WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—President Eisenhower was described today as "a bit unhappy" over the recent upsurge of rivalry among the military services. Secretary of Defense Wilson made that comment to reporters at the White House after he and Adm. W. Radford, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, held their weekly meeting with the President. At the Capitol, two senate committees have made plans for inquiries although Wilson deprecated the importance or significance of the interservice sniping. In a move which seemed partly aimed at heading off any congressional probing, Wilson held an extraordinary press conference yesterday at which he and heads of all three services sought to put a damper on the interservice squabbling. In the Senate, it looked like a race to see who would do the investigating. Senator Chavez, D. N. M., got in first with an announcement that the appropriations subcommittee which he heads will make a study of the disagreement over basic defense policy. Then Senator Symington, D. Mo., said his armed services subcommittee will also make a study of the centers of alleged misrule and public controversy within the armed services revolving principally around the roles of the army and air force in the construction of military facilities, and the air power roles of the air force and the navy.

When Kootenai River Waves Held in Line by Army and Civil Crews

BONNERS FERRY, May 22 (AP)—The army and civilian volunteers were holding the line today against the swollen Kootenai river which has broken through two diking systems and flooded some 6,000 acres of farmland. The river stood at 32.5 feet today, dropping from a record peak of 35.4 yesterday when wave poured over the land and relieved pressure on other dirt dikes. No new breaks were reported in the levees overnight. Army infantrymen and engineers built up the barriers and patrolled for leaks. The Kootenai, rolling above the 31-foot flood stage in the wake of a heat wave that melted heavy mountain snowpacks, is expected to recede to normal by Thursday at 36 feet. The Twin Falls city commission adopted a resolution Monday to set up a \$200,000 improvement district for curbs, gutters and sidewalks and arranged for a meeting Friday night to discuss the construction of a national guard armory. The resolution to form local improvement district No. 80, which covers 16 specified areas, was approved unanimously. It was explained that the resolution only signified the city's intention to form the district. A meeting to hear protests will be held in the city hall at 7:30 p. m. June 4. Bonds for the district would be issued to finance the construction of curbs, gutters, sidewalks and pavement materials. The cost would be borne by the property owners in the district by assessment. A committee representing the Twin Falls City of Commerce, A. P. Nelson, John Soden, R. S. Tomlinson and Willard Rice, requested the commission to exercise an option concerning construction of an armory in "Twin Falls or in Twin Falls Park" (Article 1-2-52).

Commission Chairman R. Lyon Smith suggested the county commission and members of the military unit as well as city commissioners and Chamber representatives should be invited to discuss the matter. The meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. in the city hall. It was explained that the federal government will bear 75 percent of the armory cost. The balance must be made up by the city, county or state or all three. Present facilities for the national guard in Twin Falls are considered inadequate.
