TITO AND "NEW LOOK"

Marshall Tito of Yugoslavia is a gambler and he is gambling now that he can renew friendship with the Soviet Union without being crushed in the embrace.

Eight years ago he took the risk that he could defy the big heads of Stalin and still keep both his head and his country's independence. He pulled it off successfully, with no little help from the United States.

The situation regarding Yugoslavia changed because the present Kremlin leaders allowed their tactics. But this development can only be understood if we put it against the broad backdrop of the "new look" in Russia.

When Soviet leaders went to Belgrade and spoke by apologizing to Tito, they knew they would thus be encouraging the anti-Communist nations and elsewhere. Why did they take a step that on its face would seem to weaken the solidarity of the Communist empire and international communism generally?

The fundamental answer would seem to be that this move exactly suited the post-Stalin strategy of the Kremlin. The purpose is to suggest everywhere that the new regime is benign, that it has no aims of conquest, that it is a Communist rather than a Communist state. This development can only be understood if we put it against the broad backdrop of the "new look" in Russia.

The coming with Tito, the highly trumpeted Soviet of the Happiness Twins, Bulganin and Khrushchev, the invitations to diplomats and seven military leaders (the General Twining) all over the world—all these help him out in the Kremlin's trying to paint a picture of Russia.

But we must be on guard more than ever. No convincing evidence exists that the Soviet Union has in fact abandoned its policy of conquest. It is still a Communist state, and its actions are still dictated by its Communist economic and political goals which can be hidden under the masks of friendship and cooperation.

Even if we knew the Kremlin's intention to allow the allies a high measure of independence, full autonomy would be warranted. But we have no proof that much more than the appearance of independence will in fact be permitted the satellites.

Moscow's means of political control are many and diverse. Knowing the Kremlin as we do, we must have a strong skepticism and assume they will already apply as many of these means as they can without publicly giving away their game.

The big Moscow welcome for Tito was a part of the window dressing for the "new look." We must not be fooled by it, and we must hope that Tito isn't either. For the Kremlin bears "love pats" can pound the breath right out of a country.

IT'S UP TO CONGRESS

In the defense and foreign aid fields, the Eisenhower administration is having difficulty this year in selling its programs to Congress.

On foreign aid, the lawmakers have not been convinced so far that the government needs all the money President Eisenhower asks. On defense, it's the other way around: Congress doubts that the administration has sought enough money to do a proper job.

Senate Democrats felt that the 15.9 billion dollars the President requested for the year was easily one billion short of adequacy. Republicans acknowledge the strength of this position by strongly indicating their intent to go at least half way toward that figure.

What pushed the legislators in this direction was the senate testimony of high ranking military officers that Russia has outstriped the United States in the production of nuclear-bomb-carrying intercontinental aircraft.

One expects the military to try to make a strong case for the funds it seeks. Normally, however, the administration civilian authorities take a fairly healthy attitude toward the request.

This pattern was followed this year. But there has been one important difference. Led by Senator Symington, Missouri Democrat, this senate this time took its own special look at the defense posture.

Hence the unusual testimony of top officers, and the lawmakers' decision to boost air force funds.

In this situation the administration perhaps could have prevented a budget hike only by speaking out and convincingly the reasons why it did not wish to go to the military. This it evidently did not do.

On top of that failure, Secretary of Defense Wilson inflamed both Republican and Democratic senators with his comment that efforts to increase the air force budget were "phony." Later details and other maneuvers to get off the hook did not help.

Indeed, Mr. Eisenhower himself conceded the weakness of the administration's position by notifying COLE leaders in the senate they were prepared to go along with the 200 million dollar increase in air force appropriations.

Mr. Eisenhower believes Russia's game today is largely economic and political, and that thus we should devote more of our substance to fighting on these fronts. By its actions to pay congress, that defense needs more stress than ever.

Whoever is right in this most vital argument, it is clear that in early summer, 1956, congress is the upper hand. It will not be the administration that is most likely to be translated into the law of the land.

Jurors Favor Defendants in Lawsuit Here

The jury in the \$66,758.28 damage suit brought by Mr. and Mrs. Don Dannebauer, against the Sport Shop and its owner, Harry Dannenhauer, returned its verdict in favor of the Sport Shop late Thursday.

The verdict was returned at 4:30 p.m. after the jury deliberated for one and one-half hours. The action was based on a fall by Tate at the Sport Shop.

During the trial the complaint against Dannebauer and the Sport Shop was amended. WASHINGTON, June 29 (AP)—The public health service said yesterday that 189 new cases of polio were reported in the country last week, 97 fewer than in the same week last year.

So far this year, there have been 2,309 cases. That compares with 2,723 cases during the same period of 1955.

Although the total number of cases is running sharply under a year ago, the paralysis rate is only about slightly.

So far, there have been 1,566 paralytic cases this year compared to 1,537 for the same period last year. Last week there were 93 paralytic cases as opposed to 103 in the same week of 1955.

The U. S. census bureau predicts that 1955's 11,000,000 live in the United States of five million people.

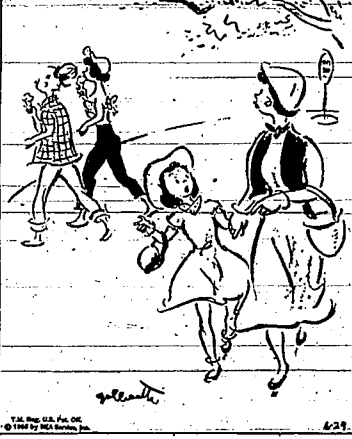

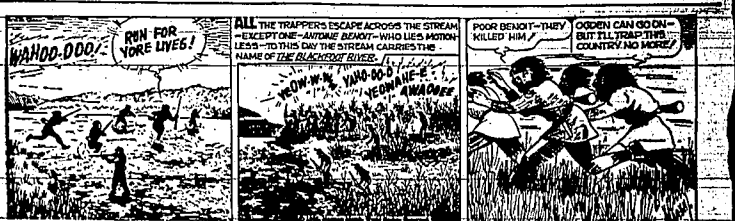
