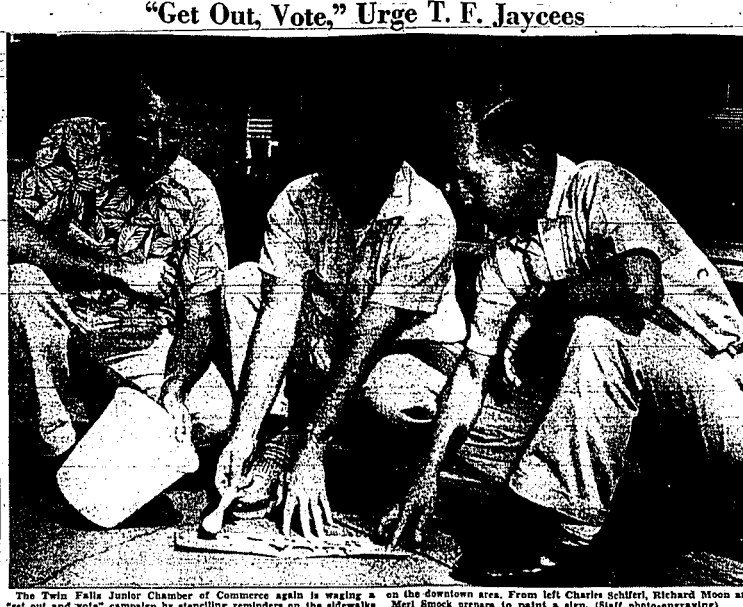

Other Coney Island hawkers, quick to cash in on his success, began peddling their own brands that seemed to have in their everything from chicken feathers to ground elements set up a hue and cry.

Some historians contend, however, that the hot dog sandwich as we know it today didn't come along until the Louisiana Purchase exposition in St. Louis in 1804. A concessionaire who loaned customers while gloves to eat the hot most popular hot dogs were produced in America. Life in MAGIC VALLEY

BOB EVANS, TWIN FALLS, who recently was retired as assistant district agent in charge of predator and rodent control in Magic Valley for the federal fish and wildlife service, was praised highly by the service when nominated for a meritorious service award.

A report accompanying the award hit a few of the high spots in Evans' long career in the fish and wildlife service. He began work with the biological survey, predecessor of the fish and wildlife service, in November, 1924, as a coyote trapper and was working for Edward Arthur in CARPY, a rabid coyote hunter, when the screen door of the ranchhouse.

Evans buckled on his six-shooter and took out after the animal, he caught up with the animal as the coyote was trying to kill some lame game at a snail one-half mile distance.

About the same time another rabid coyote came to the lambing sheds—Arthur's ranch. The coyote jumped onto a hay wagon from which two hunters were feeding the sheep but did not molest them. Evans followed the coyote through the lambing shed, trying to get a shot. The animal jumped into a pen with some sheep which had cholera, slipped a few and then headed for the cow corral. There Evans ended his career.

In the winter of 1925 Evans set up camp in the Coeur-d'Alene district. One night, with the temperature up and the temperature over his head, he was anticipating at that time of bumping against the zero mark. 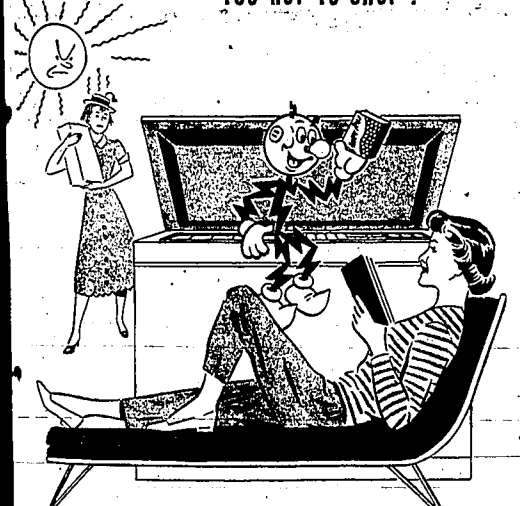

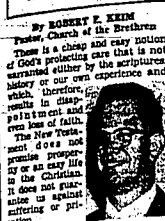

 There is a cheap and easy notion of God's protecting care that is not warranted either by the scriptures, or by our own experience and history of our own experience and which, therefore, results in disappointment and even loss of faith.

"Confidence in God"
 anxious about what we should eat or drink. (Luke 12:22ff).
 The Christian should not ask for easier tasks, but for strength to do the hard ones, not for freedom from hardship, but for grace to endure.
 Our times are characterized by a great desire for security and by anxiety in regard to it. None of us version. "Take no thought for the future."
 I like to think that "Be not anxious" is a better rendering of what Jesus said than "Take no thought." Taking thought for the future seems only prudent. It is being anxious that shows lack of faith. And nothing is so futile as anxiety.

Efforts to achieve security usually take the form of trying to accumulate wealth, which seems logical. The difficulty is that, driven by anxiety and lack of faith in God's providence, we want more and more; the more we get the less secure we feel; the more we have the more we worry for fear of losing some of it; the greater our material wealth, the less our concern about the treasures in heaven.
 On the other hand, the man who has confidence in the love and care of a heavenly Father, while he

does not sit with folded hands saying, "God will take care of me," is able to meet life's situations bravely. He can attack a difficult situation with a stout heart and meet reverses calmly; it does not worry him that his neighbors have things which he cannot afford.
 If he must suffer defeat, privations, illness, or death, he never doubts that God is both able and willing to turn all loss into gain. This enables him to remain poised through difficulty and to grow through adversity.
 Such a man is no tender, sheltered hothouse plant, but an oak, storm strong and tough by the storms it has weathered. He develops a serenity which he carries into old age. His interests are not self-centered, but as broad as the kingdom.

On a purely psychological basis, confidence is a surer way to the attainment of desired goals than anxiety. Anxiety takes years off your life, confidence adds years to your life. Anxiety hinders your efforts; confidence increases your efficiency. But the principle is more than psychological. Your Father knows your needs. He is not unmindful, even when things seem dark to you. He wants to give you strength of char-

It Isn't Carving, It's Whittling

boyhood ambitions of becoming a professional carver, but his father's ideas differed. Instead, he went to work as a fireman.

Since that time he has worked at many things, including bronze busts and is now the owner of a small farm southeast of Filer. However, he still makes use of his drawing.

Whenever he sees or reads of something he'd like to whittle," he explains, "I grab my sketch pad and draw a pattern. Then I try it."

Hah insists on the use of the word "whittle." He said "A lot of people call my hobby woodcarving, but it isn't. I just whittle with an old pocket knife."

He refers to his sharply-detailed scenes of western and Biblical life as carvings and at one time hid them whenever he had visitors. But for the last 10 years he has had offers to exhibit his handiwork and sell it. He once was offered \$200 for a sagebrush lamp with a western scene mounted on it.

"I like money as well as the next one," said Hah, "but I'll never sell my work. When you sell your hobby, it isn't a hobby anymore, it's a job and a job isn't any fun."

Calling himself an impatient man, Hah insists that even the most detailed parts of his hobby help to relax him. In the past several years he has had several accidents, including breaking his back, being stung by a bull and injuring his knee.

Most of his work has been done while recovering from accidents. "I've tried several things," he said, "but whittling relaxes me more than anything else I can find."

Whittling isn't his only enjoyment, however. When he sees an old piece of wood, he thinks of what he can mount on it.

"That's as interesting as the whittling itself," he said. Although he won't sell his work, Hah has given much of it to friends as gifts.

"I'd rather receive something that someone has made for me for Christmas than have them buy something," he said. "And that's the way I give. There's more Christmas

spirit in making something and giving it than there is in merely buying it."

One of Hah's prized possessions is an invitation he received four years ago to exhibit his handiwork in the International Hobby show in Vancouver, B. C.

"I'd have liked to have seen the 100,000 exhibits in that show even if it meant showing my own work," he said, "but I didn't go because I had promised a friend I would whittle something for him and I had to finish it."

Hah has never read any books on woodcarving or seen anyone else do it.

"The closest I came to that," he said, "was when I was a boy and used to watch the men in our town sit around the old pot bellied stove in the general store, whittling on sticks."

"That, in itself, didn't appeal much to me, so I decided to see if you could tell a story by whittling." Hah's collection of his handiwork shows many such stories. Included in his collection are the

Good Samaritan at the well, the Nazirite, a covered "wading" scene, a square dance scene which includes both dancers and musicians, a battle between a mare and a cowboy, the Rabbit and the Fox, and other well-known Disney characters.

Hah said his wife seems to like his work and he praised her for putting up with him.

"Any household cursed with a whittler has my sympathy," he said. "I usually whittle in the kitchen, cleaning up as well as I can when my wife starts and I prepare our meals."

"For awhile I thought I might fix up our basement as a workshop, but I gave that idea up. It's just too lonesome down there by yourself."
