BOISE, May 17 (AP)—The Idaho
attorney general's office today filed
with the state supreme court its
brief supporting A. G. Tomason,
secretary of the state department
of public works, in his appeal from

was unconstitutional.

State Treasurer Hugh Moon has
refused to transfer the money to
the department of development and
commerce despite a 1933 state law
which authorized use of the funds

Sugar Revision

Bill Is Favored
WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—Con-
gress today passed a bill revising
sugar marketing quotas for domestic
and foreign supplies of the U. S.
market.

First the house and then the sen-
ate acted on a compromise bill drafted
by a conference committee of con-
gress. The bill is expected to be
signed by President Roosevelt in a
day or two for probable approval.

The legislation provides for an im-
mediate increase in marketing quotas
of 85,000 tons for the U. S. beet sugar
industry, and 80,000 tons for the
sugar cane states of Louisiana and
Florida. It also provides a redistribu-
tion of the foreign share, to give
larger future quotas to Mexico, Peru
and the Dominican Republic, and
also to other smaller producers in
Latin America and elsewhere.

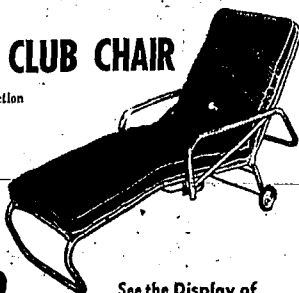

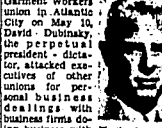

Pilot Resting After Rescue From Woods

BOISE, May 17 (U.S.)—A 23-year-old Boise Home pilot was recuperating here yesterday after being rescued from the wilderness area about 10 miles northeast of here. The light plane crashed there Monday morning.

John Monaghan was in "critical" condition in the Veterans Aid hospital here yesterday. He had an injured foot and several fractured vertebrae.

Monaghan's passenger, William Wayne, 35, Boise, was killed in the crash alongside the turbulent Middle Fork of the Salmon river.

The wreckage of the light plane in which the two men were riding was discovered by chance Thursday by Glen Harty, chief pilot at Bradley field in Boise when he flew over the area.

Two smoke jumpers from McCull parachuted into the area Tuesday morning and started a search for the injured man.

At the request of Chet Moulthrop, state game warden, Harty was in charge of the rescue work, a coast guard helicopter pilot from Fort Angeles, Wash., was pressed into service.

Harty flew a motor launch to the crash site, landing strip yesterday morning. Harry Hornback, manager of the Sulphur Creek, experienced river boatman, took the straggle in a wooden skiff and waded down the river to the crash scene.

Monaghan, an experienced back country pilot, said he was flying a plane out suddenly. He tried to make an emergency landing, but after about 300 feet the plane crashed over a steep bank and rolled end over end.

Moslems Walk On Cool Stone To Hail Kabba

DIJEDDAH, Saudi Arabia, May 11 (AP)—Moslems were seen on a clearing of modern marbles this year when they make their annual pilgrimage to Mecca.

The air cooled route to the ancient shrine, on the east side of the red hills, is a gigantic program to streamline the pilgrimage.

Modern buildings are knocking down shops, houses and even palaces to make room for more pilgrims around the square which Muslims turn toward when they kneel in prayer.

The shrine was built by the prophet Abraham, according to Moslem belief. It is draped with the site of a mosque annually in Egypt, and gold-colored with verses from the Moslem bible, the Koran.

In one of the four walls of the Kabba is embedded the black stone. It is a small building on the site of a mosque, surrounded by a silver frame. Moslem pilgrims come before the Kabba to pray. They kiss the black stone. Those farther away hail it with uplifted arms.

The shrine itself and the religious customs surrounding it are the only ancient factors remaining in the Moslem pilgrimage. The rest is completely modern.

The new clearing outside the shrine will make room for four times as many pilgrims. It will contain a pavilion with upper and lower sections.

The route between Safa and Mouta, on which the pilgrims walk barefoot as part of the sacred rite, is being paved with marble.

An air conditioning system is being installed underground to control the temperature of the stone to a comfortable 70 degrees. It often heated to more than 100 degrees in previous years.

They dragged fire hoses from nearby homes and sprayed them to add to the damage.

Things got out of hand after that. The rioting spread to the rest of the city, oversteering milk cans, hurling bottles and clothing from windows, flipping up signs and pulling the tipping beds over and pulling the front door of one security office.

The damage was estimated as high as \$10,000.

Red Atom Expert Meets Old Friend

MOSCOW, May 11 (AP)—Bruno Pontecorvo, the Italian-born atomic scientist who fled the West two years ago and threw his lot in with the Russians, had a reunion yesterday with a former American co-worker.

The American is Emilio Segrè of the University of California, with whom he worked for a number of years on an atomic energy commission award for discovery.

Segrè and Moscow with 11 other American atomic scientists for a conference on the physics of high-energy particles. Pontecorvo was based at yesterday's session. It was the first time he has been seen by non-Communist westerners since he was expected news conference here 14 months ago when he declared he had joined the Soviet Union to work for peace.

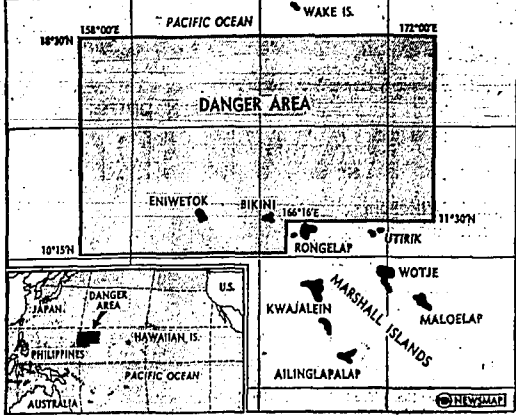

SALT LAKE CITY, May 11 (AP)—This is scheduled for completion next October.

A ride on the new automatics in the First Security building in Salt Lake City need a guide to point out even the most obvious features.

To start with, you don't need to push buttons to get elevator service. Just touch them. Some times they'll light up before your finger makes contact. It's the electro-static capacity of your body that does it.

Inside, you touch the button corresponding to the floor you want, and there you are. Starts and stops are so smooth you scarcely realize you're moving—although you travel 200 feet per minute.

If you are listening, you'll hear a pleasant chime as you pass the fourth floor. It's there solely as a convenience to one of the fourth floor tenants, who is blind.

But suppose you meet a couple of friends as you leave the elevator and you just have to inquire about his wife and yesterday's round of golf.

As you stop in the doorway, the doors begin to close—but they stop again without touching you. They do this several times. Electro-

Claims Made To Isle Area In China Sea

MANILA, P. I., May 11 (AP)—A Filipino national school principal laid formal claim today to a group of small islands in the South China sea west of the Philippine Islands of Palawan.

Thomas Cloma, president of the Philippines maritime institute, said he and his associates claimed the territory by virtue of "discovery and occupation."

Cloma named the area "Freedomland."

A map of the territory showed it to be bounded by 10 degrees latitude north and 115 degrees longitude east. He said the lands and waters he claimed comprised 84,918 square nautical miles.

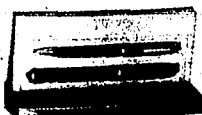

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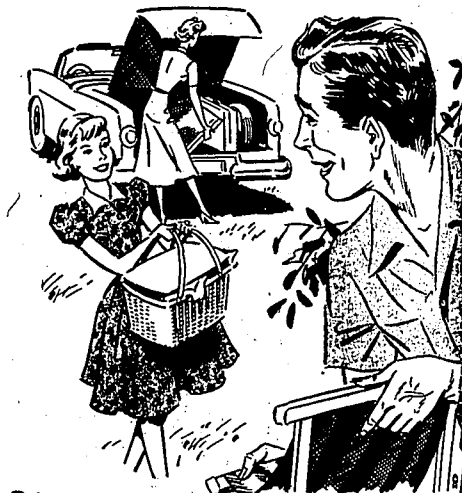

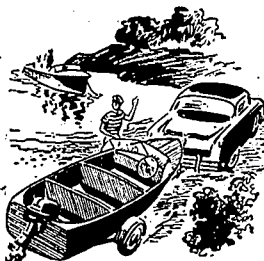

Navaho Claim Is Rejected by Health Group

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The U. S. public health service took sharp issue yesterday with charges that it is doing a "pitiful" job in serving the health needs of the Navaho Indians in Arizona and New Mexico.

Dr. Henry W. Casel, medical officer for the Albuquerque, N. M., health area, said in a statement that the health service is providing the Navaho reservation with "more medical service than at any time in the past."

Casel expressed surprise at the criticism leveled at the health service earlier this week by Paul Jones, chairman of the Navaho trial council.

Jones charged in a speech before the Navaho health association that the health service hospitals on the reservation are in "pitiful plight" and that the Navaho are sorry the health service has been made responsible for Indian health programs.

Casel said in reply: "As part of its program to improve health and medical services to Navaho, the public health service has assigned more medical health officers to the reservation than ever before. Our records show that we are providing more medical service than at any time in the past, and this service is of better quality."

"To improve further the extended quality of these services, we are going ahead with plans for new hospitals to replace the outmoded hospital at Shiprock and erect a new hospital at Gallup, N. M. We also are going ahead with new health centers on the reservation. "Contrary to published reports, a

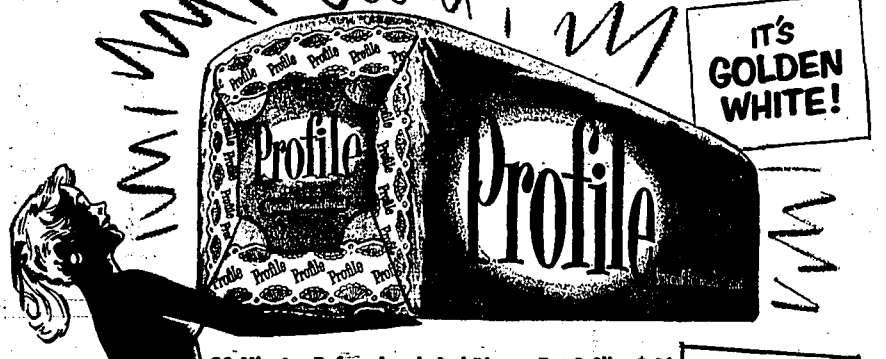

Stevenson Refutes Claims He Was KO'd by Minnesota Vote

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—Stevenson's new campaign strategy was not a defeat, Kefauver met Adlai E. Stevenson in Minnesota's Democratic caucus and belatedly made out of the state.

Eye-witness reports varied, some claiming that Stevenson looked heavily on his head and shortly expired of political shock. Subsequent reports suggest that whatever Stevenson may have landed on his feet, he certainly did not land on his head but in some other posture less dangerous to life and limbs.

The man from Illinois is back in the Democratic presidential contest nearly out in Minnesota. Kefauver went on from there to make some points, but so did Stevenson, who was in New Jersey. He has been favored, moreover, by getting his full share of the better of the political attack, such as last Sunday's when Georgia's Herman E. Talmadge said Stevenson would lose Texas votes and he had licked an anti-Stevenson bill.

It was in early January that Gov. C. Kenneth Williams, junior partner in Michigan's left-of-center political alliance, opened the 101-of-center attack on Stevenson. Williams publicly expressed ideas that 1956 was a time for moderation in the approach to national issues.

Williams said he could not support

Stevenson on the basis of his approach to national issues. Back of Williams stood the senior partner in Michigan's Democratic alliance, Vice President Walter P. Reuther of the combined AFL-CIO.

U.S. Is Facing Big Challenge By Red Move

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—Russia announced decision to cut its military manpower by about 25 percent has challenged U.S. officials of the free world at several critical points.

It has increased the difficulty of maintaining Western military strength. Although such a cutback is not likely to affect Russia's capacity for atomic war, the move almost certainly will be regarded in time for Moscow's political and full Soviet intentions lessening Western defense needs.

It generates new pressure on the Eisenhower administration to regain the initiative from the Russians through some bold new move. Not all these pressures come from Democratic critics; there apparently is some such concern inside the administration.

The problem of keeping cold war neutral alert to the dangers of expanding Soviet influence through political and economic infiltration is intensified.

The Florida primary, May 29, and the California primary, June 5, could change things considerably in almost any direction. Meantime, Stevenson is back in business.

The South would take him gladly, which is more than can be said of Kefauver and, especially, of Harriman.

Original Status as Colony Is Cited as Cause for Troubles

By HENRY McLEMORE.
Did you ever stop to think how much better off this country would be today if it had never been a colony?



That was a tough break. If we could have just started off from scratch, and never had had to break away from any mother country, we'd be ten times as popular around the world as we are today. Half my grief, it comes from our having "belonged" to England for so long a time. We severed this tie, but in many parts of the world we still are looked upon as relatives of the Englishmen, and once we moved. As a result, any hatred of England spills right over on us. I remember having this explained to me in Cairo a few years back. An American businessman had been invited to give a talk on a city street, and I asked an Egyptian acquaintance the reason for this. "What did you expect has happened?" I wanted to know. "Naturally, nothing," he replied. "But Americans seem like Englishmen to us. We lump you together. You are always backing England, taking her side, conferring with her in preference to talking with anyone else. And we know, too, that England wouldn't do a lot of the things we don't like if she didn't have an understandable approval of your people."

There must be something to what the man told me, for why would Americans be unpopular in India, Egypt, Greece, and now, of all places, Cyprus? America never pushed anybody around in Calcutta or Cairo. We were invited to buy the British, nor did we ever suggest diverting the Ganges to help irrigate our desert wastes. And as for Greece—well, that recent attack on our official property in Athens was a real surprise. The Greeks couldn't just be standing there to see us get our ear- raring them from communism, could they? It's a little late for them to start their own war for our having sent General Van Fleet and millions of dollars worth of military supplies. Granted when the reds threatened to take over.

There's one other thing that has happened. The Greeks are throwing rocks at Americans and shouting the loudest, and calling them all sorts of names. That's because of Cyprus and England. Now you very well know this country hasn't had any eyes speared toward Cyprus. Most of us Americans would have had a hard time locating Cyprus on the map in a hurry.

But we have been lumped with the English, and have to share their lumps. Two, three years ago it appeared as if France, not England, would be the mother country of the American colonies. That wouldn't have made much difference, would it? Americans would now be unpopular in India and Greece, and everywhere else that the French are having grief.

It's not so much that Monaco, or some other relatively unimportant country, had been our early mother. It was because we were at Monaco that I know of. (Reprinted by McNamee Studios, Inc.)

Beef Featured For Best Buys In Meat Sales

Beef in a wide variety of cuts will be the principal meat featured in special sales by butcher shops and food stores throughout the country this week-end.

While wholesale prices have squeezed pork and lamb out of the bargain category in most sections of the country, beef has been an even more widespread affect by recent week.

Price is higher. Beef prices were also slightly higher. Economy cuts, such as chuck roasts, were specially priced at 33 cents a pound in some New York areas where they brought 32 cents a pound several weeks ago. Compared to a year ago, however, beef prices are still low.

Cool spring weather continued to help back many early vegetable crops but shoppers in most sections of the country will find some locally grown items on food store counters. Generally the most outstanding buys will be spinach and radishes.

Two other spring favorites in the limited quantities but still at reasonable prices are rhubarb and green chutney.

While potatoes have increased in price in most places, supplies of last year's crop are running short, and the new crop is just starting in quantity from Florida and California. On fruit counters the best buys are still oranges and grapefruit.

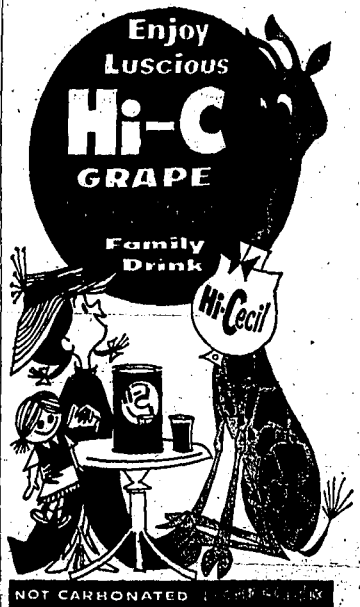

Asian Leader Visits in U.S.; Allies Watch

The visit of President Sukarno of Indonesia to the United States has the makings of a big headache for the state department.

It is unlikely that the visit of another Sukarno, as Indonesians call him, will result in any important agreements. Now it is likely to change the trend in the south Asia area. This trend, in which Indonesia is a leader, is toward "neutralism."

But two countries whose friendship is valuable to the United States will be watching every development during Sukarno's visit with close attention—and with suspicion. These two countries are The Netherlands and Australia.

Both Are Allies

The Netherlands is a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. A small one, it is true, but an important one. Australia is allied with the United States in the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization. It also is allied with the United States in the Australia-New Zealand defense treaty which was signed in San Francisco on Sept. 1, 1951.

It happens that at this time relations between Indonesia and The Netherlands, from which it won its independence in 1949, are exceedingly bad. Indonesia has broken its last political ties with The Netherlands.

One Reason—among several—for these bad relations is the claim of Indonesia to Netherlands New Guinea, covering an area of 151,000 square miles.

Overs Part Oversight

Australia possesses the remaining 150,000 square miles of New Guinea, the world's second largest island. It owns part oversight and holds the rest under a United Nations trusteeship.

The Netherlands refuses to give up its part of New Guinea. Australia refuses to entertain the idea that Netherlands New Guinea become part of Indonesia. In fact it is very probable that if it came to a showdown, Australia would fight to keep Indonesia out.

When Secretary of State John Foster Dulles visited Indonesia last March he commented on the similarity between the early days of the United States and the present status of Indonesia in their development from colonial status.

Always Aweared

Dulles undoubtedly intended it to be simply a diplomatically manly compliment. But it roused the greatest anger in The Netherlands. And it did not go over well in Australia.

Hence it looks as if Dulles and President Eisenhower will have to walk a diplomatic tightrope in any statements they may make to Sukarno. Anything that could possibly be interpreted as siding with Indonesia against The Netherlands, or in favor of Indonesia's ambitions, certainly will be interpreted that way.
