4 WHEATS IN ATLANTIC OCEAN

Flaming Super-Airliner Plunges Like Meteor in Ocean; 3 Bodies Found



NEW YORK, June 20 (AP)—A Venezuelan super-airliner burst into flame nearly two miles high early today and hurtled downward like a giant meteor into the Atlantic ocean, killing 74 persons. It was the world's worst disaster in regular airline service. Ships reaching the site, some 32 miles east of Ansbury Park, N. Y., radiated hours later that three bodies or parts of bodies had been recovered in sharp-inflated waters there. The rescuer on the scene had reported: "Found no survivors. Except to find none." One American family of four was among the 26 Americans aboard. The pilot of a coast guard plane—sent out to try to guide the stricken four-engine Super Constellation back to New York's Idlewild airport after it reported engine trouble—said later of the falling airliner:

"It was a frightening sight. It was a big ball of flame. It all happened very fast."

Mid-September Date for Delivery Is Set By Firm for Natural Gas in Gem Area

Intermountain Gas company said Wednesday it hopes to begin supplying natural gas in 23 southern Idaho communities by mid-September.

The firm said it has secured a franchise for delivery in Idaho early in August.

Pacific Northwest Pipeline corporation says it will have the gas ready for delivery in Idaho early in August.

Pacific Northwest has milled contracts to co-operative distributing agencies in 12 communities in which it has been granted franchises. The terms are similar to those of its contract with Intermountain.

Perry Swisher, Pocatello, president of the Idaho Natural Gas Co-operative association, says this cleared the final hurdle in building the local pipeline. He says construction will start very soon.

Intermountain says its final hurdle was cleared when it reached an agreement with Idaho Natural Gas company by which Idaho Natural Gas dropped its court fight for an area-wide franchise. Intermountain says it will have pipe on the ground early in July and start construction immediately thereafter.

State's Official Will Testify in Water Dispute

FRANCISCO, June 20 (AP)—Akin, chairman of the Arizona Interstate stream commission, will take the stand today to fill a background by which Arizona has part its claim to 2,000,000 acre-feet of Colorado river water.

The second witness for Arizona was expected to give a geographical description of the lower Colorado basin area and to describe dams on the river.

In addition, Davis and Parker, who were expected to testify on the Salt and Gila rivers.

Hearing Ordered

Akin testified in a suit brought in California. The U.S. supreme court ordered Special Master Simon H. Rifkin to hold a hearing to recommend a verdict. The high court will give the final decision.

Arizona's chief witness, Russell C. Akin, testified yesterday. He used the 19th century and the Spanish Caudilleros to assert Arizona's historical claim to Colorado river water. Ewing testified that Arizona water from the Gila river, a tributary of the Colorado, as early as 1947.

Documents Cited—Under cross-examination by California counsel, Norman Ewing said his information came from written documents left by the Spaniards and from reports of U.S. army units who were sent to the Arizona territory in the last century to protect settlers from Indian attacks.

Earlier yesterday, Rifkin said he will not see any need to be in St. Louis on another case. John Moore, chief counsel for Arizona, said he doubted he will be there near completion of his job by then, so far Arizona has produced more than 300 documents.

College of Idaho Offers Korea Aid

The College of Idaho at Caldwell has offered to donate three scholarships to Korean students covering room, board, tuition and books, reports Harold Gribble, Snake River Boy Scout council executive. The scholarships are worth about \$1,000 each, he added.

Only two steps remain before the funds would be available. An application for the Korean boys is at hand, he said.

"Each student must have an American sponsor who will provide the boy with about \$500 per year for incidental expenses," Gribble explained. "Obtaining consent of the Korean parents and making travel arrangements, also, will be necessary."

Indian Future

Worries U.S.; Could Be Left

NEW DELHI, India, June 20 (AP)—When Western diplomats in New Delhi the question they most frequently ask one another is whether India will go communist.

Nobody knows the answer. But U. S. Ambassador John Sherman Cooper holds that the whole of southeast Asia will be safe for democracy if India can win economic battle by practicing democracy. If she fails, he thinks there may be no barrier to communism in all southeast Asia.

Prime Minister Nehru sets out tomorrow on a month's tour of Europe, the Middle East and the United States. Cooper, who advocates a bigger and longer-range plan of economic aid to India to help her win her economic battles, already is in the United States to prepare the way for Nehru's talks with President Eisenhower.

Nehru is pushing forward a socialist economy as rapidly as possible. He aligns himself diplomatically with the Soviet bloc with regularity. But, despite many Westerners, India appears to be moving steadily to the right. It will change as rapidly as it will stop. Yet, the keynotes of Indian ideology remain democratic.

Cherry said the library may be used for several purposes, including establishing a new business, expanding product manufacturing, expanding the market for a line of products, establishing area sales quotas, contacting foreign outlets or suppliers, technical information on manufactured processing, licensing, to use government-owned investment—obtaining details on government regulations affecting a particular business.
