The child was pronounced dead on arrival at the Cottage hospital in Burley at 10:58 p.m.

Dust Clearing From Field of Demo Battling

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—The presidential nomination contest is beginning to come out of its dusty haze.

For example, Adlai E. Stevenson is now the publicly recognized choice, rather than Sen. Averell Harriman, as "my opponent" in the pre-convention race.

Stevenson is now the favorite, but he has not been on a big speaking tour. He is acting very much like the manager of an active candidate.

Do Was Abent? Another example: New York's Mayor Robert F. Wagner, Jr., and Sen. Charles McNary are showing up for the 1000-a-plate dinner tendered Stevenson in New York City, Harriman and De Gaulle were absent.

The political experts who analyze things, put Wagner's and McNary's names through the analyzer. They were warm and friendly but hardly all-out, do-or-die Stewenston appears to have the edge over other candidates. The mayor or the senator evidently want a little freedom of action.

Stevenson's statement that Harriman was a rival for the Democratic nomination may have been a surprise. It was a surprise because the wealthy governor could be a source of campaign funds for Harriman. There have been reports that Harriman was contributing to the Kefauver pre-convention campaign.

Chance Noted That would be good politics because Harriman's sole chance of being nominated depends on an election. The governor proposes himself to be an inactive candidate, at most. An inactive candidate cannot hope to stop an active candidate such as Stevenson. Kefauver might stop him, however, and it would be a favor to Harriman if he did so.

The stand-out developments in the past five months of the campaign have been Stevenson's jump as rated by the polls and the rise of Missouri's Sen. Stuart Symington from nowhere. Symington rose to third place behind Stevenson and Kefauver in the Gallup poll published last Sunday.

Symington is the likely compromise choice if the Democratic national convention fails to elect a candidate August between Stevenson and Kefauver. Former President Truman might have a hard time in this year's election. His recently published Memoirs revealed a holder of resentment against Sen. McNary in Democratic politics. Mr. Truman was more responsible than any other man for Stevenson's nomination.

What it may be worth, Frank McKinley had some political prospects to make on a recent NBC broadcast. McKinley was briefly Mr. Truman's Democratic national committee chairman. He's from Indiana and knows politics. McKinley recently swung through the "dusted" political pulpit. He reported Stevenson had a bulge on the field, although not much. He rated Kefauver and Harriman next.

More significantly, McKinley traced from there into a discussion of possible stalemate. In such event, he said, Symington would be the man.

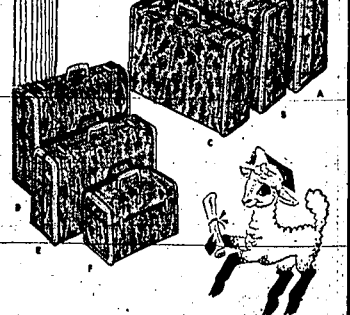

Higher Price Set on Meats In Food Mart

You shoppers in many areas will witness the arrival of local fresh vegetables on markets this weekend. They may be so happy, however, to see higher price tags on meats.

Higher prices for some meats are due to a shortage of supplies from southern and western states for some weeks and some beginning to come from local sources in all but the more northern areas.

More upward meat prices, although still below their levels of a year ago, generally moved up again this week. In recent weeks lamb has made substantial gains and is now close to last year's figures.

Prices for poultry, on wholesale markets were plentiful this week, but prices held firm after a two-week run.

Expansion for Water System Asked in U. S.

WASHINGTON, May 3 (U.S. Commerce department estimated today that the country must spend 12.5 billion dollars to expand its public water systems by 1975 if it is to keep pace with population and economic growth.

Present investment totals 22.8 billion dollars. This must be increased to 25.7 billion dollars in the next 20 years when the population goes from last year's 165.8 million to an estimated 200 million in 1975.

Last year about 126 million persons were served by public water systems. The report said this is expected to rise to 163 million in 20 years.

The report also said another six billion dollars must be spent to keep present facilities up to date.

Construction of such facilities has lagged since 1950 because of wars and high costs. In 1940, about 82 million persons got their water from public systems.

The report, prepared by commerce's business and defense services administration, estimated that public water systems delivered about 17 billion gallons a day last year and by 1975 must furnish 29.8 billion.

Federal Taxation, Spending Booklet Notes Idaho's Share

BOISE, May 3 (U)—The Idaho State Chamber of Commerce today mailed a booklet on federal spending and taxation, to stress the fact that Idaho's share of the \$6.5 billion dol-

lar federal spending program for the current year is nearly 198 million dollars.

The booklet outlines a federal spending program proposed by the Council of State Chambers of Commerce.

It included 100 a copy of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce's recommendations on the report of the second Hoover commission.

Major points covered in the recommended federal spending and tax program included:

Limiting of public works to those which are essential and feasible.

Responsibility of expenditures for foreign aid and defense.

Federal business-type enterprises should be required to pay local, state and federal taxes, plus interest on money invested in the venture.

Federal business-type enterprises "qualify competition" with private industry.

Health insurance programs should be rejected as an improper federal government function.

Lowering individual income tax rates and reducing the corporate rate to the pre-Korea level as soon as possible.

Chamber officials said however that drastic spending reductions must be made before tax cuts can logically be demanded.

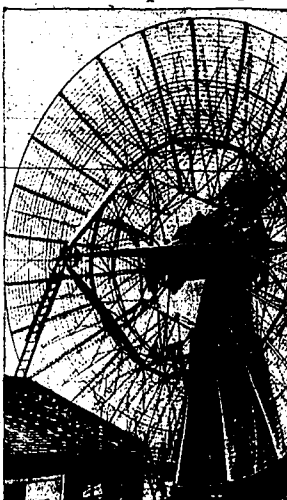
The Burt county bridge commission originally authorized the bridge building as a "calculated risk."

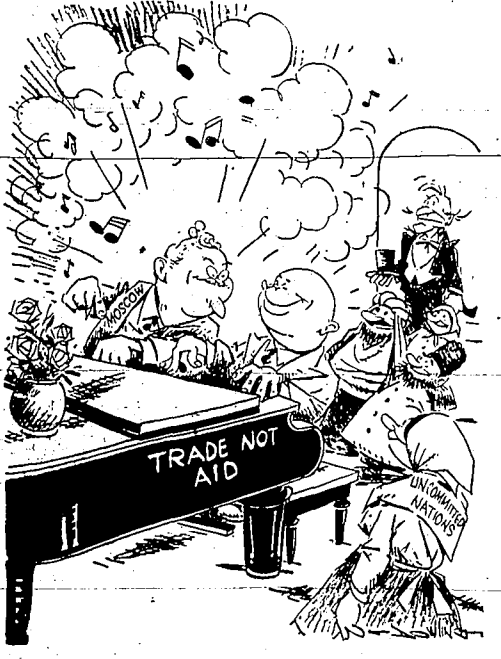

Stevenson, Out for Nomination, Puts Natural Modesty Aside, Starts Fight

CHICAGO, May 3.—Adlai E. Stevenson is a candidate who, at times, feels pretty uncomfortable about running for president.

Not that Stevenson doesn't think he would make a good one. He believes he has qualified himself about as well as any man could—without becoming actually holding the office—to take on a job of awesome proportions.

But plumb him to the depths and Stevenson comes out as a naturally modest and somewhat retiring sort of fellow in a field crowded with egotists.

He has a long way to go in his bid for the 1936 Democratic presidential nomination if he doesn't get it. He has a long way to go in his bid for the 1936 Democratic presidential nomination if he doesn't get it.

Stevenson was born Feb. 5, 1890, in Los Angeles, before it came the big city it is today. He has spent a lot of his time in the big cities but he still looks on himself as a country boy.

With a non-profitable farm of his own at Libertyville, Ill., Stevenson thinks he talks the farmers' language when he advocates at least a temporary return to fixed, high-level crop price supports.

He blamed his defeat in Minnesota on Kefauver's promise of 100 per cent parity for small farmers, the "boosman" charge Kefauver raised against him and his own failure to get his ideas across to the voters.

Somehow sadly, Stevenson said, he had been "out-promoted" before in 1932 when he was defeated by Hoover. But he maintains he is still not going to try to "out-promise" anybody, whether on civil rights, farm supports, or other issues.

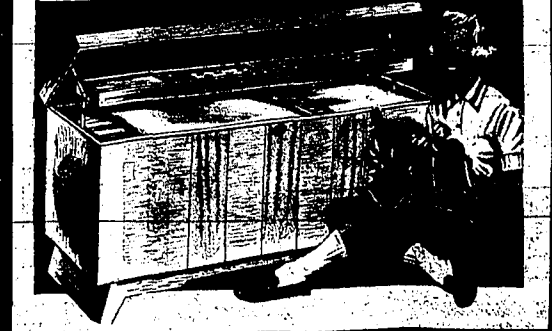

From Washington came the announcement that Republican Arthur B. Langlie had yielded victory to run for the new seat by Democratic Sen. Warren G. Magnuson. Langlie confided that the White House had urged him to make the race.

Although the GOP leadership was anxious to get Langlie into the senate race, he still was urged to accept an undertaking against Magnuson, who has served 12 years in the senate and eight in the house.

The Kentucky break for the GOP was created by the death Tuesday of Sen. Albert W. Barkley. Republican leaders were reported ready to name John Sherman Cooper, former senator, to fill the seat.

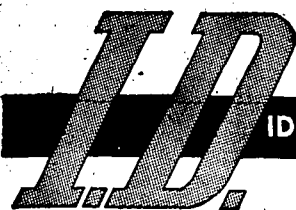

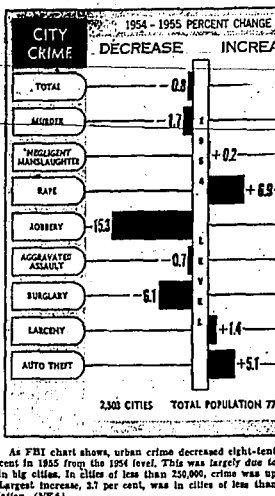

50 Cows Move From Utah to Alaska by Air

GARLAND, Utah, May 3 (U)—Shipping airplanes by air freighters took 50 cows from Utah to Alaska in a really big move.

That's just what Fred Grover, Garland, small community in the rich dairy country of northern Utah's luxurious Cache valley, is doing.

Jim pulled his "stake" in Garland and is settling down in Matanuska valley, mountain and fjord-fringed farming center about 40 miles northwest of bustling Anchorage, Alaska.

Machines Not Moved

About the only things that Grover didn't move were his milking machines. He didn't have to do this because he bought a farm near Palmer, the center of Matanuska, that was already equipped with dairy apparatus.

The farm had been selected by his brother, Clinton, who has lived in Matanuska since 1923 when a band of farmers moved there in a resettlement project that was widely publicized at the time. Actually a few of the original settlers remained, but the Alaska experiment has prospered as the territory's population increased.

Fred Grover and most of his family have already left, and Grover remained to direct shipping of the cows.

Three Trips Made

Fifteen of the registered Holsteins including a day-old calf, flew north last week-end on a "flying boxcar" operated by a charter air service.

The other 35 are making 3,000 mile flights in two more trips by the big air freighter.

As he headed north, Grover said that if nothing else, the return of his dairy produce would be much greater than in the States.

Raw milk, he reported, wholesales for \$11.50 a hundredweight in Alaska, compared with about a hundred in Utah. The retail price of fresh milk in the territory is about 40 cents a quart. Actually he's taking his cows with him because in the Palmer area, Holsteins cost about \$70 a head.

Feed Is Problem

Fred Grover was advised, in providing of a home "let's not had." The first grass crop that grows as the sun starts staying up over the horizon for 24 hours a day—two hours is fed directly to stock.

Other crops, as the stock eats on pasture from May 1 until November, are combined with oats and peas as it is fed from silage.

Grover could have put more than 18 to 20 cows on each plane load—the flying boxcars are large enough. But he cut down on the number to shipment to the Holsteins "would be comfortable" and could move around in their limited space without their shifting weight endangering the safety of the plane as it droned high over the North Pacific and the Gulf of Alaska.

Solons Turn Attention From Politics to Argue Bean Soup

WASHINGTON, May 3 (U)—A new controversy raged yesterday on Capitol Hill. It's over bean soup.

In most areas of this great nation the bean soup debate is relatively quiet. Citizens can take the stuff or leave it alone.

They can also do that in the capitol restaurants, the feeding grounds for senators, representatives and their hired help. But there's this difference:

Here bean soup is on the menu every business day.

According to legend, the custom began in the house restaurant in 1893. John Joseph Downey Cannon, Illinois, who during his 46 years in congress became much better known as "Uncle Joe," loved his bean soup.

As a speaker, he also had power.

So when bean soup was left off the menu, Uncle Joe hurried to ram through a resolution calling for bean soup every day.

Same thing happened in the senate. Only here the bean-benefactor was Sen. Fred Thomas Dubois, Idaho. Dubois began his political life as a Republican, but when the GOP went for the single odd standard of the Democrats.

But to bean soup he remained ever faithful. In 1907, he persuaded the senate rules committee to call for bean soup as a permanent fixture.

And there it has been, ever since. So it was surprising to see it attacked in "Roll Call," a sort of family type newspaper published every two weeks for the people who work in the world's greatest legislative factory.

In a letter to the editor, George L. Berg, secretary for Robert J. Corbett, R. Pa., struck out at this unavowed, nauseating, traditional bean soup.

Bean soup lovers naturally were horrified. Tomorrow's issue of Roll Call will have several violent replies.
