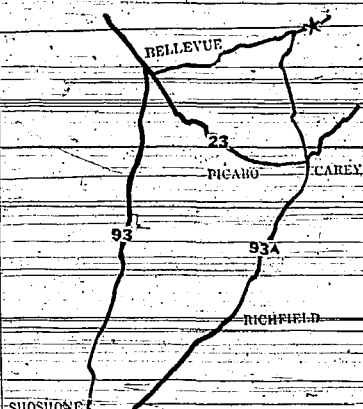

Remains of Once Booming Muldoon Doze in High Foothills of Mountains

Scattered in the upper foothills of the Sawtooth mountains, about 25 miles north of Carey, is a quiet little valley. In it are streams of sparkling clear water teeming with fish and ranches soaking up the sun. The atmosphere exudes a spirit of peace and comfortable solitude.

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INEFFECTIVE SAFETY DRIVES

What could well serve as the keynote of President Eisenhower's western regional conference on traffic safety, held in San Francisco, was pointed out by Matthew W. Hill, Washington state supreme court judge.

Delegates from the 11 participating states will go to out-homes with a feeling of compelling urgency, he said. "The feeling is that responsibility, a feeling sense of something has to be done, and that it is up to us to see that it is done."

What Ben Arnold, state senator from Arizona, told his delegation at the conference, was equally significant. Arnold, especially, is not one of the "double-talkers" who are in the habit of talking about traffic safety efforts in the past.

"Highway speed and highway safety," he said bluntly, "don't go together!"

The 25 Idaho delegates to the conference were so impressed with the urgency of the traffic problem that they called on Governor Smylie to form a statewide traffic safety committee composed of the state's civic and business leaders.

The committee adopted by the Idaho delegation called on the governor "to appoint a preliminary planning committee to consider ways and means to form, finance and conduct a statewide traffic safety organization."

One well qualified for the assignment, summing up the Idaho delegation's findings on traffic safety problems, Mayor Theron Ward of Jerome, who has shown an active interest along these lines, said Idaho was deficient in three major traffic safety areas:

- 1. The lack of a state division for driver license examinations.
- 2. The lack of a high school in which driver education is required.
- 3. The lack of uniform regulations throughout the state and the unequal application of present laws by courts, prosecutors and police.

The Times-News has contended all along that highway fatalities have increased by leaps and bounds, not only in Idaho but throughout the country, because there has been too much "shadow boxing" in our traffic legislation.

We'll agree that driver education plays an important part. It would be foolish to quarrel with the reasoning that we need good engineering, improved highways and all that. And law enforcement, to our way of thinking, is the most important part all.

But when it comes to a real showdown on law enforcement—equal application of the laws by courts, prosecutors and the police, as suggested by Mayor Ward—we usually fall flat on our face.

That goes for our state legislators, our governors and all others who have any part in making the laws and seeing to it that they are enforced.

Drivers who persist in speeding and endangering human lives in open defiance of adequate laws and effective enforcement of those laws are being slapped on the wrist with fines that mean nothing to such inconsiderate characters. They are the show-offs, the privileged ones who make a mockery of law enforcement and send their victims to the morgue in ever-increasing numbers.

Not so long ago the governor of Idaho announced a state-wide traffic safety campaign which illustrates our point. With our fingers crossed we are hoping that the campaign there could be no doubt that Idaho was sorely in need of drastic action along these lines.

But the people of Idaho may judge for themselves as to whether or not the so-called campaign against all the "speeders" who are down-drag-out drive, or just another one of those routine gestures that fall far short of accomplishing the purpose.

To further illustrate that point, Idaho's traffic deaths a year ago at this time totaled 87. So far this year there have been 72 deaths on Idaho's highways and the record continues to mount!

Speaking of traffic, state patrolmen on duty in the vicinity of the century observances on Memorial day, made note of the number of states and Idaho counties represented on license plates passing that point between 8:30 and 9 a.m.

There were cars from 18 different states—Ohio, Colorado, California, Washington, Oregon, Utah, Kansas, Missouri, Nevada, Massachusetts, Mississippi, Texas, British Columbia, Iowa, Louisiana, South Dakota, Florida, and Pennsylvania.

Fifteen Idaho counties were also represented during that same half-hour period.

Asiatic Leader States Nations Want Equality

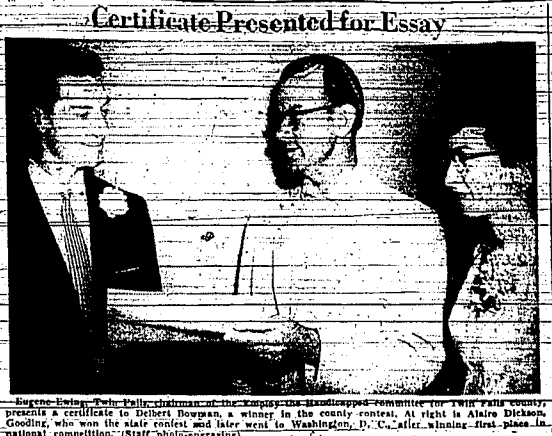
SAN FRANCISCO, June 2 (AP)—President Sukarno headed off today after a blunt policy speech in which he said Asia's "evolution" will continue unimpeded to the benefit of the underprivileged and the welfare of the world.

Sukarno, his banker and most doubtful ally in his 26-day state visit to the United States, said he would continue to lead the world affairs council of Asian states.

"We have no time for the slow progress of evolution. It is true that progress of evolution cannot occur simultaneously in all fields and national-anticipations. But we must not need up evolution. We must need explosive evolution."

"Our nations are weary," said the president, "of being the dispossessed, the voiceless, the underprivileged. They demand equality of status in the world."

The turbulence of Asia is due to nationalism, but to colonialism, he said. It is also caused by poverty and the obstructions laid in the path of freedom.

Ballot Set for Market Quota On '57 Wheat

Marketing quotas for the 1957 wheat crop have been proclaimed by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson. John A. Benson, chairman of the state agricultural administration and conservation committee, said the quotas will be effective for the 1957 crop.

The quotas will be set July 15 at the date for a referendum on whether the state will vote to put the quotas into effect. A two-thirds vote favoring quotas is necessary if the quotas are to be in effect.

Growers who are affected by the quotas and therefore are eligible to vote in the referendum are those who will have more than 10 acres of wheat in 1957.

In his proclamation, Secretary Benson said, "This marks the fourth successive year that growers have been asked to vote on whether they will accept the national marketing quota for wheat."

The national marketing quota for wheat is 1.1 billion bushels. The state's share of the quota is 150,000 bushels.

The quotas will be set July 15 at the date for a referendum on whether the state will vote to put the quotas into effect. A two-thirds vote favoring quotas is necessary if the quotas are to be in effect.

53 Million Worth of 1954 Retail Trade Reported by 468 Businesses in County

Some 468 retail establishments in Twin Falls county accounted for a total of \$53,000,000 worth of 1954 retail trade reported by the U. S. department of commerce indicated Friday.

Released by Kenneth Montgomery, Chamber of Commerce secretary, after its receipt from Harold K. Montgomery, chief of the department's bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, the report indicated that the 468 retail establishments in the city of Twin Falls accounted for \$41,200,000 worth of retail trade.

The county's retail establishments reported a \$2,800,000 annual payroll, and the city's 1,631 divided \$4,622,000, according to the report.

Blaine county, the report shows, had 86 retail establishments and a total of \$5,294,000 sales for 1954. There were 400 employees and an annual payroll of \$542,000.

Camia county listed 13 establishments with a total retail trade of \$2,000,000.

There were 13 part-time employees with a total annual payroll of \$20,000.

Clearwater county ranked high among Star Valley counties, with 187 establishments reported and a total retail trade of \$17,610,000 for the year. Total of 943 employees split a payroll of \$1,589,000.

The 112 business establishments in Gooding county, said \$4,905,000 worth of retail goods during 1954. A total of 310 employees were listed and an annual payroll of \$785,000.

Jerome county's 110 retail establishments employed 748 workers and paid them \$1,145,000 in 1954. Meanwhile selling \$12,044,000 worth of merchandise.

The report lists 40 retail establishments for Lincoln county, with an annual sales figure of \$2,299,000 and a payroll of \$167,000. Lincoln county retailers employed 85 persons.

Minidoka county's 115 retail merchants paid \$662,000 to 339 employees during 1954 and reported annual sales of \$10,816,000.

People Picket Soviet Clergy Jaunt to U. S.

NEW YORK, June 2 (AP)—Pickets representing fundamentalist Protestants gathered at New York International airport today to protest the arrival of eight Russian churchmen for a visit sponsored by the National Council of Churches of Christ.

Waving placards reading "welcome you as secret police" and "Soviet Russian churchmen are agents of the KGB," some 60 pickets marched in a gray-pilot-maze terminal entrance hours before the Russians' scheduled arrival.

The churchmen originally were expected to arrive this morning, but their plane was delayed.

The pickets represented the American Council of Christian Churches, acting in cooperation with anti-communistic organizations representing Latvia, Estonia, Bulgaria, Hungary, and the Ukraine. The council's president, Dr. Harland J. O'Dell, pastor of the Canton, O., gospel center, said the organization is protesting the Russians' 10-day visit because of the belief that they are "agents of the Soviet government."

The American council represents fundamentalists with a total of 1.5 million members. The national council represents 30 major Protestant denominations with 35 million members.

The Russian delegation represents Lutherans, Baptists, Armenians, Orthodox, and Russian-Orthodox congregations.

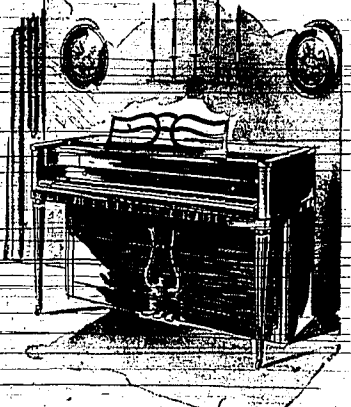

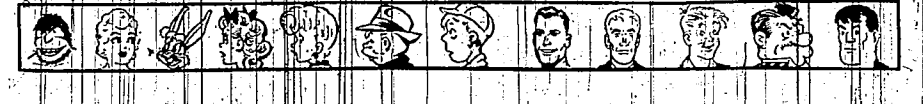

After they were forced to leave they returned to Amsterdam but had not made up their mind to come to America.

And so, for many long months, they corresponded with members of the Valley Christian church who offered to sponsor them.

He has more than 40 casting, fly, stream, and river rods and uses a \$100 custom built "Winston" rod, made to his specifications, for "dancing fly-casting contests. The rod is light and has a soft feel. It has a "plenty of backbone." He also has an Armaflex rod and made more than 20 years ago. A man in Colorado, both of these rods are made of aluminum. The first step in tying a fly is to clamp the fly hook to the vice. A thread is attached to the shank of the hook and the fly is made by fastening material to the hook with thread.
