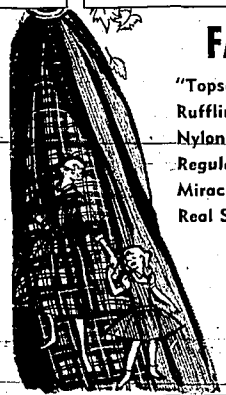

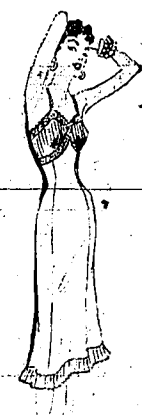

THE DEMOCRATIC LINEUP

The race for the Democratic presidential nomination now has three candidates and seven favorite sons.

Though President Eisenhower is considered safe by all the polls, there are 10 Demos begging for a chance to knock him off or to be knocked off themselves.

The three leading candidates are of course Adlai Stevenson, Illinois with around 300 delegates, hauled down, Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee with approximately 185, and Gov. Averell Harriman of New York with about 105. Some counts give each of them more delegates.

Eighty of Governor Harriman's delegates come from New York. The other 25 are scattered, mostly in the west, with no big blocks to give him strength.

There are at least five other candidates who have not been unseated, from one-half to one and a half percent of the vote.

The big race of strength is in the 350 to 400 delegates who will go to the Democratic convention uncommitted.

This year's bumper crop of favorite-sons may have sprouted early in a belief that the two front runners, Stevenson and Kefauver, would knock each other out.

Thus, if Governor Stevenson shows up with close to 400 votes on the first ballot, there may be a rush of flipping states to put him and get on the second ballot.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Democratic hopes of a November presidential victory are higher than ever since a heart attack last September suggested that they might not have to face him again.

His considerable opposition leaders maintain that they can defeat the Democratic candidate in a general election.

But they do insist, based on their knowledge of his past record, that he is not the man to carry states with approximately 200 electoral votes, as against the more than 100 which he needs to win in 1952. It takes 266 to elect.

But they do not consider it impossible to pick up the additional 66 ballots, since two states in the East—New York and Pennsylvania—or a triumph in California and several Western states would do the trick.

HAS HIS POPULARITY DECREASED.—The Democratic candidate for president may have suffered a general erosion of popularity because he has become a familiar figure rather than the legendary military hero he was four years ago.

He has had time and a record to antagonize once friendly interests and to raise a genuine doubt concerning his performance capacity, will hurt him.

DEMOCRATS REASON FOR CONFIDENCE.—These are the reasons why many Democrats may still govern the November balloting, but here, not necessarily in the order of their importance, for nobody can make sound judgment now on practical, political reasons for the resurgence of confidence:

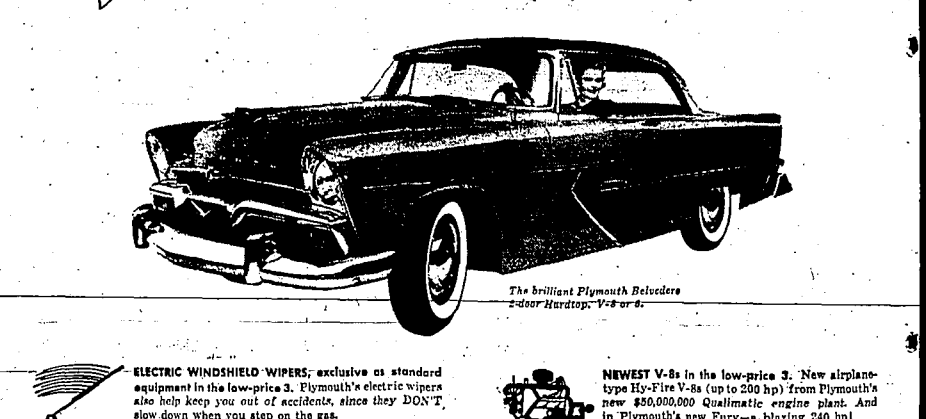

Premier May Keep Post in Paris Mixup First Step in Fairgrounds' Remodeling Is Completed as Work Ends on Offices

FILNER, July 25—First step in the remodeling of Twin Falls county fairgrounds has been completed, reported Secretary Tom Parks. The fair office building was moved from its foundation last month to a nearby fairgrounds road, while a basement for the building was dug and a foundation laid. The office now has been moved back along the new basement, and Parks and the next step will be to cover the outside of it with either a rock or brick veneer. The fairgrounds entrance also will be remodeled with a similar finish. "When completed, the building and entrance should provide a welcome change," Parks said. "With any luck, both operations will be completed in time for the opening day of the fair Sept. 5."

Men Await Fair Weather to Scale Peak, Solve Mystery

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, July 25—Clearing weather is expected to permit a four-man mountaineering team to make an attempt within the next two days to scale the forbidding east buttress of the Mt. McKinley approach as the group attempts to clear up a 45-year-old mystery. The team, headed by Walter Gonan, Seattle, is attempting to establish the validity of the claim of the late Dr. Frederick A. Cook that he was the person to climb the continent's highest peak. Cook was at first hailed as a hero but critics said his writings and photographs showed he had not reached the summit and his claim was erased from the official record. The lowering buttress is the main obstacle to the climb to the east, over the route which Cook said he took. Once over it, the rest of the climb is expected to be comparatively easy and the entire ascent and descent to the base camp will take about seven days. Don Sheldon, Fairbanks bush pilot, landed the group more than a week ago at the 8,500-foot level where base camp has been set up. Since then the group has advanced to the 9,000-foot level where adverse weather has hampered further progress. However, improved conditions started Sunday and the forecast is now more favorable for the ascent. A foremost danger this time of year is avalanches with loose ice and rock an ever-present menace. "The men are not only following

the same route which Cook reported he did in 1908 but are also carrying 40-pound packs as he did for all their supplies. The group has no radio but Sheldon expects to contact them again in three good weather" days. Meanwhile, Mrs. Helene Cook Vetter, daughter of the controversial explorer, has arrived at McKinley hotel from Seattle and is waiting to be flown to the base camp when the climbers return. Mrs. Vetter claims Admiral Robert E. Peary discredited the Mt. McKinley climb and used it as a focal point of an attack to successfully dispute Cook's claim of having been the first to reach the North Pole.

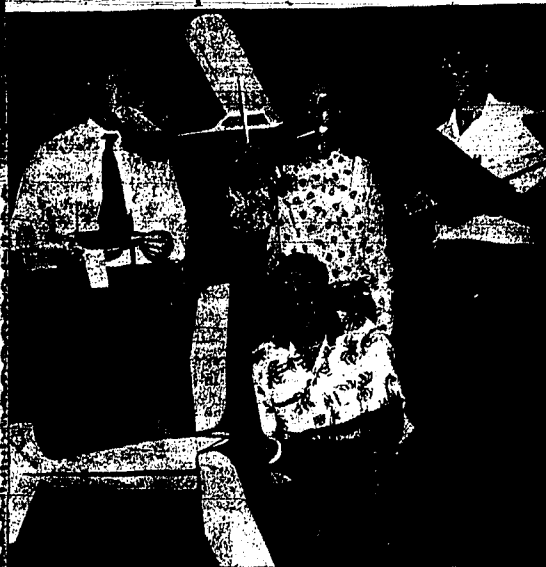

They don't do it merely to lose weight. They do it because it makes them feel more important to themselves. At least this is true of men.

Women are different. They never take themselves for granted, and never let anyone else do so either. A woman finds it easier than a man to keep her self-esteem. She is vitally interested in herself, and everything about herself interests her. She rarely finds herself the least bit boring.

They say a true philosopher can accept the crust of living by contemplating his navel. But a woman can go to a philosopher one better. She can spend a happy afternoon, oblivious to everything else, in simply currying a husband or trimming an arched eyebrow.

But after 35 the ordinary man finds it increasingly harder to think he amounts to very much. He feels more and more that he is only an easily replaceable cog of flesh in a mass world.

He wears of shaving the same old-bloody-face every morning. He cuts himself out of shape because it gives himself something to do. He drops into a bar on the way home not for a few rounds of fellowship and good cheer so much as because it enables him to forget for an hour or so his own gnawing sense of unimportance in a civilization seemingly growing more godfear every year.

But let him go on a diet, and he changes almost overnight. Dieting has become a national form of poor man's psychiatry.

A man gripped by the dieting malaise is like a sick machine addled. He is lost in a passion greater than himself. He is a crusader, fighting in a great cause.

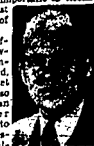
He becomes more worried over whether he can drop another pound than whether some nation will drop the H-bomb. He counts his calories like a reverse miser—the fewer the better.

He no longer feels like any other fatigued man slaving in the heat and hell of living. He is proud of himself. He feels immeasurably superior to his wastrel friends, who go about suffocated in their own blubber.

Soviet Chief Admits Flaws In Pet Plans

LONDON, July 25 (AP)—Soviet Communist Party chief Khrushchev admitted yesterday that the party's pet plan for the collective farms in his pet region, the Siberian virgin lands, is a "mistake."

Khrushchev said there was a shortage of housing, no clubs or societies of social amenities, poor cultural and only sporadic delivery of food to the new farms.

"Before the enterprises of the ministry are produced, wide-spread work on the farms is completely useless for harvesting in stages," Khrushchev said.

Khrushchev said that the ministries are responsible for this. The Communist party chief also criticized the ministries of agriculture and state farms for the "improvement of the virgin lands."

Khrushchev said that two years was "quite enough time" for the ministries to make a decision of the matter, but none has been forthcoming.

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Sympathy Added Details Requested for Sea 'Monster'

WASHINGTON, July 25 (AP)—The fish and wildlife service asked in Alaskan office today to check on reports that the remains of a huge, mysterious monster washed ashore near the Gulf of Alaska.

Although some reports said no one had been able to identify the carcass, a Smithsonian expert at the Smithsonian Institution here, who was sent to the institution today, said the carcass probably was that of a sperm whale.

Smithsonian experts have not seen the carcass, which lies partially floating in dry harbor about 60 miles south-east of Yakutat, Alaska. The place is accessible only by small plane or helicopter.

"We'd like very much to see it," the Smithsonian spokesman said. But, he said, no photographs have been sent to the institution.

The fish and wildlife service asked the Alaskan office for any information it had. But so far neither the Smithsonian nor the fish and wildlife service has sent any experts to the scene.

Some reports say the monster has reddish-brown hair, a head 9 1/2 feet long and a body 100 feet long. It is said to be a mobile upland species, a sperm whale floating on its back would account for the movable upland jaw, the expert said.

"But we can't do anything but wait until we have more facts," he said.

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Ex-State Auditor Admits He Got \$500,000 Out of Swindle

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 25 (AP)—Ex-State Auditor Orville E. Hodges admitted he got an estimated \$500,000 from the million-dollar check scheme in his office and spent it on politics, bad investments and high living expenses, a state's attorney disclosed today.

Hodges said the admissions in a "Hollis" statement he gave to the state's Atty. Gen. J. Cook in 1954 in eight hours of questioning last week. Cook said the statement was a summary of the statement to reporters today.

Hodges also admitted that he personally forced in his handwriting \$500,000 in checks on 10 state checks cashed in May, 1955, for a total of about \$80,000.

The former auditor said he did not know who made typewritten entries on some money for his political campaign.

Hodges said he needed money to oppose Gov. William G. Stratton in the Republican primary this year. Later, he became a candidate for reelection as auditor instead.

Hodges said he needed money because he never took any salary back from payrolls in his office. Asked how the scheme was arranged, Hodges said "I came in one day and said I had some warrants that I thought we could cash on the state and services for the auditor's office."

Hodges said all 46 checks involved in the 46 judgments returned against him here yesterday, charging him with embezzlement, larceny and operating a confidence game were cashed at Hintz's bank.

He denied making any profits to himself. Louis area bookshops with whom he has been linked in some newspaper stories.

Six-Guns and All, "Wild Bill" Tucker Blows Into Town for Three-Day Stay

"Wild Bill" Tucker blew into town Wednesday armed with a "K" and roaring like a hurricane. He carried an additional 120 shells, "K" shells and a .45 in his sedan delivery truck in event the situation got out of hand.

Billed as "The Last of the Frontiersmen," "Wild Bill," christened John William Tucker, came to the attention of Hollywood sound effects men. He also is an authority on "wild" west lore and stories and claims he at one time knew Frank James, Annie Oakley and Buffalo Bill Williams.

"Wild Bill" affects the facial hair and dress of the "wild" west. He was born in Beatrice, Neb., in 1862, and was father was the famous judge of Clay County, Neb., James Tucker.

"I was born 10 years after Jesse James was shot but I knew his brother, Frank," "Wild Bill" says. He carries one .44 caliber Smith and Wesson revolver of the type favored by the famous Missus bandit. He has other guns like those carried by Wild Bill Hickock.

His repertoire of sound effects includes storms at sea, four ducks at once, bird calls, hurricane, jungle sounds and "Tiger" yells. He also includes the modern sounds of an air battle but prefers to give out with the others.

His collection of shooting items includes Sharps, Henry and Spencer rifles and a gold-plated Winchester 73 buffalo gun.

His stop in Twin Falls will be brief. He will be at the Motor Vu theater for two days and will address Twin Falls Lions club Thursday. After that he will "ride up" the pickup and take off for Seal Rocks, Ore., to kill his "hounds."

Tuesday he demonstrated methods employed by Wild Bill Hickock in shooting backwards and said the famous gunman spread paper around his bed at night so he could hear enemies approaching his cot. Tucker says Hickock could shoot by sound on the darkest night.

He has a .32-caliber tip up Smith and Wesson rimfire revolver which he claims is one of the "wild west" guns even today. The revolver has no trigger guard in front but only a "safety" on the trigger.

"Wild Bill" says he is no stranger to Idaho. He claims to have attended school in Weiser when very small. He recently completed four of Florida and says it is his favorite state. He feels the same respect to the western states where his family lived and died, as he does also had a share of wisdom and cattlemen.

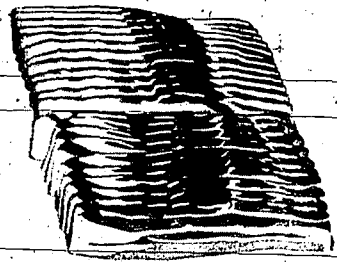

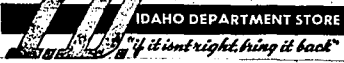

River Areas 'Invaded' by Bug Swarms

DUES MOTIVES, July 25 (AP)—The annual invasion of Mississippi river towns has begun, and residents are about to go "buggy" flaring out ways to combat it.

The aerial onslaught, which happens from three to 10 times a summer, usually starts about sunset. A United Press survey at Dubuque, Clinton, Keokuk, Muscatine, Fort Madison, Burlington and Davenport shows that everything is disrupted when they fall.

In some cities, bridges have been waded to give traction. On occasions, motorists have used chains. Visibility drops. Night baseball games have been called off at Dubuque in the past because of huge swarms of the insects.

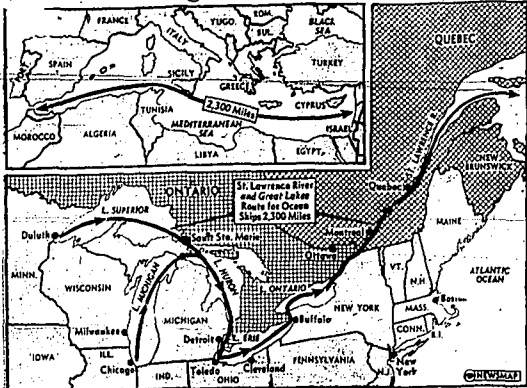
The insects die before morning and must be cleaned up before the hot sun broils the mess and it gives off a stench like rotting fish.

States' Battle Continues on River Waters

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25 (AP)—Arizona water engineer William Gookin took the stand today for what was expected to be the final day of cross-examination in the Colorado river water suit.

Gookin is engineer for the San Carlos irrigation district. He has been testifying for several days in behalf of Arizona, which is seeking title to 2,800,000 annual acre feet of Colorado river water.

Rush Program Inaugurated to Halt Likely Epidemic of Polio

CHICAGO, July 25—Medical officials today undertook a "rush program" to inoculate 500,000 children in the next two weeks with Salk vaccine, and save off a possible polio epidemic.

Health experts formed plans for the opening of 50 special clinics to inoculate children at the time interval between the first and second shots.

In addition to children, pregnant women are receiving the first shot. Meyer said the interval between the two shots would be cut from the usual month-to-two weeks to get the children protected as quickly as possible.

A possible explanation for the rapid climb of polio cases this year in the city came from a Milwaukee, Wis., health official, Dr. P. H. Krumholz. Milwaukee health commissioner, said polio strikes in two of three year cycles.

The reason, he said, is that the high birth rate of a large city like Chicago provides a new group of children vulnerable to the disease in that period. About two-thirds of the victims this year have been children between 1 and 8 years old.

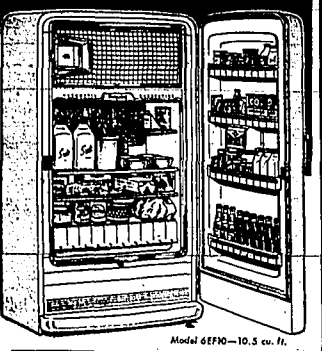

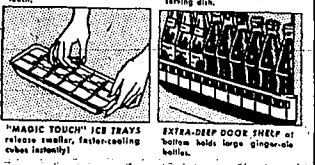
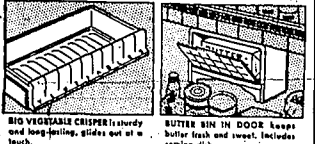
