SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 1 (UP)—A contract at a salary of \$10,000 a year for the job of director of the Salt Lake General Post Office has been awarded to a Twin Falls man.

The contract was sent to Vernon T. Harris, assistant administrator of the Magic Valley Memorial hospital in Twin Falls. The appointment was recommended earlier by the Citizens' Advisory board of the hospital.

Harris, in charge of health and charity, said:

"How that recommendation are in we have mailed the contract and if Mr. Harris returns Aug. 10, replacing Kenneth A. Griffith, who resigned effective Sept. 1."

ing and the city commissioners requesting ground transportation between the airport and Sun Valley, the approving city order into a contract with Sun Valley Buses, Inc., which would provide such service.

The letter from Hill for West Coast stated the present ground transportation provided for city passengers was "not suitable." He further wrote that his company "could obtain an improved service between Twin Falls and Sun Valley."

Both addressed the letters to the city commission in answer to letters written two weeks ago by City Manager Joseph Lammers at the request of the city commission.

City Attorney Robert Balleisen informed the commission in answer to a question, that the ordinance prohibiting transportation companies other than the Yellow Cab company from transporting passengers to and from the airport is still in effect.

Police Chief Howard Gillette told the commission he had received a complaint from Carlill the past week that another cab company might be operating in the city with passengers. The contract between the airlines and the Yellow Cab company expired on July 31, however, the ordinance providing for the Yellow Cab company to transport passengers from the airport has over three years to run.

Other business of the commission included awarding a year's contract to United Oil company to supply the city with truck and passenger vehicle tires. The oil company submitted the lowest bid of nine cents a gallon.

City State Oil company received a year's contract to supply the city with ethyl gasoline, while gasoline for trucks and passenger vehicles was low bidder for a year's contract to supply regular gasoline and kerosene at 12.5 cents a gallon. The oil company received a contract to supply anti-freeze.

Taxation for all departments of the city and its employees, including airport liability insurance, will be provided during the coming fiscal year by Taber Insurance company, Twin Falls.

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Dairy Awards Are Slated for 4-H Members

JEROME, Aug. 7—The Jerome Cooperative Creamery will present special awards to the winners of the 4-H dairy contest at the Jerome county fair Aug. 22-25.

The contest will be open to all 4-H club members who have dairy as their project. Animals need not be registered. The project must be entered by contestant unless they are owned by more than three head, or one-eighth of the herd, whichever is most.

First, second and third prizes will be given each first year, second year and third year and third place prize. Records must be kept for each year of each yearly group will be eligible to compete in the district contest.

All contestants competing for the creamery awards will be expected to enter a fitting and show record books and also have their record books turned into their county club agent or county agent prior to the fair or have their record books with them in the show ring. Records must be available or all points will be lost to contestants on basis of records.

To enter the creamery contest, the contestant must be active 4-H club member. Records of the project must be kept and presented for judging, either prior to the fair or at the fair. Contestants must care for, fit and show their dairy animals during the contest. Special award will be given for best fitting and showing, on 30 per cent schlerometer during this year's presentation in 4-H work, 35 per cent accuracy, completeness, and neatness of records.

Winners will be chosen during the fitting and showing contest by the same judge of other 4-H judging.

Three awards will be given each group in each county. First will be given blue ribbons and \$8; second, red ribbon and \$5; and third, white ribbon and \$3. First awards will be given each group in district competition, open to entrants from all counties in southeastern Idaho.

First prize, \$150; second prize, \$50.00; third prize, \$25.00; first prize, \$100.00; second prize, \$25.00; third prize, \$10.00.

Jack Smith, Twin Falls, and Lament Smith, Rupert, will be the judges. Smith is district contest extension agent for Blaine county.

WHY WE CALL IT . . .

Coeur d'Alene

Editor's Note: This is one in a series of stories on the origin of the colorful, odd, sometimes humorous names of places and things in Idaho and Utah.

A north Idaho lake, a city on its shores, an Indian tribe, an early-day military force and a sprawling mining district got their name as a nickname.

From time to time at least a dozen translations of Coeur d'Alene have been offered with resulting arguments.

But those who have devoted much time and study translate the name "as pointed hearts" and trace its origin to French-Canadian trappers who visited northern Idaho either late in the 18th or early in the 19th century.

David Thompson, first white man to settle in what is present day Shoshone county, wrote of Coeur d'Alene lake and the Coeur d'Alene Indians in 1809, Ross Cox, trapper who visited the area in 1811, referred to the Indians as "The Pointed Hearts," adding, "or, as the Canadians call them, 'the Coeur d'Alene'."

As the story goes, the Indians who later became known as the Coeur d'Alene, were more shrewd in trading with the early-day trappers

Forestry War on Budworms Ends

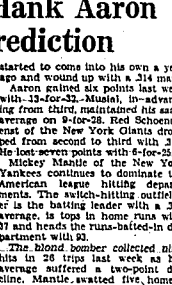
