Potato prices in Twin Falls and the rest of the nation are at their highest level in 36 years, says Joe Marshall, Idaho potato king. Not since 1920, when farmers got a bumper crop, have they been this high.

Marshall listed at least three reasons for the high prices. Freezing in Florida and Alabama, short planting in California and other states, and exporting of tremendous quantities of potatoes to Canada, Spain, and the Scandinavian countries from California and Maine are the major reasons for the existing shortage, he said.

Local grocery store managers reported that wholesale prices on Idaho red potatoes are now up \$1 per hundred, within the last week and added that they are now paying the highest prices in memory for local potatoes, although California potatoes are even higher.

The Idaho market is tight. Local farmers are selling their potatoes at a profit of 10 to 15 cents a pound for Idaho reds to 12 cents a pound for Idaho whites, generally.

Local retailers are generally agreed that the price will start dropping in a few weeks, though Golden-Muir, produce manager at Albertson's, predicted that potatoes will stay up for quite a while.

Jack Carson, manager of the Idaho potato market, said California producers are taking advantage of the present shortage. He added that their advantage will be shorted.

The fall crop, by far the largest of all varieties, is being grown on total acreage only 4 of 1 per cent more than the year before. This crop may be a little later than normal, but it is expected that some plantings were delayed by a late spring.

\$35,835 Case Is Filed Over Fatal Mishap

SHOSHONE, July 14.—A damage suit for \$35,835 has been filed in court here by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Johnson, Richfield, against Glen Stephenson, Accusis, and Fred Wright, Minidoka, as result of an auto accident last April 8 which killed the Johnson daughter, Jean.

Stephenson was driver and Wright was owner of the car.

Sturphy and Schwartz, legal firm, Shoshone, are handling the case for Mr. and Mrs. Johnson. The court plaintiffs ask \$25,000 general damages, \$10,000 punitive damages and \$835 for special damages, in addition to court costs.

The complaint alleges Stephenson was driving in a reckless manner at high speed and did not maintain proper control of the car, was heedless of danger and had consumed intoxicating beverages which impaired his ability to drive.

The accident occurred on highway number 12, about 13 miles north of Shoshone. The 1926 Oldsmobile two-door sedan carried eight people when it left the road.

One of the other passengers lost an eye in the accident.

Stephenson was exonerated of blame shortly after the accident by a coroner's jury.

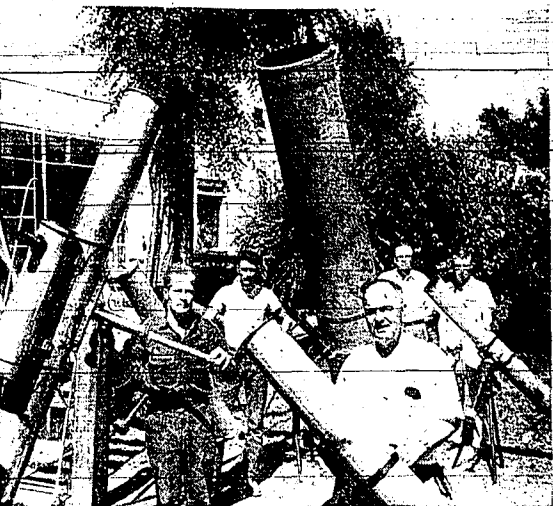

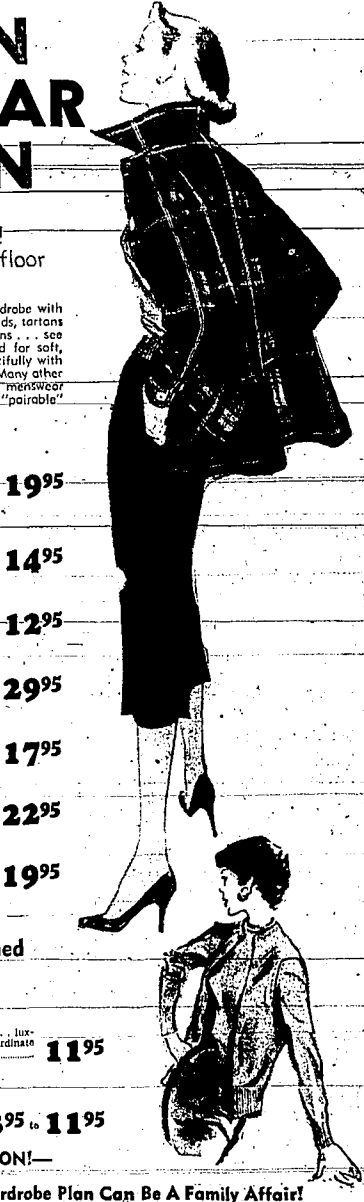

Gov. Robert F. Smyth said today the state would participate in the alert to the maximum practicable extent.

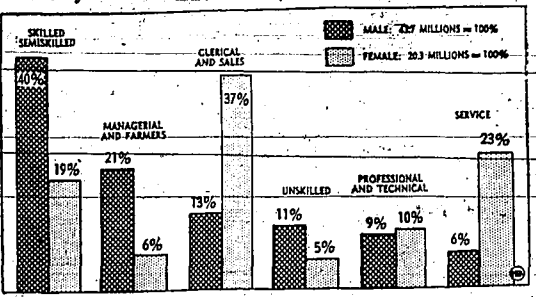
Smyth said a hypothetical state of emergency probably will be declared, including simulated mobilization of the army and air national guard.

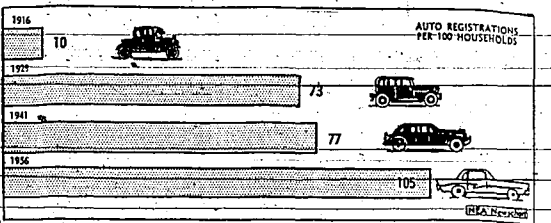

WASHINGTON, July 14.—West Coast farmers are seeking to import Filipino and Japanese farm laborers to work at lower rates than protected Mexican workers, a U.S. Trade Mission committee said today.

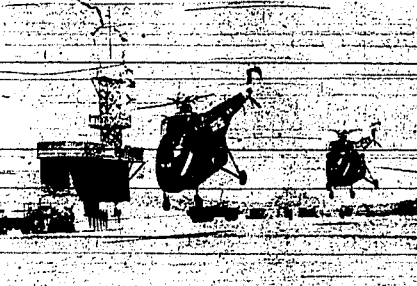

Signs found near one of the burning crosses had indicated resentment over the supreme court decision against racial segregation in schools.

Negotiations for a truce of alliance with France were broken off Friday by a Tunisian declaration.

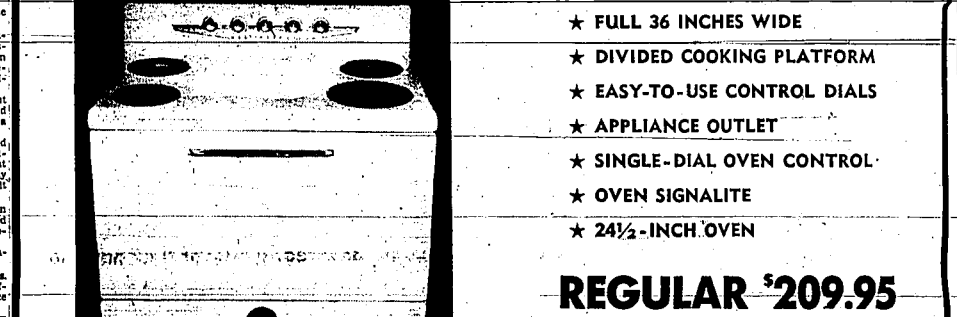
The action followed a statement by French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau that French forces intend to "remain in Tunisia and Morocco to seal off help for Algerian rebels."

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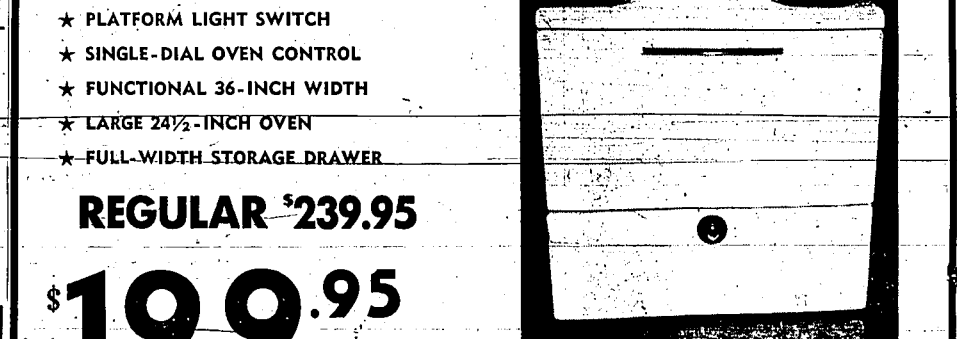


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Opposing Views on Hells Canyon Bill Presented by Idaho Representatives

WASHINGTON, July 14—(AP)—Two members of the House put on the Hells Canyon issue here today.

Scene of their efforts was the committee, which held several hours of hearings Friday on the Hells Canyon bill.

The committee will continue its hearings next week. Mrs. Grace Pfoot, a Democrat representing the northern part of Idaho, went on first. Her stint lasted for almost an hour and a half. She was followed by Rep. Hester, a Republican from the southern part of Idaho. He took an hour.

One veteran committee member, Clarence Brown, told the rather emotional Mrs. Pfoot at one point that if you stay on dams and steel off laces you'll get along better.

Later he amended his comment to Mrs. Pfoot to also "stay off cathedrals."

She had gotten rather bogged down in an attempt to explain just what her advantages—the Idaho Power company is expecting from the federal government to cover costs of building its three dams at the site.

At another point, Brown told her, "you're more of an optimist than I if you think congress will pass this bill between now and next Saturday when it may adjourn."

Brown said he'd read about a "deal" having been made in the interior committee between Speaker Sam Rayburn and Rep. Edgar Chevrolet, R. Colo., to let the bill be reported to the floor. This was done very recently and he asked her, "don't you think the committee will allow in acting (so near the end of the session)?"

She replied quite frankly, "Yes, I could hardly tell."

A bit of lightness was introduced in the hearing by one committee member, Rep. James W. Trimble, D. Ark. said he enjoyed hearing testimony from a member of congress who was born just over the hill from him back in Arkansas.

Mr. Trimble said she has a high regard for the folks back home.

Trimble responded, "That's what I was fishing for."

During Mrs. Pfoot's testimony a Democratic committee member squared away with Mrs. Pfoot.

Rep. Ray J. Madden, D. Ind. said the granting of the license to the Idaho Power company by the federal power commission was a "windfall." He said it was a "giveaway" of natural resources of this country.

Brown corrected Madden by saying it was "an alleged giveaway."

Madden firmly replied, "It was a malicious giveaway."

Rep. Hamilton Elsworth, R. Ore. also a committee member, told Mrs. Pfoot that the high dam would mean a difference of only two and a half inches in flood protection. He added that the proposed Libby (western Montana) and Kootenai dams (eastern Washington) would have more storage capacity (and thus furnish more flood protection) than the high dam at Hells canyon.

Both Libby and Kootenai would be built with T.E. dams.

Budge followed Mrs. Pfoot. He opened with this remark, "I hope the committee is not like the swamp on old South. The more light that is shined in his eyes the blinder he gets."

Then he made these points:

1. "The thing that disturbs all of us is the dam is that the supreme court has said federal rights (on the States) take precedent over state rights. Our people cannot exist without putting that water (which would be trapped in the dam) on the land."

2. "Once control of the river is taken over by the federal government, then my potatoes (in eastern Idaho) will be sold to the feds."

3. Earnestly, "That water is the very life blood of our state. We fear for our very existence."

4. By contrast with the high dam, the Idaho Power company must not violate state water rights.

5. The high dam is not a reclamation project and should be built at all by the army engineers.

6. There will be five million acres of additional irrigated land in Idaho eventually—much of it developed by pumping from underground streams. New land is coming in at the rate of 50,000 to 60,000 acres annually. All future growth would be stopped by the dam.

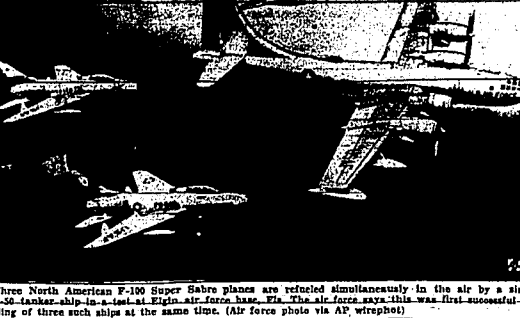

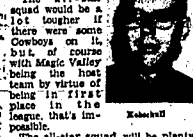

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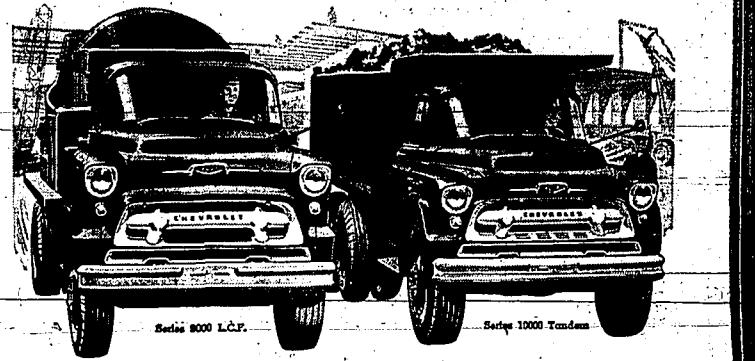

Red Leaders in East Europe Pledge Reform for Workers

VIENNA, Austria, July 14 (AP)—The June 28 bread-and-freedom uprising of Polish workers in Poznan, communist rulers in eastern Europe are promising reforms to their protesting workers and students.

But collecting on these promises may prove difficult—depending on Moscow's reaction and how far the Polish government goes in adjusting what it has admitted are "justified grievances" of Polish workers.

Poland announced Friday night that the nation's economic planning chief, Eugeniusz Bryg, had been relieved of that post and assigned to be minister of building. Stefan Jedychowski, deputy premier, was appointed economic planner.

The shift and the shakeup last Sunday in the Polish ministries of automobile production and machine industry seemed to stem directly from the Poznan upheaval and government efforts to appease the workers and forestall future trouble.

The communist regime in Warsaw also has acknowledged that "certain economic problems" facing the population of Poznan "could be blamed for the rioting. One major economic problem in Poland is inflation.

Other frank acknowledgments of labor unrest have come from Hungary and East Germany. Czechoslovakia has acknowledged student unrest and other dissatisfaction. News from Romania, Bulgaria and Greece, but even there the Communist press has com-

But the leaders and their states would "stand firmly, calmly, intelligently and with determined resolve" to protect states rights.

They spoke out less than a month before the opening of the Democratic national convention in Chicago Aug. 13.

Activity Reported

Meaning the three most active candidates for the presidential nomination at that convention carried their activities into widely scattered parts of the nation, and President Eisenhower assured the Republican nomination a week later, prepared to return to the White House from Gettysburg, Pa., early this week.

Eisenhower, firmly back in the race for a second term, talked politics and foreign affairs with Vice President Nixon in Gettysburg.

Nixon, without giving any details, said he and Eisenhower had discussed campaign plans but "we did not discuss my possible candidacy." Nixon nevertheless remained available for, and apparently assumed, a second spot on the Republican ticket.

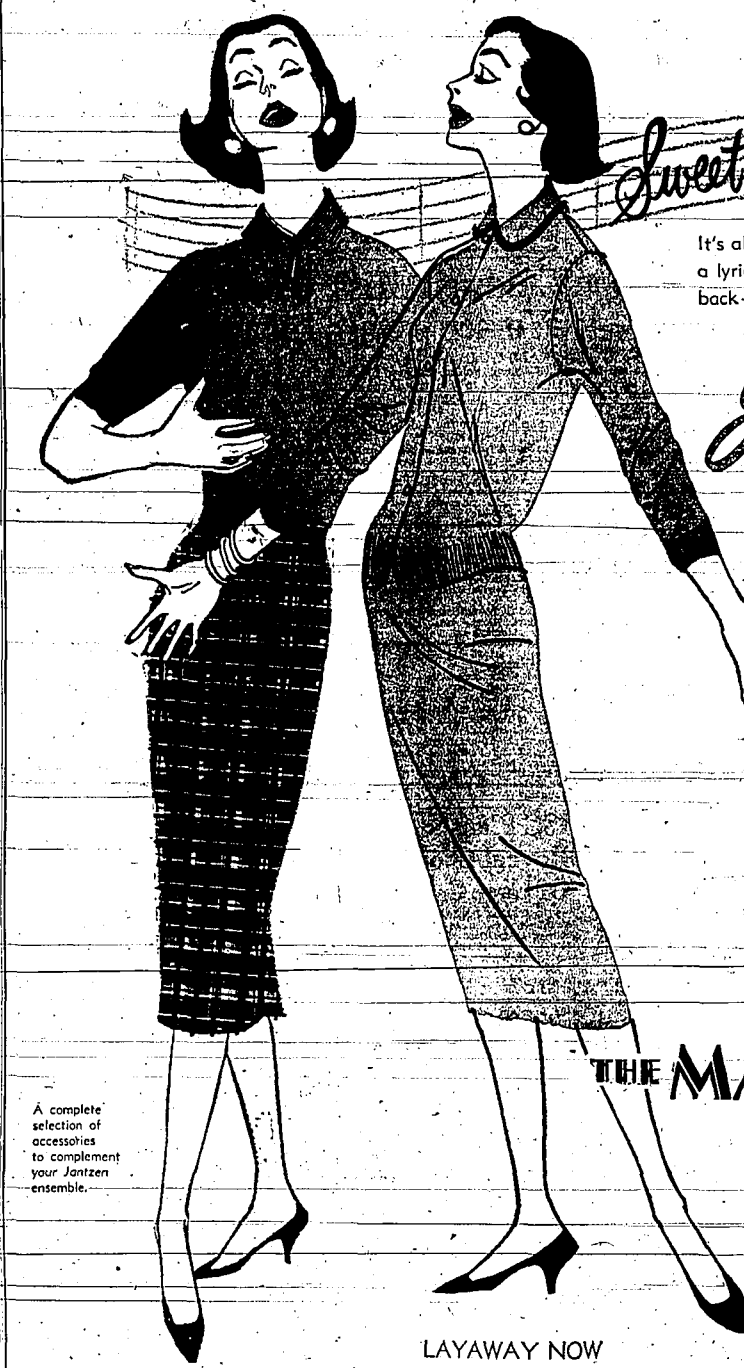

Twin Falls Man Finds He's Wrapped Up in Tape but It Isn't Red in Color

Hobbies, usually started as a means of recreation, sometimes get a little out of hand. Alvin Froehnow, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Froehnow, Twin Falls, has a growing hobby which, up to the present time, represents about \$1,300. The tape recording bug nipped him in 1950 and has been biting deeper each day.

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U. S. Blasted By Japan on Island Setup

TOKYO, July 14 (AP)—The United States occupation of Okinawa and the Bonin Islands is causing a growth of anti-American sentiment in Japan which has spread from the present to the past and into the future, according to government officials here.

Most observers are convinced that the cooperative government that has been formed in recent elections because of its failure to elect the U. S. occupation program.

Spurred by the election setback, the attitude of the people and public attacks by the press, the government has indicated it will adopt a tougher stand against the U. S. occupational government in the Ryukyu Islands.

Anti-American elements compare the United States occupation of Okinawa with the Russian occupation of the Kuriles and Sakhalin in the north.

The Japanese press has frequently denounced the occupation as "colonialism" and "American imperialism."

Landowners dispossessed by the occupation and the establishment of military bases complain constantly about their separation from the soil for which they have paid a heavy financial attachment.

The anti-American sentiment developed to a degree that Gen. Douglas MacArthur, U. S. deputy commander of the Ryukyu Islands, hurried to the islands recently to try to win their confidence by his "far east" commander Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer. The conference was held in the center of the Okinawa land controversy.

The United States got Okinawa and the Bonin Islands and the Ryukyu Islands (including two Jima) under the 1951 San Francisco peace treaty. It gave the United States the right to exercise all and any powers of administration, legislation, and jurisdiction over the territory and the inhabitants of the islands.

Washington has repeatedly refused to accept a request for a lower U. S. flag on the islands. The U. S. congress recently authorized 12,000 acres of Okinawan land.

Magic Valley Tours One Trip Provides Fishing, Sights And Stop at Nature's Refrigerator

When a source of production is combined with a place for recreation, who's to challenge the visitor? Such is Magic reservoir. Without it there would be thousands of acres of waste lands, practically no crops and few inhabitants in Lincoln county. With the reservoir's 191,500 acre feet of water storage, Magic guarantees enough water for crop irrigation while providing a fisherman's heaven for a fisherman.

On June 18 this year a Bobolink caught a 43-pound rainbow trout. The largest fish ever taken from the reservoir weighed 13 pounds. Mrs. Merle Butler, Rhoads, also in June, caught one seven-pound and one five-pound trout on the same day.

On the opening day of the fishing season this year there were 122 boats on the reservoir, not including those on the north end. Barry and Mrs. J. W. Berry, also in June, caught one seven-pound and one five-pound trout on the same day.

On June 23 there were 50 boats on the reservoir and many weeks later there are between 25 and 50 boats on the water at the same time.

To compensate for this demand, the state fish and game department constantly replenishes the supply of fish. This spring 250,000 rainbow trout, 200,000 of them fingerlings and 50,000 legal size, were planted in the reservoir.

At Magic reservoir, boating and fishing, as a rule, take a backseat to no attraction. But one day about two years ago the show was on shore.

Boating and fishing enthusiasts went chatting on shore when an intruder ambled over the hill. He was a big brown bear.

The bear seemed satisfied to gaze from the hillside about 200 feet from the group, but didn't stay long. When an approaching boat roared its engine, he slipped over the hill.

Surrounding the reservoir are four resorts. Hot Springs landing on the north and Wilson's and Magic Lake resort on the west side, all have stores, lunch service, self fishing tackle and supplies and have from 9 to 12 cabins each for rent.

To get to Magic City, traveling on U. S. 93 north from Shoshone, go about 20 miles north of Shoshone and turn west four miles south of Timmerman hill.

The Hot Springs landing may be reached by turning off U. S. 93 just north of Timmerman hill. Look for a sign just south of the Big Wood river bridge over U. S. 93. You will take you west to Wilson's and Magic Lake resort. Signs mark all routes from the main road.

Major tributaries to Magic reservoir are Big Wood river and Colman creek and Rock creek.

Overlook from Magic is a word used frequently some years, this year being an example. There is overlook from the reservoir on heavy runoff years, sometimes to control flood even before there is any threat of such. The overlook runs into the Big Wood river channel and then to Snake river.

Caretakers at the reservoir, Mr. and Mrs. Willis Walton, remain on duty all year. Walton regulates the discharge from the reservoir and does general maintenance work there.

In going to Magic Reservoir, there are attractions en route worth seeing. About a half mile north of the Ice Caves store, to the west, is a diversion dam and at the highway crossing over Big Wood channel there is a deep gorge—the narrowest in the area. How many underground caverns are there? No one knows and probably never will know. How many persons in years gone by have disappeared in the trackless wilderness?

The number is anyone's guess. And there are plenty of stories about the caves being used as robbers' roots and places for hiding "ill gotten gains."

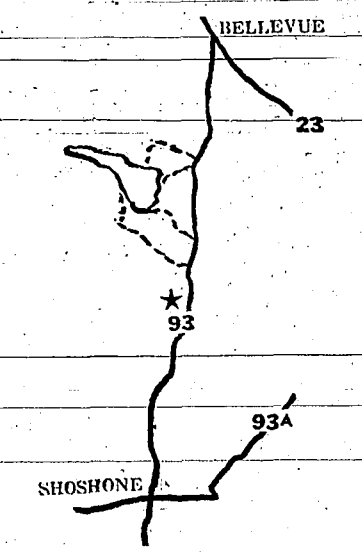

FRANKFURT, Germany, July 14 (AP)—A committee of Americans headed by an army officer from Michigan is about today to help the citizens of Frankfurt rebuild their historic opera house, smashed by allied bombers during World War II.

The tragic march took place on a national debate as to whether the combat training methods of the proud and combat-proven marine corps have become too rigorous. Gen. Randolph McCall Pale, the marine corps commander, stopped forthrightly into the controversy and said:

"The marine corps system of recruit training has been drawn into question in a very real sense the marine corps is on trial for the tragedy of Ribicon creek just as surely as is Sergeant McKee."

The 31 building permits authorized June construction here valued at \$111,876 was 41.2 per cent lower than June, 1933, according to figures compiled by the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company.

Figures for the first six months of this year, however, show that construction valued at \$1,034,253 is 49 per cent above last year.

Included in the June totals were eight new dwelling units valued at \$90,000, nonresidential construction valued at \$15,000 and alterations and repairs valued at \$5,873.

The figures for the first six months of 1934 include 75 new residential units valued at \$618,000, or 22.8 per cent below last year.

June permits issued in eight major cities throughout the state were 14.8 per cent below June, 1933, while construction for the first six months is up nearly 8 per cent.

WASHINGTON, July 14 (AP)—The army corps of engineers announced today that its civil works program for the fiscal year which began July will include three for Idaho.
