Pickets Out in Front of Scott's Cafe

Pickets began parading in front of Scott's cafe, 157 Main street here, Tuesday shortly before the noon rush hour in protest of firing two employees and because of the alleged refusal of the cafe owners to negotiate with the union. Picketing began less than two hours after Len Loring, representative for a change of disturbing the peace in the restaurant on Saturday. Loring and seven women, wearing placards and carrying signs, started picketing at 11:50 a. m. He had threatened Saturday to have the pickets in front of the cafe by Monday. Picketing of the restaurant was carried out peacefully with women walking in a semi-circle in front of the building. Customers continued to enter the cafe and diner Bennett, co-owner of the cafe, said he had not noticed any dropping off of customers. Loring issued the strike threat to being arrested for causing a disturbance in the cafe at 4:50 p. m. Saturday. At that time he entered the restaurant with Dolores Gray and a group of about eight men. Bennett, who had called the police, was arrested by officers who "demanded to know why the pickets were there." Bennett then allegedly went to about the cafe and ordered the pickets to be a picket line in front of the cafe and for them not to cross it. Bennett was taken to jail on \$75 bond. Loring was released after being ordered in the city jail on \$75 bond. Loring said the picketing was peaceful because no violence had been used. He declined to disclose the name of the other waitress who was fired. City police checked on the picketing activity before noon. Police Officer James C. Henson said that Loring was being obstructive to the cafe and to carry out activities.

BOISE, July 17 (AP)—The Idaho advertising commission approved yesterday a record high of \$208,000 for 1956 growing season and voted not to make it mandatory that No. 1 potatoes be stamped "grown in Idaho." The commission tentatively approved an additional \$58,307 budget for a research and education program to be carried out through the Idaho potato growers' association. The state said final approval would be withheld until the association presents a breakdown of proposed expenditures. The total budget for the advertising year ago was \$189,000. The increase this year reflects collections under a potato tax hike enacted by the 1955 legislature. The commission said \$162,250 would be spent to advertise early potatoes, \$137,915 for onions and the 75 cent late potato advertising program, which starts in October. Senator Goldwater, R. Ariz., accused Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler of "pressuring" party leaders in congress into signing a "six-gun technique" to get the bill out of committee.

Russia, West Germany Rift Is Broadened

Diplomatic relations between Soviet Russia and West Germany are in a very bad way.

There is even speculation in some European diplomatic quarters over the possibility of a break in relations.

That seems most unlikely. But it would not be surprising if the Kremlin declares open warfare soon on tough old West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

The recall last week-end of Valerian Zarin, the Soviet ambassador to West Germany, was a clear indication of the chilly relations has roused in Russia in the last few months.

The recall also was a tacit admission that the Soviet government blundered in sending Zarin to Bonn in the first place.

Adenauer went to Moscow last September to establish diplomatic relations between his government and Russia.

There was considerable anxiety at that time that the German ties with the western allies might be weakened seriously as the result.

It soon developed, however, that Adenauer consented to the establishment of relations only as a means of pursuing his own policy of the unification of Germany.

Russia got off on the wrong foot by sending Zarin to West Germany as its first ambassador.

The nomination was accepted only with reluctance and open resentment.

He started to visit West German officials, by passing the West German foreign office, and to attend all sorts of public gatherings from concert to beer drinking. He entertained lavishly.

All he succeeded in doing was to antagonize Adenauer. He was given freeze-out treatment.

Hence it was not a startling development when West German newspaper-Saturday and told him he was going back to Moscow to take up his post.

It would be his successor-if the Kremlin intends to name any successor to him.

An East German delegation arrived in Moscow yesterday to conduct important negotiations. This may be the Kremlin's first move in an anti-Adenauer campaign.

The committee would be directed to "make a thorough and complete study of the economic and military advantages of additional highway and rail transportation facilities connecting continental United States with central Alaska."

Two-Million Acre Soil Deposits Set

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—The agriculture department reports farmers have agreed to deposit nearly two million acres of surplus-producing crop land in the government acre soil bank.

The department said yesterday payments to farmers under these agreements will total more than 77 million dollars.

A total of 1.2 billion dollars was authorized by congress for the soil bank this year.

The "preliminary and incomplete" report of soil bank participation is the first issued since farmers began signing up late last month.

Acting Secretary of Agriculture Truman D. Morse said it indicates "widespread interest" in the program.
