## Bolons Say New Farm Bill Might Gain Ike's Okay

WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP)—The House today approved a bill that they have a compromise farm bill acceptable to President Eisenhower.

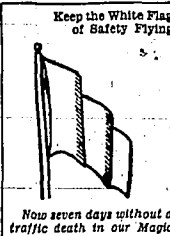

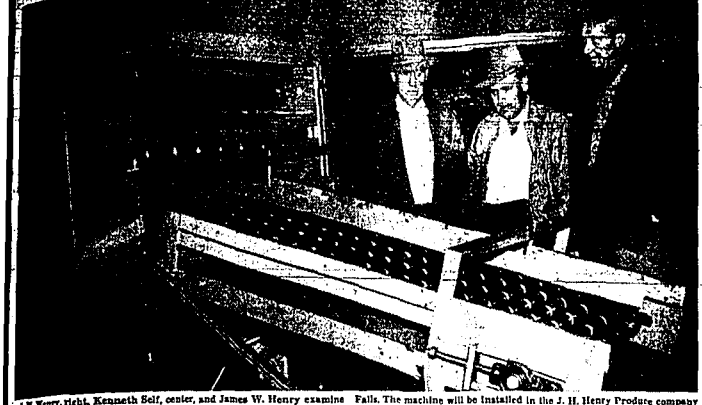

MOSCOW, May 10—Western diplomats said last night the Soviet government is preparing to make a unilateral announcement on disarmament following the failure of recent London talks with western powers. Indications from the highest sources here give these possibilities: 1. The Soviet Union will decide to reduce its armed forces as suggested at the talks. Russian sources say the armed forces of the Soviet Union, the United States and Red China are limited to 1 1/2 million each. The western powers suggested a limit of 2 1/2 million. 2. A decision to cut the military budget, as the Soviet Union also suggested at London, but without waiting for the other powers to act. Under the Soviet constitution, such steps could not be taken until early next year when the Supreme Soviet parliament meets in regular session. Khrushchev: "The Soviet government is at this moment taking a very important decision which will be announced soon."

### Season Melts Lower Snows In Watershed

Some of the lower elevations in the watersheds of the upper Snake River now are free of snow, Leah Crandall, Snake river watermaster, reported Wednesday.

At this time last year most of these snow measuring stations still had snow.

A year ago CCG Camp #12 had snow with a water content of 73 inches. Grover park divide had snow with 7.8 inches of water. Orey's boundary had snow with four inches of water and Bryan flat on the Hoback river had snow with three inches of water.

The lower elevations last year had more snow than this year because of the delayed melting a year ago. Crandall said "Salem" station still has 18 inches of snow with 87 inches of water compared to 111 inches of water a year ago and Salt River Summit has 12 inches of snow with 63 inches of water compared to 89 inches of water a year ago.

On the other hand, Snow King mountain on the Snake river still has 42 inches of snow with 131 inches of water compared to 7.8 inches of water a year ago. East rim on the Hoback river has 34 inches of snow with 77 inches of water compared to 82 inches of water last year and Teton pass on the Teton river has 137 inches of snow with 53.9 inches of water compared to 35.2 inches of water last year.

Crandall said the water content in the snow in Teton pass has increased since April 1 when only 51.2 inches were measured.

About 300,000 tons of dates are exported from the country of their origin every year.

### Russia Army Paper Avers History False

**By The Associated Press**

NEW YORK, May 10 (AP)—The army newspaper of the Soviet Union yesterday avers that the history of the Russian Revolution is "not a matter of opinion" and that the charges that Joseph Stalin left the Soviet Union in 1929 are "unfounded."

The paper thus challenges the position taken April 24 by the Soviet official magazine, *Pravda*, which said that Stalin had planned to attack the United States in 1929. The magazine said that Stalin had been "driven out" to be audited by the Soviet Union although it had been considered to have been the best leadership of the party, which at that time was concentrated in the hands of a few men.

The article did not mention the name of the author, but it is believed to be by a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party and the Soviet government.

Stalin's departure from the party committee and by news reports that he had been driven out of the party with the Kremlin's approval, has been considered as a "scandal" by the party and the public.

Dynamic conflict exists between the army and the defense ministry, and the most serious manifestation set off by the campaign of the present Soviet leadership to glorify Stalin and re-write the history of World War II, according to observers here.

Stalin's charges were circulated widely and are being countered shortly and it is expected that the charges will be of serious second thoughts on the part of the Communist hierarchy for Russia's unrepealed war record.
