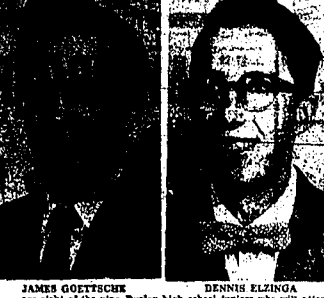

**Trouble Starts**

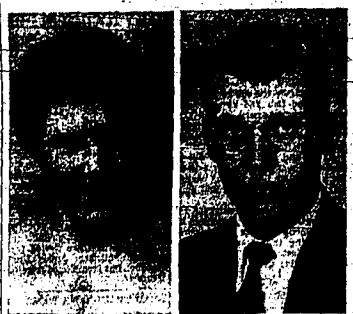
The trouble started 10 days ago when City Commission Chairman Byron testified in federal court that the city's beach was open to all races.

Then you go into the kitchen and your wife makes you decide what you want for breakfast.

### Richfield Man Adds Complexities to Hobby Born in Modern Airplane Age

Max Hill, Richfield banker, turns to the air age for his relaxation and into his hobby pours an intense interest for detail. This complicates his hobby but the results are as accurate as bank statements.

Hill produces model airplanes. In his hobby he is a brother of thousands of men and boys throughout the United States. Some fly powered models, some send their craft aloft by means of rubber bands, and some others for scale model duplication of existing airplanes.

Model airplane building and flying is one of the most popular modern hobbies. It may be purchased from which either flying or scale models can be made. This extends from "flying attacks" to extremely extensive and highly complicated products.

Hill's hobby leans toward the scale models. He gets his flying in a full scale airplane with himself at the controls.

As with many model airplane makers, Hill began his hobby in his boyhood. The spark of interest was kindled when he was a freshman in high school. He claims his constant interest in aviation is what keeps him interested in model airplane construction. As designs for airplanes change, his field of exploration broadens.

Long before Hill learned to fly he had visions of flying model airplanes into the air. He tried "balsa" and other attempts could be described as successful.

Both gasoline powered models crashed after extremely short hops and were destroyed. This decided Hill his field was in the non-flying model.

The Richfield banker goes for materials and offers spends months working on one model. The simple models hold no challenge for him. His goes beyond the detailed plans offered for airplanes and goes so far as to drill holes in gun barrels. He finishes models in minutes and spends hours putting a proper finish onto the wood.

### Cherokees Want Point Four Program to Help Economics

By MAL BOYLS  
CHEROKEE, N. C., May 26 (AP)—Should Uncle Sam include the American Indian under its program of aid to foreign nations?

Some members of the proud and diabolical Cherokees nation think so.

"Certainly we feel that we are a kind of point four program," said Jackson, a Cherokee tribal councilman, a navy veteran and the fourth highest official leader of the Cherokees here.

"We need capital. If the federal government would provide us with the capital, we could create more industry. We could put more Indians in business. We could be independent again. And that's what we want to do."

The Cherokees were a proud and free nation centuries before the United States. They were the first of an Indian on the other side of a great river.

Most historians today agree the Cherokees were more peaceful than the Choctaw, Chickasaw and Seminole. They lived in log cabins, liked their own corn.

That happened to the Cherokees, of course, is about the saddest chronicle in American history.

Some 180,000 square miles ranging from Virginia into Alabama. They tried hard for peace.

"We made 80 separate treaties with the white man," said Jackson gravely. "We lived up to every treaty—and the white man broke every treaty."

Under the pressure of incoming settlers, the U. S. army was ordered in 1838 to move them to a new home in the area that is now in Oklahoma. Some 18,000 Cherokees submitted, and started the "Trail of Tears." Some 4,000 died on the way to the hills here. Thanks to the help of changing times—and their own hard-earned money—they own a 53,000-acre reservation in the Great Smoky mountains, which they bought themselves. They have grown to 23,500 members.

Most of them are Christian. There are 18 churches on the reservation—14 of them Baptist—and all but about a dozen of the oldest Cherokees speak English. The younger ones now usually go through high school.

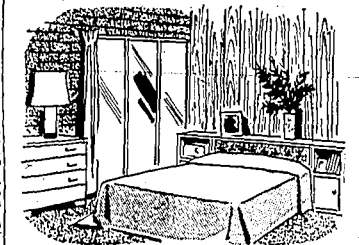
The federal government maintains the school as a 25-bed hospital. The Cherokee Historical society in 1930 started producing "Unto These Hills," an outdoor summer drama which employs 200 Indians, has paid them a million dollars in salaries, this year hopes to draw its millionth customer.

### Safety Noted For Batch of Polio Serum

BOISE, May 26 (AP)—The state health board says the safety of a batch of the Salk anti-polio vaccine, now back in use in Idaho, is safe and effective. Dr. Kayo Sunda, U.S. public health service physician assigned to the board, reported yesterday that newly manufactured batches of the vaccine have passed all tests in the state health laboratory.

No Polio Found No polio has turned up in 98 adult specimens from Idaho children who received the vaccine in an experiment last March, he said. And all of the first 25 blood samples analyzed show antibodies that all three polio types—a sign that the vaccine is providing immunity, he added.

The experimental vaccination program marked the resumption of statewide vaccinations, which had been suspended last year because of a polio outbreak. The board says it feels the outbreak was the result of live polio virus in first batches of the Salk vaccine, but never batches are safe and effective.

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U. S.
