## Fourth Highway Traffic Toll Hits 138; Others, 117

CHICAGO, July 5 (AP)—The nation today tallied its traffic dead from one of the most disastrous midweek holidays on record despite an all-out highway enforcement effort.

A United Press count from 6 p.m. Tuesday to midnight last night showed a final toll of 138 persons killed in traffic. Drawings killed 48 persons, four, fireworkers and miscellaneous accidents 34 for an overall total of 255.

## Polish Purge Grows; Food Offer Denied

BERLIN, July 5 (AP)—A widespread purge of "unreliable" Communist party members was reported today in Poland. "We do not hunger in Poland," Warsaw asserted.

### Wheat Voting Set for Valley During Month

Ballooning on the wheat allotment and the pending referendum will be conducted July 20, announces Lloyd S. Jones, chairman of the county agriculture habilitation and conservation committee.

The vote will decide whether marketing wheat with penalties on excess wheat. It is to be in effect for the 1957 crop and the level of price support available for cooperators.

Jones said if the measure is approved, farmers who comply with the law will receive between 75 and 90 per cent of parity. "Should the farmers decide against it the price support will be 50 per cent of parity provided by law. However, the vote is required to approve the measure. All farmers having wheat allotments of more than 15 acres are eligible to vote. Their wives are also entitled to one vote.

### Restaurants Hike Menu Prices List

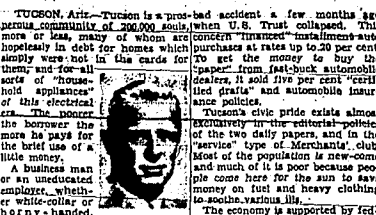

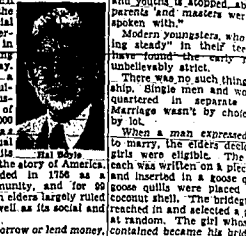

WASHINGTON, July 5 (AP)—The goose-and-gander theory may be a new one to William Rogers, deputy attorney general. He has dished out the same sauce that once was handed him.

Particular sauce was prepared by Herman Workman, a retired judge of the justice department, who has served under both the Truman and Eisenhower administrations.

### Truman Views Hat Harriman Spun in Ring

NEW YORK, July 5 (AP)—Gov. Averell Harriman, a presidential pick, wrote the hat he threw into the Democratic political ring when he walked in the rain today with former President Harry S. Truman.

It's going to be valuable. But Mr. Truman again asserted his neutrality about selection of a Democratic presidential nominee.

On a hectic 12 block walk to Harriman's home, where he was a breakfast guest, Mr. Truman said he took the same position toward the candidacy of Sen. Stuart Symington, D. Mo., as he did toward the presidential aspirations of Harriman and Adlai E. Stevenson.

"I want to remain neutral," he said.

Mr. Truman walked from his hotel at 730 a. m. carrying a plastic suitcase. Shots from passing truck drivers and occupants of taxis greeted him. One Madison avenue bus driver stopped his bus in the middle of an intersection to lean out and shake hands.

Harriman met Mr. Truman on Madison avenue between 77th and 78th streets. Mr. Truman remarked to him that there had been reports that they were plotting against another presidential hopeful and added "I don't do any plotting."

Harriman praised Mr. Truman as the "first ambassador" the country has had in Europe in a long time. He said the Europeans "only wish they knew where we stood now as they did when U. S. foreign policy was 'definite, firm and direct' under Mr. Truman.

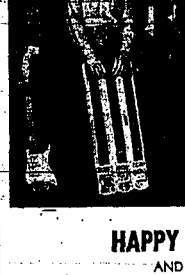

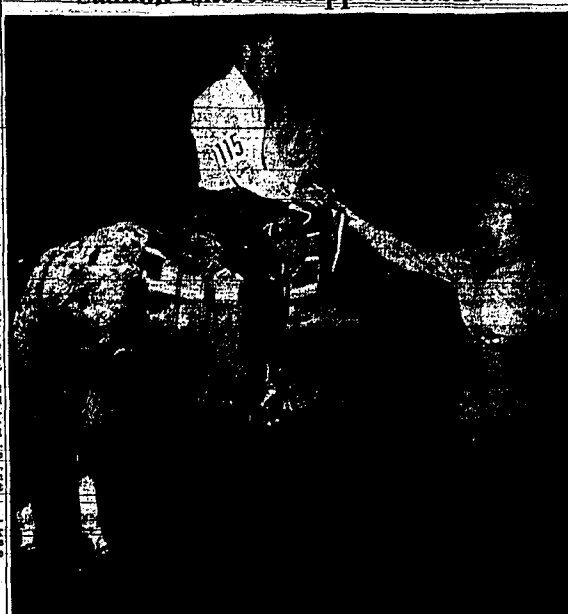

### Reds Whittle U. S. Lead in Air Strength

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—Russia has been able to whittle down America's air power lead by lavishly pouring men, money and materiel into the effort since World War II.

While the living standard of the Russian people has been steadily higher, while the Soviet Union has suffered shortages in Europe has persisted, the biggest air force in the world has been built.

By leaps and bounds, the Soviets created and expanded the economic industrial and scientific strength that underlies modern air power.

These developments are in the spotlight now because of the senate's power investigation and the Russian visit of Gen. Nathan F. Twining, air force chief of staff. For almost a decade military men, particularly airmen, have been warning what to expect. But even the airmen have been startled more than once by the rapidity of Russian advances.

The senate inquiry will not settle the controversy whether Russia may overtake the U. S. air power in a few years. Neither the Eisenhower administration nor the Democratic administration would say. Airmen are likely to change their minds.

When the investigation apparently has swept away any doubt that the once "backyard" Russians are serious competitors, Air Secretary Donald A. Quarles summed it up when he said the Soviets have greater numbers of aircraft and are outpacing America in rate of progress in production and technology. Despite that, Quarles is confident personally that the Russians will remain second best in quality.

Onions and potatoes continue moderate in price, along with corn, but corn should become cheaper as local crops are picked.

Watermelons, especially the small ones, in the 18 to 20-pound size, are coming down in price just in time for picnickers.

### Politicians Wrangle on Russ Angle and Ike's Plans to Run

WASHINGTON, July 8 (AP)—Senator Bridges-R-N.H.—said yesterday a senate Republican policy committee memorandum, which has drawn Democratic fire but not designed to link Democrats with communism.

Senator Kefauver, D. Tenn., commented the paper "put out by the committee itself was 'deplorable and dirty politics' which President Eisenhower should disavow."

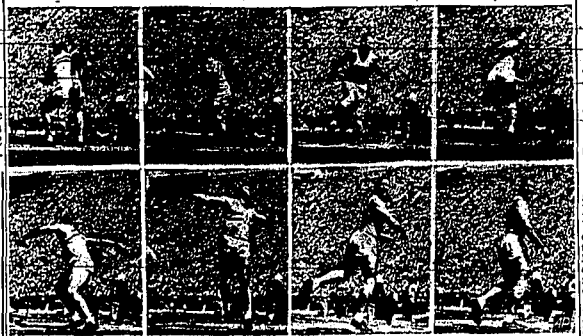

BONN, Germany, July 5 (AP)—The West German Bundestag in a landslide vote today passed a sweeping law of approval to compulsory military service.

The 487-member Bundestag walked out angrily near the close of the all-day session.

In one of the most bitter floor fights in the six-year history of the Bundestag, tempers flared and disputes flared as the government and opposition parties battled over the bill.

But Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's supporters snared under three opposition parties on the second or semi-final reading of the body's draft measure. The vote was by a show of hands.

This is the last major legislation to be passed by the Bundestag since the election of the body in 1933.

The bundestag (upper house) then met in the afternoon and was presided over by the popularly elected lower house, which would practically insure that West Germany will have a strong western proponent in its 600,000-member body.

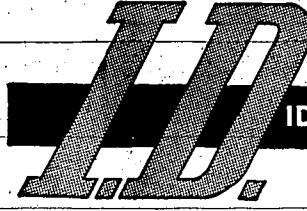
