House Groups Warned On High Dam in Canyon

WASHINGTON, July 13 (Special)—The house river committee was warned today that the proposed high dam canyon dam "are trying to sell you the Brooklyn bridge for a dime."

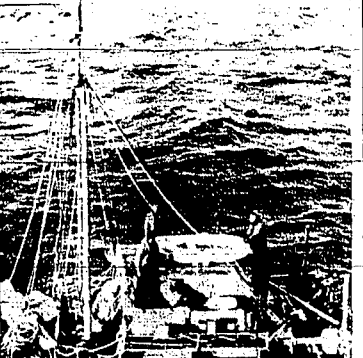

State Control of Water Draws Okay by Committee of Senate

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—The senate interior committee Thursday approved legislation which would reaffirm state control of water within its boundaries.

The bill by Senator Barrett, R., Wyo., would spell out the federal government's control of navigable and non-navigable streams. The committee also approved an amendment to the bill by Senator Neuberger, D., Ore., to provide for suspension of a license issued by the federal government when state water laws have not been complied with.

The bill would also require where construction has not advanced to the point where water has been impounded on intra-state, non-navigable streams.

Ike Selects 2 Critics For U. N. Delegates

GETTYSBURG, Pa., July 13 (AP)—President Eisenhower today nominated two frequent critics of his foreign policy, senate Republican leader William F. Knowland and Sen. Hubert Humphrey, D., Minn.—as U. S. representatives to the United Nations general assembly.

They were among five representatives and five alternates nominated to spend for the United States at the assembly commencing scheduled to open in New York about Nov. 12. All must be confirmed by the senate. The nominations were announced shortly after the president's signing of the legislation. President held a lengthy conference with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, other state department officials and other state department officials.

The potato market today was more than 100 cents higher than the "national" potato price in New York. The price in New York is almost at a point where a black market exists.

A Chicago trader today said a week ago wholesale prices were the highest in 40 years. In New York, a price of 105 cents was reported.

Idaho Schools to Get \$396,197 for Lunch Program

WASHINGTON, July 13 (Special)—Idaho will receive \$396,197 for school lunches during the coming school year under the national school lunch program of the federal government.

This amount is an increase over the \$318,000 that Idaho received last year. Under the law, Idaho must match each dollar of federal aid with \$2.42.

The law requires that if a state's per capita income is above the national average, it must match each dollar of aid with three of its own. The national per capita income is \$1,770. Idaho has a per capita income of \$1,433.

The department of agriculture says that it will supervise 48,000,000 meals during the year. This represents an increase of \$10,700,000 over last year.

Dulles, Now Neutral About Neutrality, Changes Story on "Immoral" Neutrals

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—After a month of confusion Secretary of State Dulles has become neutral about neutrality with the same ease he usually shows when what he is saying now doesn't happen to sound like what he said before.

Early last month congress was growing about continuing American aid to neutrals. India is the world's biggest neutral. If this country can't win India as an ally, the last thing it wants is India as a Russian ally.

President Eisenhower, as if to soothe congress, strode into his June 6 news conference and, speaking without notes, began defending neutrals.

He went on to suggest that if a nation joins a military alliance and is then attacked, other countries may say it got what was coming to it. This was startling. This country had spent time and money trying to win military allies.

It wasn't hard to imagine the effect on those Asian countries which had allied themselves with the United States while India remained aloof. It wasn't long before the White House put out a statement explaining that what Eisenhower meant to say was that some nations are justified in being neu-

tral but they'd be safer as American allies.

Vice President Nixon defended a nation's right to be neutral in a speech the next night. He said "we must deal with neutrals as moral and spiritual equals."

Dulles said just the opposite in a June 9 speech, thus compounding the confusion begun by Eisenhower. Dulles said neutrality is "immoral and unethical."

—This raised a question—just what is America's view toward neutrals? until answered late in June when Nixon set off on an Asian tour which did not include India.

In Manila on July 3 he said the United States can understand nations which remain neutral because they have internal problems. But it has no sympathy, Nixon said, "with countries which make a moral distinction between the communist world and the free world."

In this speech, less tolerant than the one he gave in June, Nixon made no mention of India. But India's prime minister Nehru apparently thought Nixon was aiming at him. He must have already been burned up at Dulles.

In a July 3 news conference, he said the views of Nixon and Dulles

WHY WE CALL IT... Wasatch

The word Wasatch is used frequently in Utah. It apparently was given first to the range of mountains—that stretches north and south through the northern portion of the state.

But it has been given, too, to a two-way low, 11,400 ft. high, that has been practically no neutral in the world.

The word Wasatch comes from the Ute Indian word Wa-Wa and means a mountain pass or a low pass over a high range.

It apparently was applied first to the mountain range by Capt. John Fremont, the explorer who visited the area in 1842 and 1843.

In his journals, written in 1842, he spelled the name Wa-watch but it later was shortened by eliminating the "h" and the hyphen.

The Wasatch mountain range stretches along the eastern edge of Utah's great basin. In most of its length it forms the divide between the Colorado river and the basin which drains into Great Salt Lake.
