25 Korea Tots Arrive in U. S. For Adoption

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 2. — Harry Holt, the famed Oregon farmer from Creswell, arrived at Portland International airport Saturday after a 6 a. m. today with another plane load of Korean orphans. The children arrived in line shape. Holt was immediately placed under the care of a physician.

Arlene Steward, Karen Cedarwall, Seattle, and the pilot of the plane rushed ahead to pick up the children. Holt was the plane after Holt was taken on the flight from Honolulu. It was not known immediately whether Holt had a heart ailment or was exhausted.

The 25 mixed-blood orphans were brought from Holt's orphanage in Korea for adoption by families in Oregon, Washington, California, Florida and Canada. Since then he has personally extended orphanages and an extensive rescue operation to find homes for children, refugees and Korean mothers.

Mrs. Cedarwall said the flight passed without incident aside from Holt's illness. She said that when asked about the magnitude of his rescue mission, Holt simply looked up from his diaper-changing and replied, "I wish I were angel food to feed to them."

Some of the orphans were met by adoptive parents in Portland. The others will enjoy a brief rest here before proceeding to their destinations.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Republican National Chairman Lewis Hill and the whole White House family, especially Chief of Staff Sherman Adams and Press Secretary James C. Nixon, drive. Only President Eisenhower's caution and restraint have kept the whirligig from blowing away.

The whirligig's leading opinion of the disreputable movement, which has disintegrated into a mere political maneuver, is that it is a waste of time and energy.

Together with Vice President Nixon's "close political associates," Hill has been instrumental in inspiring a small liberal faction in New York, leading bankers, industrialists and former government officials now heading great corporations. Several held support by the president have denied that they support or finance the Minuteman, but their disclaimers are not accepted at face value.

The New York group has had numerous overseas assignments, including active participation in some of the foreign aid programs, which resulted in intimate contacts with former ministers headed the international co-operation administration.

They do not believe that Nixon, supposedly more responsive and susceptible to conservative sentiment, will give them any more of the fact of their international program, should he land in the White House, they doubt if he would show their enthusiasm.

PLOT REVEALED FROM CAPITOL HILL—Nor does the Nixon faction believe that Gov. Christian A. Herter is in any way connected with the Minuteman plot for vice president, or for possible promotion to the White House. And it is the fate and future of the Minuteman plot that is the subject of the basic controversy. Herter is the capitalist liberal version of the plot.

The Minuteman's health should force him to withdraw from the race. The New York crowd's withdrawal would be Chief Justice Earl Warren. This conclusion has been drawn from the fact of Herter's assertion that he thinks his health is equal to the job, and Warren's insistence that he will never again run for office.

Nor is Governor Herter looked upon by Blasen's critics as the Eastern liberal and internationalist. Herter is reported to be Sherman Adams himself.

"DIVERSIONARY" ACTION—The pro-Herter cry is repeated in the Minuteman's operations. It is designed to make Nixon an object—large or doubtful, and controversial, and to create a convenient atmosphere for the Minuteman's operations. The developments and circumstances within the next two weeks.

In short, in the opinion of the wing supporting Nixon, the current struggle is not simply a conflict between Nixon and Eisenhower, but a struggle for control of the Republican party and the direction of its future policy and philosophy, especially in the field of foreign affairs.

CONFISCATED ASSETS—Sen. Everett Ruess has made more in an effort to restore to Germany and Japan the property of their nationals confiscated in this country during the last war. He has introduced a bill which has been approved by a bill which would give these alien an American handout worth between 500 and 1,000 dollars. The bill would give to the German and Japanese who have come out of the pockets of American taxpayers, and it would violate a separate act which prohibits the sale of property of the United States and her allies.

Stassen Cites New Support On Campaign

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Harold E. Stassen said today the chairman of the Missouri delegation to the Republican national convention has thrown his support to Stassen's "dump-Nixon" campaign.

Stassen released a letter in which Elroy W. Bromwich, the delegation chairman who also is chairman of the national committee from Missouri, said he has "much evidence that a majority of the delegates will favor a change in the vice presidential nomination."

For this and other reasons, Stassen said he now believes the odds are 50-50 that the Republicans will discard Richard M. Nixon and nominate Massachusetts Gov. Christian A. Hailer as President Eisenhower's vice-presidential running mate.

Bromwich, described by Stassen as a "conservative Republican business man" said in the letter that it is "doubtful if Missouri can be carried by the Republicans in November if the vice presidential nomination is not changed."

But an Eisenhower-Hailer ticket, Bromwich said, "can carry Missouri," and help win two or more additional congressional seats.

Stassen said in a separate reference that "the situation has been changing quite rapidly" since he launched his drive two weeks ago to dump Nixon.

Auto Makers Eye Cleanup Of '56 Model

DETROIT, Aug. 9.—The most important single thing to be done in the car makers' and retailers' eyes is an orderly cleanup of outgoing models.

"By 'orderly' cleanup is meant liquidation of new car stocks on hand without rattle-dance driving in the final days of the model year.

The car makers have spent well above a billion dollars getting 1957 model cars from drafting boards to the point where they are ready for assembly lines. Major changes have been made by most producers.

To help reduce the biggest new car inventory in history, producers have curtailed production where it has been lower than retail deliveries for the last couple of months.

Inventories reached a record level of 90,789 units on March 1. On July 1 they are estimated to have dropped to 66,000 units.

The present model year has about three months to go. No major increases in production schedules are planned.

New car sales for the first half of 1956 are estimated to have totaled 3,100,000. The frequently revised figure for the entire year puts the figure at 5,800,000. The figure seems somewhat low.

It is expected that the industry will settle for 5,000,000 retail deliveries the total will come close to the average of the last five years.

That figure also would give a five-year total of retail sales of almost 25 million units. Production for the same period will come slightly more than 29 million units.

The exacting needs of guided missiles, atomic energy and new processes of modern industry are creating demands for them. To get ahead today a metal must have more versatile characteristics than the mere toughness of steel, or the electrical conductivity of copper.

Zirconium, which resembles steel in its use in pipes for steam, is being used in metal today, for example. More uses are being found for it every day.

Because of zirconium's non-corrosive properties, its resistance to heat and low absorption of neutrons it's ideal for use in atomic reactors. "Women in Iraq get no respect whatever," the tired-looking young mother said. "My husband Abdul tried to make me live as an Arab woman. When he got angry I would get slapped, shoved, spit at and cursed."

Mrs. Subbugh told of how she could no longer take the treatment that he had subjected her to. She had fled to the United States where she was attacked by an Arab mob because he tried to protect her.

Mrs. Subbugh was finally able to get her husband to surrender their son to her, as a court had ordered. She fled to Rome, where she arrived penniless. Consul officials there gave her clothes for herself and the baby and arranged her transportation home.

She said today that her romance began in Seattle, Wash., where her husband was a student, turned into a nightmare after he took her home to Baghdad.

"I was expected to walk in my bare feet, to sit on the floor, to eat with my bare hands, and cook on the floor," Mrs. Subbugh said. "In Iraq, the men marry for one reason only—to have a slave."

Second 'Shot' Urged to Halt Polio's Wave

CHICAGO, Aug. 9 (AP)—Authorities expressed concern today about a decrease in the number of children receiving for second Salk vaccine injections in Chicago's offensive campaign against a record polio outbreak.

"The responsibility is in the hands of the parents," said Dr. Herman H. Bland, president of the city board of health.

Fifteen park districts administering pool and fire wading pools were closed yesterday as the all-out campaign continued to prevent a polio epidemic as the peak of the polio season approached.

Bland and other health officials were disturbed in the drop-off in second inoculations at hospital, clinic and office of the city.

"It was reported that 50 percent of vaccine distributed dropped by a parent before the beginning of 18,000 doses yesterday from 50,000 daily average since the beginning of the polio outbreak. Bland said the parents are indifferent and blasé and he said the situation may become critical.

"The situation may become critical if the parents are not urged to get their children in for their second and third shots when they are due."

He urged parents again to get their children started immediately in the polio inoculations if they have not done so.

There have been 630 polio cases reported in 1956, the worst in a year in record in the city.

There have been 773 cases of poliomyelitis since the outbreak, and not a case of paralysis has been reported since the Salk vaccine injections. Forty-four paralytic cases are reported among previous recipients of one shot and 13 cases in the two-dose category.

Ex-Navy Doctor Sets Trip to Assist Asians, Curb Soviets

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Young Dr. Dooley is hardly one to sit back and watch the communists make hay.

Once again this blue-eyed Irishman with all the charm and guts of his ancestry is preparing to head for Asia to spread his personal brand of good will.

Baseballs, movie cartoons and much needed medicine—these will be the simple but effective diplomatic tools of Dr. Thomas Dooley, a rather remarkable young American.

The former navy doctor, who has written a best seller about his experiences caring for refugees from North Viet Nam, is now getting ready to go to Laos.

As a civilian, he's determined to spread some extra good will in this tiny country endangered by communism.

"The future of Laos is shrouded in a mantle of uncertainty heavier to pierce than that associated with any of the other newly independent countries of Asia," he says. "Rather than curse the darkness perhaps we can light a few candles."

Next September, 29-year-old Dr. Dooley and four ex-navy medical companions who worked with him in Laos will start visiting the mountain people of Laos loaded with gifts, and ready to dispense medicine.

"We will present ourselves to the village chief, then throw a baseball around, play with the kids and then evening eat with the natives," he says.

"Six nights and I will show them a movie, Bambi, Fantasia, Snow White, or another of that type of film. The sound track is being prepared in our own tongue by the Laos embassy."

"The next morning we shall say 'Let us treat you. Bring us every child you have. Look, we possess the medicines that cure yaws, your malaria, your trachoma.'"

"Then we will give medicine to anyone who needs it for four or five days show them a movie each."

Attack on Nasser Stiffens Attitudes

CAIRO, Aug. 9 (AP)—Prime Minister Nasser's personal attack on Egyptian Gamal Abdel Nasser will stiffen the attitude of the Egyptian leader on the Suez issue, sources said today.

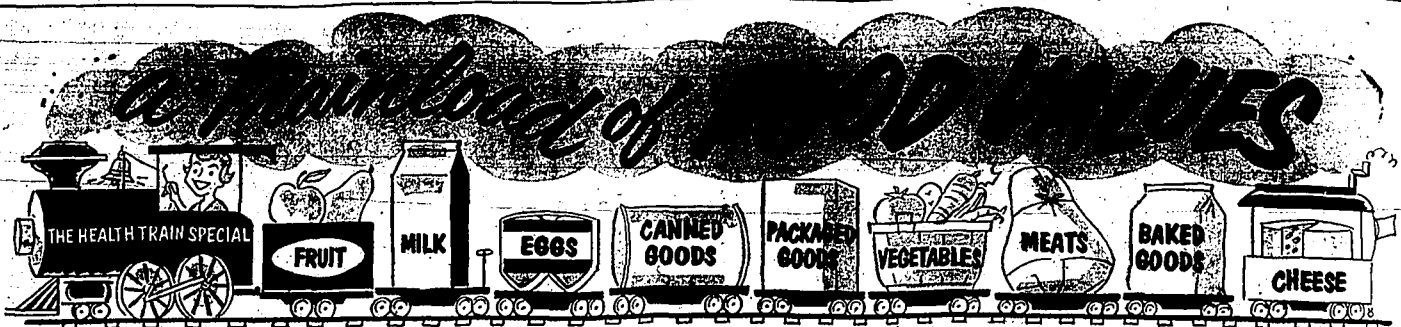

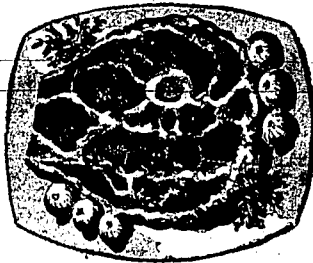

 Bargain-chasing housewives will find special in smoked butts and lamb in many of the nation's food stores this week-end. They will also find a plentiful supply of many vegetables and fruits. "Practically everywhere they'll see that there are a lot cheaper so one can't miss and many green salads may be favored in many an American home."

Beef Getting Up
 But the warning is out that beef will go considerably higher next week as it might be sensible to snap up some special in that line one week-end. In many areas of the country there will be week-end buys in round steak, beef chuck and ground beef.

The sharp-eyed shopper will spot other week-end specials in small loaves, roasting and trying chickens, ribs, boned-in hams and ready frozen whittings. At one chain there will be buys in pork ham and smoked beef tongue, too.

Potatoes Cheaper
 Potatoes are cheaper than a week ago as they are supplied from Long Island and the West. Watermelons and cantaloupes are lower. The Cantaloupes are coming up from California. The watermelon is coming up from Maryland and Delaware are competing with California watermelons.

Letting carrots and cauliflower are cheaper but corn is about the same if its good quality. Cucumbers are somewhat higher as supplies diminish. Celery, green beans are moved up in price. Strawberries and good quality berries are scarce. Apples are a bit lower but the kind available now are good mainly for pies or apple sauce.

Peaches continue abundant and the public has had so much of them they're quite cheap.

Auto Dealers Suit Measure Is Signed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—President Eisenhower yesterday signed legislation, permitting auto dealers to sue manufacturers in federal courts, which he said represents a "significant" step in the exercise of federal authority.

The bill would give the nation's 100 dealers recourse to court in disputes with manufacturers over compliance, termination, or failure to renew franchise agreements.

Previously, a dealer had no right to sue if the manufacturer lived up to the letter of the franchise.

Keeping Mental Health Cited To Help Your Pet Parakeets

By HAL BOYLE
 NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (AP)—Keep yourself mentally healthy. You owe it to your parakeet.

"If you become neurotic, the pet in your home may become neurotic," said Ben Gaspard, owner of the Midtown Pet Center, a specialist in the emotional well-being of his little feathered friends.

At 10 A.M. each he deals in animals ranging from \$100000 cheetahs ("I'm the thing to buy out your new sports car"), the dapper, middle-aged Frenchman likes to call himself a "bird psychologist."

"This is a title you earn, he said, not by going to college, but by his long study of the habits and yearnings of birds.

He has provided pet- or boarded the pet- of such well-known clients as skilful Henderson, Faye Emerson, Ernie Kovacs and Arthur Godfrey.

"People in the 'entertainment' world usually are extraordinarily kind to their pets," he remarked. "They feel nothing is too good for them."

However, he recalled the case of one comedian who liked to four that bars at night with his pet monkey. The monkey soon began to share his taste for whiskey.

"The combination of liquor and late hours" buff the monkey," said Gaspard. "But the comedian is still making the rounds—alone."

Birds, he insisted, can have a form of nervous breakdown, just like



people. "Too many crowded-cocktail parties, for example, will open a canary and cause him to come down with sinus trouble, a psychosomatic escape."

One of his current patients, a talking crow named "Ole," is being used as a photographic model for a beverage concern. He also has appeared on TV, where he spoke a cheery "hello."

After a photographer held him too tightly while posing him for a picture, "Ole" became so frightened his head feathers fell out, he became bald, and clammed up completely.

Now, following several sessions on the psychiatric perch with Gaspard, "Ole" has begun talking again, but instead of saying "hello" he mutters "What for?" and "oh, yeah?"

"Kindness is essential in dealing with birds," said Gaspard. "A small canary needs affection as much as a Great Dane. You can't force birds to talk or sing. They will do it only when they are happy and carefree."

"A bird is as temperamental as a cat. It will perform only when it wants to."

Here are a few more things Gaspard has learned:

"Women can teach a parakeet to talk much better than men can. It is because their voices are higher, more like those of birds."

"Birds learn words easier that have the letter 'R' in them. It is probably easier for them to learn German, French or Hungarian than it is English."

"The best time to teach a bird is just before he goes to bed. Then he will study in his sleep."

Birds, alas, like their owners, are not immune to snobbery.

"If you put two talking crows in with two talking mynah birds," said Gaspard, "one crow will learn from
