Magic Valley Hobbies No. 20 Myrtlewood Hobby Nearly Completely Refurnishes Home of Hansen Couple

Through the pursuit of a 13-year hobby, a Hansen man has furnished his home with some of the most unusual furniture in the western United States. Vance Naylor, Magic Valley resident since 1919, makes furniture from myrtlewood.

The rare, beautifully grained wood is found only in southern Oregon and in the Holy Land. Naylor obtains the hard, expensive wood in its raw state from a lumber firm in Oregon and cuts and assembles it into furniture in his basement workshop at his home two and one-half miles east of Hansen on highway 30. It is an expert craftsman. One of his finished products is a German made clock enclosed in a myrtlewood case. The clock is finished in light, wavy wood.

Mrs. Naylor drew and cut patterns for the clock after Naylor had selected the style he wanted from a picture.

The clock is 81 inches high, 24 inches wide and 18 1/2 inches deep. Naylor's four granddaughters and grandchildren want the clock. He says he doesn't know which of the granddaughters eventually will receive the clock but he doesn't plan to build any more for some time. He said it took him all last winter to make the case for the clock.

Naylor began his hobby after visiting Oregon 15 years ago. He and Mrs. Naylor saw a myrtlewood stand in a shop.

Farm Policies Hit or Lauded In State Talks

The Blomberg administration's farm policy, shaping up in the state capital, came in for praise and blame from speakers in the 10th state Friday night.

At the University of Idaho, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for senator, said in Nampa that the farm policy was "encouraging what he called an 'un-American' trend toward larger corporate farm holdings."

Read A. Benson, a field representative of the Republican National Committee and a son of Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson, upheld the GOP farm record in a speech at Twin Falls. He said the party would never support a program that is not fair to the best interests of farmers and ranchers.

Benson moved on to Boise Saturday to address the biennial state meeting of the National Farm Bureau, which recently held the state banking and currency committee that corporate farm policies were anxious to expand holdings on so-called farming high land prices to small farmers. This kind of thing is being encouraged by the government, he said, "to the individual farmer."

"This is the kind of action that Republicans have been warning against," he said, "and it is distinctly un-American," the candidate concluded.

At the University of Idaho, a candidate for the Republican nomination to congress from the Boise district, said he was at a club meeting the week and a half ago of our military services should be continually reviewed.

In the speech, billed as non-political, Miss Shaduck said 46 percent of the cost of government operation is devoted to national defense.

The lands are open to application and selection under the national public land laws and application and offers under the mineral leasing laws, subject to valid pre-emption rights and in accordance with veterans preference rights. Penny said.

Application for new lands will be permitted under the homestead, desert land, small tract or any other national public land laws. Under the lands have been classified as "suitable or suitable for such type of application, he said.

"Mrs. Olson has always taken their children to Sunday school and church services, "except" she added, "when gas rationing made it impossible for us. And then everything went wrong on Sunday last week."

"There have been times when I have felt very inadequate," Mrs. Olson admitted, while the children were young. Five of her children are married and the Olsons have 16 grandchildren.

Besides keeping house, preparing meals, washing, ironing and mending the clothes and all the other duties of a mother, Mrs. Olson helps her husband with most of the bookkeeping for his business.

Maybe it's like the mother of 13 replied when asked how she had time to take care of so many children. "When I had one, it took all my time. How much more than 13 late!"

Cretan Visit Canceled by U. S. Vessels

ATHENS, Greece, May 12 (AP)—The U. S. sixth fleet has canceled plans for a good-will visit to the island of Crete because of the anger aroused in Greece by Britain's execution of two young Cypriots, it was announced today. A U. S. embassy spokesman said the visit was called off on the advice of the Greek foreign ministry. The newspaper Kiriis, published in the Cretan city of Chania, warned today that American sailors "might get a pitiless reception" if they visited the big Greek island under present conditions. Proposal Given
Kiriis said the fleet's proposed stay in Crete harbor should either be canceled or that its leave-hungry sailors should be kept aboard ship while the naval visitors were in Crete. The United States had nothing to do with the execution on the disputed island—except for a vain effort to persuade Britain to postpone them—but Greek fury has deepened in part on U. S. installations here. Office Blocked
A Greek mob stoned the U. S. information service offices here Wednesday in a riot in which three persons were killed and 124 injured. The two Greek-speaking natives hanged on Cyprus this week—Andreas Demetriou and Michael Karasolides—were the first to be executed under the stern security regulations imposed by Britain to halt underground violence on the strategic Mediterranean island. Authorities here have renamed the thoroughfare in which the British embassy stands "Karasolides and Demetriou streets" in their honor.

Official Dies

LEWISTON, May 12 (UP)—City Engineer Richard C. Lowrie died of a heart attack yesterday. Lowrie, who had been in apparent good health, reported for work as usual yesterday. After an hour at his office he drove to a clinic, complaining of severe pains in his chest and arms. Lowrie was 51 and had been city engineer here since 1922.
