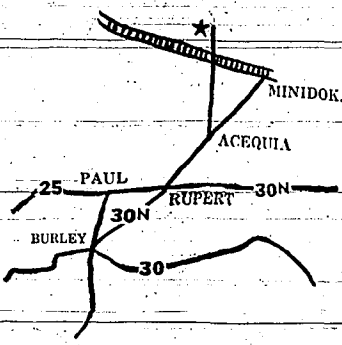

### Idaho Ranch for Youth Is Beginning to Grow on Desert Land North of Rupert

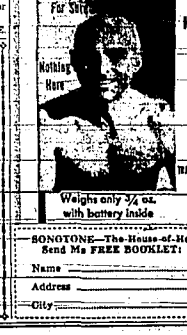

WASHINGTON, June 9 (AP)—President Roosevelt's illness could put a "muscle" into the campaign to elect a Democratic president—a man physically unequal to the demands of the job.

The 3 in the Jack Hat Vice President-elect, Mr. Hoover, surely will not succeed him if he failed to complete a second term.

Whether those issues could be hoped for by many Democrats is doubtful. There is no doubt, however, that any special difficulties, permanent or temporary, would serve during the presidential campaign to reinforce the impression that the president did not have a serious heart attack.

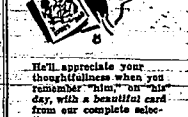

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

In this country the Magic Valley 50 or 75 years ago, the day-to-day life of the women who made settlements of the area possible has been accepted as the exception. And, when circumstances forced a woman into a field ordinarily dominated by men, she not only had the usual difficulties confronting man but also had to overcome the handicaps of her sex.

The characteristics that made the pioneer never were restricted to the masculine gender and, on occasion, women not only completed men's work but surpassed them in accomplishments.

Why Wilkins, horse queen of Idaho, on an equine footing, was a success of the hour? Her fame and never once lost her femininity. Miss Wilkins is a legend in the southern part of Idaho along the Nevada border. She was prominent in business circles in both the East and the West and is not only nationally prominent but, indeed, a local history.

Miss Wilkins' photograph shows a handsome rather than a beautiful woman. Her eyes are level, cool and clear. There is courage and confidence in her chin and the set of her mouth, corners of which turn ever slightly, indicating she was a fighter. With her smile, her nose was straight and finely chiseled.

Single home as an adult was what is known today as Murphy's hot springs, a room near the Nevada border about midway between Three

love. She had a magnetic personality, a head for business and an eye on the world.

Mrs. Hawes knew Kitty Wilkins when they lived on the Brunson desert country.

Three years ago—1953—the Brunson area with a small bunch of horses in the 1870's at the behest of John Turner, Mrs. Hawes' father. At the time, the Wilkins were running a hotel in Tuscarora, Nev. When the hotel burned in 1876 he moved his family to Idaho to enter seriously in the business of raising horses. The ranch was located at the hot springs which later was to bear Kitty's name.

The Wilkins' horses increased rapidly—winning the desert to the far distant Bureau mountains. They shipped thousands of horses bearing the diamond brand to markets all over the United States.

One of Kitty's brothers, Burt Wilkins, had a rodeo show and traveled most of the time. Miss Wilkins was going to a convent school. When she moved into the Brunson country, she brought with her the idea of the wild country had ever seen or heard.

There is a vast, triangular piece of land bordered on three sides by

deep canyons where many of the Wilkins' horses ranged. Even today that piece of land is called "the island" a contraction of Wilkins Island—she and her brother, John Wilkins, took over the operation of the ranch when their father died in 1904.

Today, little is changed in the vast area once ruled by the queen. Nature works in a slow, methodical way. The racing Jarbidge river still rushes through the canyon, the same cedar, cottonwood and juniper trees line the stream, the same planned rocks look down from their lofty perches along the canyon rims. The same dirt road that Kitty used still runs by the old ranch which, in fact, is the only thing that has changed. Instead of a ranch home, the site is a resort with a few cabins, a dancehall and a bar.

But down from the "island" still ride cowboys; down from the parched, sage-covered desert their

### Two Changes Of Blood Put Into Triplets

NEW YORK, June 9 (AP)—Prematurely born triplets were reported in this condition today after receiving two changes of their entire blood supply in a case believed to be unprecedented in medical history.

City health officials said the chance of just one of the triplets being born with this particular condition was one in 45 million. The chance for all was termed "astronomically small."

No Other Case Known

Dr. Peter Vogel, director of the blood bank at Mt. Sinai hospital, where the transfusions took place, said his knowledge of no similar transfusions involving triplets was limited to the present case.

Needed to Save Lives

If their blood had not been replaced, the antibodies would have caused blood cell destruction, leading to poisonous jaundice, usually fatal in premature infants.

"They received their first complete change of blood early yesterday, less than two hours after their birth. They received the second yesterday afternoon."

It is possible they will require other changes but their bodies quit producing rib-positive blood in the next few days.

## Injury May Delay Bout With Moore For Championship

NEW YORK, June 9 (AP)—A million-dollar heavyweight title bout in September between flashy Floyd Patterson and light heavyweight champion Archie Moore hinged today on a broken bone in Patterson's right hand. The fracture of the fourth metacarpal bone, the little bone back of the knuckle—may prevent the 21-year-old Brooklyn prodigy from swinging his precious mitts for a period of six weeks to three months. That could mean an outdoor extravaganza in Yankee stadium. There was hope, however, that the healing time may be quicker.

The bad news on the break struck Patterson in the 11th round of a fight with Tommy Jackson in a thrilling, no-nonsense 12-rounder Friday night and virtually sewed up his lucrative shot with Moore.

The news was hard to believe until you saw the split on the medical youngster's right hand. For it was in the 11th round that Floyd touched off a final attack of granite in an effort to stop his almost indomitable opponent. And he used both hands in firing a rapid volley of punches that had Jackson wobbling and almost ready to fall.

That was familiar to Patterson's dressing room and talk only of Moore in September when Floyd's former manager, commission physicians to examine his "hurt right wrist." He hadn't even mentioned the injury to Moore. He later learned that the doctor had hurt it in the 6th round but it didn't bother him much.

Tommy Alexander Schuff discovered the break. He said he moved the bone back in position, then placed the fourth finger in the hole.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 9 (AP)—A major problem facing the Western states and British Columbia is an inability to keep the wild deer population under check, game experts said Friday. Thomas L. Kimball, director of the Colorado game department, said that "one perennial problem is that of cropping surplus big game animals."

The speakers said that despite the lure of generous bag limits in heavily populated game areas, hunters seldom get enough game to keep the population within desired limits.

"There has been no state government," Kimball said, which has recognized a pyramid deer herd in time to remove his surplus animals and keep forage in balance with the deer population.

"Our annual kill is between 70,000 and 80,000 in Colorado but we are quite sure that is an insufficient harvest."

Levi L. Mohler, chief of Idaho's game management division, said the "most pressing problem in elk and deer hunting in recent years in Idaho has been that of getting adequate harvest."

"This is especially interesting in view of the fact that deer and elk hunting is for either sex. Idaho has never had a buck law. And the driving big game population and the excellent hunting, at least in the practicality and soundness of either-sex hunting."

MANCHESTER, England, June 9 (AP)—Althea Gibson, who may become Wimbledon's first Negro champion, defeated Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., Saturday 2-6, 6-4, 6-4, for the Northern England women's singles tennis title.

"It was the 10th title the 28-year-old New Yorker picked up—in 18 tournaments since she embarked on a three-continent tour early last fall. In Europe this spring she has triumphed in six tournaments."

## AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

"The Understanding of Love"

This week a local businessman told me of an experience which he and his wife had that so well illustrates the difference between others' con-

My friend's wife is a "flower of love." With much work and care each season she cultivates a garden of these beautiful flowers and awaits their coming to see at least 50 stalks of full colorful bloom. Just last week when her husband was at the peak of their beauty she looked out early one morning to see at least 50 stalks of the white flowers on the lawn below the flowerbed. Investigation showed them to have been deliberately cut out with a pair of garden clippers. It looked like a malicious act of wanton destruction.

Naturally she was angry. A number of comments were made about "those mean kids." However, a little further investigation revealed that their little 3-year-old grandson had been cutting the evening before.

In telling me about the experience, my friend said: "You should have seen the change that came over my wife when she found out that the children were cutting her flowers. She began to figure out ways of using the cut flowers, and being told about the destruction not being nearly so bad as she had thought it was."

How much of the friction of life would be eased if we could see the acts of others through the eyes of love, patiently understanding why others do the things that they do. Often we would see the seemingly arrogant person as a "righteous" and unobtrusive in public.

We would understand the tremendous insecurity that so often throbs people who are afraid to work with us. It is only when we catch a glimpse of the love of God for others that we are ready to view even their irritating actions with sympathy and helpful understanding.

Abraham Lincoln was being untraded by someone for his patience with one of his avowed and bitter enemies. His reply was: "We God has been patient with him for a long time, why shouldn't I be patient with him for a little while?"

Fortunately God sees our actions with both understanding and love and therefore is patient with us. So great is His love that our Lord Christ, as God the Son, endured the Cross to bring us His erring children to our senses, and to turn us from sin and waywardness. May He give us the grace to love and thus to love Him, and ourselves to see them as He sees them.

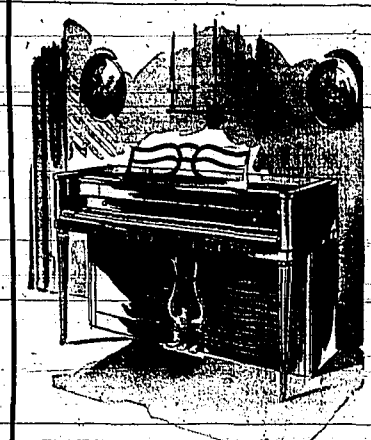
