Idaho Bows Out of Civil Defense Test; Problems Reach Giant Proportions

No Inquest Scheduled For Accident Deaths

As Idaho bowed out of the theoretical attack on the nation in its second day it left Twin Falls county's civil defense director, Sheriff James H. Benham, with the problem of what to do with thousands of theoretical refugees which streamed across northern Idaho last Friday. The sheriff has been in more than 60 new camps and down into Twin Falls county to be issued to refugees, supplies to guard food, clothing and gasoline supplies in the county.

SHOSHONE, July 21—No inquest is planned in the traffic accident which killed a Seattle man and his wife and critically injured their son and daughter Friday on highway 93A eight miles east of Richfield, Lincoln county official reported Saturday.

Officials at St. Benedict's hospital, Jerome, Saturday described the condition of Mr. and Mrs. Rocens as "hopeless" and that of the daughter, Mrs. Zudonis, 26, as "slightly improved." Her condition Friday still was listed as critical.

The traffic death raised Magic Valley's total for 1956 to 24 and upped Lincoln county's to four for the year. Lincoln County Sheriff J. H. Benham said a truck driver, whose vehicle had passed on track 4, killed by Martin Titus.

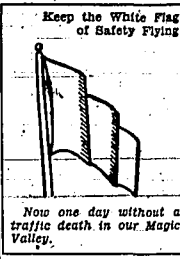

Kin of Vets Given Benefits

Four suggestions to aid survivors of deceased veterans in filing claims for death compensation and pension are offered by Arnold Heverge, local veterans administrator. If the veteran's death certificate does not contain cause of death, it should be accompanied by a certificate from the attending physician showing date of treatment and cause of death. Heverge said. A widow filing a claim must furnish the record of her marriage to the veteran. If she or the veteran were previously married, she should furnish copies of death or divorce certificates to show that these marriages were dissolved. If minor children are among the survivors, birth or baptismal records, including the names of both parents and date of birth, if adopted, a copy of the court order of adoption is needed, he said. Parents filing a claim must include a certified copy of the veteran's birth or baptismal certificate containing the names of both parents. Heverge said this evidence is required by the law governing compensation and pension payments.

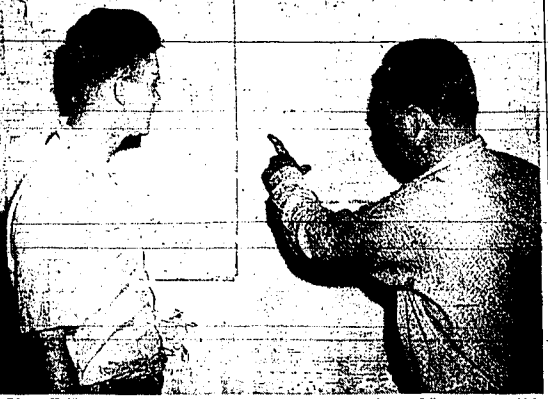

Executive of Life Magazine Declares Magic Valley Beats His Dakota Farm

"Magic Valley farmland beats my own property in the Red River valley of North Dakota, and that's the best portion of the whole state," says Edward K. Thompson, managing editor of Life Magazine.

Thompson and his son, Colin, stopped in Twin Falls Friday while on a three-week business and pleasure trip to visit relatives in Seattle and Montana. "I like to get away from the big city once or twice a year," he said, "and find out what non-New Yorkers are thinking about and doing."

He explained that although there is more rainfall on his farm land in North Dakota, irrigation in this area has put Magic Valley land far ahead of it. "Growth in this valley is far more lush," he said.

Thompson and his son have nearly two weeks to go on their trip "way" to return by then," he explained, "so that I can attend the Democratic national convention."

He said he attended both political conventions when possible, but had decided to bypass the Republican convention this year because "it looks like it won't be very exciting."

He added that the Democratic convention, in his opinion, won't be as spectacular as earlier events had indicated. "I have a hunch that Stevenson's claims of an early nomination are pretty valid," he said.

Emphasizing that he would attend the convention only as a spectator, Thompson explained that Life would have seven photographers and possibly more than that number of reporters there with a similar staff from his companion magazine, Time.

Now in his 30th year in journalism, Thompson began his career with a small country weekly. He soon worked his way up to the SHILOH JOURNAL, where he worked with Gene Gibbs, now publicity director for the University of Idaho, with whom he still corresponds.

He left the journal in 1937 to join Life, where he has remained since with the exception of three and one-half years in service in World War II. He has been managing editor for seven years.

The most interesting part of his job recently, he said, was negotiating with Ex-President Harry Truman for his memoirs. "My job isn't really very exciting," he said, "editors do everything second-hand."

Thompson drove from his home in Larchmont, N. Y., to Columbus, O., to pick up his son, who recently completed a four-week air force ROTC summer encampment at Lockbourne air force base. Colin will be a senior this fall at Yale University.

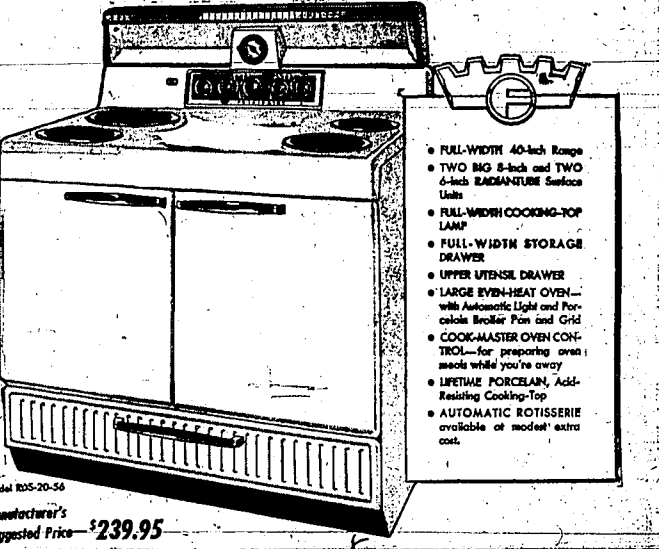

Russ Leaders Are Checking Restless Area

VENNA, Austria, July 21 (U. P.)—At least four top Kremlin leaders were touring Russia's restless east European satellite Saturday.

Their apparent aim was to try to lessen the effects of their de-stabilization campaign and to prevent repetition of the Roman work-ers' rebellion.

Soviet Premier Nikozi A. Bulganin and Defense Minister General Zhukov arrived by air in Warsaw. With them was Ukrainian Premier Leonid Brezhnev, a Soviet Central Committee ally of party boss Nikozi S. Khrushchev.

In Budapest was Soviet First Deputy Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan, alleged to be the man who this week chopped down Matyas Rakosi as Hungary's long-time party dictator.

A few hours after the announcement of Mikoyan's arrival, Budapest Radio said the Hungarian Communist party central committee sent a pledge of loyalty to Moscow. Mikoyan conferred with Kuroz Gero, who replaced Rakosi as first secretary of the party.

Arrive in Celebration
Bulgarian Zhukov and party arrived in Warsaw for the announced purpose of helping the Poles celebrate the anniversary of their 1945 "liberation day" Sunday. But the fact that Mikoyan was coming also from the other satellite states indicated a major conference was intended to survey satellite unrest and plan ways and means of preventing another revolt.

Speeches Sunday are expected to deal with the subject approximated in the minds of most Polish people. That is, what is going to happen after Poznan. Will there be promised reforms and an easing of controls or resort to harsh, Stalin-like crackdowns?

It was sent to the house floor by the rules committee under an agreement barring amendments stipulating that it will be referred to a committee pigeonhole rather than changed in conference with the senate.

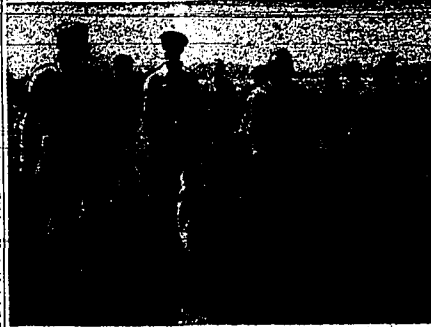
Representative Madden, D., Ind., proclaimed that this was "abominable legislation," saying: "We have to take this or nothing."

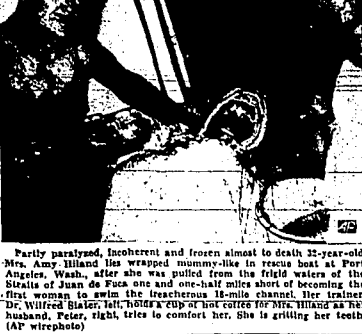

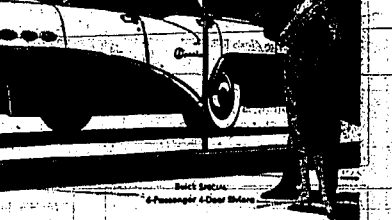

II. HIGHER SALARIES FOR TEACHERS—to help retain "the cream of the crop" for guidance and instruction and encourage gifted youth to enter the teaching profession.
III. ENCOURAGE HOME INDUSTRY—that our ambitious young people may longer enjoy the security of life and earnings compelled to "job hunt" in larger cities.
IV. STATE AID FOR THE BOYS FARM—a project for underprivileged and homeless boys, under way here in Idaho.
V. CANDIDATES FOR PROBATE JUDGE MUST BE MEMBERS OF THE LEGAL PROFESSION—Their legal training and experience will assist them to interpret and administer the laws as constituted.

Concerning the reorganization of the Youth Rehabilitation Act adopted by the last session of our Legislature, the following is recalled in recalling the following soul-stirring incident.
"Last year I had the opportunity to defend a boy charged with involuntary manslaughter who was the driver of an automobile that took part in a race, through his negligence, an accident occurred causing the death of a twelve child. The boy was found guilty of negligent homicide. The Court, in following the provisions of the Youth Rehabilitation Act, sentenced the boy to the State Industrial School at St. Anthony. If this boy was not criminally inclined, his associates with other boys of that nature, would undoubtedly tend to have an unfavorable effect on his outlook toward the future."
"When adopting the Youth Rehabilitation Act the Legislature failed to establish sufficient funds to provide for the needs of such workers who could supervise the activities of a minor in a situation such as this."
"I believe," Turner earnestly added, "there should be a line drawn between those criminally inclined, and others who through negligence or carelessness, commit a wrongful act. The Youth Rehabilitation Act should be reorganized and set up to recognize and deal with proper distinction between the two classes."
"Higher salaries for teachers—possibly a hackneyed phrase to you, but it is all one of the most controversial and important issues in the state."
"You are no doubt aware," reports Turner, "of the number of our best and brightest are continually accepting teaching positions in other states. The main reason being that Idaho's lower salaries prevent them from maintaining adequate standards of living for their families and standing in the community."
Records further prove that less than fifty per cent of Idaho's graduates from Idaho colleges accept positions in Idaho. It is therefore obvious that such means must be devised by which their wage scale can be raised.
Encouragement of home industry—it is a well-known fact that the great Northwest, because of its water power, is potentially one of the industrial centers of the nation. The farm, consisting of four sections of land near Rupert, set aside by the Federal Government, is the largest of its kind in the Northwest. The Boys Farm idea, operating in a similar manner to that of Father Flanagan's Boys Town, was initiated by a group of public-spirited citizens throughout the surrounding area.
Developments thus far on the project have been advanced through contributions and donations from individuals and organizations. It is expected in a few years that the "Farm" will become self-sufficient. "If it can be shown that such a project can maintain itself once it becomes established, I would be in favor of state aid in the initiation and maintenance of such a project," stated Turner in his radio broadcast of June 6.
"My platform as stated is only a brief outline of the many and varied ways I shall strive to serve you should I be elected to represent you in the State Legislature. I am confident that you, as citizens of Twin Falls County, including the youth, will have a champion in the Legislature. 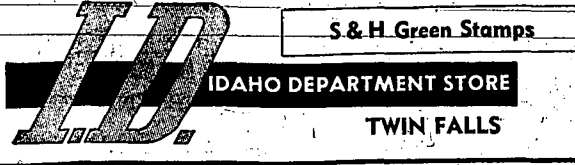

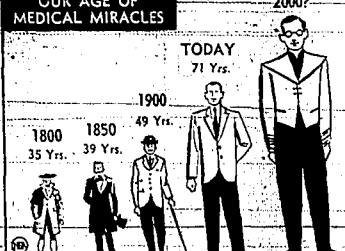
Three candidates each are in the senatorial and gubernatorial contests.

Trip Over Divide Into Stanley Basin Is Lined With Scenic and Historic Places

Magic Valley Tours Scenery, History and Recreation Are Mixed During Drive North to Stanley

Editor's note: This week the Magic Valley tour is a special one. It is recommended that winter, which presents entirely different experiences and reactions to a traveler. All you do is set on highway 21 and follow it north along good roads. Made on some of the side trips mentioned.

Between Shoshone and Stanley on highway 21 there are only three communities of any size. The three, Bellevue, Halley and Ketchum, are grouped together in a small area of what might be considered the foothills of the Sawtooth mountains.

If all the communities which have lived and died along this road and all points of interest were included on a map, the map would have to be large to handle all the names and explanatory matter.

Take Timmerman hill—10 miles south of Bellevue—as a starting point. From Timmerman hill a traveler gets his first view of the Wood River valley. In the bottom lands the road cuts through the marshy coun-

try of Silver creek, famous for its trout-fishing and, if one turns east along the foothills road, he will reach Pico and the Haystack state fish hatchery.

Bellevue is one of the oldest communities in Magic Valley. Once it was a rip-roaring mining town. For anyone who has been to Halley before, now's the time for a little variety. Turn west at Bellevue and drive to Halley along the river bottom road.

On the way, there's the ghost town of Bradford, site of the first labor strike in Idaho on July 20, 1884—the Minute Moore and Silver which-hunters claim is one of the Star Queen mines, two of the largest producers in the area, and picturesque Colorado gulch leading to the Snooker mine.

Between Halley and Ketchum the road is lined with places of interest. Red Devil mountain rises to the west, just north of Halley. Red shale, in the early days, is reported to have made an outline of Satan

himself and hence the name for the mountain.

Three miles north of Halley the Deer creek road branches off to the west. The road goes to Clarendon hot springs and up Kinsey gulch—where it drops down into the Willow creek country and, eventually, Camas prairie. However, this is a Jeep trip.

Long ago, a 30-room hotel was located at Clarendon hot springs.

Three miles further north along highway 22, the road crosses Big Wood river. The road to the west here leads up Greenhorn gulch which-hunters claim is one of the best places in the Big Wood river country to hunt elk. Two miles further, on the left, is Owl rock standing stark against the age-covered hillside. The wide trail (rumored parallel to the road is one of the most famous sheep trails in America).

From Owl canyon up to Galena, just about every little canyon

has at least one summer home hidden away from the hustle of everyday living.

A mile south of Ketchum, on the east side of the road, is a large white farmhouse. This home is the site of the original McCoy ranch, now owned by Howard E. Reinheimer, "New York City." With the exception of paint, Reinheimer has not changed the exterior appearance of the original building.

Ketchum has had a varied colorful career. Its first claim to greatness was in the rough and tumble mining days when it had the only mill in the area. Orca from as far away as the Lost river country was brought to Ketchum for smelting.

When silver was demoralized, Ketchum became a sleepy little town in the hills. But along came sheep—and the community had a boom again. The town still is the end of rail for the Union Pacific branch line from Shoshone. Following World war I, when the price of wool nearly disappeared, Ketchum again reverted to letting each day take care of itself.

The third boom for the community came when Sun Valley was built by the railroad. This boom still is in progress.

Up the road from Ketchum is a good gravel road to the west. Don't

take it. The road goes up Warm Springs creek and over Dolanhide summit, a trip so beautiful it deserves special treatment. Besides the road isn't in very good condition yet.

Continuing along highway 22, the road soon enters the Sawtooth national forest. Across the road from the forest service sign is the place on Big Wood river—engineers have considered building a dam to hold back the river's flood waters in the spring and to provide more water for Magic reservoir.

Should the dam ever be built, the bottom lands along the river would be flooded and several of the earliest ranches in the Wood river valley would become memories. The Redman and Winslow ranches may be seen from the road. One mile further north is the mouth of Eagle creek—where a large herd of elk ranges in winter, and J. B. Peltzman, Twin Falls, raises seed potatoes despite the short growing season.

The North Fork store, where Marilyn Monroe last spring filmed a part of her current picture, "Bus Stop," is a little further up the road. The Presbyterian summer camp is just across the river while a little north are the Wood river and North Fork camping grounds for tourists. Both of these camps were all but washed out in the high water of last spring but have been put back in good condition by the forest service.

Boulder creek pours clear, cold snow water into Wood river a mile further north and from the mouth of the stream can be seen the snow-capped Boulder peaks. The road leading to the peaks has been made impassable, even to Jeeps, in the last three years.

To the left, on the fir and pine covered mountains can be seen the scars left by loggers years ago. Lumbermen skidded timber down the mountainside to the river to be floated downstream on high water.

The Baptist camp at Cathedral Pines is two miles further up the road. The Esley hot springs plunge is one-half mile upstream from the Baptist camp. In this general area are located numerous summer homes.

In another mile, the road crosses Silver creek and then, for one mile, the road seems "queer" into the mountainside. On the Spruce creek flat beyond are more summer homes, the Boy Scout camp and Russian John ranger station.

At Prairie creek it is possible to drive along a side road for about a mile and then walk a short distance

From the top of Galena, the road dips rapidly into Stanley basin, the old road and the new ones from the top but surfacing from the point to Stanley is under way now.

The road then turns east and comes to his way down a steep slope in the beginning of the surrounding forest. This is the No Return. The first turning of the slope goes up Frenchman gulch to beaver ponds that are famous for fishing. Two miles east of the Salmon river, a little west of this gulch is the old Vienna, one of the earliest producers.

In a couple of more miles Beaver creek adds its water to the swelling Salmon river. It is up the canyon that once was located the granddaddy of all mining camps—Sawtooth City.

Stock raising is becoming very popular in Stanley basin—especially Rocky Mountain chub, once used only by sportsmen, has been taken to the Rockmore cattle ranch. Shaw and Dave Williams have two of the oldest in the basin. Join one another.

Although commonly referred to as "Sawtooth City," the name of the valley is called "Sawtooth" by the people who live here. The name is derived from the fact that the valley is operated by several well-known stockmen, including John Brockridge, Twin Falls, who is president of the National West Growers association.

This area of the valley also is becoming increasingly popular as a vacation land. There are numerous summer homes at Pettit lake and the Alturas lake lodge and camp grounds provide facilities for vacationers. A short distance from Pettit lake is the Clark-Miller ranch, one of the first to develop the vacation trade.

A road is under construction along the foothills between Alturas and Pettit lakes in preparation for opening another summer home area. Several chub camps are being built.

Three miles south of Stanley a bridge under which passes water here a hotel is operated in summer and boats may be rented for lake trips on the lake.

Four miles beyond is Sixteen terminus for this tour—Galena. The community is famous for two reasons. One is the fact that it is the only community open to the public as part of the road-to-the-peak trail. It is a new town, U. S. government is reconstructing the old settlement. This is called "Lower Stanley" while the old community is called "Upper Esley."

The second reason for Stanley fame is that it resides in a beautiful country, recently "discovered" from the world.

The trip, 80 miles from Idaho can be made easily in a day. If a person really is interested in the points of interest, views, and even more, would like to visit in Ogden.

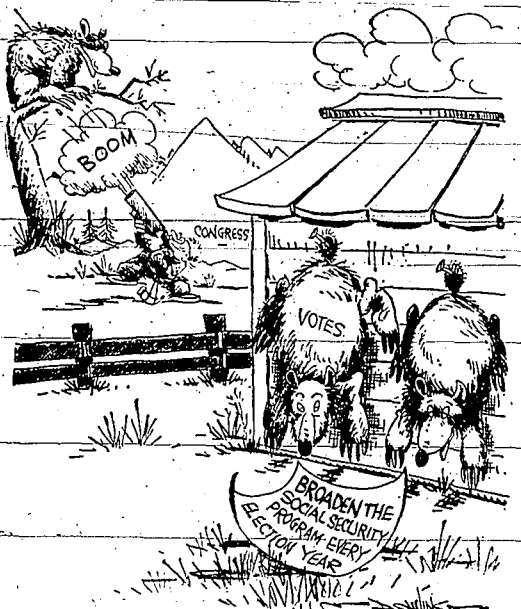

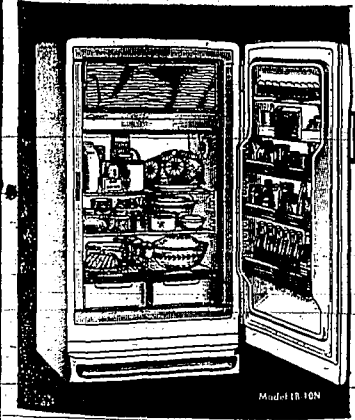

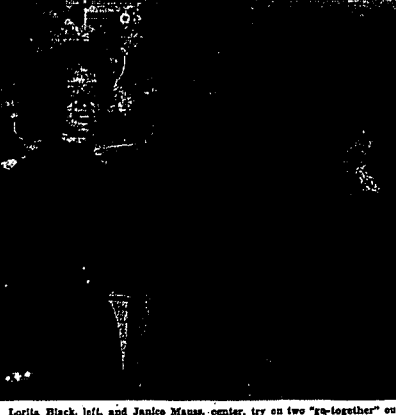

Care of Your Children

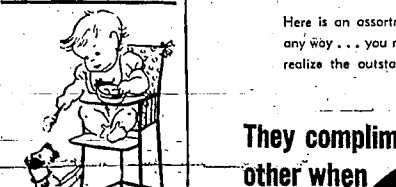

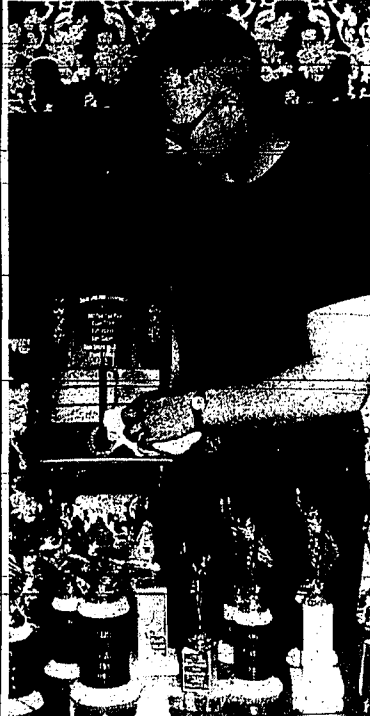

He Will Send Bulganin New Message Soon

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—President Eisenhower will send Soviet Premier Bulganin a new disarmament message in a few days, it is reported. The message is designed to encourage further military cutbacks through emphasizing that one-sided reduction of military forces for a global arms race is no substitute for a global arms control program.

The Eisenhower answer, authorized by the president, also will emphasize the American view that the world's nuclear problem now before the world is not reduction of the conventional arms but steps to bring the threat of nuclear war under control.

The administration has been developing a proposal for diversion of nuclear energy from bomb stockpiles to peaceful uses and the new message is expected to re-emphasize the letter is expected to include this work.

Officials disclosed that a reply to the letter which Bulganin sent in June has been submitted. Its delivery is usually completed. It is likely, however, that it will be rejected.

Several points of the Bulganin letter will be rejected, it is believed. The letter was sent to the Soviet government and several western governments apart from the general lines of the proposal. The result of these responses are already apparent in messages sent to Russia by leaders of western European countries.

U. S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk said that the new message is in line with the position of the Eisenhower administration. He rejected the suggestions for withdrawal of western—and Russian—troops from Germany under a new plan.

The proposal for a big power agreement to cut back troops in Germany is expected to be the main action point of the Bulganin letter or last month's proposal. It is expected to get a polite but rejection from the U. S.

Senate Okays Extension for Loans to Vets

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—The senate today passed a bill to extend for a year the World War II veterans' home loan guarantee program under which almost five million loans already have been made.

The new goes back to the house for consideration of senate amendments. Passage was by voice vote after an explanation of the measure by Senator Lehman, D. N. Y.

The home loan guarantee program administered by the veterans administration now is scheduled to expire July 25, 1957.

The bill would extend this to the same date in 1958 and also provide that any loan being processed by VA on the new deadline date may be guaranteed if it is closed within one year. The latter provision was added by the senate.

Sponsors of the bill said VA loans accounted for 30 per cent of the nation's total housing starts last year and that an abrupt cutoff would be too severe a shock to the nation's homebuilding industry.

More than 11 million veterans so far have not participated in the program, the sponsors said.

India Purchases Obsolete Planes

SACRAMENTO, Calif., July 21 (AP)—The purchase of 30 obsolete U.S. air force training planes by the Indian government for its expanding air force was announced today.

A U.S. spokesman at McClellan air force base said 10 of the T-61 propeller-driven trainers would be shipped to India from San Francisco in mid-August. For the remaining 20 were scheduled for shipment in September.

The purchase arrangements were made by Wing Commander T. G. Kelly, air attaché of the embassy in India in Washington, and Squadron Leader P. N. Kishanani, assistant air attaché. The air force spokesman said he did not know how much the planes were sold for.

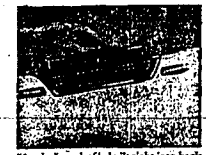

T.F. Man Builds Three Homes in Past 20 Years, Says There's Nothing to It

"If you ever want to build a house yourself, just start in. It's surprising what you can do," says E. Geppner. And he should know, for he's built three homes by himself within the past 20 years.

A tailor by trade, Geppner has almost completely turned over his work to his wife while he concentrates on finishing their home on Blue Lakes boulevard near sixth avenue east. He hopes that after two years of work, they can move into it by Labor day.

"Anyone can build a house," says Geppner. "There's a wealth of information on it in the library. On this ground, Geppner drew the plans and had done all the carpentry and electrical work—and part of the plumbing himself. He says he paid

to have the brick laid and furnace installed, but adds that if necessary, he probably could have done that, too.

Geppner bought the property on which he's building and a neighbor has let several years ago from a local painter. "There was an old shack on it then," he explained, "but it was pretty rundown, and I sold it to a man for use as a fishing cabin. As soon as he finishes his present project, Geppner plans to build an identical house on the next-door lot.

"A lot of books say that the breakdown on the cost of a house is 60 per cent labor and 40 per cent materials," he said, "but I think it may be even higher. At any rate, I'm saving myself some money and doing something I enjoy."

Geppner plans to live in the upstairs and rent the basement of the house when it is completed. Both floors will have a kitchen, living room, one bedroom and a bath. When the second house is built, he will rent it. "Another possibility is that we'll move our tailor shop into the basement from downtown," he is added.

The house will be surrounded primarily by concrete, possibly colored green. "Lawns are all right for old-timers," says Geppner, "but I'm a little more modern than that. I want a strip of grass in front that I can mow in two or three minutes, and that's all. I'd rather spend my spare time enjoying myself than working on a lawn.

He said he works nearly every

day on the house from 8 to 10 hours a day. "I work until I get tired, then I quit."

In 1927 Geppner built his first home in Jerome. About 10 years later he has his son, Ebert, built "half a house" on Addison avenue in Twin Falls. "The original house had no bathroom," explains Geppner. "My son and I moved what had been the
