Boy, 8, Passes Despite Rare Blood Supply

SALT LAKE CITY, July 18 (UP)—A police roundup which obtained a supply of rare type blood failed to save his life.

Eight-year-old Richard Oakson died at 11:18 a. m. Wednesday of multiple internal injuries received when he was trampled by a horse when he was trying to lead into a barn. The boy was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard J. Oakson, South Jordan.

He was leading the horse into a barn late yesterday, said Deputy Sheriff Elmer Leake, when the animal's hooves tangled a rope around the animal's hooves.

The frightened horse kicked out, knocking Richard to the ground, then trampled him.

At the hospital, doctors' rare immediate call for the boy's rare type A-negative blood, then found none of the other hospitals in town had any in stock.

Police officers armed with lists of type A-negative donors, quickly rounded up 50 volunteers at the hospital. They brought in blood as doctors operated on the boy.

Caution Given For New Type Of Sicknesses

NEW YORK, July 18 (AP)—All Americans ought to know that a well hidden neurotic disease is being increasingly common among them. It is "compensation neurosis." To insurance companies it is an insidious and elusive nuisance. But psychiatrists see it as an unconscious drive in grown men to return to the passive bias of their babyhood.

Insurance companies won't talk about it. Doctors talk about it, naturally. They're expected to cure it and once it gets going in an individual, it's a stumper.

The University of Texas school of medicine is the major scientific authority to talk about it. Speaking to physicians generally, it said the reason for the increase is obvious—"compensation" is more and more available.

It spots specifically of accidents in industry but the disease develops out of other accidents, particularly automobile accidents. Industries and motor vehicles are insured and so is the source of "compensation neurosis."

The patient with compensation neurosis genuinely believes that he is ill or disabled," said the authority. "He believes the existence of his ailment to be irrefragable and that it is a result of a major or minor accident which he has recovered on the job."

"If peace is maintained however, it looks as if Russia may come along every fast," Coon said. "I have a feeling though, that a difficult internal problem may arise through the new class of college trained young people, who in their demand for a higher standard of living may contribute to a weakening of the Communist party discipline."

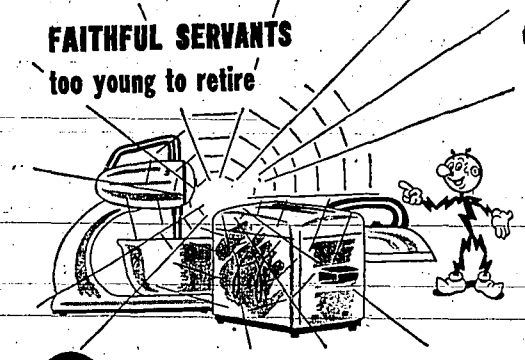

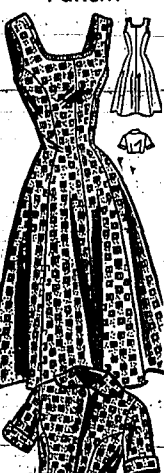

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

"We have two lovely children, a boy of five and a girl of three. Could you tell me what tests to give them so we can know about their degree of intelligence each has, and so we can know what to expect of them educationally?"

No tests are necessary in the present. Young children such as these are best left alone to develop at their own rate and according to their abilities. They need good, plain, nourishing food, sleep, recreation, affection and guidance; this last in the hands of the expert. Even then, the tests often have to be repeated.

Tests for such children, given with the view of early education, are material and likely to be misinterpreted. Children of this stage of growth develop rapidly. Their intelligence develops in step with their daily experiences and, since these change and multiply as the days pass, the tests help little. Education is the use of training based on them and likely to be a nuisance to the child and so of little value.

Eagerness on the part of parents to learn what ability can be hoped for in a child is almost like the use of wanting a roadbed to open rapidly into a full-blown flower. One cannot expect a gift that comes from the bush and unfurl its petals. Of course, the result was not what the real thing was. What she got was a distorted, mishapen caricature of the real thing.

That might happen to the child whose ambitious parents began testing and teaching on the basis of the test. Had the child walked, read and watered the roadbed the while, she could have had the perfect flower.

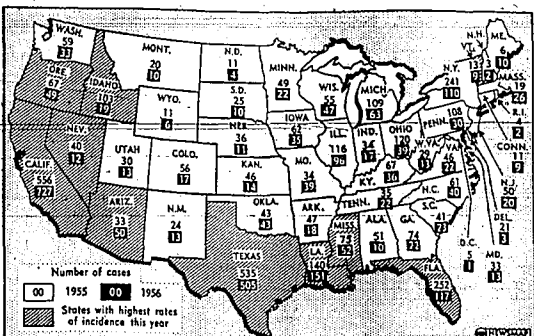

Man-Made Hazards Plaguing Hunters of Oil Under Ocean

NEW ORLEANS, July 18 (AP)—The seaaring oil hunter struggles to keep poling against man-made hazards that some call worse than the natural ones.

But the prize under the tides of the Gulf of Mexico and along the coast of California is too rich, the rate of discovery too much higher, the pay too good to let the quest for oil halt entirely, if that can be helped.

The man-made hazards are a steel strike that plucked eight pipe supplies to a trickle; squabbles between federal and state governments over who owns how much of the sub-sea merged lands; and even over where the coast line actually is; discussions between the governor and the oil companies on how much more land shall be leased; for how much; how operations shall be regulated; and who gets how much tax money.

Supreme court direction, discuss terms on just where the state's territorial waters end and Uncle Sam's jurisdiction begins, and while California perfects its leasing plans, oil companies hunt for pipe to keep on with such drilling as they are now permitted.

Ex-Aide Says U. S. Lagging In Arms Race

WASHINGTON, July 18.—Former air force Research Chief Trevor Gardner has warned that Russia may win the race to develop a 1,000-mile ballistic missile because of competition among the U. S. armed forces.

He also said Russia may have developed tanker planes that would enable the Reds to deliver atomic or hydrogen bombs to the U. S. "heartland" now.

Gardner quit as assistant air force secretary for research and development last February because he didn't think the administration was devoting enough money and effort to that field.

His testimony before the senate airpower subcommittee, given last month and subjected to intense departmental censorship, was made public last night.

Gardner said Russia already may have a missile with a range of 700 to 800 miles. This country's current longest-range ballistic missile is the Redstone, which has a 200-mile range.

He said there is no question in his mind the Reds are ahead of this country in developing a 1,000-mile ballistic missile. This is the so-called intermediate range ballistic missile (IRBM), fired like a shell and capable of raining atomic destruction on distant targets at almost incredible speed.

"If the management structure doesn't slow it down we might get one about the same time they do," Gardner said, "but we can't do it by back-stabbing."

By this he presumably meant scattering the effort to develop the IRBM among various military branches, rather than concentrating it in one. He said the army, navy
