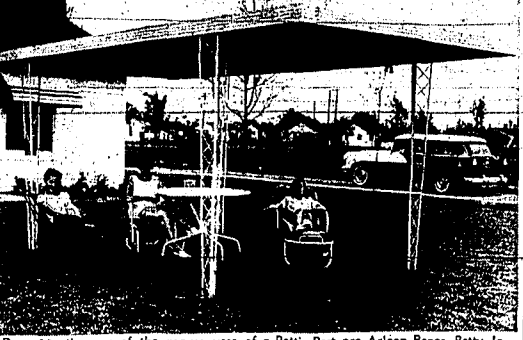

### Officials View Boom in U.S., Question Curb

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—Two of President Eisenhower's cabinet officers yesterday reported the nation's economy is continuing to boom, and questioned the need of applying anti-inflationary brakes.

Secretary of Commerce Weeks reported a new record high for personal income and a continuing high rate for the gross national product.

Secretary of Labor Mitchell questioned the need of last month's credit-tightening action by the Federal Reserve board, and said that the figure, issued last month, was 63,078,000.

Weeks said employment figures today show a slight increase in the number of workers with jobs. The March employment figure, issued last month, was 63,078,000.

"I don't happen to believe there is an inflationary trend," Weeks said.

"In view of the tight money situation today the rate in the Federal Reserve discount rate has been kept at 4 percent. It might prove to be a handicap to business expansion and the economy, but in the long run I have confidence that the economy will still move forward."

The Federal Reserve board raised its bank lending rate last month to the highest level in more than 20 years. This action was to raise borrowing rates all along the line.

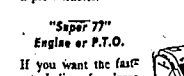

### Fluoride Aids Teeth, Claims Idaho Report

BOISE, May 4 (AP)—Fluoridation of the water supply has reduced tooth decay by as much as 40 percent in Montpelier in the past three years, the state health department reported yesterday.

Dr. Wesley O. Young, director of dental health, said Montpelier dentists had noted measurable improvement in all age groups.

Young said 7-year-old children were examined in July, 1933, when the fluorine in the state water was added again this March.

The 6-year-olds examined this March showed 40 per cent less decay than the 7-year-olds examined in 1933. Young said seven-year-olds showed a reduced decay rate of 30 per cent and 8-year-olds of 19 per cent.

For comparison, 229 children in Montpelier were examined in 1933 and again this March.

"The dental decay rates in Paris in 1935 are somewhat higher than those in Montpelier before the start of the fluoridation program," Young said.

"At the present time, the average 7 to 8 year-old child in Montpelier has suffered from 1.5 times less dental decay than had children of the same age in Paris," he added.

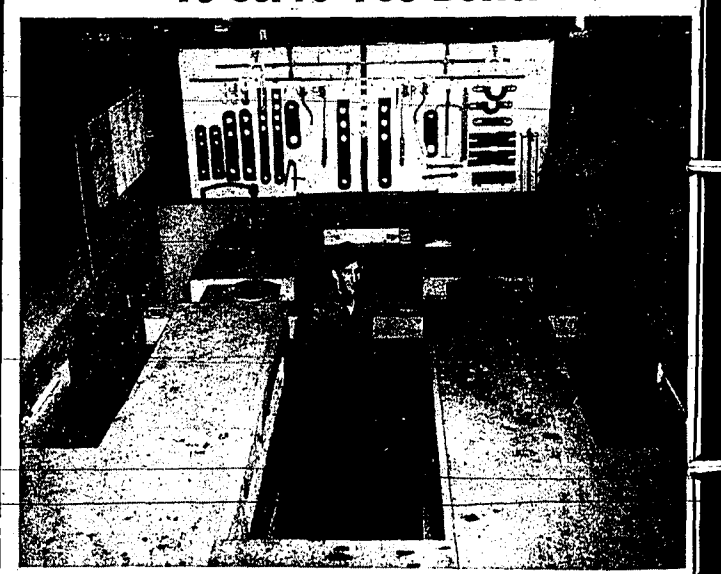

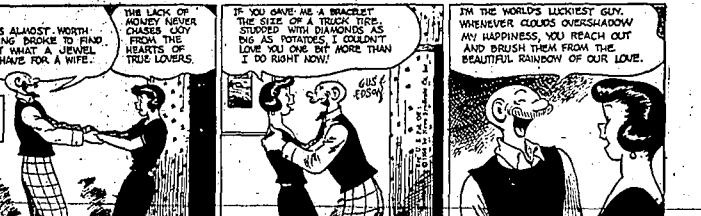

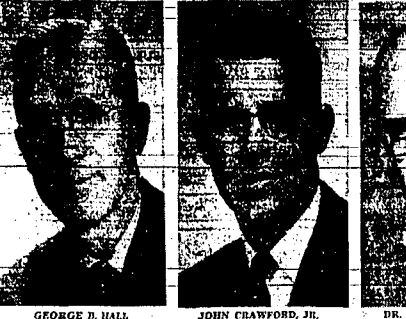

## British Diver Vanishes and Reds Blamed

LONDON, May 4 (UP)—British newspapers reported today that a frogman-hero Lionel (Buster) Crabbs may have been snooding around the Soviet coast after he disappeared when he vanished into the murky depths of Portsmouth harbor last month.

The burden of the speculation is that the British killer Crabbs, said conservative Daily Sketch said unidentified naval officers in Portsmouth mouthed before they murdered him and carried him off as a spy.

The mystery surrounding Crabbs' disappearance and probable death during the visit of Soviet leader Nikolai Bulganin and Nikita Khrushchev has created a furor. The question will be brought in parliament next week by questioners who want to know what proof the government has that the missing man is dead.

The former naval commander was last seen April 18—the day the Orjontkizds arrived in Portsmouth—when he donned underwater gear and plunged into the harbor where the Russian cruiser was anchored.

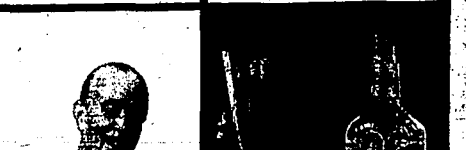

# Newest Church Merger Movements Reverse Historic Tendencies to Split

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Progressive churches are merging in the newest church merger movement, reversing the historic tendency of Protestant Christians to split up into ever-more-numerous denominations.

For centuries, Protestants have been starting new denominations to accommodate every shade of doctrinal belief. The splitting process went on until by 1854 there were 20 separate bodies in the United States alone.

Now the pendulum seems to be swinging in the opposite direction. The emphasis is on uniting the scattered Christian faith, instead of forming new denominations. Leading Protestant bodies around the world are trying to stake out common ground on which to build a united church.

At present, according to a survey by the World Council of Churches, an "unprecedented" total of 21 church union negotiations are in progress. Some are aimed at the merger of two existing denominations, others would bring three or more bodies together.

Walls which were centuries high and many of these negotiations will drag on for years. But the fact that the "united church" movement is beginning to bear fruit is significant.

In the United States, the biggest merger now definitely set is the joining of the Presbyterian and the Congregational churches, with 1,200,000 members. This union will take place on June 25, 1937. The new body will be called the United Church of Christ, and will be the seventh largest U. S. Protestant denomination.

Prospects are also bright for an early merger of the Presbyterian and the Episcopal churches, which have 2,200,000 members and the United Methodist churches, with 2,700,000 members. A plan of union has been drawn up, and will be approved at the annual conferences of the three groups next month. Southern Presbyterianism, the originally separate denomination, will be withdrawn from the proposed union last year.

Similar negotiations are underway among three U. S. Lutheran bodies with a combined membership of 1,500,000. The union will be announced in the fall. The proposed new "American Lutheran church" will come into being next year.

Exploratory talks are continuing between the Methodist church and the United Presbyterian church, with 2,700,000 members. A plan of union has been drawn up, and will be approved at the annual conferences of the two groups next month.
