Expert Advises Heating Spuds To 40 Degrees Before Sorting

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, June 16—One of the easiest ways a grower can increase the quantity of saleable potatoes is to warm them up to 40 degrees in the storage bin before doing any handling or sorting, according to Walter C. Sparks, associate horticulturist with the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station.

"Cold tubers injure easily," Sparks explains.

In a report to the Idaho Shippers' association, Sparks emphasized that the time they are handled is one of the most important factors in causing or preventing injuries. This fact has been brought out in potato injury studies at the Aberdeen, Oregon station.

During the past marketing season, Sparks reported, tubers graded and handled at 45 degrees had 4.2 per cent culls when examined at the retail market in Dallas, Tex. The horticulturist pointed out that large volumes of Idaho potatoes are graded and shipped each year out of cellars this cold or colder.

As temperature of the potatoes increased the percentage of culls declined. Those handled at 40 degrees had a 2 per cent culls while those warmed to 45 degrees before sorting had but 2.5 per cent.

Warming up the potatoes sufficiently to reduce these injuries, Sparks reports, a week or more before taking the potatoes out of storage, by ventilators placed closed and the cooling fans turned off, is important heat from the tubers will be sufficient to warm them up to at least 40 degrees.

Importance of temperature in potato warehouses at grading time is one of the results of an extensive study by the Idaho agricultural experiment station on all phases of the potato injury problem. Sparks has followed injury problems through every harvesting, storing, grading, shipping and marketing operation.

Early phases of the project were in cooperation with the Idaho advertising commission.

Church Chief Gives Advice In MIA Meet

BOISE, June 16 (AP)—Members of the Young Men's Christian Association here met Sunday to discuss the annual MIA general conference which is being held in Salt Lake City.

The conference will conclude with general sessions Sunday. Opening sessions yesterday included a general session at which Church President David O. McKay urged youth to stand adamant against false ideas that would undermine the faith and tested ideals and truths of the pioneers.

Theodore Loos, president of the MBA, and 27 other officers and members of the union, were suspended yesterday and 150 others faced suspension or dismissal—for their part in the strike Thursday. McLernon said the announcement of the decision to seek an injunction was "delayed" until after midnight pending service of the "show cause" order on the MBA.

LA PAZ, Bolivia, June 16 (U.P.)—A pre-election revolt plotted in Bolivia's government tonight against security measures throughout the country today. Opposition forces called for a two-month delay in Sunday's vote.

Deployed patrols of armed peasants and miners throughout the La Paz area on the lookout for possible trouble, and informed sources said the government would pay no attention to demands that the election be put off.

Tension reached a high pitch last night as 15 opposition members fled to Ayllon in various foreign embassies here in the wake of the revolt charges.

Among eight who entered the Guatemalan embassy was Eduardo Escobar Roca, a leader of the Republican Socialist Union (URS) accused by the government of having a hand in the alleged plot.

Interior Minister Federico Porton brought the plot issue to a head when he charged the opposition planned to stage a rebellion today for Sunday to prevent national elections from going off as scheduled.

Planned Long Time
"We have ample details that subversive plans were made a long time ago," he said.

Earlier, the government published claims by two high officers in the defense ministry that Escobar had plotted with certain members of the Argentine government to topple Bolivia's present regime.

Argentine Ambassador D. Jorge Macalano Ponce denied the charges.

Meanwhile Oscar Uruaga de la Vera, leader of the Socialist Falcons which has pulled all the candidates out of the race, appealed for a two-month postponement of balloting.

Survey Shows West Need for Ascorbic Acid
UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, June 16—Westerners of all ages should eat more foods that are rich in ascorbic acid.

These include citrus fruits, tomatoes, green and leafy vegetables and potatoes. Girls and women in the West should use more milk and milk products.

These suggestions come from a study of 1,117 seven-day diet records collected in the seven western states. This extensive study of human eating habits has been carried on by the various state agricultural experiment stations in cooperation with the U. S. department of agriculture and the U. S. public health service.

First findings from this cooperative project, dealing with nutrient intake, have just been published as a western region research bulletin. In it the data are presented by age and sex groups.

The representative on the technical committee at the start of the project in 1947 was Kathleen P. Warwick. Later she was replaced by Shirley V. Brigg of the department of home economics research.

The new publication reporting on the cooperative nutritional studies in the western region is Bulletin 383 and the title is "Nutrient Intake." Copies may be secured by writing the mailing room, college of agriculture, University of Idaho.

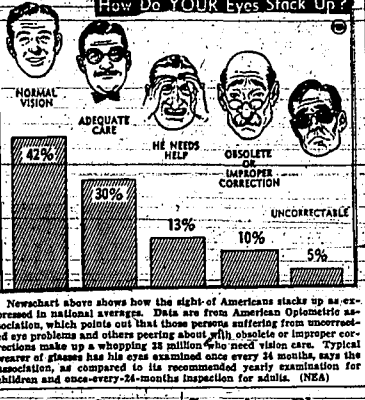

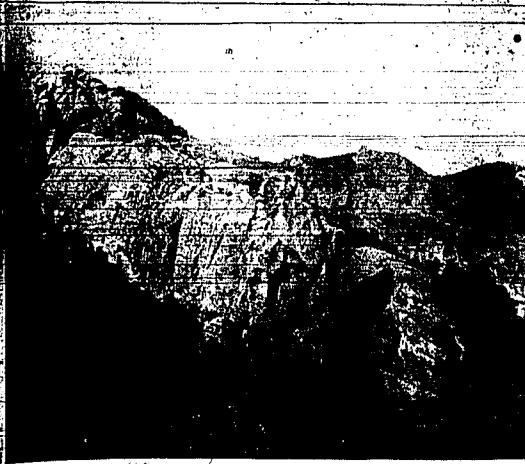

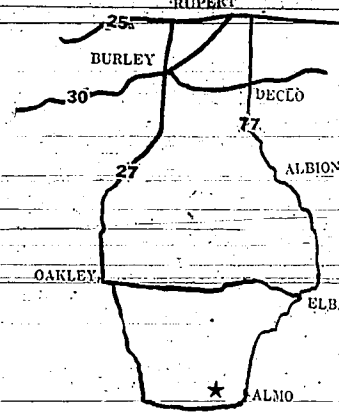

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Pat Gaver, GANNETT, has a collection of Idaho motor vehicle license plates with a few missing and is looking for another collector who also has missing plates that do not correspond to the ones he's missing. In other words, he's looking for a swap.

Idaho started to issue license plates in 1913 but Hattie had the jump on the state by three years. In 1910 Hattie began to issue licenses as if she had a collection owned by A. W. Ensign, HALLIE. The license plates in 1910 and 1911 were blue with white numerals. In 1910 only nine were sold.

Patatoes have appeared four times on Idaho license plates, "Beech-Tidie" twice and "Vacation Wonder-land" once—in 1947. That year the figure of a skier was stamped on the license.

Down through the years the name "Idaho" has been altered to "Idaho" twice. While black has been the predominant color, white, orange, yellow, blue, brown, red, green and silver also have been used.

In the war years of 1943 and 1944 the state did not issue metal plates but sold paper decals to paste onto windshields. In 1945 motorists had to turn in metal plates before they could get the 1946 issue. Metal was in short supply in those years.
