Marine Corps
Will 'on Hook'
Top Probe

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—Members of the house armed services committee today are expected to still have the hook on the Marine Corps, S. C. "death" which they generally praised the committee's report on the Marine Corps. Details of the committee members said the report will still "wide open" regarding the Marine Corps. Officers concerned.

Had Been Drinking
The Marine Corps commandant, Gen. Matthew G. McKeon was being before the committee yesterday that he had been drinking on the night of the march. The 31-year-old Worcester, Mass., junior officer led his men into the streets where six recruits were killed and many wounded.

Remored

Paul Cunningham, R. Ia., was not satisfied with Patterson's explanation of the march. Cunningham said if McKeon were to be removed from the command, he would be "blamed" for the march. Chairman Carl Vinson of the armed services committee said the committee will continue to be wide open until congress is thoroughly satisfied that the reasons for the march are eliminated from the Marine Corps.

Rep. Robert C. Byrd, D. W. Va., said "I don't think it should be removed entirely from all military bases." He said he had suggested that a law be passed on marine regulations covering drinking.

Mourning Capital Offers Tributes for Beloved "Veep"; Services Are Slated

WASHINGTON, May 2—This mourning capital which Alben W. Barkley served so well and where he is buried to long paid its last respects today to the beloved "Veep."

The great and the lowly alike, in government and out, gathered for the 11 a.m. EDT funeral services at the Washington Methodist church at 2000 Massachusetts ave. The 75-year-old chief of a heart attack died Monday while speaking at Washington and Lee university, Lexington, Va.

One hundred and fifty seats at the church were reserved for the Barkley family and the congressional delegation.

The Rev. Dr. Frederick Brown Harris, chaplain of the house, recently retired minister of the

historic church, was the presiding minister.

Barkley's body was to be taken after the funeral by special train on his last journey home—to Paducah, Ky.—for burial services and interment tomorrow. His family and an official congressional delegation will accompany the body.

The Kentucky senator's widow, the former Mrs. Jenn Hadley of St. Louis whom he married in 1941, 78, is quoted as not enjoying at the very least a brief personal reference to the veteran senator and former vice president whose public career spanned 50 years, 41 of them in Washington.

Mrs. Barkley also requested no flowers. She asked that contributions be sent instead to the Kentucky heart fund. But that didn't stop a flood of floral tributes.

Barkley's death rang down the curtain on one of the most notable careers in American political life. No death here in years plunged the capital so quickly into complete and almost unending mourning.

The senate suspended most of its business for the rest of this week and the house yesterday canceled its legislative business and adjourned in his memory.

One example of Barkley's popularity with both parties was the action of the senate Republican party committee yesterday. It adopted a unanimous resolution of regret and adjourned its regular weekly lunch meeting, devoted to partisan planning, in his memory.

Barkley's body was brought to Washington by ambulance yesterday from the historic college town of Lexington, Va., deep in the Virginia hills at the top of the Shenandoah valley. He was taken only a few hundred yards from the grave of Robert E. Lee, military leader of the southern confederacy, who also died in 1870.

The body lay in state in an iron-cased, mahogany casket in the House funeral home here last night and until time for the services today. Hundreds visited the mortuary to pay last respects.

An honor guard from Lexington included four Washington and Lee students and four dress-uniformed cadets from Virginia Military Institute in the same town.

Although they wanted the services to be public, Barkley's family dismised any talk of a state funeral in the senate or the capital rooms.

Friends and family said Barkley didn't want one.

The venerable "Veep" body will reach Paducah at 11:30 a.m. EDT tomorrow. Burial services are planned for 2 p.m. EDT at the Broadway Methodist church in Paducah, with interment following in Mount Kemper cemetery.

Barkley's close friends denied any knowledge of reports, published by the Detroit News and the Newark N. J. News yesterday, that Barkley suffered a heart attack in 1952 while he kept secret.

Dr. Paul Dudley White, the Boston heart specialist, who treated President Eisenhower, said he treated Barkley for a "heart flutter" in 1950 at the Bethesda, Md., naval hospital. He said Barkley did not have a coronary thrombosis but his heart was not functioning properly at the time.

Barkley was then vice president. He was under White's care for two months.

The senate did not meet yesterday but the house rang with eulogies for Barkley, who first took his post there in 1942. They were serious, heartfelt tributes.

But there also was a chuckle now and then, as Barkley would have wanted it.

Study Is Held On Needs for B-52 Buildup

WASHINGTON, May 2—Gen. Curtis LeMay disclosed today that the strategic air command is studying how much it thinks B-52 production should be increased over administration plans.

The strategic air commander made it clear he believes SAC needs more B-52 intercontinental jet bombers than planned by the administration. He said he would support any over the Russian air force. But he said in an interview he has set a fixed number of how many additional B-52s should be built.

"We are in the midst of a study of that right now," he said.

LeMay was called back for further questioning by a senate armed services subcommittee on air power on whether the United States is in danger of losing air supremacy to Russia, LeMay told the subcommittee on Monday that Russia will also supremacy in long-range striking power by 1958. Strategic air command plans are changed.

Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson conceded at a news conference yesterday that Russia presently is outstripping the United States in production of modern intercontinental bombers.

At the same time, Wilson disclosed that the striking power of the strategic air command will be increased by bomber wings will be increased by 10 per cent. He said that each of the commands B-52 wings will have 43 bombers instead of 30, the number of bombers presently in heavy bombers. The use are replacing B-52 super bombers.

But Wilson refused to comment on LeMay's claim that the Russian will have more intercontinental bombers in 1958-60 than this nation.

Lively Operation for Lung May Aid Cancer Probe

LOS ANGELES, May 2.—Operations of the Los Angeles area to probe the existence of cancer now are justifiable in some cases, says a chief surgeon of the University of Pennsylvania medical school.

The thing which makes this surgical gamble attractive, Dr. Julian Johnson told the California Medical Association, is a statistical showing that the chances for a cure are good if the malignancy is no larger than the size of the average man's thumb.

Recent progress in surgical techniques and in the use of anesthetics has reduced the risk of the operation itself to the point where it may be less of a hazard than the possibility of cancer, Dr. Johnson asserted.

The increase in lung cancer has added urgency to his idea, he said. Except for malignancies of the skin and female organs it now is at the top of the cancer list in Los Angeles, Dr. Johnson reported. For the country as a whole, stomach cancer holds this No. 1 position.

When an X-ray shows a suspicious shadow and there are no other threatening symptoms, there always is doubt as to whether it is cancer. The only sure way to find out is by operating. When this doubt may be considered, many doctors prefer a watchful waiting procedure.

If it is in fact cancer, Dr. Johnson said, delay may give it a start that surgery cannot overtake.

Caution Noted For U. S. After Slump in April

NEW YORK, May 2 (AP)—Many businessmen are warning that the prospects for the U. S. economy in April were disappointing.

There has been a year of wide swings in business sentiment. At the start of the year, many were expecting a boom in 1956. Then along in February there was a quick shift to pessimism.

Some of the big retail chains report a drop in sales. The auto industry is cutting back output, still further as cars fail to move out of the dealers' hands as hoped.

The weather gets much of the blame in the eastern third of the country. It was unseasonably wet and cold in other parts of the land.

The tunnel will direct the flow of the river while construction is under way.

Actual construction of the dam in the 800-foot-deep Deschutes canyon—10 miles north of here—is expected to begin sometime in July.

Thomas W. DeLisle, chairman of the PGE board, mentioned the long controversy over construction of the dam in his address, stating that he believed construction of the dam is going forward on a level basis.

PGE was licensed by the federal power commission to build the 25 million dollar 120,000 kilowatt project. The state fish and game commission consented that PGE is violating terms of the license by not submitting plans for fish life protection.

PALMA DE MAJORCA, May 2 (AP)—Princess Grace of Monaco dropped her handkerchief to a triumphant bullfighter yesterday.

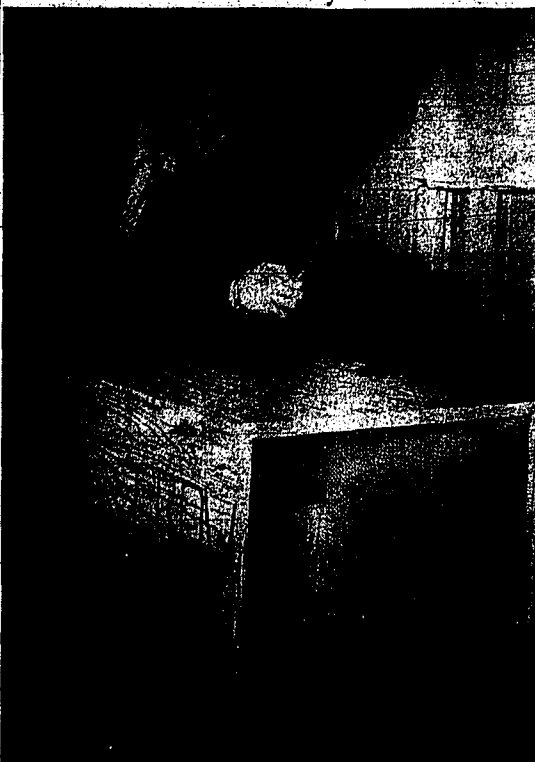
The smiling princess, seated in a royal box with Prince Rainier, sat through an afternoon of bull fighting described as "first class" six days were killed.

Unrest Arises Among Famed Religious Sect

MEMPHIS, May 2 (AP)—Unrest in stirring again among the Doukhobors' Sons of Freedom sect.

After two years of quiet but unrelenting resistance to authority, 25 of these nonviolent pacifists were charged with attacking a provincial politician and tearing his clothes.

Police called for aid from Iremont, where the Doukhobors' Sons of Freedom were gathered Monday as a crowd of about 100 members of the fanatical sect gathered for a three-night appearance as the women were taken into court to answer to the charge of attacking.

The Sons of Freedom long have been the problem sect of the generally law-abiding Doukhobors, who came from Russia many decades ago.

The Sons have a long record of violent resistance to authority and public demonstrations.

The latest trouble is over compulsory education for their children. They contend Canadian schools prepare the young for war. In the past the Doukhobors have asked that their children be exempt from school.

They contend they are responsible only to the authority of God, not to man-made authority.

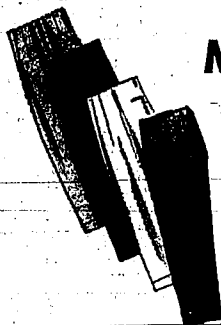
