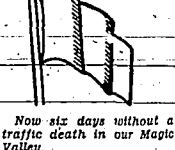

### 'Orphans' of GOP Policies Seen on Tour

OMAHA, Neb., July 7 (AP)—Adlai Stevenson, head of a tour of four Midwest states, charged today that the livestock farmers are "the orphaned children of the Eisenhower-Benson farm program."

Stevenson said many livestock men along his route through drought-stricken counties in Iowa, Missouri, and Nebraska the last two days told him they are worse off now than during the depression more than 20 years ago.

"Agriculture is our basic industry," the Democratic presidential candidate said, "then certainly prosperity is a mockery when so many farmers are going broke."

He said the livestock farmers, especially young farmers who started after the war, cited both falling prices and "unstable or rising costs" as the source of their troubles.

"Everywhere, farmers said that low prices hurt more than the drought," he charged.

"It seems possible to me to deal with livestock so that high fixed costs will not eat up all the profits," he suggested, "efficiency, feed control, help to school, lunches and hungry people, and sensible supports could make a vast difference across the country as I have in the last few months."

Stevenson told his audience anxiously about the future.

### Truman Says His Home Town Best

INDEPENDENCE, Mo., July 7 (AP)—Former President Truman stepped off the train at Independence today and said that every place he visited in Europe was fine, but "home is the only place worth visiting."

Mr. Truman said he received an honorary degree from Oxford University.

Mr. Truman said his immediate plans involved mostly "seeing about my mail." He said he had no writing plans and as far as he knew, Independence was not to be a meeting place for leaders on the Democratic party—as it was on several occasions for planning the 1952 campaign.

### Majority of Fatal Accidents Involve Only One Car, State Police Discover

A large majority of the 21 traffic fatalities in Magic Valley since "one" single automobile, State Police Lt. Clark Hand noted Friday, involved only one-car accidents.

Hand says the majority of the fatal accidents occurred in the daylight hours with those in state highway police district No. 4 occurring around 4 p. m. The 21 deaths in the valley resulted from 18 accidents with excessive speed blamed for four of them. Other causes were either not falling asleep at the wheel, inattention, failure to stop for stop signs and general inattention to driving.

The last fatal accident in Magic Valley occurred July 1 in which a 14-year-old boy died from injuries received when an automobile ran off the road on the Idaho-Nebraska state line. The driver of the car was asleep at the wheel.

Hand's records, which include a map showing nine counties covered by his district, list 482 traffic maps. This does not include traffic accidents in cities where no deaths occurred.

### Boise Protests Dam and Plant

BOISE, July 7 (AP)—The Boise Chamber of Commerce today added its protests to those of other chambers in southwestern Idaho against the proposed dam and power plant on the Snake river near Marling.

Chamber officials said they would appear at a public hearing in Boise next Thursday to outline the chamber's protest and to favor the so-called "Gulley" plan instead.

The Gulley proposal deals with irrigation of Mountain Home, Hillcrest and Dry Lake lands with supplemental irrigation for lands on the south side of the Snake below Gulley.

Among the principal reasons for protesting the Marling plan the chamber listed increased cost over the Gulley plan and flooding of acreage already under cultivation.

A hospital bulletin said: "The condition of Miss Margaret is such that she is able to ask questions about her situation. She is much more lucid. She is asking questions about her whereabouts."

### Solons Agree On Funds for Foreign Aids

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—A senate-house conference committee agreed yesterday to authorize a ceiling of \$4,014,275,000 on foreign aid, but the house appropriations committee in a separate action voted to hold the appropriation to \$3,625,000,000.

These figures, for the fiscal year which began last Sunday, compare with the \$2,765,000,000 congress appropriated last year, and with about \$4,000,000 President Eisenhower asked for the new year.

Foreign aid programs always have to go through two processes. First comes authorization, in which a ceiling is set. Then comes the appropriations procedure, the house voted for a ceiling of \$3,600,000,000. Eisenhower and other administration leaders protested this was dangerously low, and their efforts were a factor in a senate vote for a ceiling of \$4,562,000,000.

A senate-house conference committee then was named to reconcile these two ceilings. Senator George D. Aiken, announced this afternoon that a compromise authorization had been reached at \$4,126,283,370.

Later word from the committee was that the finally agreed-on figure was \$4,014,275,000. Of the total, \$2,300,000,000 is for military aid.

### Bounce Is Noted To Quell Drunks

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, July 7 (AP)—Police and today a project putting bounce in cells at Stockholm's main jail is paying off in the handling of drunks.

Arrakas-for-drunkens-clubbed sharply here after liquor rationing was ended last October. Jailers soon complained that alcohol-strong prisoners were tearing up the old cells night after night.

Cells lined with foam rubber were introduced. In the new cells, police reported, all the energetic inhabitants can do is bounce around.

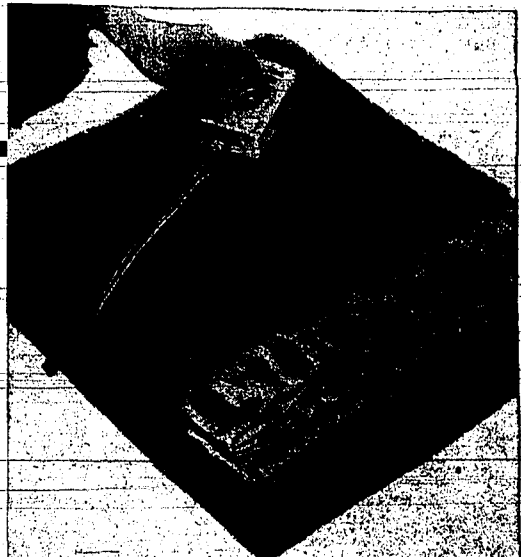

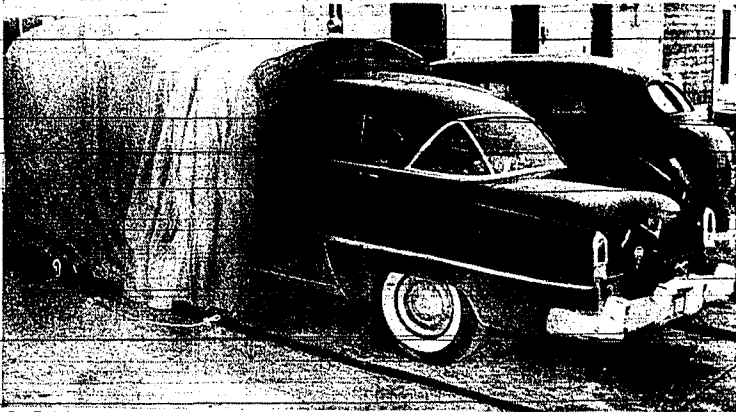

## Buhl Man's Invention Wins National Acclaim

### "Inventor of Year" Title Is Awarded Buhl Storekeeper for Portable Garage

BUHL, July 7.—Don Teeter, 58, Buhl storekeeper, has been named "inventor of the year" from Idaho by the Gadget-of-the-Month club in Los Angeles. Teeter's prize-winning invention is a portable canvas garage, capable of completely covering the longest automobile on the market today, but which can be folded up for carrying on top of a car.

The garage is now in production in Los Angeles and will be on the market soon at a cost of between \$185 and \$225, depending upon the materials used in its construction.

The garage is a collapsible metal frame covered with canvas and mounted on "on-top" rollers which contain rollers, allowing the garage to be compressed to three feet or expanded to 17 feet. Robert Long, inventor of the "zipper" truck, explained Teeter, "it can be compressed to three feet, allowing the driver to drive over the parallel tracks. Once the car is in place, the garage may be closed by simply pulling on one of two cables found on either side of it. Because it can be collapsed, the garage doesn't require a lot of extra space which would be necessary if the car had to be driven straight in."

Manufacturers have also considered the possibility of modifying Teeter's invention slightly for use as a cover for truck beds.

In addition, the army has shown an interest in the device for use as a cover for gun emplacements. Army spokesmen also have pointed out that if used to cover troop trucks, soldiers could dismount from all sides of the truck bed, rather than from just the rear.

The invention is Teeter's second to go into production. The first was a low tent which fits on the top of the rear door and the rear bumper of a station wagon, providing its passengers with lodging for the night on camping trips.

The low tent can be folded up to a bundle 26 inches long, weighing less than 25 pounds. It was on display for 11 days at the 1955 Sportsman's show at the Los Angeles Shrine auditorium.

Mrs. Teeter says that her husband is always inventing something and that she rarely pays any attention to it.

She added, "A lot of times he wakes up in the morning and says, 'I've got an idea.' Then he goes right to work, and in several days his new invention is finished. It applies for patents on most of them, but he's only tried to sell these two."

### Sewage Plant Aid Planned for State

WASHINGTON, July 7 (Special) Residents of Idaho will be entitled to \$388,025 annually in federal funds to aid in building sewage treatment plants.

This is the state's allotment under the new water pollution act recently signed by the President and will be given for each of the next 10 years. In addition, \$15,000 annually will be granted for research work.

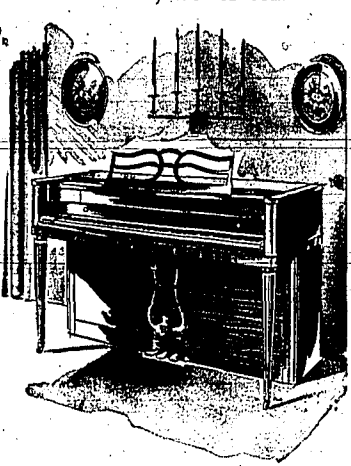

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

The second florist in TWIN FALLS claims raising flowers by telegraph has done more to aid the nation's floral business than any other thing, including improved refrigeration and transportation facilities.

Orlo Williams, who started as a florist's helper in 1909 and bought out the employer 10 years later, still is active and plans to start next spring selling potted plants at his City florist greenhouse on Seventh street.

Williams started working for John Lundahl and his nephew, Ed, who owned the Twin Falls Floral company, and bought the firm in 1919 from Lundahl. In 1929 he also bought the company, then primarily a potted-plant store, from C. W. Nightingale.

Williams and his son maintained ownership of both stores until January of this year when they sold the Twin Falls floral company.

Since the sale, Williams' son has gone into the wire business and Williams has quit the cut flower business to concentrate on growing potted plants.

Williams has a lot of fish in a month's time, but the refrigeration system cost only 60 cents more after it was built.

There have been big changes in his business since it started, he explained, "but the greatest ones came about when I returned from the convention of the National Floral Telegraph association in 1926. I was the only delegate from Idaho."

Meeting with other florists from all over the nation gave him many ideas for his business, he said, and he introduced some of these ideas in his store.

# Burtenshaw's Talk in T. F. Is Solon

Claude Burtenshaw, candidate for the Democratic nomination for U. S. senator, struck hard at what he called the "official record" of the Republican incumbent, Herman Welker, in a talk Friday night to a group of dozen Democratic workers meeting in the Oriental cafe.

"Welker is the tool and candidate for big business," Burtenshaw said, and to point up his case he quoted Welker's record on several major bills of the last two years as recorded in the Congressional Record, official publication of congress.

According to Burtenshaw, Welker opposed an increase in the school lunch program, "at a time when there was a growing surplus of agricultural products," in favor of the Dixon-Yates bill, in favor of turning all atomic energy projects over to private power, and in favor of railroad rate increases without a hearing, and in favor of "eliminating" federal stock and money stock under international banks.

"This record," Burtenshaw said, "is the official record of his business and not the people of Idaho."

He added that those who approve Welker must also approve his "two limiting the President of the United States in his power," and that Welker opposed the nomination of Eisenhower and since then has "rotted" the United States in various ways.

"It is my duty as a candidate against Herman Welker to report on his official record," he said, "and the case of Sen. Lester Hunt of Wyoming. Some papers have called this 'the official record' of Welker, but I deny that I am using 'merit tactics' in this campaign."

Herman Welker is a lawyer from Idaho, who has made money out of "immorality," Burtenshaw concluded.

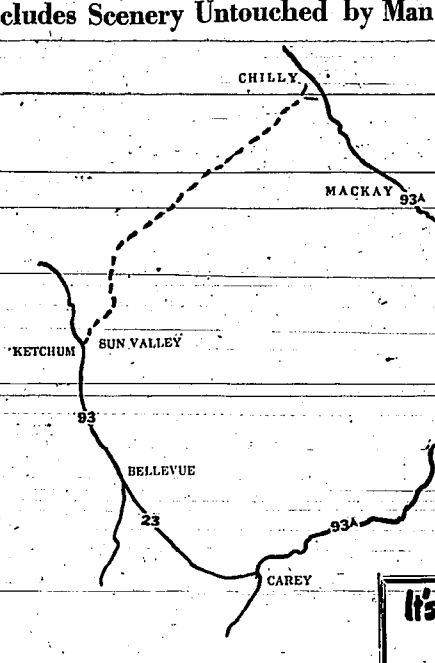

On reaching the summit, they returned for each succeeding wagon. Draining the wagon was a problem in the return trip—and several loads of ore went over the grade when wagons went out of control.

As you drive along the now well kept forest service road from the foot of the mountain to its summit, look closely at the creek side of the road. Far below you will see the dim outlines of the road—Horse-Lewis and his "mule skinner" traveled the road built prior to the present one, which was traveled almost exclusively by horses, also presented a problem to the first motorists.

At half-don places it was necessary in making a switch-back turn to stop, back up, and then proceed around the curve, with a severe thousand-foot drop a few feet away from the car.

# Recent Brides Begin to Learn Universal Career

Many girls, who just a month or so ago were planning their weddings, have settled down to begin the universal career of women; housekeeping. Some of these girls may find the work a familiar one, and some, although they know generally what should be done, are at a complete loss. Keeping house on your own, without anyone to supervise, can be confusing and intimidating.

Although much has been said and written about the budget for money, new housewives actually follow one, and fewer still budget their time. New appliances and different cleaning chemicals have been added to the already long list of the housewife. Besides full and part-time jobs which many of the brides of today undertake, women are expected to take a more active part in civic and community service.

Big business has become aware of the importance of detailed study and planning of the work to be done, and will work as well for the housewife. The housewife who is interested in hard physical work, the washing of windows, with just-as-necessary, but easier, silver polishing still cut down fatigue considerably at the end of the day.

Some of the new duties and picking up the time room in the evening just before retiring will lessen the "stuck when you face it in the morning" feeling.

Some, your housekeeping requirements are not the same as your next door neighbor's, no matter how much alike your situations seem. No set plan can be set down for all cases, but the following are suggestions to try to plan for free time for shopping and for yourself. If you do, you will find that you won't have to come home to a cluttered house after you spend a long, tiring day.

Plan meals that take the least preparation for the days that you have the least time to prepare them. After a housewife has many family members to take care of, it is often better to eat food and the specialties of the cook.

Besides the fact that your family will appreciate your thoughtfulness in planning a well-planned menu, you will feel satisfied and not out of sorts because of a guilty conscience.

Some women like to do jobs of the same category, like washing all the windows in the entire day, or cleaning the house thoroughly and then concentrate on heavy cleaning in one room each day.

Read and listen carefully to every suggestion and idea you come across in the magazines, newspapers or in the radio, and try to fit it into your own scheme of things at all. But, sometimes, three or four lines in a magazine, newspaper or conversation will save you much in time and work in the year to come.

A lot of time is consumed by the tedious scrubbing on soiled spots if you want a really white and bright wash. The solution is easy—wash towels, sheets, pillow cases, and other linens in a foot bath. Use a lot of water. The extra scrubbing necessary to remove it causes undue wear. There is little, other than frequent washings, that will keep your linens white. Good use of iron will help to keep them bright.

Blankets can be washed successfully with a little know-how. First and foremost to remember is the cool temperature of the water. They should be dried in the shade, hung on lines at least a foot apart to increase air circulation and speed drying time. Smooth the corners, pulling them very gently. Press the linens when dry.

Blankets should be covered with a sheet or cover or a quilt, vacuumed frequently and turned to insure even wear.

Pillows should be washed occasionally if the fat states that you can have them washed. They should be dried in the shade, hung on lines at least a foot apart and give them a fresh smell. However, always hang them in the shade. The hot sun will cause the oil-in down to dry and the feathers will become brittle.

Use a box of water softener beside the bathtub. A small amount in the tub will do away with the hard-to-remove ring caused by hard water in this area.

A few drops of bleach in the dishpan will give your dishcloth white and clean-smelling and make the dishes and glassware sparkle.

Have curtains washed once a week. They will look when they are replaced over the sparkling glass.

Use a little vinegar cleaner to satisfy you for window washing try a little vinegar in hot water. It will remove the greasy scum on the glass instantly and they will dry almost without polishing. Some women prefer to use newspaper or paper for window cleaning.

If your husband owns a hand sander or electric drill, investigate its use as a mirror.

Use your old dusting cloth on the chrome of your bathroom fixtures for a mirror.

You are lucky if you have a vacuum with attachments. They will save you time and do a better job than is possible by hand.

Use a small brush for dusting. Use a million uses. Use it on the window sills and get every particle of dust that accumulates there and is pushed into the corners and cracks by a dust cloth. Be sure to open the window and clean the window.

There are so many tricks, ideas and suggestions to make housework more pleasant and easier. Try them. It's no sin to do things the easy way, especially if it does the work better and saves you time and trouble to devote to other things.

You'll find that a clean, becoming dress, shorts, pedal pushers or jeans, if you must, is a comfortable and a practical thing to do. It will make-up will improve your frame of mind, especially when the doornails sting.

If you get tired, sit down for a few minutes, don't drive yourself until you get into such a mood that you can't enjoy being with your family in the evening.

Remember a house has a primary purpose, to be lived in. If you find yourself crying and jumping to pick up every newspaper and book that is out of place, stop.

Even though you are working extra hard that day to get the place spotless, just take pride in the fact that it was all in order when the family came home.

Take an absolute order at all times, some evening you'll find you are sitting alone in a house, not a home. You're alone because your family has probably found somewhere where they can relax.
