The government announced firing squads executed 38 rebels in a swift court-martial, convened under martial law, not around the clock. The revolt—crushed in 12 hours by government air and ground forces—flared at 11 p.m. Saturday in Buenos Aires and three other major cities.

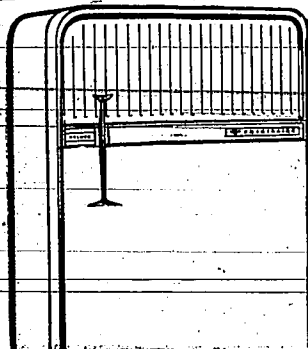

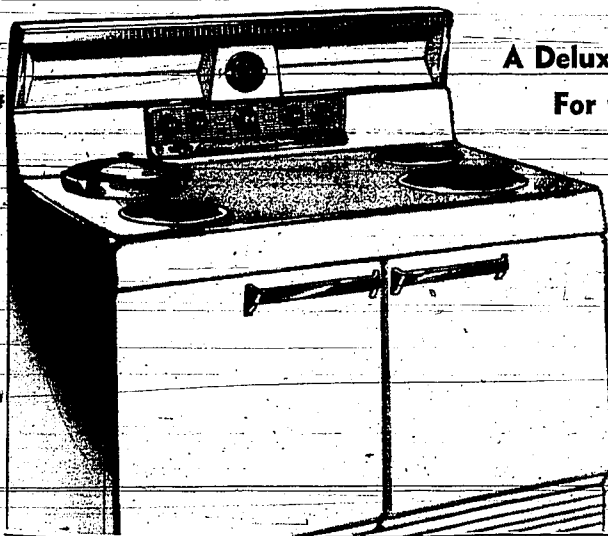

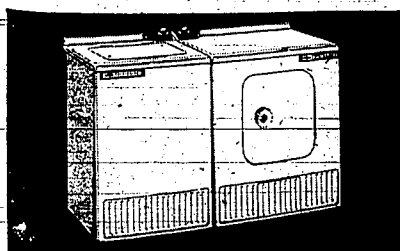

**CHAMELEON TACTICS**  
The chairman of the United Nations Command to throw out the "neutral" truce terms operating in South Korea was long overdue. They have been functioning as agents of communism rather than truce inspectors.

When the American, British, French, Chinese, and Polish representatives were formed the first two assigned to study truce enforcement in North Korea, the latter pair in South Korea.

Almost from the beginning the Chinese Reds have been trying to determine the degree of Communist compliance with the truce terms. They were unable to make on-the-spot checks to see whether any new military buildup was taking place in violation of the agreement.

Continuing reports against the U. N. Command as authentic filtered in to the effect that Red violations were continuous and numerous.

Across the line in South Korea, the Czech and Polish representatives freely used their "inspection" privileges for espionage and subversion. The command charges them with being "flagrantly" un-neutral.

Judged practically, what the Chinese have done is to empty the truce period—July-1953, and to leave merely an interval between phases of a war rather than a postwar prelude to real peace in the area.

One gets the feeling that the Reds might decide to move south again, if and when they believed the military balance was sufficiently favorable to them and political conditions in South Korea were conveniently unstable.

The truce has meant an end to shooting war, and that is of tremendous importance. But it has not spelled the end of uncertainty, for the Communists feast on uncertainty.

In their callous corruption, the Communists are "for" their own strategic purposes, they have revealed as fresh as their respect no agreement except as it suits them.

The normal devices of international accord and association are for the Reds mere elements to be warped to fit a plan of conquest that changes but never dies.

**WHAT'S TITO'S MOTIVE?**  
While Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia gets the Kremlin's newly patented warm welcome in Moscow, we in America must look on with growing skepticism.

Tito has not spoken the final word on his present relations with Russia, but his initial responses suggest he is leaning strongly toward a renewal of wholehearted friendship.

Should he, for practical purposes, join the Soviet camp it would be poor news for the West. Since his break with Russia in mid-1948 he has made military links with two NATO countries, Greece and Turkey. He has established close ties with other Western nations. And he has gained a billion dollars in economic and military aid from the United States.

It is quite possible, of course, that Tito may not reverse himself so completely. It is possible, too, that he may seem to do so but that the appearance may be deceiving.

No one in the West believes a "new" Russia has replaced the old, that the goal of world conquest has been abandoned. For hard-bitten Tito, a realist if there ever was one, to believe Soviet blandishments is almost incredible.

Certainly he could not have been fooled by the stage-managed resignation of Foreign Minister Molotov timed for the eve of his Moscow arrival. Molotov, one of the architects of the Soviet-Yugoslav break, has not been in charge of Kremlin policy for a year.

(It would ill behoove us in the West to read the Molotov move any more encouragingly than Tito must. This is clearly another maneuver in a long series designed to sell the world on the "break with Stalinism.")

Some suggest that Tito may well believe that he is acting from strength, that he is now so fixed economically and militarily that he can deal with the Kremlin on his own terms. He may be gambling, in other words, that he can move closer to Russia without being grabbed up as just another satellite.

**STARS AND MUD**  
President Sukarno of Indonesia says the world is suffering from "technological indigestion."

"Sometimes feel as though man has reached for the stars and smeared his hand with primordial mud," he declared in his speech before the Washington National Press Club.

"We have penicillin and the wonders of bacteriological warfare. We have rocket-powered bombing aircraft—and ox-drawn plows. We have atom bombs—and half the world sits by flicking of oil lamps. We have television and soap opera."

Indonesia's father of his 11-year-old country may have been talking primarily about the Asian countries now struggling to make good their new-found freedom and proudness. They are "in a hurry" at Sukarno's best that western culture has to be rejected. But they want to go back to the value of money?

**WHERE THEY TALK THE MOST**  
Uncle Sam picks up some money each year by taking a "cut" on the business of pay phones in federal buildings. This year he estimates that his commissions will run to \$24,000.

What is particularly interesting is that \$107,000 of that sum will be received in Washington, and \$239,000 in the rest of the country. As only about 10 per cent of Uncle Sam's employees live and work in the Washington area, apparently those who do make about the time as many phone calls as those outside Washington.

The significance? Nothing much, except new backing for the American belief in the windy city code. Washington talk a lot more than people anywhere else—Minneapolis Journal.

**INVESTIGATION NEEDED**  
An insurance agency in Chicago has charged that huge burglaries in the Windy City could be attributed to police apathy toward investigative work. He added that police work on some crimes of this nature had been so lax that insurance companies had to hire city policemen to work on cases on their docks off. That's one way of creating interest in investigation—Xenia-Kent-Cleveland Daily Dealer.

**TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG**  
WASHINGTON—Continued and scientific studies of the possibilities of atomic power will be conducted by the Atomic Energy Commission, which has members of the joint commission on atomic energy now investigating the problem. The study:

(1) That nuclear power will be a negligible source of industrial energy for at least 20 years, and that the principal reason for development is to provide a source of power for the military. For reasons of safety, rather than economy, we cannot afford to permit development of nuclear power in the hands of the public. It is essential that development be kept in the hands of the military, where it can be controlled.

(2) That conventional fossil fuels, and especially coal, will be our principal source of energy for hundreds of years. Next in order over the long-term period will be hydroelectricity, natural gas, nuclear power, and oil.

**WATER POWER AS ISSUE WILL VANISH—(3)**  
That the water power question, which has figured so prominently in politics for the last quarter of a century, will disappear as a major issue in the near future. Where projects are government-financed or cheap money and no taxes, coal and lignite are becoming the principal sources of power. That other nations will probably develop an atomic-powered industry and economy before the United States, but only if they have no or few natural resources. And they can do so only with engineering and management far ahead of ours.

In short, for an indefinitely long period, American activity in the field of atomic energy will consist of foreign projects rather than by domestic, bread-and-butter economy. We shall transform the bomb into a blessing under a program of "atomic enlightenment."

**PRESIDENTIAL PANEL CHAIRMAN'S OPINION**

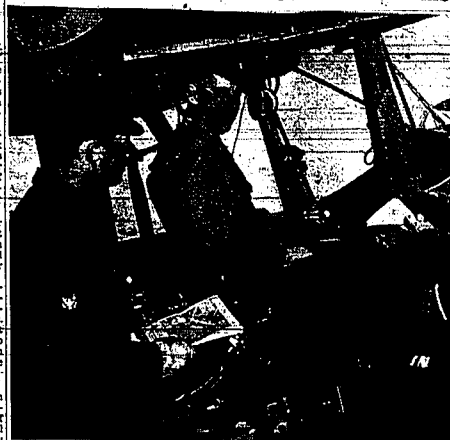



# **Soviet Actors Get Good Pay; Movie Production Speeds up**

MOSCOW, June 11 (AP)—A top movie star in the Soviet Union can earn about 200,000 rubles a year and nearly 90 per cent of it is taken home (AP).

At the government-pegged rate of four rubles to the dollar that is \$50,000.

That may not be enough to start a stampede from Hollywood but it is still several pegs above the average Soviet worker's annual take of 9,000 rubles.

Things are looking up generally in the Soviet Union's post-Stalin movie industry. New studios are going up, production has doubled, and an industry leader reports, production censorship has been removed.

Ivan Alexandrovich Pivov, director of Mosfilm, the Soviet Union's oldest and biggest studio, told reporters recently his studio has scheduled 22 full length films for 1956 and hopes to raise the target to 30 in 1957. Mosfilm produced eight pictures in 1955, 12 in 1954 and 18 in 1953.

Pivov said pay at Mosfilm ranges from 1,500 to 6,000 rubles a month. In addition actors earn 200 to 1,000 rubles for each day of shooting. He said some actors turn out two or three movies a year, during which time they may work as much as 150 days.

Mosfilm employs 350 actors among a total staff of 3,500. The studio covers 60 acres of the choicest land in Moscow, in the Lenin hills where the University of Moscow and the Russian Academy of Sciences are located.

The 30-year-old studio is in the middle of an expansion program. It has been operating out of one lot, measuring 4,000 square yards, but next month studio two, 3,000 square yards in area, will be added and a third studio, measuring another 3,000 yards, will be added in 1957.

Other big Soviet movie studios are located in Leningrad, Kiev and Gorky. Eight of the Soviet republics have studios of their own producing full length films. Several feature films will be released soon.

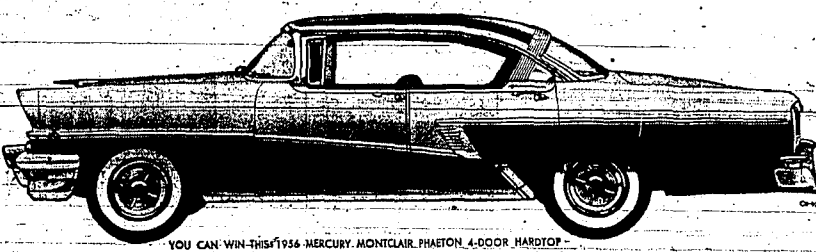

# McSpaden Warns Against Dangers Of Golf Gambling

ROCHESTER, N. Y., June 11 (U.P.)—Sounding a warning against gambling in golf, Harold (Dug) McSpaden, one of the leading tournament players, said today that because of its nature the game "could be one of the crooked sports in the world. Understand, I'm not saying it is crooked," McSpaden pointed out, "it is a spotless sport, but we have to make certain that we keep the gamblers out of it."

One way, he insists, is to tip off the officials, who occasionally have caught scoundrels. "With the huge payouts at stake, who is to tell who a gambler gets to somebody," McSpaden explained. "It's almost impossible to tell if a man misses a shot deliberately or not. All he has to do is spray a shot into the rough or over the top of the green and down goes the favorite."

McSpaden emphasized over and over again that he was dealing only in possibilities. "Everybody gambles in golf, with the women playing the big dollar Nassau," he said. "That's part of the fun of playing."

McSpaden, who cut up most of the money lost with Byron Nelson in the 1944-45 era in which they were known as the "gold dust twins," said he had the same handicap when they lay the same open to chasers and gamblers who sometimes try to go to professional level.

Chasing on handicaps in connection with golf is no secret. Larry-minors, amateurs, establish handicaps from the back to on long, tough courses. "They have a rough edge when they meet an amateur," he said, "with the same handicap who has posted his handicap on a short, easy course."

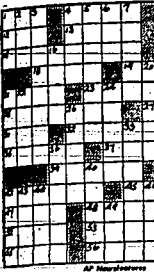

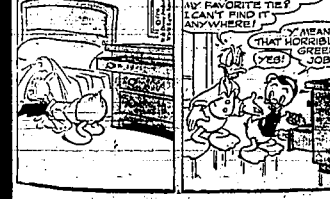

## Reformed Fat Man Offers New Book to Help Others Reduce

NEW YORK, June 11 (AP)—There are at least 25 million overweight Americans, and Leonard Louis Levinson has just written a book dedicated to them all.

His dedication reads:

"To the thin person, inside every fat person, fighting to get out."

For most of his life Levinson, now 52, never counted his calories and preferred to take them rather than leave them alone.

He was a highly successful writer of film scripts, stage acts and radio shows.

Then he was commissioned to write "The Brown Derby Cook" to celebrate the sophisticated cuisine of the Hollywood restaurant.

"In preparing that book," he recalled, "I tasted about 1,500 dishes they had in a card file as well as all those they had in the menu. For example, they had 23 different ways of preparing lamb kidneys—imagine that—take a half pound of butter or a pint of rich cream and

"Well," said Levinson, "I found 300 ways to prepare a hybrid egg—a different way for every day of the year."

The book, "The Complete Book of Low Cholesterol Cooking," but won't put on weight.

"The single most important thing a dieter should learn is moderation—how he can eat almost anything," he said.

Levinson was a great brown mustache when he started the project, resembled a walrus in other ways when it was finished. He was round, wiry and fully packed. His doctor told him he had to reduce at least 15 pounds.

"I thought it would be easy," said Levinson, "but it took me a full year. I had become too used to stuffing myself with rich food."
