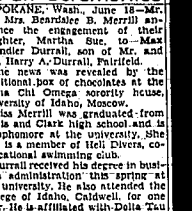

# WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—A billion-dollar, bipartisan water power deal branded as "regulative blackmail and the Chicago plan" is brewing behind the scenes of the Democratic national committee.

Under pressure from Democratic National Chairman Paul H. Butler, who has frequently castigated the Rayburn-Johnson leadership for its failure to make a late-session effort to force a policy of government ownership of water power operations on the White House. Otherwise, they threaten to defeat general power bills wanted by the administration and numerous other Republicans.

The Butler-Chapman-Truman bill will affect the entire hydroelectric industry. The outcome concerns the lawyers, for it means either a bond issue or a tax increase, or huge expenditure of federal funds on projects which private companies are willing to undertake at their own expense.

But the measure also faces a grim test of its "partnership" concept. It involves public power projects reaching him as a result of this maneuvering, which will secure him of favoring the so-called "power trust."

## THE FARM OUTLOOK

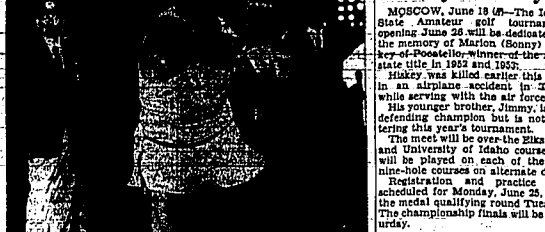

### FBI Seeking Informant of H-Bomb Miss

HONOLULU, June 18 (AP)—The federal bureau of investigation today is seeking an informant who disclosed that the air-dropped hydrogen bomb missed its target, Honolulu, Advertiser disclosed today.

The advertiser said the informant is "imprudent to find the job on Eniwetok and plug it. No matter what advice he belongs to the FBI was not a very good idea."

Intelligence authorities are "far more concerned with the fact that the informant was not a very good idea."

The FBI's only comment on the story was: "We are interested in any possible security violations involving the atomic energy act, which we are obligated to enforce."

According to the advertiser, the FBI knows that the person or persons they suspect responsible for the leak stays at a small Waikiki hotel on a regular rest and recreation trip through last week.

The advertiser said whether the suspect or suspects remained in Honolulu, or returned to Eniwetok, is not known. The advertiser is interested in learning whether the informant was drunk when he told the mysterious person that the H-bomb exploded seven miles away from the target on May 31 (May 29 in the advertiser's account).

Air Secretary Donald A. Quarles said the H-bomb was not intended to miss its target by just under four miles. The atomic energy commission denied that the explosion blinded anyone.

Also confirmed as yet was the tipster's story that some leak force person had been seen at the Honolulu airport on May 31. The advertiser said that they are living in "perpetual fear" at Honolulu, as published reports of the H-bomb explosion are being repeated as saying: "We are apprehensive on the day of the test naturally, because scientists can make a mistake in as little as 30 days of the year. It is a lot less nerve-racking than being stationed in a lot of other places."

### Kefauver Takes Step to Kiss, Make up With Democratic foe

WASHINGTON, June 18 (AP)—Sen. Estes Kefauver has taken steps to "kiss and make up" with Adlai E. Stevenson. Stevenson promptly replied that he was "much pleased."

Kefauver insisted that his move had no political implications. He said he still is fighting "to win" the Democratic presidential nomination over Stevenson and other hopefuls and that his "personal" position is that he would not accept the vice-presidential nomination if Stevenson were elected. But Kefauver said his first move yesterday in apologizing for his personal attacks on Stevenson during their recent presidential primary battle was to call for a national television program that "I got mad and lost my head and lost my sense of character" in criticizing Stevenson.

He said that if Stevenson should win the Democratic nomination again, he would campaign for him. Stevenson, in a telegram to Kefauver from his Libertyville, Ill., home, praised the senator for helping immeasurably to restore unity to our party and strength to our common cause. He said he was "much pleased" by Kefauver's statement.

Although Kefauver refused to count himself out of the presidential race, many Democrats think his chances suffered a near-mortal blow with his Florida and California losses. There has been speculation that he might accept the number two spot on a presidential ticket headed by Stevenson.

Sen. Kefauver threw all of his delegates straight to Stevenson and his lead, Stevenson would have nearly enough convention votes to force a presidential nomination on the first ballot.

Asked yesterday if he would throw his support to Hartman if he could not get the presidential nomination himself, Kefauver said: "If I can't win, I will make my recommendations as to whom I think should be elected."

### Texas Torero Wins Bravos, Facing Prison

EL ESORIAL, Spain, June 18 (AP)—A Texas bullfighter under a 2½-year jail sentence for using words that "insulted" the Spanish nation drew cheers from a crowd yesterday.

Harry Whitney, Austin, Tex., a former torero, leaped and then killed a big bull that was as tall as he was.

His work in the ring was so skillful that a crowd of 2,000 cheered him and awarded him the trophy of a "san-approved" performance—the ears of the bull.

Whitney, nearly six months, was sentenced to six years in jail on charges of "insulting the Spanish nation." The charges were made after the Texas used "harsh words" in an early morning argument on a Madrid street corner. That the words were not disclosed.

Whitney has appealed the sentence to the supreme court, and most foreigners in Madrid believed the U. S. government would help him get out of Spain if the appeal fails. Whitney does not want to leave Spain but is cramming in as many bullfights as possible in case he must.

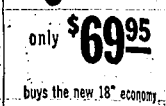
