The wreckage was identified as that of a TWA Constellation en route from Los Angeles to Kansas City. No sign of survivors was reported. Still missing and presumed to have crashed was a United Air Lines DC-7 with 131 passengers and a crew of 10.

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One-Time Boom Town Is Quiet Village Now



Once a roaring boomtown of 2,000 miners and caterers to the miners, Jarbidge nowadays can hardly be called over-populated as the lack of life in the photo above indicates. Magic Valley Tours Jarbidge Has Roaring Past of Mining Town, Little Present, Few Prospects

"Some think Jarbidge is ugly from tolling.
"And mutter, 'She's barren and grey.'
"Why her beauty is so warm it's like boiling.
"In its picturesque, western way."

Thus wrote an "old timer," John A. Taylor, who knew, lived and worked in the gold mines of the now-quiet little ghost town just south of the Idaho line in Nevada. Perhaps ghost town is not an accurate description of the community which in the valley of the river from which its name stems. Actually, while the gold mines mostly stayed out except for an occasional "glory hole," and some places "mining" prospectors today use the place as a headquarters. Although not a beehive of activity—except when deer season brings a flock of California hunters and July 4 when these same hunters return to provide a free fish fry for all comers—Jarbidge frequently sees dozens of new prospectors. Unlike their predecessors who used a mule and a goldpan, the current crop uses jeeps and gas tanks and carries rock radioactive ores, tungsten and others.

Dave Bourne, hailing from Brunau valley, discovered gold in his North Star mine in Jarbidge, known at that time as the middle fork of the Brunau, and things began to hum. In a matter of days, a tent city had sprung up as other prospectors rushed in to make their fortunes.

In 1910, Clark and Fischer erected a small mill to handle the ore from the Bourne mine. As supplies, even a sawmill and apple trees, were brought in by packhorse and mule by "W. W. Walsh," "Walter Davidson," the late Alex. Urdahl, and other freighters, a graded road was started over the mountainside. The road, known as the Crispin grade, ascended in a perilous route from Murphy's hot springs—at that time, the headquarters for Kitty Wilkena, the "Idaho home queen"—climbed the mountainside and descended at Jack creek in Nevada, a distance of 14 miles. The road is a fantastic piece of construction.

It is plainly visible and sometimes used by jeeps. Main street runs directly through town. There is one additional side street, about one block long, in a side canyon known as Bear creek.

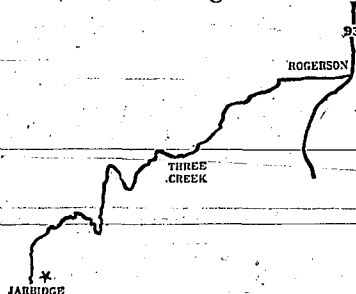
It is worth the visitor's time to visit the old community hall with the canvas backdrops and read the advertisements of the business establishments during the boom.

A stroll down the street brings the visitor to the antique fire wagon, consisting of a 40-gallon metal tank fastened between two large wagon wheels.

Although Jarbidge is in Elko county, Nevada, the town's main contact is with Twin Falls since the road is passable the entire year. The star main route makes two trips weekly from the Idaho city, delivering and collecting mail and shopping for the town's residents.

The business district includes a postoffice, two saloons, three small

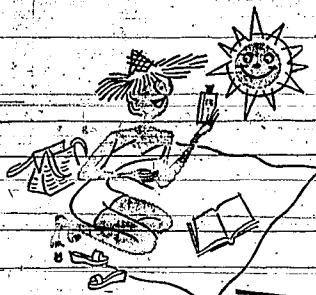

"The Holy Bible"

By M. E. WALDRUM
Pastor, Church of Christ

Many and futile have been the efforts to discredit the Bible and it still stands as the world's greatest book. The fact that it has stood against such attacks, criticisms, etc., is a most interesting one. On the other hand individual, move-ments, and churches try to claim the honor of preserving the Bible. Actually, no individual, single movement, or church can make such a claim. It has survived through many centuries, and as a result of great effort on the part of many.

Well over one billion copies of Bibles have been printed. Something like 80,000 Bibles have been sold daily.

The Bible, in its original form, has been printed into more than 1,100 languages and dialects. Since the book's beginning, the Bible has always headed the list by a wide margin; so that now its leadership is taken for granted, and it is not troubled along with other books that cannot be compared with even the greatest books that men have written.

to certain localities, sections, nations or races. But the Bible has a universal appeal, its popularity is limited neither to any national group nor any special racial group. Its message is to all nations, every creature alike. This is also true in meeting the needs of all nations and peoples. It will "thoroughly furnish the man of God unto every good work."

Why do some misunderstand the Bible? Many would be glad to believe that God has sent Him (John 17:21). One of the greatest hindrances to Bible knowledge and world unity today is division among those who profess to believe the Bible. Too many are ready to "explain away" the meaning in order to promote some personal view, or doctrinal doctrine.

Another reason is to fail to divide the scripture properly (1 Tim. 2:15). One cannot expect to divide properly and understand the Bible without first studying it. Then at least four things must be considered: who wrote it, when written, to whom written, and what written about. By perverting or "scrapping" the scriptures one can prove almost anything he wants to. But by properly dividing them will the proper and only right answer be given.

The authority of the scriptures is easily seen by those who are fair in their studies. The Bible is complete in religious matters, and is the only true textbook on salvation. It is imperative that we recognize the authority and comply with its teachings. This is necessary not only to have unity among all the believers, but to make sure we have the right and only way to heaven. Bible authority must be respected.

How can we account for such authority and comply with its teachings? It was written over a period of some 2,000 years, about 1,500 B.C. to around 100 A.D. Some 40 different writers had part in writing it, yet all agreed in revealing Jesus Christ, the Son of God. There is one answer: "Holy men of God spoke, as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." 2 Pet. 1:21.

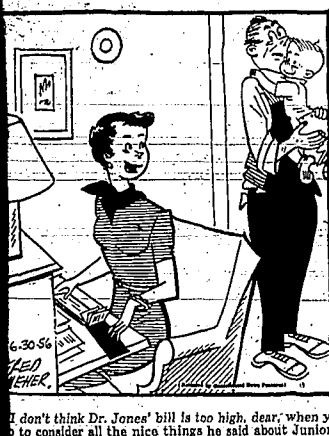

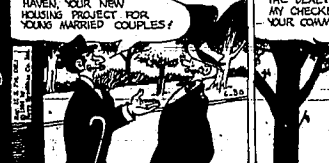

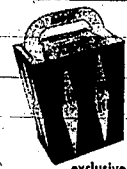
