WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—It's up to the Democrats whether a long-delayed vote by the house interior committee on the controversial Hells canyon dam legislation comes off as scheduled tomorrow. So said Republican members when asked about the possibility of another GOP stay-away. Republican members stayed away from a committee meeting last Thursday—a year after their subcommittee had approved the bill. Their absence prevented a quorum and made a vote impossible.

Republicans said in interviews that they will vote on the bill tomorrow, numerically and with the help of one Republican, damn though they intend to vote to authorize a federal dam in the Snake river in Idaho and Oregon. They pointed out that advocates of the bill claim support from 15 members—enough to constitute the necessary quorum.

The vote was called off last week because only 14 committee members—12 Democrats and two Republicans—were present when Chairman Carl Albert, D. Calif., banged his gavel. The Republican was Representative Eugene McCarthy, D. Cal., who objected to the vote on grounds of a quorum. McCarthy and Representative Chesebrough, R. Colo., only committee Republican to announce support for the bill, were absent last week but they will be present.

Police in the Chicago area has shifted from horse racing and dining room-to many factories.

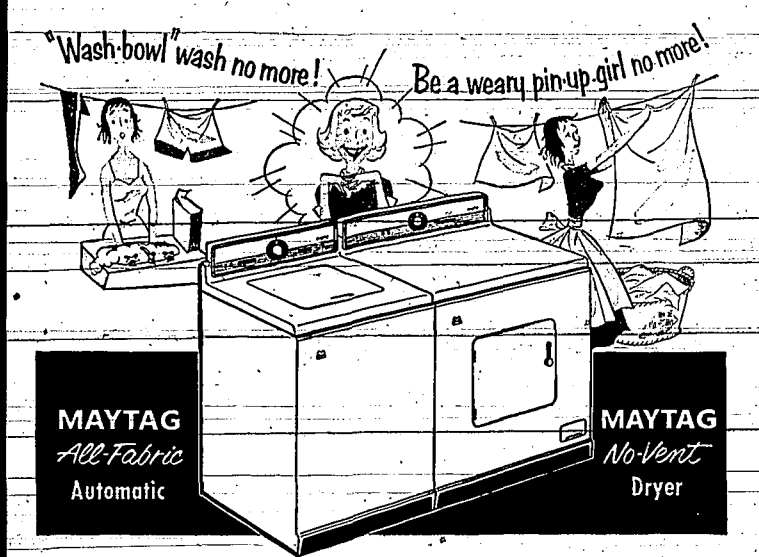

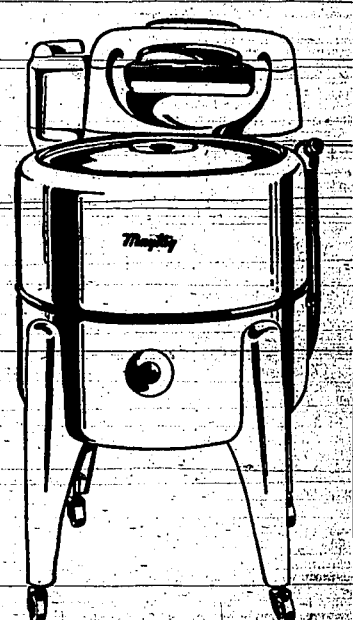

WASHINGTON—Chief Justice Earl Warren may be the only one who has not been a member of the federal judiciary against engaging in embarrassing, non-judicial and semi-political activities. A majority of the court, however, has been a member of the association, hope that he will do so.

Senator Kefauver, Stevenson's most vigorous springtime adversary, says he's still in the fight, that he doesn't want the vice-presidential bid that he won't "trade delegates around like a pack of whist" in a contest of this kind. New York's Governor Harriman or anybody else.

You would be hard pressed, however, to find a politician or political expert—aside from loyal die-hards—who seriously give Kefauver any chance now of his remarks show, however, he did not actually close the door on taking the vice presidential nomination, and that he might try to influence his supporters to get behind another man if he decides he can't win himself.

At this point few can see the signs of such substance if it exists. No clear evidence of strength without the aid of the media or a shrewd eye. He has about 90 of New York's 98 votes, and a smattering in the West.

And talk of a Harriman-Kefauver combine to block Stevenson must be discounted. There is no indication that together they would have enough strength to make a difference.

Forgotten that delegates once freed from allegiance to one candidate do not necessarily follow his recommendations on second choice. They hunt for the winner.

They will get much of all these claims and counterclaims, these hints of alliances and deals, before the talk stage ends and we begin to see the crucial maneuvers which really will tip the scales at Chicago.

### Unusual Factor in Blood May Tell American Indian Origins

NEW YORK, June 25 (AP)—In the blood of Japanese, Chinese, and American Indians, scientists are finding an identical substance or factor which may provide the long-lacking positive proof that the original inhabitants of the Americas were Mongolians from Asia.

"To the untrained mind it is incredible that science could prove such a thing in such a way. But the facts are shaping up, hard and fast, and here are the facts:

"Two years ago scientists carrying this unique blood 'factor' from the blood of persons of 'mixed' white and Indian descent in South America. Since it was unique among blood substances, it was given a name—'the Diego factor.'

"Since many millions of samples of white and Negro blood have been tested without this factor ever having been reported, it seemed likely that it was peculiar to Indians. But other scientists report systematic studies of Caucasian blood.

"In the United States, 3,000 whites were tested in The Netherlands, 200 Dutchmen; in Spain, 150 Spaniards. Also there were 200 individual samples of Italian blood. But once did the Diego factor turn up.

"Meanwhile, Miguel Layrisse and Zulio Aranda, Venezuelan scientists were following the original clue—leading Indians. In 10 Caribbean islands through the Caribbean Sea, in 1934 Aranda and Layrisse were present in eight Brazilian scientists found it in high percentages in Parva and Guahibo Indians.

"The Layrisse-Aranda team had a hunch: They took blood samples from 100 pure Chinese and 150 Japanese living in Caracas. Five per cent of the Chinese and 12.5 per cent of the Japanese carried the factor.

"At about the same time, Marston Lewis, Hiroko Aoyama, and Bruce Chown, blood scientists at Winnipeg, Canada, and Philip Levine, geneticist at the national convention in Hartman, N. J., had the same idea.
