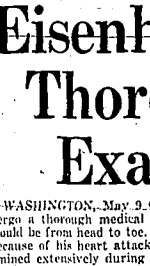

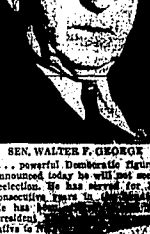

### Two Men Die In Crackup of Giant Bomber

LANGLEY AIR FORCE BASE, Va., May 9 (AP)—Two air force pilots were killed yesterday in the crash of their B-47 twin-jet bomber on an island off Virginia's eastern shore. An air force spokesman identified the two as Maj. Henry J. McGee, 35, an East St. Louis, Ill., native, and holder of the distinguished flying cross; and first Lieut. John S. White, 35, Nampa, Ida.

The spokesman said the dual control bomber was airborne alone from Langley shortly before 8 a.m. yesterday on a local training mission. It became overdue at about 11 a.m. and a Langley-based helicopter spotted the wreckage on Ship Shoal Island shortly afterwards. Air force officials were investigating the crash but details were meager.

WASHINGTON — When such an unrecruited Republican conservative as Sen. John W. Bricker of Ohio, in a speech before the Senate, denounces the industry makes excessive profits at the expense of purchasers, it signifies that the congressional rest-

Bricker's amazing attack is symptomatic—almost every other industry from automobiles and steel to food and transportation items on railroads and airplanes, has profited immensely for the last few years. Secretary Ezra Taft Benson, for instance, blames the tremendous spread between Farmers returns and the price of their products on the fact that General Joseph Campbell, an Eisenhower appointee from the ranks of business, pilfers his civil earnings for the purpose of making a fortune at the expense of taxpayers and the traveling public.

**HIGH COSTS OF EQUIPMENT, ETC.**—Solid Republicans from agricultural areas attribute their constituents' plight to the high cost of farm equipment and the high cost of wire, feed, and fertilizer. While whining at corporate profits, they agree with the public that steadily increasing wages won't be the solution. They want too soft on commercial rates, current profit percentages, they add, key industries eagerly bow to demands for higher pay year by year.

As the Bricker-Benson-Campbell incident indicates, even administration spokesmen have become concerned about certain aspects of Eisenhower profligality. This is the case with the reason for the federal reserve board's decision to lighten money rates a few weeks ago.

**WARNING AGAINST UNWARRANTED EXPANSION**—An overoptimistic industry, according to this report, is inflating and expanding too speedily and lavishly. This may mean that the industry is not set, and building plants that may not be used, all on huge profits.

**UNWARRANTED EXPANSION**—The expansion of the nation's physical plant was as dangerous as the stock market boom of the twenties. It can result in overproduction, top-heavy accumulation of inventories, idle factories, unemployment and general hardship.

Nobody can agree on an overall cure for these conditions. The only thing that will do it is to let the majority opinion call for passing on the benefits to consumers in the form of lower retail prices—rather than in the form of higher wages for oil, television and radio sets, transportation and utility charges.

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—The National Lawyers Guild, which permitted a list of names to be used for the purpose of Truman administration loyalty investigations, is about to come under a probe by the House committee on un-American activities. The probe is the result of a report by the committee's subcommittee on un-American activities, which was set up in 1950 to serve the purposes of the Communist party. It may be the last of a series of probes since it has nothing to fear from the House, which is now a subcommittee of the House of Representatives.

General Herbert Brownell, who headed the guild in 1953 and was later named as a Communist agent, is the only member of the guild's executive committee who was in the House report. The report also named several other members of the guild, including former President Truman and former Secretary of State A. A. Berle. Justice Ferdinand B. Murphy, who was in the report, was the late Associate Justice Robert H. Jackson. Murphy, Jackson and many others were named in the report.

The National Lawyers Guild was founded in 1937 in New York City. It was one of the first organizations to be named in the report. It has since moved its headquarters to New York City.

**Churchill Will Be Guarded in German Jaunt**

BERLIN, Germany, May 9 (AP)—City authorities announced today they will guard Winston Churchill against mob violence during his first postwar visit to Germany.

The 81-year-old former prime minister, who is this year's winner of the Nobel peace prize for his role in ending the war, is expected to arrive in Berlin today to receive the city's highest honor.

His visit has aroused strong protest from the far right and "extremists" in Germany who charge Churchill betrayed away their future to the communists at the Yalta conference.

**Signs Appear**

Crudely painted signs saying Churchill "is wanted" and "Churchill beat it" appeared on walls here over the weekend.

Protests against the scheduled arrival of Churchill at the city hall today are being held in the city hall today.

Police have promised that double security rings of uniformed plainclothes guards will surround Churchill throughout his stay.

Twenty motorcycle police and four troops of paratroopers were assembled to escort him from the airport to his first stop in Germany.

The heaviest precautions, however, are being reserved for tomorrow when 200 police will mass around city hall during the award ceremonies, and another 500 will be stationed at key points elsewhere in the city.

"Cannon" Readied

"Water cannon" — the special tear-gas mounted fire hoses used by German police to disperse mobs — will be alerted for use if necessary.

Churchill will spend the night at a hotel here. After receiving the city's highest honor, he plans to go on to Bonn, a West German capital, for conferences with President Theodor Heuss and Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

Dr. Seibert said "It has been proved conclusively that drinking water which contains one part of fluoride to a million parts of water reduces tooth decay in children from 50 to 65 per cent."

### Review Eyed For Means to Aid Arms Ban

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The United States is undertaking a new "look-see" review of possible ways to break the East-West disarmament deadlock, administration officials report today.

The detailed disarmament review has the approval of President Eisenhower. It will be directed by Harold G. Buzell, presidential disarmament coordinator, who has just returned from seven weeks of frustrating discussions in London with the Russians.

Work slated on the project will be started soon by both private and government agencies on disarmament subjects. These subjects include nuclear inspection, missiles, other advanced inspection, military production, and communication.

James said following a call on the President yesterday that he had been instructed "patiently and carefully" to continue to seek a sound agreement with the Soviet Union and other nations "on disarmament."

James emphasized that existing disarmament agreements with the Russians "continue to be more important than areas of agreement."

Looks for No. 10

Despite the problems immediately ahead, James said a new disarmament message might be on its way soon from Soviet Premier Nikolai Khrushchev to President Eisenhower.

James still favors the President's reply to a March 1 proposal for an East-West freeze on nuclear stockpiles.

The East-West disarmament deadlock is attributable to all sorts of factors, but at least two stand out: The United States insists on mutual inspection planned to President Eisenhower's "open skies" plan of reciprocal aerial reconnaissance and military observations. Soviet Communist Party boss Nikita Khrushchev says his London visit said the Soviet plan is "flexible."

The United States wants disarmament to be taken carefully and slowly in harmony with political settlements on other East-West issues such as Germany and Korea. The Soviet disarmament, not only political settlements and inspection details worked out later.

### Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

Life on earth isn't so arranged that each of us will be of his strength. No matter how much we are helped, how much other people help us, there is a limit to the strength that is within us. Knowing that this is true, we must make every effort to train children to self-reliance.

With some children, this is a difficult task because they cling to their mothers. Sometimes the mothers have taught them to do so by doing everything for them instead of teaching them to do for themselves, by staying with them and making every effort to wherever they went. By establishing this close association, this firm clinging, has been conditioned to stay close to his mother.

Children sometimes fall ill with serious illnesses, and their mothers are forced to stay in close attendance on them. When their children are convalescent, they still want the comfort of their mothers' presence and cling to them with almost desperate determination.

Cost what it may, these children must be conditioned to self-reliance. They must be weaned from their mothers as soon as it is possible. When a child is saying this is far easier than breaking it. The child cries, vomits his breakfast, or keeps on crying until his mother does not know whether he should be put to bed and the doctor called, or in to go to school or to play, as the case may be.

He must go to school. All mothers know that, and they must prepare the child for the separation. Try putting him at a distance in the same room, or in the next room, for short periods and gradually lengthen the time of separation. Give him something interesting to do. A toy that takes his mind off his troubles is a good answer. And do not talk about his being alone. That must not be mentioned.

"Look, your wagon and truck are over here, make them go over there. Start the game and slip away to let him play by himself. If he stops soon, say nothing. Watch for another chance to send him, help him to do it himself. Bring a child friend into the house and let them play together. One day they will be out together as a team. Gradually the child learns to do a share of his living by himself. When he is taken to school, be sure you don't bid him a tearful goodbye. Leave him with the other children and say something like, "I'll see you at lunchtime," and then without looking back. And stay close to your mother and be made sure that those attending are asked to bring a covered dish and table service.

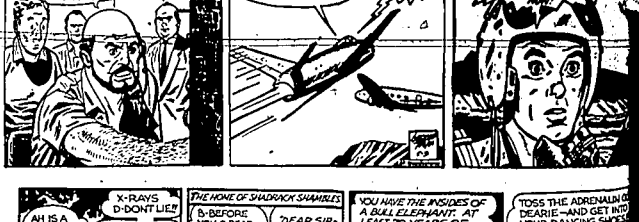

### Plans for Africa Viewed With Concern
