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Talks to Resume Thursday in Row Of Steel Industry

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—Steel industry executives agreed today to resume talks with union leaders tomorrow in an effort to settle the steel strike. Agreement came at a meeting of four top company officials with Joseph P. Kamp, director of the federal mediation and conciliation commission. Union officials agreed yesterday to resume talks. The industry and union representatives will reopen their stalemated negotiations tomorrow afternoon at Pittsburgh. Finigan said he has not yet decided whether he and other government officials will take part.

John A. Stephens, U. S. steel industry president, and leaders of the union said yesterday that they have never had any reluctance to meet with the union. Stephens said that the outlook for settlement of the 11-day old strike is bright. He said that the union would recognize the wonderful offer that has been made. Stephens said that he has heard in separate talks with union and industry leaders yesterday that he has changed his feeling that this is still an extremely serious situation.

The industry group met with Finigan for 30 minutes this morning and with Stephens for 20 minutes this afternoon. Stephens' office is at 2300 Pennsylvania Ave. N. W.

W. J. McDonald, president of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steelworkers, said he agreed on resumption of the talks in a conference with Finigan yesterday.

Half of Idaho Ad Funds Eliminated by Decision Of State Supreme Court

BOISE, July 11 (AP)—A. B. Jonsson, Idaho secretary of commerce and development, promised today to make the best of a state supreme court decision denying him \$50,000 in state highway funds appropriated by the 1955 legislature. Jonsson said that the state's Republican and Democratic leaders had agreed to a court decision, which knocked out half the funds set aside for the department in the current biennium. The court upheld the contention of Mrs. Ruth G. Moon, Idaho's Democratic state treasurer, that the appropriation violated a constitutional provision earmarking highway funds for road construction and maintenance.

Jonsson said that it would be difficult to carry out the intent of the Legislature. He said that the department had enough cash from its balance on hand and from tolls to see it go ahead with a tour for travel editors, planners for August, he said there would be no personal cuts.

Rehearing indefinite
Atty. Gen. Graydon Smith said he had not decided whether to seek a rehearing of the decision.

State Democratic chairman George Greenfield said the decision would "completely vindicate" Mrs. Moon. He added: "A consistent effort has been made by Gov. Robert F. Schmidt and his administration to tag Mrs. Moon an obstructionist. And I think it would be only appropriate if they now tender her their apologies."

Smith's Answers

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Crop Harvest Lower, Claims Farm Agency

WASHINGTON, July 11.—The Agriculture Department today estimated that the crop harvest for 1936 is expected to yield a total crop "near the average" of the last five years. The agriculture department's crop reporting board yesterday estimated the production index would shrink to about 100 per cent from 102 per cent in 1935.

The board, taking its first overall look at 1936 crop prospects, estimated the acreage of all crops to be harvested at about one per cent less than in 1935. The total acreage planted or growing as of July 1 of 1936 principal crops was 351 million acres, the lowest since 1911, and about \$2 million acres below last year.

Principal acreage decreases from last year are in oats, corn, barley, cotton, rice and tobacco. Crops with the greatest average increases were wheat, soybeans, flax, winter wheat and durum wheat.

However, the crop reporting board said "weather hazards from here on can make large changes in sectional and total crop outputs."

The "critical July-August period for some important midwestern sections remains hazardous because of sub-soil moisture shortage."

The board said spring crop plantings although late in many instances generally were satisfactorily completed with good stands. Yield prospects for most crops improved during the "drier months" and generally well timed rainfall and temperatures which favored growth of late crops and aided grain maturing.

But it added that crops in some great plains areas, especially in the Dakotas, suffered severe drought damage.

Aerial Traffic Control Is Hit

CHICAGO, July 11.—The All-States Pilots association today blamed the "inefficiency of the act" and been principle of air traffic control for the crash of two airplanes over Grand canyon.

"Outside of perhaps cleaning out a dirty valve, we make no repairs," Mrs. Poe explained. "Our job is only to test the cookers and make suggestions." She added that the tests were made in cooperation with Florence Schultz, home demonstration agent.

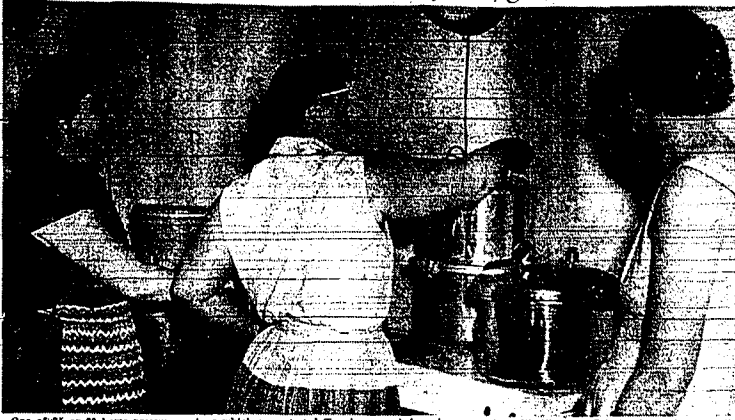

Italian Concerns Invade U.S. With Line of Motor Scooters

NEW YORK, July 11.—Two Italian manufacturers have invaded the United States with a deluge of line of motor scooters and plans to change the riding habits of millions of Americans.

Their chances of success are good enough, they figure to make substantial investment very worthwhile.

One of the manufacturers, "Piacentini" company of Genoa, Italy, already selling 300 of its motor scooters a week in the United States. The other producer, Innocenti, is not far behind in sales.

The two companies claim they have a fertile market here among suburbanites, farmers, housewives and the 20,000,000 families who own one car and could use another but can't afford it.

Motor scooters, they point out, cost about \$100. Have a top speed of 50 miles an hour and travel more than 100 miles on a single gallon of fuel.

In Europe, where gasoline is expensive and transportation difficult, motor scooters have been a huge success. They are commonly used by doctors, engineers, office and factory workers for spare deliveries and even for family utility.

Recently American businessmen have begun to show practical interest in them. A steel company president, on first seeing them in Rome, ordered several three-wheeled models for his Pennsylvania plant. Here they cut costs considerably by replacing larger trucks from the smaller tasks of plant delivery.

In India, as part of a government program to stimulate rural production, motor scooters with station wagon attachment, are becoming widely used.

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POLITICS THROUGH AND THROUGH

Bearing in mind how the public power advocates have been crying their eyes out over the "great power shortage" in the Pacific Northwest for years, it's interesting to review the tactics they have employed to "solve" this problem.

By now it should be apparent to everyone that the public power enthusiasts are far more interested in government control of utilities than in any shortage which may exist.

In other words they want their way or else, some Hells canyon or high water. We'll stop at a political philosophy and they'll stop at a political philosophy and they'll stop at a political philosophy.

The irony of all this political fervor for public power, Senator Morse and everything else in the same category, is that the very same people who are so eager to have their attempts to circumvent normal procedures set up by the federal government.

The federal power commission, as everyone knows, is the body established to decide such things as whether Hells canyon contracts should be made on a political standpoint, but on the merits of the development itself.

It will be recalled that the FPC held hearings last year and a half with the testimony of hundreds of witnesses and the proposed development of the public power enthusiasts had every opportunity to advance their contentions in complete detail.

They jockeyed for delays and postponements. They jockeyed for delays and postponements. They jockeyed for delays and postponements.

It is in this manner in which the nation's future should be settled, why not let it go away with the federal power commission? If such issues are to be made nothing more than political footballs to cry, to kick around, why not make that crystal clear to everyone.

Idaho, particularly, should be much concerned. After all, in this great neck canyon and drag out political fight, Hells canyon, this state had the most to lose.

THE STEEL STRIKE

Management and union negotiators in the steel industry are of course blaming each other for the nationwide strike now in progress and uncaringly they did not start off in a conciliatory mood.

But the country's interest dictates that they nevertheless come to grips quickly on terms of a new steel contract.

A strike which would last as long or longer than the right-week 1952 stoppage could make a damaging blow to the prosperity.

A year or two break in production would be felt in the oil and gas, railroad equipment and construction industries.

Corruption would put a crimp in most other major steel users. Unemployment would put out in industries which supply steel users with their materials.

In their hearts, both sides in these negotiations know they will have to come to hard, compromising bargaining sooner or later. For the good of themselves and the whole nation, it had better be sooner.

Secretary of Labor Mitchell wisely declined to pick the steel industry for the next beyond freezing certain critical steel supplies to insure continuity of defense production.

Federal mediators confer with both sides in hope of breaking the stalemate. But the whole theory of free collective bargaining is undercut when the government becomes a third party to negotiations.

If the bargaining process is as sound as it is supposed to be, then it must be demonstrated again and again, in practice. Entry of the government into the picture not only support an argument that collective bargaining between management and labor is ineffective.

In this case, contract talks began May 28. More than a month of discussions produced no real moves toward a solution. Neither side got down to brass tacks. It was as if each were waiting until a strike would be under way, in hope the added pressure would force the other's hand.

While that is the classic role of the strike, the government's intervention in the bargaining procedure is in danger of serious distortion when the negotiating parties cannot bring themselves to really earnest dealing so long as strike pressure is absent.

The industry, the steel workers and the entire U. S. economy will suffer if this strike lasts long. It is a shame that the most stubborn bargainer at the steel contract table.

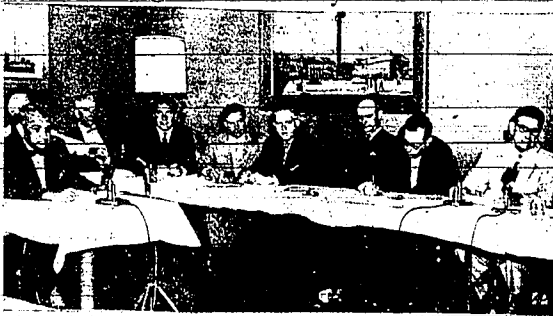

Eisenhower apparently has decided he had better not remain silent now after seeing the cuts being made in foreign aid and the destruction of the school aid program.

Republican congressional leaders who visited him yesterday at Georgetown said Eisenhower is "irritated" with the Democratic congress. Because the Democrats have a thin majority there, they run it as if he tries to use them as a campaign target, they have ammunition to fire back.

It is the performance of his own Republicans—the way they've thwarted him and sometimes led the parade in doing it, there's no mystery about why they want him to go for his own reelection.

But it is ironic they should be so anxious for his continued leadership and still do to him what they did on the education bill. The Democrats could call the Republican job that one critical.

The school aid bill seemed to have a chance of passing both houses if no one tried to tack on an amendment forbidding the use of any federal money to build new schools in states which still had segregated schools.

It was clearly recognized that if that happened, senate Democrats from the south would have killed the whole program with a filibuster. But house Republicans didn't wait for that.

Last week the house approved the anti-segregation amendment, with 144 Republicans and 77 Democrats voting for it, while 68 Republicans joined 118 Democrats in voting against it.

U.S. Acting to Offset Possible Losses Of Vital North African Military Bases

The United States is taking out valuable insurance against the possible loss of its military bases in North Africa. It is speeding up the construction of the air and naval bases agreement signed in 1953. Secondly, it is preparing to take advantage of the offer Portugal has just made to give it the use of two big Portuguese bases.

North Atlantic treaty. But they also are calculated to offset to a great extent the possible loss of the two big bases in Morocco with the United States has invested about 40 million dollars. BANGON, Indochina, July 11 (AP)—President Ngo Dinh Diem believes the Southeast Asia treaty organization has reduced the threat of communist attacks against South Vietnam.

"The leader of the world's newest anti-communist republic told United Press in an exclusive interview yesterday that SEATO will force North-Vietnam to hesitate before planning any new war in Indochina.

"There is a guarantee from SEATO against aggression that will make the communists hesitate before launching any new adventures.

Although it is not a member of SEATO, which includes the United States, Great Britain and France, South Vietnam is included in its area of military defense.

Diem, who met last week with Vice President Richard Nixon in Saigon, said his army is "better" today than it was when the Geneva agreement ended the Indochina war.

"American aid has made it possible to support our army and reorganize it," the 55-year-old president said.

"The Geneva agreement, which we did not sign, prohibits our joining alliances," he explained. "There is a de facto situation (under the Geneva accord) and we have said we will not resort to force to change that situation. We are a nation working for peace."

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Grain Fuel Is Suggested in Bill in Senate

WASHINGTON, July 11 (AP)—Two farm state congressmen proposed today that motorists be required to burn up surplus grain in their gas tanks.

Sen. Earl Muntz, R., S.D., and Sen. William P. Hall, D., introduced their bill today. It would eliminate the government's 1.7 billion bushels of surplus grain and, within 14 months and add no more than three cents a gallon to the cost of gasoline.

They said in a joint statement that motorists would benefit because low-grade gasoline would be converted into "smoother-burning, powerful, high-grade extra mileage motor fuel."

The Jensen-Kuntz bill would prohibit sale of gasoline or motor fuel unless it contained at least five per cent by volume of alcohol manufactured from grain.

To enforce compliance, it would levy an additional tax of five cents a gallon on production or importation of present types of fuel.

They said their bill is fair because the advent of gas-consuming motor vehicles and tractors eliminated the horses and mules which used to consume the now-surplus grain. The bill would waive the tax once the grain surplus is eliminated.

Muntz and Jensen said that "agro-alcohol" made from corn—has been mixed in motor fuels in many other countries for many years.

"One of those nations requires by law the use of 25 per cent agro-alcohol in all their motor fuels in order to keep their farm crops in normal supply," they added.

Government May Switch Squadron

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 11 (AP)—Air Force Secretary Donald Quarles said last night that government officials are considering switching to an air defense squadron from Minneapolis—Wold—Chamberlain field—where two air force units are based.

But even if congress agrees to establish a new base, it would take at least two years to build. A site could be selected and facilities built to accommodate it, he said.

Quarles said the air defense group at Wold-Chamberlain and then spoke at an air defense crew appreciation by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Stations to Quit "Rock and Roll"

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 11 (AP)—Radio station WMIN, St. Paul, today announced it will discontinue "rock and roll" programming of "rock and roll and rhythm and blues" records.

Station officials said this policy had been set up in view of "the recent outside-agency recommendations with this type of music."

Police recently were called out to investigate the beginning of a riot at the St. Paul auditorium where a rock and roll dance was reported to be getting out of hand.

Youth, Horses Die In Lightning Bolt

DRILON, Mont., July 11 (AP)—A Missouri youth and three horses were killed and a rancher stunned yesterday when lightning struck in their midst on a ranch about 60 miles west of here.

Clarence Cunningham, 19, Princeton, Mo., the victim, was vacationing on the Cary ranch near the Idaho-Montana border.

Sheriff John McDonald said Cunningham and Ralph Quigley, about 55, were transporting stock salt to a summer range when the bolt struck. One of the horses fell at top Quigley, who recovered, worked himself free and walked to a ranch house three miles away.

Faces Charges

GLASGOW, Scotland, July 11 (AP)—Eugene Mac Rae, a porter at a Glasgow Women's hospital, today faced embezzlement charges growing out of the discovery of the bodies of 35 stillborn babies in the hospital's lavatory.

He was accused of accepting money for burial of the stillborn babies which he then hid in the empty chests. Authorities said he collected about \$25 last year.
