Kootenai Falls; Snake River Is Holding Steady

The Kootenai river in north Idaho continued to rise yesterday, but the Snake held steady nearly two feet above flood stage in eastern Idaho. The weather bureau forecast warmer weather for Wednesday. A few showers are forecast also. Cool weather has diminished the flood somewhat. The bureau said the Snake stood at 9.2 feet somewhat, the same as Monday. The Kootenai fell from 10.1 feet to 9.6 to 9.5 at Bonners Ferry. Dikes go up to 37

feet. The Salmon was reported just above flood stage at Salmon. The highway department said it was washing at the edge of U.S. 95 north of Riggins and the highway was restricted to one-way traffic on several stretches. The river is falling.

Near Salmon, it has inundated a few houses, washed away some farm roads, stranded about nine people. Houses have moved to higher ground in the Salmon area and about 1,000 people were evacuated after the accident.

Naval Rocket Projects Will Be Continued

WHITE SANDS PROVING GROUNDS, N.M., June 5 (UPI)—The U.S. Navy said today it had no intention of abandoning its high-altitude Aerobee rocket despite a second test failure of the missile in less than a week.

An Aerobee "H" test shot last Friday was a success yesterday. Yesterday's test before launching the missile was ruined by damage to the delicate rocket's instrument-filled nose cone caused by a bird.

The Navy's 16-day test plan to abandon the project but Commander W. Dichi, naval research laboratory and international geophysical year project manager, said the decision "had to be done" to spruce up the Aerobee "H."

Dichi said an apparent major defect in the rocket was causing it to get below normal altitude for the intended geophysical year program.

The Aerobee "H" is the specialty-grade missile designed for altitude research about 100-miles—seven times higher than the present altitude record—and includes a transonic-concentric solid propellant.

A small rocket, which spluttered up to 50 miles and then began to dive into the earth floor, had been test off located in the desert.

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INCREASED DISCOUNT RATES

The federal reserve board isn't too happy about the public dispute that has been stirred up over its latest increase in discount rates.

These are the interests which federal reserve banks charge their member banks for loans which they turn around to commercial firms.

Few people understand all the technical intricacies of these moves. The tendency is therefore to play it up as a personal policy feud between Federal Reserve Board Chairman William McChesney Martin, Jr., and Secretary of the Treasury George M. Humphrey.

Actually, Martin and Humphrey are still speaking to each other, daily and sometimes several times daily. They have mutual respect for each other's opinions on what F.R.B. policy should be on credit at this particular time.

President Eisenhower really settled what dispute there may be between Humphrey and Martin by his press conference statement expressing complete confidence in the federal reserve system. It was not under the control of the President, he said, and it would be a mistake to make it so. Martin himself couldn't have asked for a more historic endorsement.

Martin is known as an optimist, believing that the opportunity for success is great in America. If the country doesn't run off the track, if it does, it does not rule out the possibility of another depression like 1938.

Managing the currency, making credit available, controlling it and keeping the banking system solvent are seen as the important responsibilities of the federal reserve system in keeping the train on the rails.

The federal reserve board and the treasury have fought over this right-of-way many times before. In the two years following Martin's appointment to F.R.B. he was in four major disputes with the then Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder.

The big argument then was over supporting the price of government bonds by federal reserve. At one point, Martin thought he might have to resign. But an accord was reached.

The reckless waste and inefficiency of the Korean war period were followed by the 1953 recession. In 1954 federal reserve poured easy money into the market to offset it.

This is now admitted as a mistake. Things louted over by the fall of 1954. But early in 1955 a boom got rolling and the brakes had to be applied. This is the corrective action now being taken.

There was a treasury-federal reserve argument over this last November. Before the discount rate was raised for the first time in the past year, it was all kept under cover, but it got out into the news papers then. But—the fifth rate, last April

really stirred up the animals.

The federal reserve board position is that it can't do its job of stabilizing the value of the dollar. It will be subjected to political and business pressures, or if its policies are to be matters of constant speculation. The board thinks it's doing its job best when it's out of the newspapers.

STEVENSON'S VICTORY

What Adlai Stevenson did in Florida was not impressive; it was a victory.

Another step forward in California, another indication of strength which other contenders for the Democratic presidential nomination may find it hard to chip away.

From the outset of this campaign Stevenson has commanded a great deal of latent strength around the country. The only question has been whether he would suffer a series of primary defeats which would cause this delegate strength to take flight.

The fact is that since his surprise licking by Senator Kefauver in Minnesota, the former Illinois governor has not sustained such a defeat.

He is sure, with the exception of his write-up in Oregon, he has accomplished nothing startling at the polls. But he has avoided being hurt in a way which would cause his following among top party men to conclude that he doesn't have it in 1956.

Florida's primary fell into that general pattern. It was a narrow win over Kefauver—a mere 12,000 votes. But only candidates like Gov. Averell Harriman of New York would find much comfort in this modest showing. The fact is that Stevenson, who might seize every slight encouragement.

If, however, Stevenson follows with a triumph in California; the latent power he has in many key delegations will most likely begin to shift toward him. A quick rundown of potential votes in these groups indicates they could bring Stevenson within striking distance of the nomination.

Then only a determined coalition of his adversaries and the various "favorite son" candidates could conceivably block him.

Gov. Kefauver, who is the main candidate to be held to eliminate him in the technical sense.

With his Florida showing put on top of a loss to Gov. Robert Meyner's slate in New Jersey, Kefauver could hardly bring off a coup now even if he won a stunning victory in California.

The decisive stage is at hand for the Democrats, and Stevenson seems in the best position to gain from the events that still lie ahead.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON — With possible disappearance of the "Gavel," former chairman of the congressional campaign committee of the "Conservative Republican," as secretary of the interior, John Foster Dulles has now become the principal target of the Democratic opposition. The chief spokesman of the opposition is Rep. John E. McCormack, D-Mass., who says that Dulles may dominate the 1956 electioneering.

Any decision at Cannes on new fare arrangements will be up to the International Civil Aviation Organization, which the U.S. government may refuse to accept the outcome.

But Dulles holds out for the American position: an international rate may lead European countries to withdraw landing rights and other privileges.

Thus, within a few weeks, Dulles may have to decide whether to insist on lower rates important to those who fly on Pan American, with the result that rather than precipitate an aviation strike that will benefit the Russians, Moscow has shown signs that it intends to compete for a place in the sun quite frequently.

The commission has received a petition signed by 100 persons in the neighborhood and about 10 opposing it. However, Lyons H. Smith, in discussing the situation, said Jewel and Wagner had been doing all they could for the citizens, expanding traffic problems and also to provide a safe place for children walking to and from the "high school."

In continued discussion shortly before original programmers supported the original resolution to add a curb and sidewalk to the area, several installers of sidewalks said they would much prefer property from their front yards.

Before installing the sidewalk, the commissioners will either by dedication from the residents of the street or by condemnation.

Another discussion from residents of the area, 100 and 200 blocks on Van Buren street, protested installation of sidewalks only in front of the first four houses on the north side of the street, and had been requested by homeowners.

Concluding item of business was the appearance of James C. Reynolds who presented an architect's drawing of a mortuary he planned to build on property he purchased some years ago on Addison avenue east. He told the commission he had no objection to the zoning of the property outside the city limits with the intention of building a mortuary.

MIAMI, June 5—Former Cuban President Carlos Prio Socarras, deposed as a three-term president by a military junta here yesterday in a reversal of his policies and nature, has applied for asylum in the United States. The U.S. government said that Prio had "done nothing" to "warrant not to emerge in safety which may be profitless in the public interest" and "the violation of its laws." The government refused to allow Col. Rafael Trujillo, who had fled to the United States, to have his application for entry to the United States and to leave on or before June 5. He was released on May 20. Prio was arrested on May 20 and accused him of plotting against his administration.

He was placed under house arrest at the Miami International airport. A few days earlier, he had been released from the immigration office in Miami. An immigration official said that Prio's release was a threat to security of the United States.
