EMERGENCY PRESS HEADQUARTERS. Operation Alert, July 20 (AP)—The biggest civil defense drill in the United States began today at 11:05 a. m. It was the third annual Operation Alert, a war most based on government experiments and agencies scattering for over a year in Washington. The test was under way at 11:05 with the announcement from emergency press headquarters at a secret location more than 100 miles from Washington.

A simulated surprise attack was launched against the United States at 11:05 a. m. today—well—simulated more than 100 miles from Washington and Puerto Rico as the initial phase of a nationwide civil defense exercise.

Two Dead as Auto Crashes Into Rocks Along Road's Edge

SHOSHONE, July 20 (AP)—Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kreonis, Seattle, were killed instantly when their 1952 Mercury Buick crashed into rocks on the road shortly before noon Thursday eight miles east of Richford on highway 33A. 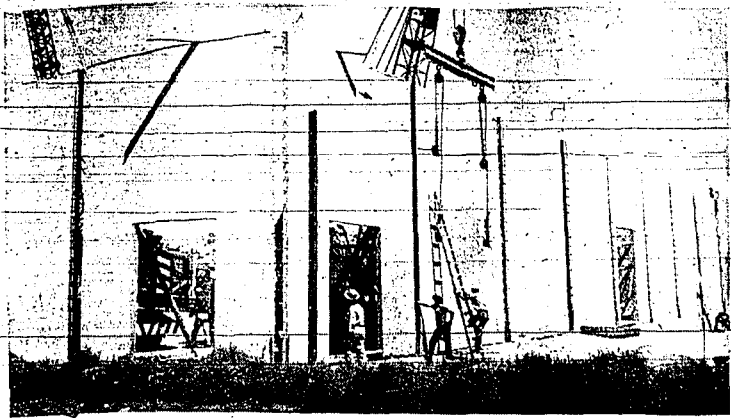

Concrete Walls Put in Place for Warehouse



Workers Friday completed the erection of the reinforced concrete walls at the new Green Giant warehouse in Buhl. Having the six-foot thick wall in sections 25 feet high and 20 feet wide, they finished the remaining job in three days. The structure will measure 280 by 181 feet on the exterior and will have 32,000 square feet of floor space. Completion date for the building is Aug. 21. Walls Erected for Storage Warehouse Of Green Giant Canning Firm at Buhl

BUHL, July 20—Walls were erected this week for the 32,000 square foot Green Giant storage warehouse, which will be capable of storing 100,000 bushels of peas or corn, by the Reynolds and Walker Construction Company, Twin Falls.

The floor for the \$145,000 warehouse was laid last month, and the walls, completed Friday, were raised three days in large sections of reinforced concrete. The sections, measuring 25 feet by 20 feet and 20 inches thick, were put into place with a 30-ton crane. A 12-ton crane was used for supplementary work on the structure.

The average weight of each of the 40 wall sections is 18 tons, reported the Howard B. Reynolds, whose construction company is handling the job. "The outside dimensions of the walls are 20 feet by 18 feet," he said. "The new warehouse is expected to be completed by Aug. 21, and will replace several semi-covered piles for storage. Reynolds anticipates no trouble in meeting the completion date, saying that his firm is presently ahead of schedule on the

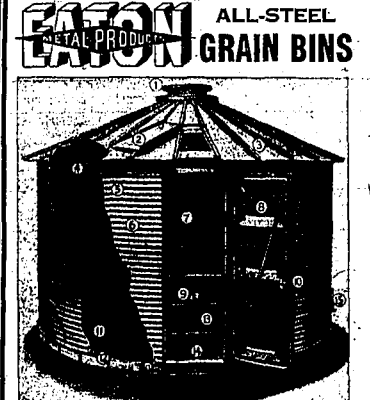

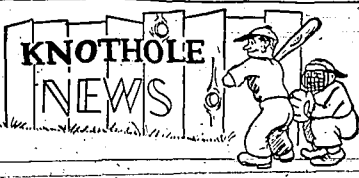

The baby weighed three pounds and the seven-month infant "has as good a chance as any premature baby," doctors said.

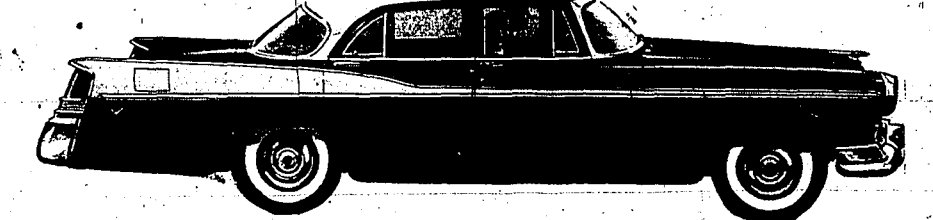

Nagy Predicts Red-Hungary Chief's Ouster

BERNE, Switzerland, July 20.—Eotved Hungarian Premier Gyorgy Nagy said today that Hungary's Communist government will soon "collapse" and will soon "follow his ousted predecessor into oblivion."

Nagy, first postwar premier of the Hungarian republic, was deposed in the 1947 Communist coup engineered by Matyas Rakosi. The Hungarian Communist "strongman" suffered a similar fate this week.

Nagy said that new party chief Imre Nagy "will not be able to make his sympathy for the old revolutionary type of Communism and will fall very soon."

Cseres was named secretary general of the Hungarian Communist party Wednesday in the biggest party shakeup since the 1947 coup.

He took over from Rakosi who resigned the "strongman" post with a justification of "grave mistakes in the handling of the personality and the influence of socialist law."

Nagy's resignation did not surprise me, it was in an exclusive interview with United Press.

He was expecting his downfall any day.

"But it is a great satisfaction for me to hear about his resignation there in Switzerland, the same country in which I was spending a vacation when he carried off the Communist army, and made it impossible for me to return to Hungary."

Nagy, premier of Hungary from 1945 to 1947, was on a private visit to Switzerland when the Communists took over his homeland.

He lives in Herndon, Va., and is on his way to Europe.

House Approves Safety Measure

WASHINGTON, July 20.—The House yesterday unanimously passed a bill that would require manufacturers to put safety releases in their products to prevent children from being trapped inside and suffocating.

The measure would give the Bureau of Standards 90 days to set appropriate requirements for such safety releases and would require manufacturers to adopt them by October 1. The bill was sent to the Senate for action.

Radar Asked

BAIT LAKE CITY, July 20.—Police Chief W. Glenn Skousen and Mayor Adlai P. Stewart said today they would ask the city commission for approval to spend \$2,700 for radar speed detection equipment.

Skousen said the equipment would be used to "encourage courtesy and safety on the streets."

A very high proportion of the accidents being produced is due to speeding.

Fear Soviets Will Pass Us In Air Stated

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Senator Byrd, D. Mo., said last night that unless there are "radical and sweeping changes" in defense policies he is convinced that eventually "the Soviets will pass us in the air."

And Byrd, chairman of a special senate subcommittee studying relations with the Soviet Union, repeated his contention that there are conflicts between sworn testimony of Secretary of Defense Wilson and top air force officers.

Earlier in the day, Byrd made public a letter from Wilson disputing this and stating that Wilson was positive that this country now is superior to Russia in air power and that the administration planned to stay ahead.

Wilson wrote Byrd that he had reviewed his sworn testimony and that of other witnesses before the senate group. He denied there are inconsistencies and stated the differences of opinions—not basic facts.

Wilson also reiterated that he did not propose to "impound" the extra \$200 million dollars in air force funds voted by the Democratic congress over his opposition.

Byrd's latest comments came after more than three hours of closed-door testimony by Gen. Nathan F. Twining, air force chief of staff, and two of his experts on their recent inspection by invitation of some Russian facilities.

Yank Given Death Penalty in Britain

LEEDS, England, July 20.—A British court sentenced an American citizen to death by hanging today for stabbing a British laborer to death during a cafe brawl.

The convicted American was A. Z. James C. Jordan, 20, Newark, N. J. He was convicted of the fatal stabbing of 27-year-old laborer Willie Belmont in a "cocktail" cafe at Hull on May 4.

Jordan is the first American serviceman to be found guilty of murder by a British civil court since 1951, when a British soldier was hanged for the murder of a British girl.

On July 31 she will officially leave the Atlantic fleet and subsequently will be inactivated and stripped. She has been in active service since her commissioning Dec. 8, 1917.

WHY WE CALL IT...

Lake Lowell

Editor's Note: This is one in a series of stories on the origin of the colorful, odd, and whimsical names of places and things in Idaho and Utah.

When it was built, in 1906-07, it was the largest artificial reservoir in the world. It is eight miles long and 2 1/2 miles wide and has a capacity of 190-150 acre-feet of water. When it is full it has a surface of 9,855 acres.

The name, Lake Lowell, was attached to the body of water in southwestern Idaho's Canyon county many years ago. But it was known officially as Deer Flank reservoir.

Then in 1915 E. J. Newell, then regional director of the bureau of reclamation, officially christened it Lake Lowell.

It honored E. S. Lowell, an Idaho irrigation pioneer who had travelled to Washington in 1902 to fight for reclamation projects. Since Lowell's death in 1944, millions of dollars of agricultural products have been raised from the 51,000 acres of land which get their life-giving water from Lake Lowell.

In addition, Lake Lowell has become the most popular recreation spot in the Nampa-Caldwell district and each week-end boaters, swimmers, picnickers and fishermen flock to the water.

Across the shoreline have been designated a wildlife refuge, an Idaho fish and game department, and a "Nevell said of Lowell, 'but time has proven them to be sound and workable.'"
