

Pajama Party Set for 5,000 Girl Scouters

ROCHELAND, Mich., June 19 (AP)—The largest, noisiest pajama party in history will take place in this tiny town of some 300 persons. This pajama party is going to be a 19-day affair. It is part of the first large-scale roundup in the history of the Girl Scouts.

Five thousand teen-agers, their faces scrubbed, their hair twisted in a spiral pin curls, will crawl beneath mosquito netting and go to sleep in sleeping bags. The organizers speculate that the girls will sleep 40 miles away in Detroit.

The girls, all between the ages of 14 and 18, and their 1,000 leaders and camp aides will take over a highland recreation area in a two-way landing operation starting June 20.

They're coming from Hawaii, Alaska, Brazil, Great Britain, Norway, Denmark, Canada, Colombia, and the 48 states. Special "Girl Scout only" trains will pick them up at train stations across the country.

At Detroit, chartered buses will meet at the station and take them to the camp site.

Roundup staffer Mrs. Jon Griffiths promised the girls will give the week "a lot of fun, a lot of new experiences carved a homelike niche out of the wilderness."

Internal Disorders Plague Neutralist Leaders in Southern Asia Countries

Internal disorders ranging from riotous demonstrations to small-scale wars are plaguing South Asia's neutralist leaders. India, Indonesia, Burma, and Ceylon all are affected.

In India, up by the Tibetan border, Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru's army is fighting primitive Naga hill tribesmen who demand an independent state. More than 200 persons have been killed in recent months in demonstrations in big Indian cities against Nehru's plan to reorganize the country's system of states.

In Indonesia, rebel control parts of Java, the main island, Sumatra, and the Moluccas and Celebes island groups.

In Burma the government has been trying unsuccessfully for eight years to suppress organized rebels who are operating within a few miles of Rangoon, the capital.

In Ceylon, 12 persons were reported killed last week in riots called to protest Premier Solomon Bandaranaike's plan to make Sinhalese the country's sole official language.

The disturbances all stem from World War II and the surge of nationalism which brought independence to the four countries concerned. Ironically, some of them at least represent resentment by large sections of the people against "colonialism" by the same neutralist leaders who denounce colonialism by the western powers.

Nehru's Naga hillmen, for instance, want a state of their own. The hillmen are a backward people and speak their language, and they go out on head-hunting expeditions. Nehru put the hillmen under the Assam state government, which tried to ban head-hunting and drinking. A rebellion resulted. Nehru

15 Million Acres in Reserve Is Goal for Soils Bank Plans

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—The agriculture department hopes to get farmers to set between 8.5 of the goal of 20 million to 25 million acres in reserve of the soil bank this year.

For doing so and thereby reducing production of basic crops, the government will pay farmers \$1 to \$3 an acre. The money will come from the 12 billion dollar soil bank funds.

For 1956, the reductions may be accomplished by underplanting by loss through natural destruction, or by plowing or cutting the crop before a deadline established by the department.

A department official said these are the hopes for acreage reduction for this year: 4.4 million Corn, two million to four million acres; wheat, five million to eight million acres; cotton, 1.5 million to three million acres; peanuts, 50,000 to 100,000 acres; rice, 50,000 to 100,000 acres.

Tobacco: fire-cured, 10,000 to 20,000 acres; burley, 15,000 to 30,000 acres; Maryland, 5,000 to 8,000 acres; dark air-cured, 3,000 to 5,000 acres; fire-cured, 4,000 to 7,000 acres; Virginia sun-cured, 500 to 1,000 acres; clear binder type, 51-3,500 to 4,200 acres; type 52-1,500 to 2,500 acres; type 51-500 to 1,000 acres; Oplo cigar filler—300 to 500 not large.

The acreage reductions fall short of the goal of 20 million to 25 million acres for cotton, wheat, corn and rice which Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson outlined to the house committee on agriculture on Feb. 21. Benson told the committee the soil bank should be leased with three million to five million acres of cotton; 12 million to 15 million acres of wheat; four million to six million acres of corn; and 400,000 acres of rice.

The department said the soil bank now is getting under way throughout the country as a part of the national farm program. It pointed out that "even if farmers have already planted 1956 crops, they can make adjustments and earn soil bank payments this year."

Acreage reserve agreements must be signed by the farmer not later than July 20, the department reminded.

A department official said average soil bank payments will be under \$50 an acre. The lowest rate is an acre-wise set for winter wheat planted in 1955 for harvest in 1956 which the farmer certifies was underplanted because of adverse weather. The highest payment is \$166 an acre was for clear-binder tobacco, type 51. The total average for this type of tobacco is \$100 an acre.

CHICAGO, June 19 (AP)—The nation's furniture makers today unveiled their new creations for the coming year at the huge summer furniture show in the city's Loop area, which opened its 11-day show.

Officials of the show said they expected a record number of buyers to show up for the first time with a resultant heavy flow of orders.

"Consumers have been spending at a rate never before equaled in the 12 months of the year," said a furniture mart general manager.

William E. York said there is no reason why the extra billions predicted in consumer income by the U. S. chamber of commerce "should not be spent on home furnishings."

Prices are expected to remain generally unchanged with slight increases in prices for higher steel and labor costs not being absorbed, he said.

England Ends 1956 Series of A-Bomb Tests

SPRINT, Australia, June 19 (AP)—Britain successfully exploded an atomic device in the Monte Bello Islands today. The blast ended the current series of nuclear tests. An official announcement said scientific records were being collected for an evaluation of the explosion and safety precautions were in operation. The first explosion of the current series was set off May 18. Observers at the time regarded it as a trigger for the first hydrogen bomb Britain planned to test next year.

Parley Sought
But last Thursday Prime Minister Anthony Eden announced his government was willing to discuss with other powers a general limitation or abandonment of test explosions. His statement coincided with publication of a British medical research council report. It warned that strontium, the radioactive poison released in nuclear explosions, could cause ill effects in the rate of flaring increases.

Holds Other Series
Britain has had two other series of atomic weapons tests. The first was held in 1952 in the Monte Bello Islands and the second in 1953—45 "Woomers" southern Australia. If the H-bomb test goes off it would be held off Christmas Island in the Pacific.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19 (AP)—Adm. Grove D. Murray, 66, who commanded the aircraft carrier USS Enterprise the day Pearl Harbor was attacked, died last night. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage six days ago.

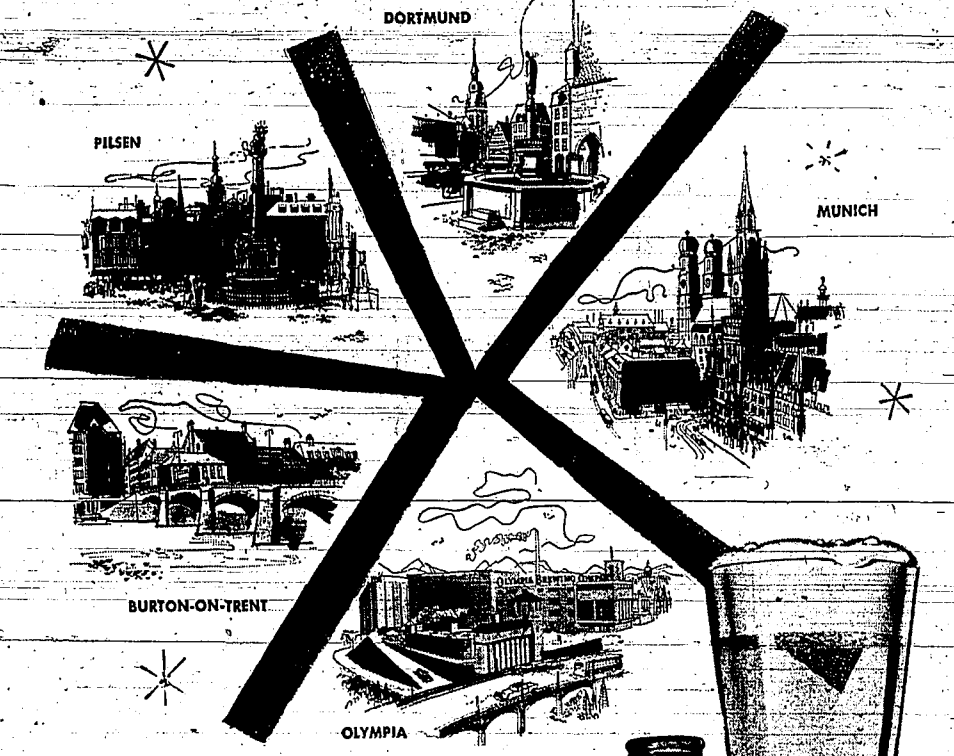
