### Health of Ike Not Top Issue, Truman Avers

**NEW YORK, July 3**—President Truman today said the health of President Eisenhower has been "a part-time President" since he took office and that his health is "a legitimate political game."

But Mr. Truman said the President's health is "not a matter that should be the campaign at all."

Mr. Truman said his comments were made in a letter to the editor of the New York Times after a six-week tour of Europe.

To Name Choice

"He said he would announce his own choice for the Democratic presidential candidate 'when I arrive at the White House,'" he added.

"Whoever he is," Mr. Eisenhower said, "I don't think any man can be a part-time President and be a success. The charge against a President, he said, 'is an issue that preceded any health condition entirely. It started right at the beginning.'"

Refer to Golf

Truman also referred to the President's golf playing.

"Yes, I think that's right," Mr. Truman replied.

Mr. Truman said that to put Mr. Eisenhower's health into the campaign is "not proper."

Does He

"I don't like to talk about it when the President announces he is on the road to recovery," he said.

Truman said that he would like to see the present occupant of the White House and "I don't want to make any statements that might make any difference in the way he runs the country."

### Benson Sets Wheat Support at \$2 Bushel Under Parity Rules

**WASHINGTON, July 3**—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson today set the wheat support level under the flexible price support law and locked up the government support price of 1957-crop wheat to \$2 a bushel.

Under the current parity price of wheat, this support rate reflects 125 percent of parity. The same rate is being paid on 1956-crop wheat.

Benson announced the 1957 support rate yesterday, well in advance of the July 20 referendum in which wheat farmers in 36 congressional wheat states will vote whether to accept marketing quotas on next year's crop.

If the producers accept quotas, the available support level government will support 1957 wheat at \$2 a bushel. If they disapprove quotas, the available support level will be 50 percent of parity, or about \$1.21 a bushel.

On the supply situation, Benson could have set the 1957 support rate at 77 percent of parity. This would be about \$1.65 a bushel. This was about the same figure at which he ordered the 1956 crop supported before President Eisenhower overruled him in this presidential election year and raised the rate to 82 percent of parity.

"I am glad that the factors affecting the wheat situation make it possible to hold price supports at higher levels than the minimum indicated by the legislative provisions," Benson said. "It has been possible to increase wheat exports, through aggressive use of the special authorization programs, opens the way for very substantial production adjustments in the years immediately ahead. We have turned the corner and expect to start making steady reductions in the huge wheat surplus."

In computing the total supply for 1957-58, Benson estimated 1957 wheat production at 656 million bushels. He said this reflected July effective bank operation for that year. The actual total supply for the 1957-58 marketing year is 1,668,000,000 bushels. This includes an estimated carry-over of 293 million bushels, next July 1-and his figure of 668 million bushels for 1957 production, plus imports of five million bushels.

The actual supply situation would be 128-percent-of-normal-and would justify price supports at 77 percent of parity. But the law says Benson can set the support level any place between 90 percent and 75 percent. He chose the halfway mark.

### Tranquilizer Use of Drugs Hit by Expert

NEW YORK, July 3 (AP)—The ever-increasing "tranquilizing" of Americans with drugs, which has been causing considerable concern among medical scientists, has, at least, drawn an official condemnation from the American Psychiatric Association.

"I took notice of this apparently widespread use of the (tranquilizing) drugs by the public for the relief of common anxiety, emotional upsets, nervousness and the routine tensions of everyday living."

"This, it said, is a medically unsound and constitutes a public danger. It then took cognizance of the fact that physicians have been used to promote the drugs to other physicians. It said, it should not allow themselves to become involved in public relations enterprise directed toward the promotion of use of 'successful' use of particular products."

"The practice is operating 'to foster public misunderstanding and misuse of the drugs. It is a violation of the ethical standards among pharmaceutical houses to refine, promote and sell their own products. This is combined with the eagerness of the public, and of physicians themselves, for 'good news' about a new treatment for psychiatric disorders."

Dr. Franklin C. Staughton, professor of clinical psychiatry at the University of Colorado, told in a national journal in the current issue of the technical journal, "The use of tranquilizers by psychiatrists object to the use of drugs for the relief of ordinary anxieties and tensions. They are actually prevent the disturbed individual from seeking definite psychiatric help early in his illness," he said.

### Stassen Notes Reds May OK Open Sky Bid

DALLAS, Tex., July 3 (AP)—President Eisenhower's peace secretary, Harold E. Stassen, said last night that air force Gen. Nathan Twining's bid to Moscow was a good sign that Russia may eventually accept the President's "open skies" proposal.

Stassen, special assistant to President Eisenhower on disarmament, added that 1000 military club delegates from the United States and Canada. "The key club is a Kiwanis-sponsored high school boys' service organization."

"Do not let the critics of the 'open skies' get you down," the former Minnesota governor told the delegates. He cited Twining's visit to Russia and the summit conference at which the "open skies" plan was proposed as the beginning of possible acceptance of the plan by Russia.

"Never minimize the danger, but never give up hope that from a strong position we may gain lasting peace," he said.

At a news conference earlier yesterday, Stassen said he had no comment on his availability in the event of a draft from the Republican national nominating convention.

### Man Can Live With Peaceful Nuclear Radiation, but Not in Times of War

WASHINGTON, July 3 (AP)—Dr. William D. Coolidge said today that man can live with peaceful nuclear radiation, but not in times of war.

"The radiation from atomic explosions that covers the greatest area—700,000 square miles—has a half-life of 15 years. It is in the form of heat, light, and radioactive fallout which would require thousands of explosions. CAVALIER, N. D., July 3 (AP)—Gov. Averell Harriman came to a predominantly Republican county of North Dakota yesterday to deliver another blistering personal attack on President Eisenhower for what he called the "Eisenhower farm doctrine."

Harriman has been touring the farm-belt in search for delegates in his effort to win the Democratic presidential nomination scattered by the New Yorker's catered "moar" of his fire on the President.

Eisenhower has run out on his promises to the farmers, Harriman said. "Eisenhower has surrendered to, and his policies are dominated by, his business."

This criticism, made to a shrill audience in the park at Cavalier, drew frequent but scolding bursts of applause. As he has done everywhere, Harriman said the "agriculture" should be considered a national asset, not a national disaster. "The audience applauded this observation very strongly."

### Treaty Rights Are Asked by Tribe's Letter

PT. HALL, July 3 (AP)—Indians of the Shoshone-Bannock tribes here have sent a strongly worded plea to federal authorities in Washington asking them to honor treaty rights.

The letter to Commissioner of Indian Affairs Glenn L. Emmons was made public here. It asks "that the rights and privileges granted us be fulfilled, that we may thereby live in perpetuity as a tribe or nation of American Indians."

"We are an 'aggrieved' people," the letter says. "The disappointments and injustices extended us through the violation of the spirit and terms of our treaties with the United States government has brought endless humiliation, misery and despair to our people."

The letter asks these things:

1. Exemption from all taxes.
2. A halt to the policy of permitting sale of Indian lands to non-Indians.
3. Restoration of three-quarters of a million acres of land ceded to the government.
4. Protection against trespass on the half-million acre Ft. Hall reservation.

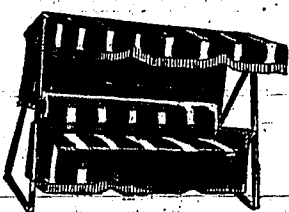

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### Boost for Vet Benefits OK'd By Committee

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP)—A general 10 per cent boost in payments to veterans for service-connected disabilities, with uniform approval authority for the house veterans affairs committee.

Chairman Charles D. Tamm, describing the bill as "moderate," said the Democratic leadership of the house favors such a measure during the present session of congress. But because of the lateness of the session, no chances in the senate were viewed as imminent.

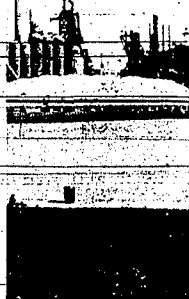
It would add an estimated 175 million dollars the next year to disability compensation payments to which now run about \$1,200,000,000 annually. Tamm said the cost is expected to be somewhat smaller in future years.

All but about 20,000 of the 2,084,230 veterans now receiving service-connected disability payments would get increases.

The bill provides a flat increase of 10 per cent in present payments ranging from \$1 a month for 10 per cent disability to \$13 a month for 90 per cent disability. Those getting 50 per cent disability would get a boost from \$181 to \$225, about 24 per cent.

### Water Official Of Israel Pays Visit to Region

BOISE, July 4 (AP)—Mark Holzman, supervisor of water rights and water authority for the Israeli government, arrived here yesterday to complete a study of water law and administration.

He planned to confer with Mark Kulp, state reclamation engineer, and visit projects in the Boise valley before leaving later in the week for Arizona and New Mexico.

Holzman is on a three-month tour of the western states, sponsored by the state department, to gather information that can be put to use in Israel.

The Jewish state is still in the process of establishing a system of water rights and laws, he said, and there is something to be learned in southern Idaho where the economy is roughly similar to that of Israel.

"I want to talk to the people around here who have lived 50 or 60 years in the business," he told a reporter.

Holzman already has visited the Minidoka pumpkin project in southeastern Idaho and farm areas along the Boise and Salmon rivers.

He said he was paying particular attention to Idaho's system of leasing its underground water supplies.

The once-by Rainier waved to his cheering subjects with princely aplomb as he handed his princess up the stone steps of St. Charles church to attend a July 4 mass.

VATICAN CITY, July 4 (AP)—Pope Pius XII shook hands with Polish exiles today and imparted his blessing on them "at this time of sorrow and oppression for your dear fatherland."

The pope stopped to talk with 200 Polish priests and laymen during a general audience in St. Peter's Basilica. He shook hands with several of them and said:

"I am addressing special prayers to the lord at this time of sorrow, affliction and oppression for your dear fatherland."

The pontiff did not mention last week's Poznan revolt by name.

Philippines to Get Titles for Islands' Bases

MANILA, P. I., July 4.—President Ramon Magsaysay and U. S. President Dwight D. Nixon announced yesterday the United States will transfer to the Philippines all title claims to U. S. military bases in the islands. The announcement came in a joint statement issued here today after Nixon landed here on the first hop of his goodwill tour of the Far East.

The United States has since the independence of the Philippines, always acknowledged the sovereignty of the Philippines over such military bases and expressly reaffirmed full recognition of such Philippine authority over the bases, the statement said.

The United States signed a pact with the Philippines in 1947 leasing 23 bases for 99 years, subsequently, the Philippines agreed to the Brownell, Jr. pact that the United States never relinquished permanent title to certain of the bases. The pact, parts of the Cavite and Subic Bay naval bases and a small area of air facilities were granted Philippine independence.

The joint statement specifically mentions the United States has abandoned this view in the face of sharp opposition and criticism both in the Philippines and abroad. The statement said the two countries would hold formal negotiations here in Manila to prepare for the formal transfer of base title papers and claims.

The Philippines also said the two agreed on the need to strengthen bases in the Philippines in order to meet the common defense of the two countries as well as the Far East in this area.

Committee Hits Military Buying

WASHINGTON, July 4.—A Senate investigation charged yesterday that the armed forces have been buying equipment at inflated prices, resulting in a loss of \$100 million in the past year.

The Senate subcommittee, headed by Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, said the investigation revealed that the military had not done enough to make sufficient effort to find the best prices for the equipment.

The subcommittee said it charged that there has been a "controlling lack of interest" for the military's consciousness in the armed services.

Last May 2, Coggriff said the board had ordered him to increase the bank's capitalization by \$150,000. He said he wouldn't do it and challenged the board to prove it had the power to make him do it. Continental stockholders subsequently upheld Coggriff.

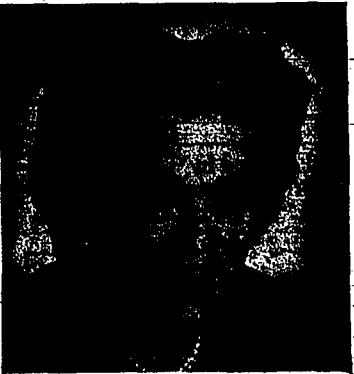
Coggriff told newsmen yesterday that the federal reserve board has ordered a hearing for Sept. 10 in Salt Lake City. The order said the purpose of the hearing will be to determine how much—how much—capitalization Continental Bank should have and how much, if any, it should be increased.

Peter W. Billings, a bank attorney, said the two main issues of the hearing will be: (1) Whether the board has the power to determine the proper amount of a bank's capitalization, and (2) if the board does have the power, whether it is being used "arbitrarily and capriciously" in this case.

BUDAPEST, July 4 (AP)—A public meeting was held in Budapest last week denouncing the Communist party and preaching "anti-revolutionary ideas," the Hungarian communist government revealed yesterday.

The meeting, attended by 6,000 people, was conducted by an organization of Hungarian newsmen and members of a newly-founded 'Petoefi circle'—a debating club named after a famed Hungarian revolutionary poet. The statement criticized the speakers 'who went as far as to deny the leading role of the party and preached anti-revolutionary ideas.'"

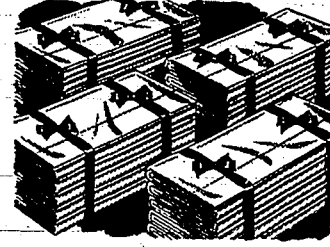

The country from the Rocky mountains eastward was divided midway by east-west lines into hot and cool sections.

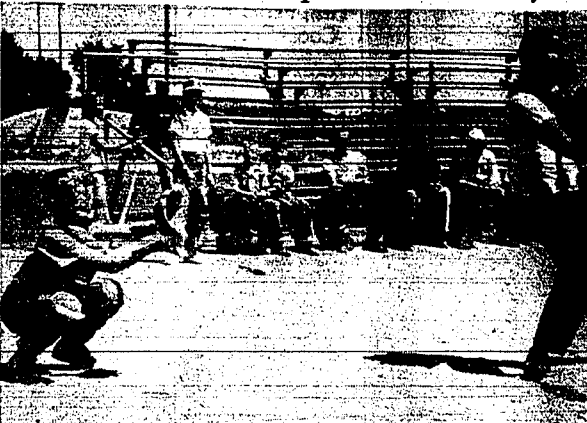
The northern half enjoyed pleasant air while southern states bore an air of heat and humidity.

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# Firms "Waiting to See" Developments Before Passing on Increases in Rates

The federal highway bill, which was signed Friday by President Eisenhower and went into effect at 12:01 a.m. Sunday, has resulted in an immediate increase in gasoline and tire prices, but firms using these commodities are adopting a "wait and see" attitude before effecting rate changes, a sampling of Twin Falls businessmen showed on Monday.

The bill will provide an additional 25 billion dollars for highway construction by increasing federal taxes on gasoline one cent a gallon and also raising taxes on tires and rub-

ber for recapping.

Idaho is slated to receive \$1,220,254 for the construction of primary, secondary and urban highways and an additional \$10,122,547 for use on an interstate system designed to link every state in the union with modern four-lane highways.

Magio Valley gasoline and tire prices raised automatically Sunday on both the wholesale and retail levels and retailers report that there has been no apparent drop in volume of business, although there has been some half-hearted complaining by some consumers.

Trucking and taxi firms meanwhile have indicated they will maintain their present rates until they can obtain figures showing the increase in costs which they will incur as a result of the bill.

A spokesman for the state highway department said Monday his office has received no official word yet on where or how the additional funds will be used within the state.

Very little building is expected to take place anywhere in the nation, however, before the summer of 1937.

Both retailers and wholesalers were unanimous in the opinion that

consumers will maintain their present rate of purchase of the tax items.

Don Heter, owner of Don's Conoco service, 360 Main avenue west, admitted that some of his customers had voiced opposition to the tax increase, but he compared it to complaints about income tax.

"They can't do anything about it," he said, "so they just complain. Actually, I think many of them are willing to go along with the tax if it will mean better roads."

He added that some drivers might cut down the amount of gas they purchase at a time, but that "it will just mean they'll make a few more trips to their service station. People today own and operate cars no matter what kind of home they have. They'll buy gasoline almost as soon as they'll buy milk."

William Riegan, manager of the Maggell Automobile company, local Goodyear tire distributor, estimated the average increase on the cost of a passenger tire will be between 80 and 90 cents, while truck tires will raise in price anywhere from \$1 to \$1.25.

"The bill will not affect tires used on farms," he added.

Prices on recapped tires will increase about three cents a pound, he continued, which will mean an increase of from 25 cents to \$1.50 per tire.

Riegan reported his firm had to inventory every tire in their stock to report to the government, as well as all recapping rubber on hand.

He added that in his opinion, the bill will affect commercial trucking firms far more than it will private citizens.

Agreeing on the latter point was

George Warberg of Warberg Brothers, who said, "It looks as if truckers will pay a little more than their share on this bill."

Both he and M. E. Carr, manager of Consolidated Freightways, said their rates would not increase immediately. Both said that figures showing the increased expense as a result of the bill would have to be tabulated first.

Carr added that both these figures and any new policies on rates would come from Consolidated's office in Portland.

"We'll naturally have to keep in line with rail and other shipping firms," he said, "if we are forced to increase rates."

Representatives of local taxi companies also said their rates would remain unchanged unless the increased taxes forced them to raise their fares.

F. E. Ostrander, local Teras company manager, said the tax increase on gasoline, which now provides for three cents federal and six cents state taxes per gallon would not mean any additional bookkeeping for his office or for his retail dealers. He said he favored the tax because "it will build a lot of roads which wouldn't be built otherwise, although we don't know where they will be, of course."

Ostrander added, however, that in his opinion the saturation point is being approached in regard to gasoline taxes.
