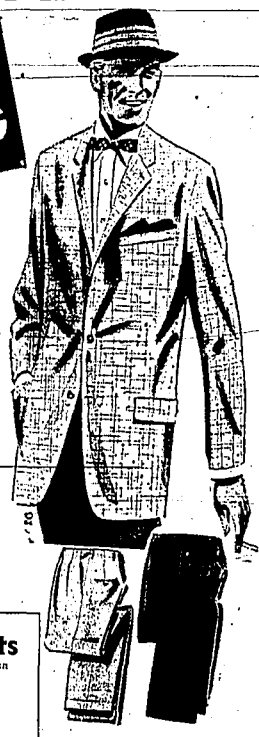

Shippers Are Told Aims for Soil Program

BUN VALLEY, May 23 (U-P)—A department of agriculture official yesterday announced the soil bank plan in the farm program should be considered "unemployed acres program."

Lloyd M. Chase, Washington, D.C., director of the grain division of the commodity stabilization service, "bridge" attempted.

"What is being attempted by the soil bank," he said, "is to make it possible for the farmer to bridge over from too much production to production for available demand."

Midwest Gets Relief as Cool Blasts Arrive

A double blast of cold air came to the rescue of the sweltering Midwest yesterday and showed behind a front of thunderstorms.

Cool weather came flowing back into the Midwest around midnight. Temperatures dropped dramatically and midwesters were pronounced cool. In Chicago, where the temperature got to 93 yesterday, a double delivery of cool weather parted more than 6 degrees off the thermometer.

The first arrival of cool breezes pulled down the mercury from 93 to 86 degrees in one hour. The mercury stayed around 70 until another cool blast took the temperature from 70 to 64 degrees in three hours yesterday.

Temperature contrasts were equalized by dramatic showers. The mercury got to 100 degrees yesterday at Dodge City, Kan., and at Lake Rock, Wis., often the coldest spot in the nation. But by early today, the temperatures were in the 60s in northern Minnesota and upper Michigan and in the 40s through Wisconsin and Illinois.

The clash of hot and cold air prompted thunderstorm warnings throughout the Midwest, with some severe storms farther west.

The showers and thunderstorms cooled the temperature from 80 to 60 in Chicago, Ill., and in St. Louis, Mo., and in St. Paul, Minn. Winds up to 40-mph per hour were clocked at Cleveland, O., early today.

Soviets Might Have View of H-Bomb Blast

PEARL HARBOR, May 23 (AP)—Only Moscow really knows whether unidentified Soviet-espionage saw the first American test of a plane-dropped H-bomb.

Aircraft and destroyers of the test force swept across sections of the 40,000-square-mile danger zone repeatedly in the days preceding and on the day the H-bomb drop was made.

Except for one instance, in which a Japanese fishing craft apparently wandered into the northeast corner of the zone less than 12 hours before detonation time, the patrol reported repeatedly that their sweeps had "disclosed" no unknown shipping in the area.

This meant that none had been seen. It did not necessarily mean that nothing was there. Six ships and a half-submarine plane spotted one comparatively small part of the zone for two days in a hunt for a missing American bomber, who was aboard a light bomber when it crashed. This intensive hunt, with thousands of men serving as lookouts, sighted nothing except drifting trash dropped from passing ships.

The Marshall Islands are within easy reach of long-range Soviet submarines basing on Siberian or Red China ports. To slip into the warning area, close enough for a good look at the bomb test, could have been a simple operation for Russian submarines.

England Ends 'Give-Away' of Foreign Land

Great Britain evidently has decided that the "give-away" method of dealing with its colonial possessions has gone far enough. The decision was made plain in a declaration of policy Monday, in behalf of the government, by Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd.

Briefly, it is that Britain intends to hold such possessions as Cyprus, Aden and Singapore at any cost. That means by force if necessary. Lloyd called them positions of strategic interest.

Lloyd's statement was made, after it was approved by the cabinet, at a Conservative party rally.

The statement was aimed in the first place at the nationalist political leaders of some of Britain's smaller possessions. But it obviously was aimed also at "neutralists" like Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru and at some foreign governments which would like to take over British territory.

New Balance Is Planned in Space Rocket

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—A rocket "bracketing" system will be built into the rocket that launches the first baby moon satellite into outer space, it was disclosed last night.

Engineer Peter Freeman of the Glenn T. Martin company of Baltimore, Maryland, announced the plan in a talk prepared for the Washington section of the Institute of Radio Engineers.

Freeman described in some detail the prospective control mechanism for the unusual finless rocket that will carry the satellite into a globe-circling path. The satellite will carry it in an elliptic course that will vary from 200 to perhaps 1,500 miles above the earth's surface.

The huge, 72-foot, three-stage rocket will be controlled in its upward flight, he said, by an electronic and mechanical system based on the principle used by a small toy to balance a broomstick on its hand.

He explained that the rocket-bearing the satellite in the nose will be kept from wobbling, swerving or rolling end-over-end in much the same way that a youngster keeps a broomstick upended in his hand by moving his hand about.

In the case of the rocket vehicle, Freeman said, the trick will be accomplished in a split second.

Gyroscopes will be used within the rocket as "reference" guides to an accurate path. But, if the rocket shows a tendency to get off the beam, various control magnets will take over.

These magnets will be used in the rocket's propelling motors which automatically tilt and provide directional changes in the stream of exhaust gases surging from the vehicle's rear.

It will cause these changes in the direction of thrust that will keep the vehicle from pitching like a boat "yawing" from side to side, rolling end-over-end.

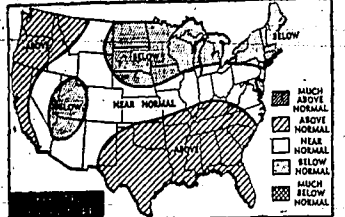

Blood Cancer Finds Unwilling Victim In Small Child; Progress Is Reported

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 22 (AP)—Leukemia, a blood cancer, found Joseph Ware an unwilling victim. The chubby 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Ware, Ardmore, Okla., already has received "unheard of" accomplishments. He arrived at the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation hospital with acute leukemia when he was 4 months old and has survived the blood cancer attack.

He has received no treatment since Sept. 1, 1953, but "we are still unwilling to say he is cured," Dr. Leonard P. Eliel, research director and cancer section chief, said.

Ten years ago this would have been "unheard of," according to Eliel, because before the development of a battery of new drugs the average victim of acute leukemia lived but three to four months.

Two other youngsters recently underwent leukemia treatment as part of the hospital's program. One is Candy Craven, 3-year-old daughter of Sgt. and Mrs. Glenn Craven, Midwest City, Okla. Her case was first diagnosed last November and she was released from the hospital two months later. However, like Ware, she is still under careful observation by the doctors.

The third is little Richard McClure, hospitalized April 9. Ironically, 3-year-old Richie is the son of Lawrence McClure, a biochemist in the foundation's cancer section who concentrated on leukemia studies.

In case of previously untreated patients his group is trying at least to convert the disease to a chronic form enabling the patient to "live with" his cancer for years.

Agents are commonly employed against leukemia. But the strategy here is to concentrate a triple attack with a combination of three substances given simultaneously.

biting it with cordone and ACTH. Then researchers level combined doses of 6-tertoppurine, aminopterin and azasterin at the remaining cells.

Researchers believe if each drug slows the cancer in a different way, it might be more effective to put up three road blocks instead of one to keep it from taking a detour.

Apparently neither the disease nor the little boy's treatment has affected Joseph Ware's health.

"As far as we can tell, he is growing long hair," Eliel said. "He looks like a future football star."

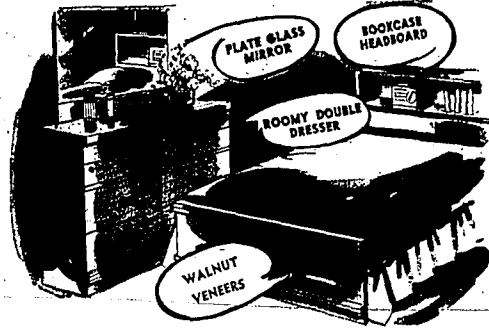
