AGE RECORDED

Captain of Liner Defends Crew; Death Toll Mounts

NEW YORK, July 28 (AP)—The master of the sunken Italian luxury liner Andrea Doria came out of seclusion today to defend his crew against criticism in Wednesday's sea disaster. The collision apparently took a score of lives. The Italian line's estimate tonight of "two dead and 18 missing and presumed dead" was a sharp rise over previous estimates that only five passengers had died on the ship or after rescue.

The master, however, said that 20 passengers are still "unaccounted for," whereas it previously had been believed only 10 had been missing.

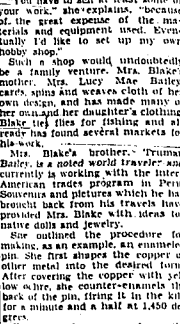

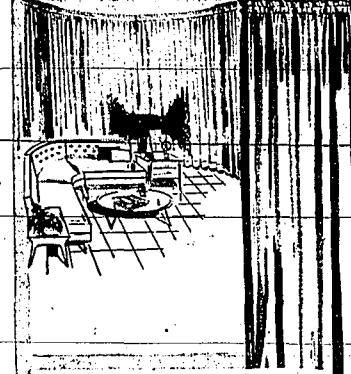

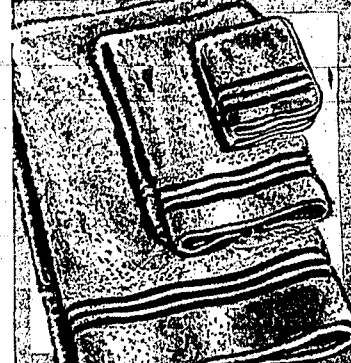

House Items Are Paid by Illinois State

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 23 (AP)—Household items ranging from lawnmowers and valued at \$17,270 were charged to the state by former state auditor Orville E. Hodges. It was disclosed last night by W. H. Ackerman, assistant state's attorney of Sangamon county, said the money was spent by Hodges on his lavish Lake Springfield home between 1933 and shortly before the giant check scandal which he is charged was uncovered. The money was obtained, Ackerman said, from Hodges' caretaker the help of John Casper, caretaker of the home, who kept itemized expense accounts for the Lake Springfield establishment.

Ackerman said Casper presented these expense accounts periodically to Hodges' office where vouchers were made and checks drawn on the name of an office employe, Harold de Silva. The checks were cashed, Ackerman said, by De Silva, and the money found its way back to Casper.

Ackerman said the expense items included lawn mower repairs, a motorboat license, flowers, razor blades, dog collars, soap bowls and candle holders.

Some items were explained only by the names of Illinois women. Most of these items ran from 65 to \$10.

Ackerman said the information has been presented to the grand jury.

In another development, the state and Hodges yesterday in an attempt to recover the \$47,270 he is accused of embezzling. Circuit Judge Julius Miner issued a writ at Chicago designed to strip Hodges' assets in Illinois, along with those of his wife and son.

\$100,000 Street Improvement Project Involves Seven Miles of City Streets

A \$100,000 street improvement program involving seven miles of streets in Twin Falls and "recapping" of several blocks in the downtown area is being carried out by the city street department, reports Homer Ballenger, superintendent of streets and water.

Trek Across Desert Pays Dividends in Scenic Grandeur and Geological Finds

Bones of Prehistoric Animals Rest in Dried Swamp on Edge of Owyhee Desert

High above Snake river south-tracked lips and thick tongues for the all but inaccessible water below. The situation, though, was not so bleak as it seems. Once the high level dries up, or at least the part along the top of the bluffs, which was a part of a

bridge. Follow the "main" road to a point approximately three miles beyond the last power pole and then turn right. The road, while only a desert road, can be traveled in modern cars. After a distance of between four and five miles, another road cuts back toward the river. Straight ahead, just about on the location, is a coral made of heavy timbers. Next to the coral is a large parking area where vehicles must be left. The rest of the trip must be made on foot.

Since drivers are scarce objects in the desert, it is advisable for anyone making the trip to take along a filled water can. In addition to finding a few bones that are thousands of years old, the view of Hagerman valley from the top of the bluffs is nearly worth the drive across the desert. In comparison, the air and sunlight are brush, the valley is as green and cool in appearance as fresh mint. Since the bluffs are high, an unobscured and rather unusual view of the entire valley may be had.

After finding the bones in 1924, Cook contacted Dr. H. T. Steens of the U. S. geological survey who, at the time, was engaged in a ground water study in the area. He sent a collection of horse bones to the National museum in Chicago. The following year the Smithsonian institute sent the late Dr. J. W. Ordley to Hagerman to study the terrain. He returned again in 1930 and in 1931 N. H. Boas headed the expedition. C. Lewis Oxley was in charge of the 1934 expedition.

Identified as to the type of animal from which they came. Occasionally, however, complete bones, including tiny horse hooves and horse, camel, beaver and turtle teeth may be found. This is particularly true on the east side of the bluffs. The drawback here, is that most of the bones are imbedded in "concrete" made by nature down through the ages.

The Smithsonian institute very carefully encased all the bones removed in plaster until members of the expedition, and all of them, had seen them. Cook then showed the explorers deposits of gypsum from which a substance was made. At a few places along the river there are considerable deposits of the mineral.

The early day bluffs, for example of the ground along the trail, are large bears and two species of horses. The Oregon trail across the Owyhee desert, still is clearly marked. In places it appears almost like a wide ditch about three feet deep. The road leading to the fossil beds crosses the old trail just before the bluff turn off which heads back toward the river.

A well defined foot trail from the parking area winds around the top of the bluff where the Smithsonian institute did most of its excavating. Along the trail may be found many pieces of prehistoric bone, some fossilized and some in their original state. For practical purposes, most of the fragments are not easily

While three of the Republican senatorial hopefuls appeared at a north Idaho GOP rally, one of their opponents looked off a southeast Idaho speaking tour.

Ray J. Davis, Pocatello, spoke in his home town Friday night, giving his views on foreign policies. Sen. Herman Welker, who seeks the nomination again; William Holden, Idaho Falls, and John S. Brown, Hagerman, were in Coeur d'Alene for the rally. Pocatello speaker was Louise Shaddock of Coeur d'Alene, unopposed for the GOP nomination for the first district congressional seat.

The seat is now held by Rep. Cloris Post,ampa Democrat, who also is running again and is unopposed in the primary. Davis told his Pocatello audience the most important foreign problem at present is keeping the free world from falling into the embrace of the Soviet Union.

He advocated aid to friends of the United States to achieve that aim, but said he definitely opposed any aid to those who do not recognize communism. Glen Taylor, one of four Democrats seeking his party's nomination for the senate, spoke in Rexburg. He repeated his claim to the title of "the senator who did the most for Idaho."

Alvin McCormack, Lewiston, an other Democrat, said in Bonner County the "Eisenhower administration is doing no more than the Hoover administration was doing in 1921 to cause a depression."

He said a steady decline in farm prices caused the stock market to crash in 1929 "and it can and will cause another calamity in the near future."

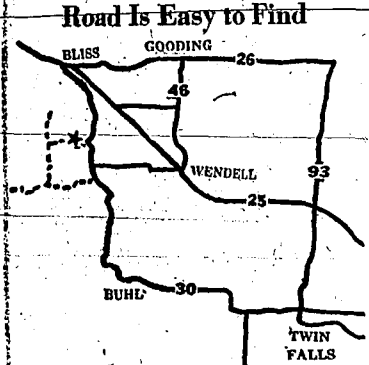

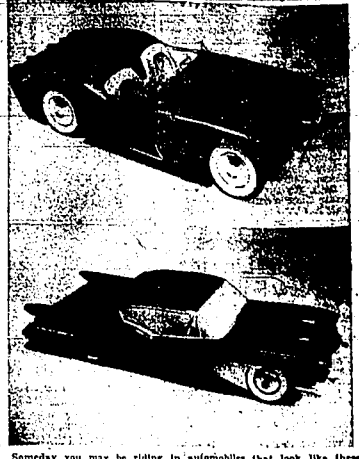

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

By LEE CARNEY—
(Pastor, Filer Avenue Church of God)

TEXT: "And he said unto them, when ye pray, say, Our Father, Luke 11:2.

The mind of man is a questioning mind. Among all the questions that have been asked — it is the most important question that can be asked — the one which men have been constantly seeking an answer all through the ages. What is God like? It is the answer to that question which alone can satisfy the hearts of men.

The question has been asked in a variety of ways, and there has been a variety of answers. As we search the Old Testament with this question we find that a number of answers are given, answers differing as men's experience of God increased.

Among the first answers that we get is this: God is a Deliverer. One of the greatest events in the history of the Jews was their deliverance from Egypt. As they marched under Moses from slavery to freedom they were taught that their deliverance was the work of God. So they came to understand that God was someone who delivered his people.

Later, another idea was added to that of a Deliverer-God. Their entry into the Promised Land meant many and arduous struggles with the people of that land. The com-

mon belief at that time was that each nation had its own God and that if a nation was victorious in battle it was because its God was stronger than the God of the victor. This very fact of Israel's entrance into the Promised Land was a revelation to them that their God was stronger than the gods of the people they had defeated. So they came to look upon God as someone who was leading the army of Israel into victorious battle. He was a Warrior-God.

Yet again a new conception of God appeared. With the coming of the prophets the native nationalistic conception of God gave way to the idea of a universal God — a God who was God of all nations, not merely of Israel. He made the world and spread out the heavens as a curtain and as a tent to dwell in.

So one might search through the Old Testament, discovering from the words of God as the knowledge and experience of men increased.

When we come to the New Testament we find that God is a Reality.

I see Him again. He has passed out of the garden. He has been before His judges. He has been condemned to death. He has been nailed to a cross. There from His place on the cross He speaks to His Father. "Father, forgive them." The Fatherhood of God to Jesus meant that with God there was full and free forgiveness. How the world needs that assurance!

Lazarus has been raised from the dead, and while all the people are marveling and praising God, Jesus turns quietly aside and prays, "Father, once again that word—'Father.' Beat Summer Heat With Simple Daily Precautions

By ZEGGY WRAY

If these hot, muggy days bring your family suffering, make an effort to keep your summer living more comfortable and cut down on the heat by simple daily precautions.

Check the temperature of your home. If it is too warm, open windows at night. If it is too cool, close them. Use a conditioning unit, your problem is solved. If you have a hot water heater, you can make the heat more bearable by turning the thermostat into the high spots.

Close the shades. It is not the heat but the humidity, or some of it, that is the trouble. Despite that, you'll have to combat both of them to lower the temperature.

Open doors and windows early in the morning and warm the room. Open doors and windows late in the evening and let the cool air come in. In this country, open doors and windows in the early morning hours, when the sun starts to rise, and close them as soon as the cool air begins to warm. This will help to cool the blinds and drapes.
