Midwest Crop Damage Noted In Hail Storms

Violent hail storms hit midwest farmlands last night, killing livestock and destroying crops. Iowa and Wisconsin bore the brunt of the rain and hail, which also struck parts of North Dakota and Nebraska.
Winds and hailstorms as big as two inches in diameter caused damage estimated at \$50,000 to five private farms and a branch of a municipal airport.
The hail shattered windows of the airport and in autos parked nearby. Hail also sliced through canvas coverings.
One of the heaviest hail storms was heavy in the extreme northeast corner of Iowa. Partner east, Wisconsin, was ruined by the hail and rain. A small hail piling three inches deep on the ground wiped out his crops.
Rainfall in midwest areas was heavy, measuring up to four inches in northwestern Iowa.
Bloom, Ia., officials reported an undetermined number of hogs died under the barrage of ice.
Lightning was blamed for several fires that broke out in the farmland. A large barn north of Manning, Ia., was destroyed by a lightning bolt. In another place, Wis., police said several minor blazes were touched off by the lightning but no serious damage was reported.
The storm was accompanied by high velocity winds reaching 50 miles per hour at the Wausau airport, and 40 miles per hour at Council Bluffs, Ia. Power lines were battered down by the gusts in Des Moines.
Elsewhere, mercury readings were somewhat higher than the Great Lakes region east through the Ohio valley.
Scattered showers and thunderstorms were forecast for today from the Midwest across the Great Lakes through New England. Fair weather was expected for the lower Ohio valley east to the Atlantic coast.

French Raid Rebel Areas

ALGERS, July 12 (AP)—French soldiers swept through a 10-mile coastal district of western Algeria today in a new "cramping" operation to wipe out nationalist rebel forces.
Reports said 16 rebels were killed and three French soldiers were wounded when patrol teams cut across the land from Ain Khal to Houmeis, 55 to 65 miles west of Algiers.
Four persons were injured when two grenades exploded in Algiers last night. One was tossed into a cafe and the other shattered a store in the center of the city near the opera house.
French officials said three French sailors were killed and one was seriously injured when their armament was hijacked off a road into a ravine near Oran yesterday. They blamed the accident on a broken bridge.

Elko Man Chosen For Nevada Post

CARSON CITY, Nev., July 12 (AP)—Gov. Charles Russell appointed an Elko man yesterday to fill the vacant post of the late Gov. A. Danaher in the office of state superintendent of public instruction.
The new appointee is 42-year-old Byron P. Stetler, Elko County school superintendent. Russell said Stetler did not apply for the \$9,000-a-year job but was unanimously recommended for it by representatives of the state education association and the state board of education.
Stetler is expected to file for election in the post shortly. His appointment is good only until the end of the year.

Probe Sought In Recording For U. S. Jury

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The Senate internal security subcommittee urged government agencies today to conduct a check-down on the Ford Foundation and the University of Chicago for eavesdropping on a federal jury.

The subcommittee made public a report on hearings in Twin Falls, Colo., into the tape-recording of jury sessions in five or six cases in the Wichita, Kan., federal court. The subcommittee sent a transcript of the hearings to the justice department to learn whether the University of Chicago research team which planned the recordings violated any law.

It also sent a copy to the internal revenue service to determine whether the Ford Foundation, which financed the study, violated the rules for tax-exempt foundations.

The subcommittee also called on the researchers to destroy all records of the jury deliberations.

A University of Chicago research team, which said it was studying how well jurors understand trial procedure and the judge's instructions, made the recordings secretly with the consent of the trial judge and the chief judge of the 10th judicial circuit.

Chief Judge Orrie Phillips later had a heavily edited version of the tapes played at a 10th-circuit conference in Estes Park, Colo., 4 years ago, and the story of the recordings leaked out. The senate last March passed a bill forbidding future eavesdropping on juries. The bill is now pending in the house judiciary committee.

The governor is answering up that issue in advance, for himself. From one of his campaign headquarters came a speech by Harriman.

against him. For example, "It was very interesting for me to observe the fine balance that Governor Harriman was able to maintain between helping the Soviet Union to help us win the war... while at the same time rigorously protecting the postwar interests of the United States."

Deane's speech warned that our wartime friendship with the Soviet Union was a fragile thing, born of expediency, and it was almost certain to collapse once the war was won.

There's a touch of complaint against wartime policies in one passage: "Had the British and our own government held out with the same degree of firmness that Harriman did, Poland might not be behind the Iron Curtain today."

That is a grave charge, but Deane's top tribute to Harriman—and it would sound mighty good in a presidential campaign—relates to the proposal of V. M. Molotov that there be a joint U.S.-Soviet Union command in Japan after the war was won.

"Well," said Deane, "that proposal was no sooner out of Molotov's lips than Harriman took him up one side and down the other and left him a burning crisp."

"If not for the firm position taken by Harriman at that time, if the question had been sent to Washington and became the subject of debate, we would have had the most confused position that we have suffered in Germany and Austria's words, now sponsored by

Harriman's campaign aides, seem to challenge somebody's judgment in Washington during wartime. But whether Deane suspected the state department—the White House—or the Pentagon of failing to understand the fundamentals of U.S.-Soviet Union relations is not clear.

Harriman was a top man at the controversial-Yalta conference. But the record of that conference as published so far does not produce anything which would challenge Deane's estimate of the ambassador's attitude toward the Russians.

It is a fact that he helped knock over a plan to give the Soviet Union a large postwar "dollar" vote. The Russians wanted \$6 billion at 2 1/2 per cent interest for 30 years.

Harriman's banker objected with some acid comments on Russian bargaining methods. And it is a fact that Harriman was the man who at the United Nations organization conference, held at San Francisco in 1945, warned against Russian designs and devices.

Harriman's campaign defenses against the soft-on-communism issue would be pretty good.

Disaster Seen For Crash in Strange Area

BOISE, July 12.—"A traffic accident anywhere is bad enough," says Ken Harizer, manager of the Idaho Motor Transport association, "but an accident away from home can be disastrous, not only because of the direct consequences—but because of the extra trouble in convenience and expense involved."

"A traffic accident can turn a vacation trip into a nightmare," Harizer declared, explaining that the Idaho trucking industry hopes to spare many drivers the pain of accidents through the "Vacation Driving" program.

"Self-insurance and a desire to hold extra expenses should be sufficient incentive to every driver to drive with care on his vacation," Harizer said. "Unless you are one of those who go to the same place every year, you will probably be driving part of the time in unfamiliar territory loaded with new hazards of the road that you must meet as you come to them."

Harizer warned against the dual hazards of attempting to drive too far and too fast which he characterized as the "two great sins" of vacation drivers into accidents than any other cause. He explained that exacting hours behind the wheel are tiring to the best of drivers and the resultant fatigue cuts down on the high degree of alertness which is required to drive safely.

Long hours behind the wheel are frequently coupled with high speed which, in itself, is tiring. Speed also worsens the consequences of an accident which may occur and it increases the time and space necessary to avoid emergencies beyond the capabilities of the average driver.

"Take it easy. Make the travel time an integral part of your vacation and enjoy it. Get there and back safely," he concluded.

End for Heavy Work for Red Women Stated

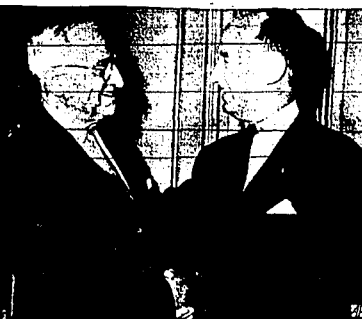



Fowls, Roasts Are Featured On Week-End

By The Associated Press
Turkeys and chuck roast will be the featured items at the meat counters of many of the nation's supermarkets and corner groceries this week-end.

Turkeys once were generally regarded as a special treat reserved for holidays and special occasions, but in recent years the birds have become a big sale item. The theory seems to be that the family can get one hot meal, then several cold meals from the "chicken."

Lower Prices Seen
Indications are that chuck may be featured in future months, too. The fanciest steaks and other choice cuts come from corn-fed-indeed cattle and farmers reportedly have cut their feeding operations because of rising corn costs and declining beef prices. Cattle fed solely on grass, however, will soon be abundant, prompting lower prices for the tougher, lower grades of beef.

Most meals, especially pork, will be featured in many areas this week-end. Pork and rib roasts will be up as much as 10 cents in some areas, while lamb and veal steaks will be generally higher, by two to six cents. Frying chickens also are on the increase, along with eggs in a few areas.

Vegetable Buys Listed.
At the produce tables, the outstanding buys appear to be cabbage; just about every variety of lettuce, squash, beans, green onions and carrots. Prices continue to show the most attractive price tags among the citrus fruits in many sections, although some pieces have lemons listed as bargains.

Generally, however, it's a case of the fruits and vegetables from nearby farms being the best buy for the housewife.

This is particularly true for corn and tomatoes, which are still relatively high and scarce except in some areas.

Carrots, snap beans, celery, cucumbers and zucchini also should be good buys this week.

Peaches, Melons High
Peaches and cantaloupes are still little buys generally, but cantaloupes are coming into markets in some sections, a reminder to housewives that it's time to make preparations for canning.

Most berries, which have short seasons, are pretty well finished except for a few areas where local crops still are available. On the other hand, more cherries should be coming to market.

Spud Prices Rising
Potatoes still are rising in price generally, which is bad news to the housewives and, incidentally, to the potato chip industry.

Potato chippers are caught between higher prices and lower supplies of spuds. Industry sources say, however, that more restaurants are serving chips rather than potatoes cooked in the premises, which means they should sell more chips.

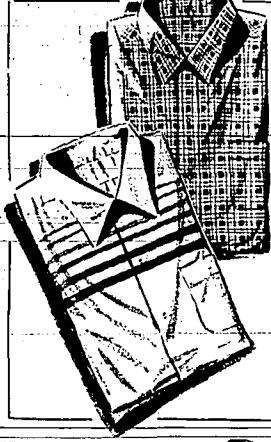

Polio Across U.S. Reaches 275 in Week

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The public health service said today that 275 new cases of polio were reported in the nation last week, sharply less than the 405 cases reported in the comparable week of 1934.

The new cases boosted this year's total so far to 2,931. At the same time last year the figure was 4,111.

At this time of the year, polio cases usually swing up sharply each week. But last week there were only 17 more cases than the week before.

Although the total number of polio cases is running considerably below last year, the mortality rate is still down slightly. There have been 1,528 cases so far this year compared to 1,852 at the same time last year.

Authorities said there is no way of measuring what effect bulk polio vaccinations are having on the country's rate. However, they feel certain inoculations will prevent several thousand cases.

The states reporting 10 or more new cases last week: Ohio 11, Indiana—10, Illinois—8, Mississippi—12, Louisiana—10, Oklahoma 10, Texas 10, and California 33.

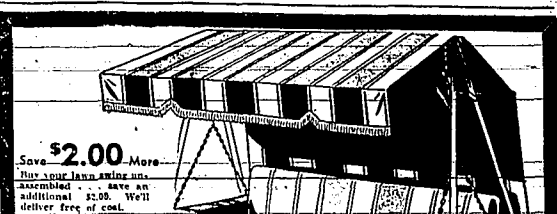

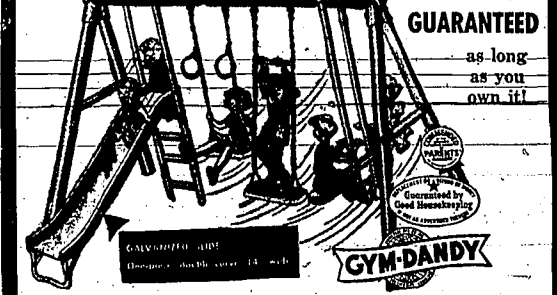

Tuna Picture Looms Better Than in Past

SAN-DIEGO, July 12—The tuna industry isn't hurting as badly as some reports say and there should be good news for inland and sand-wich devotees.

Prices are lower—both on what the fishermen catch and what the canner sells—but production in the United States continues to rise, and for the first time in five years there has been a surplus of fish. The amount of canned and frozen fish the Japanese sell in this market.

New money is coming into the industry too—much of it, surprisingly, coming in the form of locked Kansas City—to finance the building of new clipper.

Also, the canners haven't as yet begun to feel the competition from the U.S. gulf coast, and as far away as Pago Pago in American Samoa, the canner doesn't mean that fishermen and the canner are both happy. They aren't.

They're deeply in the Japanese trough. If it isn't higher this year than last, it isn't lower either. James H. Anderson, vice president of the California Tuna Packing, feels the leveling off of imports is due more to a change of heart by the Japanese.

Also, owners complain of higher operating costs. For one thing, insurance on the fishing clipper rose 25 percent after a series of fatal boat sinkings when the industry was in the doldrums a year or so ago and much of the fleet was idle for weeks at a time.

And the canners say that their August and April price slashes to meet foreign competition and the lower prices on undervalued brands give them their profit margins a shove too close for comfort.

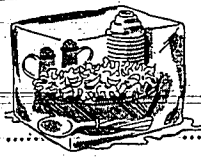

TOKYO, July 12 (AP)—Some 1,500 enlisted men of the U. S. first cavalry division in Japan will be transferred to Korea to fill vacancies in the seventh and 24th divisions, it was announced today.

An army announcement said the move was a "temporary measure." "It does not mean," the army said, "a general reduction in the strength of U. S. army forces in Japan, but rather a continuation of the rotation of army troops in the far east to meet personnel requirements."

The transfers, scheduled to take place here this month, will be mostly in the three lowest pay grades. They will be men who are without dependents in Japan and who have not previously served in Korea on their current duty tour in the far east.

"Temporary vacancies created in the first cavalry division are planned to be filled through normal replacement channels," the army said.

WHY WE CALL IT . . .

Idaho Falls

Editor's note: This is one in a series of articles on the origin of the names of places in Idaho and Utah.

The 400 residents of Eagle Rock to the newly formed state of Idaho were well-satisfied with their dusty little town as they promulgated to church one Sunday in March, 1890.

Little did they know that Denver financier H. J. Holmes would hit town on Monday with plans that would jettison their community.

Holmes quietly surveyed the town, the land and the Snake river as it churned past the town. He went back to Denver but returned April 25 with the Honorable Willis Emerland several other financiers to announce their plans for Eagle Rock.

May the group had formed the Idaho Falls Canal and Irrigation company and by November they had completed their first canal. One hitch remained. Holmes didn't like the name of the town.

"Eagle Rock" sounds like a desert," Holmes blustered. "I can't sell land with a name like that. Why don't you get a name that suggests water?"

The city council thought the idea a splendid one and petitioned the postoffice to change the title to Idaho Falls, partly in honor of the company that hoped to make it famous.

The change was made by the postoffice on Jan. 1, 1891, by the state legislature a few weeks later and by residents of the community who voted 64 to 2 for Idaho Falls.

On Aug. 26, 1891, the name became official.

"The Idaho Falls name actually was derived from the cataraacts on Snake river, where the waters rush—through—Burr's Rock canyon—dropping 55 feet in less than a mile. Today the falls remain but now they cascade over the retaining walls, built to channel flow of the stream—through the generators of the municipal power plant.
