# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

**WASHINGTON**—Russia's sensational and oft-cited charges against the U. S. military and diplomatic relations, has upset all Pentagon planning as violently as Moscow's new economic offensive has disrupted our foreign aid program and international relations.

In an introduction to the current press conference, Tucker described the procedure which funds the pattern and allocates the funds for the three services: the Navy, Air, and the Army.

He said that the Air Force has civilian and military staffs present at all closed sessions for study and revision.

Within financial limitations prescribed by the White House and budget bureau, the joint chiefs submit their findings to the president and the secretary of state. The program is then forwarded to congress for legislative authorization and appropriations.

**CLASSING SERVICES**—As presented to Capitol Hill, the 1957 program outlined today, and resulted in the formation of a committee on national defense. At closed-door meetings, the various service spokesmen vented their grievances over the Eisenhower budget cuts and the situation of their respective departments.

What also came out of the sessions was the fact that the Air Force is being completely bypassed in air power.

**AIR EXPERTS SCOFF AT NAVY'S CARRIERS**—Air experts scoffed at proposed construction of six giant aircraft carriers at a cost of billions. In written analyses before the House and the Senate, the Air Force was named by carrier waters on all sides—the Baltic, Black and Mediterranean seas. The Air Force pointed out that its aircraft carriers were the only "airlift" for land-based bombers. 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### FIENDISH WEAPONS

When the United States dropped the first hydrogen bomb over Nagasaki, in the minds of some cautious U. S. officials, not a demonstration of superior might but a catching up with the Soviet Union.

These men, in other words, are inclined to accept Russia's attitude that it has long since unleashed an H-bomb from a plane.

Our own previous massive hydrogen burst was a "device" rather than a deliverable bomb. To say this does not say we have lost our overall technological advantage over Russia, built up over the years by stockpiling atomic bombs and developing a wide variety of atomic weapons. But it does suggest that our margin may be diminishing in some ways.

If the cautious ones are right, then our touching off a delivered H-bomb could have helped to redress the balance in one of these questionable fields.

But whether we are just pulling even or are ahead in this category, it should be clear to America and the world that what happened at Bikini recently was an event of the utmost significance.

So long as we can hold an edge or keep the Russians in virtual stalemate the prospects of nuclear warfare seem remote. It would be mutual destruction on such a scale that the spools would have to be collected in ash cans.

By the same token, maintaining an effective margin might prevent Russia from using its military might as a weapon in the closet, to force peaceful capitulation of weak or timid nations on the fringes of its power sphere.

Reading the details of the Bikini drop, one cannot doubt that what we are preparing for is indeed a kind of conflict which must never be allowed to happen.

Estimates of the force of that explosion place it somewhere between 10 and 15 megatons or the equivalent of 10 to 15 million tons of TNT. This is more explosive power than was unleashed in World War II by all the conventional bombs put together.

As to the fact that the hydrogen bomb was dropped from a jet B-29 flying 60 miles an hour at an altitude of eight miles, and you begin to get some notion of the shape a third World war would have.

Still ahead is that moment when a warhead of this or greater power will be capable of projecting 5,000 miles across oceans and land masses in guided but pilotless missiles.

None but the insane could want a war fought with such devilish weapons. But we must be ready even for the prospect that devils might oppose us. So long as these devils are being worked upon anywhere on the globe, we have no choice but to go on perfecting our own and striving them as we are doing once more at Bikini.

**RHEE LOSING FAVOR**  
Syngman Rhee has never encouraged what might be called ideal democratic conditions in Korea. So it is rather remarkable that in winning election to a third term as president he polled only 56 per cent of the vote.

Four years ago he drew 72 per cent of the total. This time he had surprising competition from an ex-Communist who is in hiding, and a man who died of a brain hemorrhage 10 days before election.

Obviously the aged Rhee still has pattern in hand. But the strong vote for his rivals would seem at least in part to represent a protest.

It could be that Koreans are growing weary of his iron-handed rule in the guise of democracy. Or perhaps that they are just growing tired of Rhee.

Observers have been saying for a long time that Korea needs fresh, imaginative leadership. A good many Koreans may be reaching the same conclusion.

**A FRIENDLY VISITOR**  
Indonesia's President Sukarno has proved a captivating visitor to America.

Not only has he shown a tremendously engaging personality, but he has revealed a considerable knowledge of this country, its history, and especially its revolutionary origins.

Again and again he has demonstrated in words that he has real appreciation for the ideals of freedom which sparked the American Revolution. In fact, this nation's course toward freedom has been a beacon for liberty-loving people all over the world.

He shows, too, a determination to search discerningly for the real essence of America—beyond its material affluence and flashy suburbs and tall buildings. He has been looking for the "state of mind" which lies at the root of all as a people.

Indonesia's country is "neutral"—in the cold war. But his word is not proof that to be neutral doesn't mean to be unfriendly as some would argue. We should all be very glad he came.

**CANADA'S NEVER-NEVER ROAD**  
For the past 30 years or more, there has been talk of a highway across Canada. Many speeches have been made by politicians denouncing the loss of national pride and resulting from the lack of a road linking the provinces. They bemoaned the fact that the roads in the West were to get from eastern Canada to western Canada.

In 1949, after much prodding, the federal government agreed to build a \$2-billion highway across Canada. The project's success is now in doubt because of the fact that only 1,600 miles of the \$2-billion road have been constructed to date. The remaining 1,400 miles are still unopened and there are still 185 miles on which there is no highway of any kind.

Since the federal government is trying another scheme to speed up the construction of "approved" roads to the extent of the mileage of the highway, it is probable that the Ottawa government will get the gap closed by the end of 1960.

If we ever get the money that is necessary to do the job, there would be a great task to go on from Ottawa to have the government back. There is no one in the West who would not support the network, the federal government hopes to get a single road across the country funded after five years. This is disconcerting to those who are building.

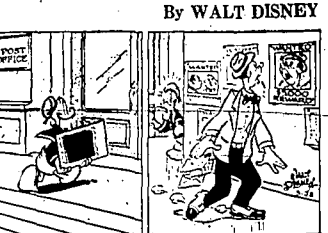

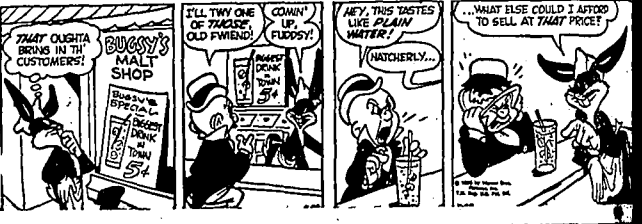

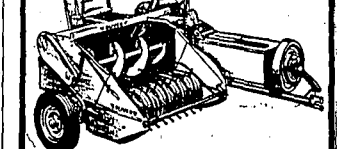

### Laborite Hits Eden and U.S. For Blunders

CAMBRIDGE, England, May 28 (AP)—Lithuanian Laborite Boris Beran said today that the government is leading Britain "to ruin" by following an American foreign policy "based on a profound blunder."

Beran launched a scathing attack on the Conservative government and the foreign policies of the United States in a speech here.

"I am not trying to promote bad blood between Britain and America," Beran said. "I believe the American working man is as good as we are."

"But the official policy of the United States is founded on a profound blunder and we have been following it. We are still following it and we cannot extricate ourselves from it."

"What is this blunder? It is the assumption that the Soviet Union is arming itself... for a favorable opportunity for a military attack on the United States."

"As a result of that we imposed on our economy the biggest single program of rearmament this nation has ever known in peacetime and we imposed conscription on our young men."

**Make Charge**  
Beran charged that Britain had been "misled" into believing a Soviet attack was imminent.

"I always look the view that the threat from the Soviet Union was firstly social, secondly political and thirdly technical," he said. "It was not military."

Beran said that if warnings of the military might of the Russians are true, then the communists had recovered from World War II far better than the Western nations.

"It is that," he added, "where never has been a greater testimonial to the efficiency of communism."

### Platform Eyed

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—Rep. John E. Moss, D., Calif., today said the Republican and Democratic parties should adopt platforms emphasizing "the people's right to know."

Moss, chairman of a house government operations subcommittee investigating suppression of public information, call for a free flow of public information from government agencies.

### Meetings Planned On Dam Locations

PORTLAND, May 28 (AP)—Army engineers will hold a series of meetings early in July to get local views on possible locations for dams in the Columbia river basin. The engineers announced the series today as part of their review of possible dam sites in the basin. The review was started last fall to determine the remaining scores and water-resource potential in the region. Brig.-Gen. L. H. Poole, North Pacific division engineer, said another series of hearings is planned early next year, and a complete report will be submitted to congress by the end of 1957.

### Tongues Added

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—The Voice of America has added two new languages to its world-wide radio network—Telugu and Malayalam. With the addition of the two languages, spoken by many millions in India, the network now is broadcasting in 43 languages.

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### 2 Red Lands Admit Unrest For Students

VIENNA, Austria, May 28 (AP)—Communist Czechoslovakia is experiencing an outbreak of unrest among its university students. They are accused of presenting ultimatums demanding reduction in the Marx-Leninism course, a cut in military training and the restoration of academic freedom.

Similar symptoms are reported among the students of red-ruled Poland. They complain of lack of freedom and modern instructional methods, while the authorities accuse certain students of distributing anti-communist leaflets.

These student revolts are being discussed openly in the communist-controlled newspapers of the two countries—something unheard of in the past.

They appear to be the result of a wave of cynicism spreading among the youth of Russia's east European satellites in the wake of the denunciation of Stalin and the admission that many victims of Stalin's purges were innocent. These have been accompanied by some easing of controls to permit a measure of free speech.

The Czechoslovak student revolt appears centered in Slovakia, although the national capital, Prague, has had a taste of it.

Prague and Trnava, the two main newspapers of Bratislava, capital of Slovakia, report "stormy and demagogic protests" by university students which have been condemned by communist authorities.

Students in Prague, Bratislava and Banika systems lampooned the government and university authorities in their May 24th parade.

Pravda, Prague Communist Slovakia, reported that now it can be said—without reservation—that the student revolt is a serious danger to the national capital, Prague, and the rest of the country.

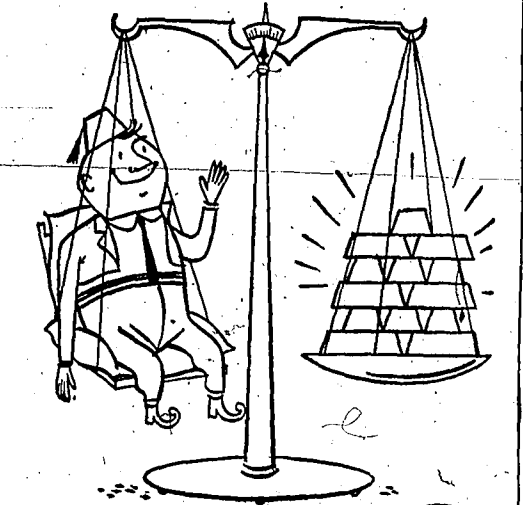

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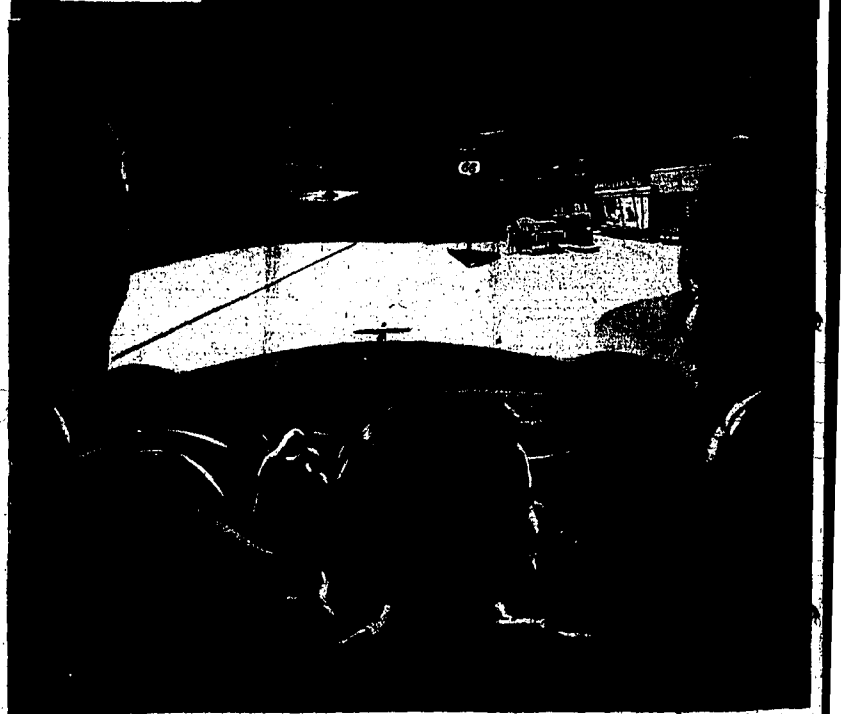
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
