injury with the aid of seats which served as a shield.

It was in a section of the passenger compartment that the plane was crushed by the impact that the rescue drama took place.

The troop carrier, chartered by the royal air force, was taking off from Stansted when it suddenly veered off the runway and groundlooped.

As the passengers were being served, including 11 mothers and 18 children—four of whom were infants.

A flash fire would have meant disaster. But there was no fire. In the crucial moments when the bodies of an RAF man and a woman were killed on impact, and the bodies of a man, two women and a child.

Help Reached All five crew members of the Stansted airfield rushed to the scene. The aircraft was found to be in a mangled condition. Doors stood by, but could not get to the injured.

Workers undid up heavy lifting equipment and set to work on the living patterns of the plane. Two hours after the accident, the aid of the injured was freed and the bodies of the two dead were removed.

Enrico Fermi Honor Given Atom Expert

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—Dr. Enrico Fermi was honored with the first Enrico Fermi award for his work in atomic energy.

It was presented to the famed mathematician, a native of Budapest, for his "outstanding contributions" to the design and construction of computing machines for atomic research and development.

"More than anyone else," the citation said, "he was the first to show the way to control and use of atomic energy and to the general advancement of the arts and sciences for the benefit of mankind."

The award, authorized by congress in 1944, was recommended for Fermi by the AEC's general advisory committee with the approval of President Eisenhower.

It is in memory of Fermi, the Italian-born nuclear scientist, whose pioneering led the way to controlled release of atomic energy.

Battle Brewing on Criticism of Weeks, Unpaid Employees

WASHINGTON, April 30—Republicans and Democrats differed sharply today over a report critical of Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks and the use of businessmen who advise the government without pay. The dispute centered over a report released last night by a house judiciary subcommittee on the administration's use of so-called WOC's (without compensation). The report, signed by the Democratic majority of the subcommittee, dealt mainly with Weeks and his department's business and defense services administration. Rep. Kenneth B. Keating, N. Y., ranking GOP member of the group declared that "the men that wrote the majority report... drip with venom against private enterprise and even advocates measures to check property." Rep. Emanuel Celler, D. N. Y., chairman of the subcommittee, said Keating's statement was "a side and mean attack on me to protect the secretary of commerce... who has drawn a curtain of secrecy around his entire organization." The majority report, signed by

four Democrats, said that in "many instances" the commerce department gave "automatic approval" to positions made by WOC groups who were to have served only in advisory capacity. "It charged that Weeks had failed to control activities of the BDSA and allowed it to become an instrument for inside influences and the advancement of special interests." The minority report, signed by three Republicans, said the "entire tenor of the (majority) report... general condemnation of the WOC and industry advisory programs... is based upon misconception and unwarranted conclusions." "The voluntary contribution made by WOC's since the Korean war and to the present has been of inestimable value in attaining an adequate

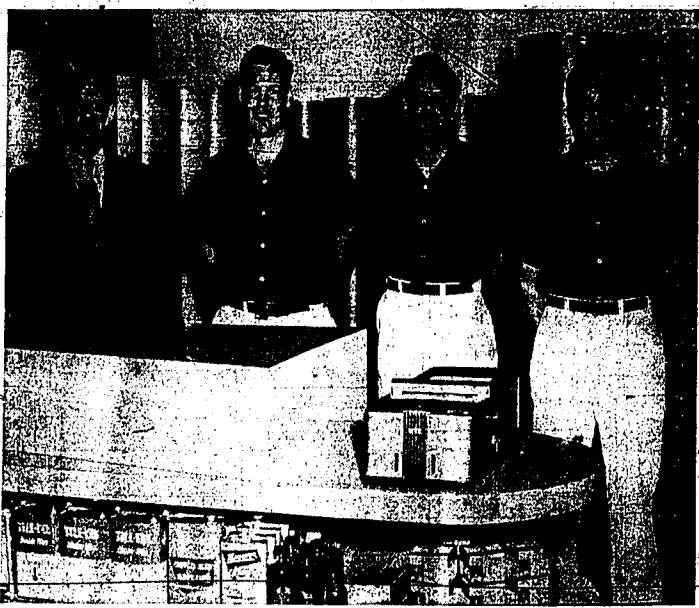
