T.F. Doubles Construction For 4 Months

Construction in Twin Falls during the first four months of 1956 averaged a 44.1 per cent increase over the same period last year, a percentage by the statistical department of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Thursday.

The total construction for 1956 to date is valued at \$1,366,330, according to the report. Included were \$1,000,000 for residential units, valued at \$1,000,000, and \$366,330 for non-residential units, valued at \$366,330. The increase was in part due to a 64 per cent increase in the amount of school projects and in addition to the Methodist church at Marsville.

The report also stated that the total construction here during April represented an 87.5 per cent increase over the same period of last year.

Included in the total were 24 new residential units valued at \$192,000; non-residential construction valued at \$192,000, and \$1,000,000 for residential units valued at \$1,000,000.

The report shows the value of construction in the Twin Falls area for the first four months of 1956 was \$1,366,330, compared to \$944,430 for the same period last year. This represents a 44.1 per cent increase over the same period of last year.

The report also shows that the total construction here during April represented an 87.5 per cent increase over the same period of last year.

Amazing Changes Seen in Old 'Lodge' of Writer, U.S. Army

It's close to 11 years since I attended a meeting, but I still like to keep up with what is happening in my old lodge, the Army.



I have been to an Army camp lately, but they tell me I wouldn't know the barracks and the mess hall, what with crackerone curtains, gay labeleynous, and from what I gather, sterling flatware and Wedgwood china.

Now from Washington come two reports that underscore the fact that "insider" as soldiering is concerned, I was born a full decade too soon. One report concerns the invention of a portable foxhole digger, and the other a new and dazzling type of headgear for "OJ" Joe.

The Army, so says Washington, is now using the new foxhole digger, and the new headgear is a type of green beret to replace the overseas cap. This is a splendid idea, and should have been thought of a long time ago.

The overseas cap is all right in the way it looks, but it's not much for looks, and it doesn't do much for the wearer. That is especially true when it rains or when the wind blows. It gives the wearer's head the appearance of a slightly garished, peaked, hard-boiled egg. If worn on the side to provide a certain rakishness, it invariably slips down and comes to rest on one ear. Small-haired soldiers are forever losing them. If worn squarely on top of the head it makes the soldier look like a boob at a state fair.

A beret, especially a green one, has a fair, if not romantic, O.J. Joe associates it with shipboard cruises and Bohemian Paris. It has a definite-to look, and the wearer would be sure to be mistaken for a line soldier, even if his job were that of a private collector and he happened to be on D-plus-8.

It makes a man's back and arms feel as if they were being drilled by the automatic foxhole digger. This may well be the greatest military invention since paper or the turlough. Built something like a boxcar, the new foxhole digger will take a place of concentration in no time flat.

The trenching tool in use in World War II was never designed for digging foxholes, that I am positive, because they were an emergency issue, and originally were built for children to use for digging on the beach. I always kept looking for the idea of a trenching tool that would be a good idea to have in the toolbox for gardening, just grand for stading potatoes, but terribly inadequate for opening up frozen earth, or for working through roots and the other new and dazzling things that are being thought up around to something about the overseas cap. How is it? Certainly the dog breed could stand a lot of improvement.

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—Rep. Grant Pflanz, D. Ida., called on congress yesterday to see that the Nez Perce Indians of north Idaho are compensated for the loss of fishing rights at Celilo Falls, Ore., which is soon to be flooded by the dam on the Dalles dam.

"It seems only fair and proper that they should be given the same kind of settlement that has given the other tribes," she told a senate appropriations subcommittee hearing.

Mrs. Pflanz referred to the fact that the army corps of engineers has recognized the claim of three Northwest tribes but not that of the Nez Perce.

Kevin J. Soneky, Washington attorney for the Nez Perce, said the tribe should receive at least \$5,200,000.

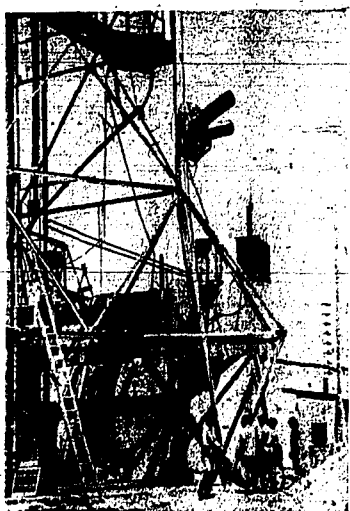

Europe Unity Idea Is Cited By Churchill

AACHEN, Germany, May 11 (AP)—Winston Churchill said yesterday if the Kremlin does not give Stalin incentives he sees no reason why Russia cannot eventually "join in the spirit" of the Atlantic pact.

The 61-year-old former prime minister, here to be honored for his own aid to European unity, said the West's best hope of achieving it lies in the pact's "grand alliance of the European powers, linked with Canada and the United States."

He added that, although the United States has so far taken the lead in cementing the historically-divided nations of Europe, it must also "must have her part" in a real unification of the continent.

Unity Praised
Churchill told a blue-ribbon audience that Europe's problems can be solved more easily by united East-West action than by rival blocs confronting each other with suspicion and hostility.

The British veteran's unofficial proposal amounted to endorsement of the Russian idea—rejected by the West—action that East and West should seek means of joining forces before they die with the realization of Germany. He also said "We must avoid violence," the victorious leader of World War II.

"Aches and Death"
"The only unity these might be these is a unity of aches and death," the 61-year-old former prime minister came to this 1,200-year-old metropolis—first German city taken by the allies—to receive a \$150 award for his efforts to promote a "United States of Europe."

Aachen authorities presented him with the Carlsberg award, a illuminated scroll and a medalion on a black-and-gold ribbon. In the presence of West German President Theodor Heuss and Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

Teacher Gets His Pardon in Dope Charges

GARBOIN CITY, Nev., May 11 (AP)—Robert E. Eisenberger Jr., a 29-year-old schoolteacher, headed for his home in San Jose, Calif., yesterday after winning a full pardon for a crime he said he did not commit.

The Nevada board of pardons and paroles granted a pardon yesterday to Eisenberger, who was convicted on Feb. 13 of possessing an ounce and a half of marijuana. He served 60 days in prison.

Eisenberger pleaded the marijuana had been planted in his suitcase. He said he was sentenced to serve two to 10 years.

All five members of the board, including Gov. Charles H. Russell, signed Eisenberger's pardon in a 10-minute executive session following the brief hearing. Eisenberger's civil rights were restored.

"I feel confident all this way that I would be exonerated," Eisenberger said. "I'm especially glad for my parents, because they've borne the brunt of this thing."

The chain of events that led to Eisenberger's conviction began with a week-end trip to Las Vegas. His mother packed shirts, socks and other clothing in his bag. It weighed 20 pounds.

Since all through flight to Las Vegas were full, Eisenberger took a flight to Burbank, where he and his mother were transferred to Western Airlines for Las Vegas.

However, his suitcase inadvertently got on a Central California airlines flight to Burbank. Airport officials there, suspicious because the bag appeared much heavier than the listed 20 pounds, opened it and found the marijuana. They called Burbank police, who notified Las Vegas authorities. They took Eisenberger in custody when he claimed the suitcase.

He didn't need one as a President's secretary or as a President of the United States. Mr. Truman explained: "This time, he said, he's going 'as Mr. Truman from Missouri'—to be shown."

The former President and Mrs. Truman boarded the liner United States before 10 a. m., to sail at noon for their seven-week jaunt.

Despite his unofficial capacity, Mr. Truman said, there won't be too much time for sightseeing. He has a full schedule of invitations from heads of state in six countries, many of them returning White House hospitality to the Trumans.

The principal reason he is making the trip at this time, Mr. Truman said, is to accept an honorary doctorate of laws degree from Oxford university, June 20.

"I'm going to have dinner with the prime minister, lunch with Mr. Churchill and tea with the queen," Mr. Truman said of his other engagements in England.

He said he had no official commitments. President Eisenhower, however, asked him to do a thing, he said, and he didn't offer.

"It wouldn't be worth it if I didn't go," he said. "I don't know what's going on."

Mr. Truman said he also had accepted formal invitations of the premier and president of France, the premier and president of Italy, the chancellor of Germany, the queen and prince consort of The Netherlands, the prime minister of Belgium, and the U. S. ambassadors in London, Paris and Rome.

The Truman's sailing companions include a large number of Mr. Truman's former official associates. Among them were former U. S. ambassador to France, William Bradford Huie; former U. S. ambassador to Canada, U. S.

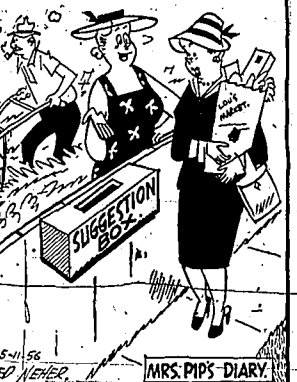

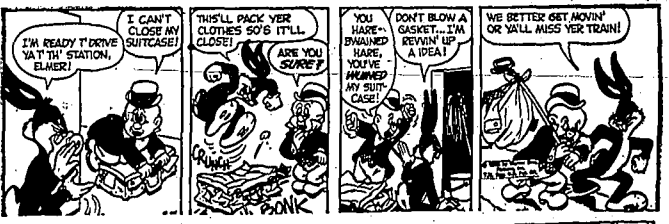
