Controversial Book on Ike's White House Tenure Published

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—The background of a book on how he obtained his presidential source material, Robert "Eisenhower's Story," was published today.

The book includes these excerpts:

"The greatest single influence on Eisenhower in deciding to accept a second term after his heart attack was the argument by his political advisers that he could work most effectively for world peace from the White House, not from retirement."

"Twelve associates discussed the matter with him at a secret White House meeting last Jan. 12.

Eisenhower "was not convinced that the vital interests of the United States would be best served by pro-

posed non-recognition" of Red China.

"The President's vacation with the "powerful right wing" of his party reached such extremes in the summer of 1954 that for a time he considered the idea of a new political party."

Eisenhower told a March 9, 1956 cabinet meeting that the supreme court's decision holding racial segregation in public schools unconstitutional "necessitates a different pattern of life in the South. He said it would take time for people there to unroot old traditions and live by the new 'right' ideas."

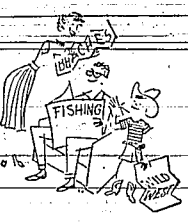

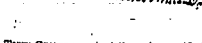

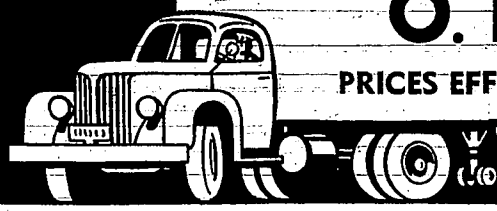

HAGERSTOWN, Md., June 23 (AP)—A bold, new plan to find out if teaching by television in public schools is feasible will be launched in a Maryland area next fall.

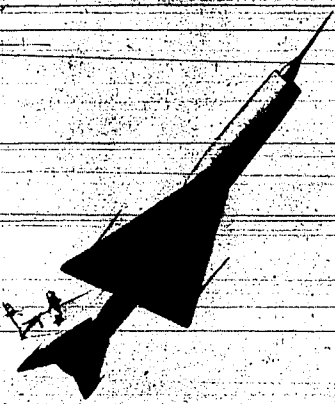

Costs of Motoring and Trucking Will Be Hiked to Pay for Highway System

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—If you need a new set of tires for your automobile, you can save about \$2.00 in taxes by buying them before midnight Saturday.

On Sunday the federal government will step higher taxes on tires, gasoline, diesel fuel, trucks, buses and truck-trailers.

The increased taxes are included in a bill which President Eisenhower is certain to sign into law this week. The bill will put into effect the biggest construction program in history to modernize the nation's highways. The higher taxes on motorists and truckers are to help pay for it.

The house and senate completed congressional action on the measure Tuesday. Here is how the new taxes will affect motorists and truckers:

Tires
The federal tax will jump from five to eight cents a pound. This means a tax increase of 74 cents a tire on the "tubeless" type which now popular make passenger cars now come equipped. Thus, it will cost \$3.70 more in taxes to produce a new automobile with a spare tire.

Trucks, Buses and Truck-Trailers
The federal government will collect from manufacturers a tax equal to 10 per cent of their sale price. Instead of the present eight per cent. The only way to escape the levy is to buy before midnight Saturday. Tax collectors in dealers' and distributor's hands on Sunday will be subjected to the tax.

Weight Tax on Trucks
Starting Sunday, operators of trucks weighing 12 tons or more will have to pay a new tax of \$1.50 per 1,000 pounds on the gross weight of their trucks. This amounts to \$30 for a 12-ton truck.

Tread Rubber
Manufacturers of camberlock, or rubber used in re-treading tires, will be subjected to a new annual tax of three cents a pound. During the next 12 months the new taxes are expected to raise \$12 million in revenue.

Diesel Fuel
The tax jumps from two cents to three cents a gallon. Some service stations may use lower gasoline prices immediately. Gasoline delivered to service stations by midnight Saturday will be exempt. It will be up to each service station operator to decide when to hike his prices. Some big stations in cities can store only a two or three day supply. Others can hold a week's supply. Some rural stations with little business need only bi-monthly deliveries.

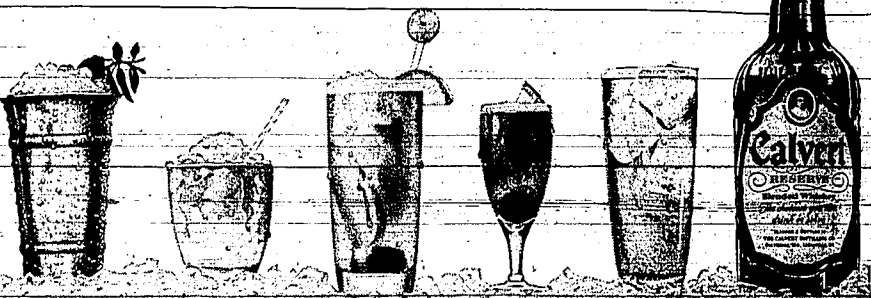

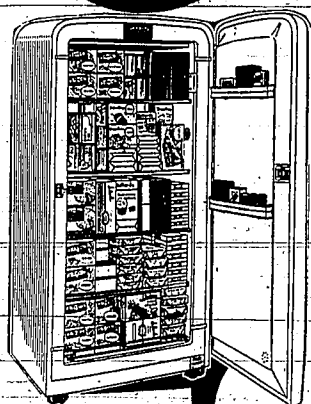

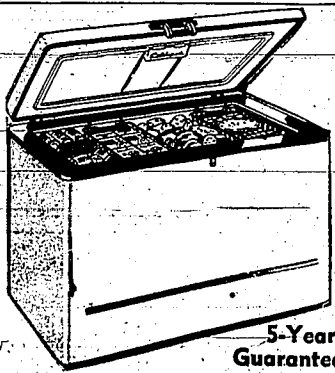

Super Gas Is Readied by 2 Major Firms

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—Two top executives served up new "super gas" to automobile owners in a news conference this month and said: "It's your pleasure, sir."

The super fuel is expected to be more common from coast to coast by late next month. The "trickster" in the higher cost is that it may change the price of a 12 billion dollar a year industry.

The oil company of New Jersey with service stations in 18 states has passed millions of dollars on the theory that the average car owner wants a fuel that is just what his car needs.

The oil company, which started out as an experiment in February, is now testing this week in the field.

"But it is still just an experiment," said a spokesman for the company in Philadelphia.

"We are not making any claims for it and we are not revealing any secrets. We are not trying to promote it as a new product. Our future action will be determined by the results of the tests we are going to decide this week and set the trend for the future."

The traditional policy of selling only one grade of gasoline by using a "tailor made" for each car only now provides five different grades of gasoline from a single pump at each of 250 service stations in Florida. The top grade is more than 100 octane and "seller" for five cents above the cost of regular.

The brand name for Standard Oil of New Jersey's products, under the name "Golden Esso Extra," is being sold in New York, Washington, Memphis, Baltimore, Boston and New York.

The price of the super gas is three cents higher than regular gasoline and six cents higher than regular.

"The super gas was better than expected," the company spokesman said. "It figured out five per cent of the cars on the road should use the super gas to get top engine performance and the best possible mileage."

One will provide for "desirable future developments," one for "absolutely indispensable additions" and the third for operation "without addition of new programs or expansion of facilities."

University of Idaho Idaho State colleges and other institutions will be required to estimate the number of students or inmates they will have for the next 10 years.

The department of highways will submit its proposed program of construction for the next five years, and this program will be printed as part of the budget for use by the legislature.

"It is obvious from an analysis of operations," Young said, "that some institutions have been underestimating local and endowment income, which operates as a drain on appropriated money. It is requested that these estimates be accurate."

The department budget must be submitted to the budget director's office by Aug. 15, under a stepped-up schedule adopted by the 1955 legislature. They will be gone over by a budget committee, also operating for the first time, and the governor's budget will be printed Nov. 30 for consideration by the public.

Mysterious Nightmare Death Kills Healthy Men in Nippon

TOKYO, June 23 (AP)—A mysterious physician has reported the deaths of 200 young men in Tokyo from an unknown ailment similar to the fatal "nightmare" disease in Mississippi. It was disclosed today by Dr. Saburo Yoshimura of the Tokyo Metropolitan Health bureau.

At a meeting of doctors last week he said 60 persons died in 1954, another 50 in 1955 and 80 so far this year from the mysterious illness.

He said autopsies have given no clue to the illness because other than "relaxed" state of the heart there was heavy accumulation of blood in the heart, no other abnormal complications could be seen.

Acute symptoms similar to a person dying from a heart attack were not found, he said.

Dr. Yoshimura said a feature of the illness was that the victims, mostly were healthy men between 20 and 30 years old who were in high spirits up to the time they went to bed and died.

He said the deaths occurred mostly between 3 and 9 a.m. Grains of the victims' awakes others but they died within 20 minutes.

Dr. Yoshimura cited the case of a 27-year-old shoemaker who worked late one night and then went to bed at midnight. At 2 a.m. he started groaning and his mother rushed to his side. She woke him up but he continued to groan and then died.

A high school teacher, 34 years old and apparently in perfect health, went to bed at midnight after working on school papers. He began moaning at 2 a.m. His wife rushed to call a doctor but her husband was

BOISE, June 23 (AP)—Calvin Wright, district director of internal revenue, reminded Idaho farmers Wednesday that they need no longer pay social security tax on their "hand-to-hand" sales.
