CHICAGO, Aug. 11 (AP)—Scrapping Harry Truman, the Democrats' old champion, went all out for Averell Harriman today as the best man for President in these times of "mounting crisis in the world." His statement could throw next week's national convention into an uproarious, harmony-shattering battle. His endorsement was unqualified. Meanwhile, the Democratic platform committee ended its hearings today and turned to the task of drafting a party platform which will appear in a few days.

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Stassen Claims Nixon Lacking Much Support

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—E. Stassen asserted today that "less than 20" of the 1,322 delegates to the Republican national convention are "already committed" to support Vice President, Richard M. Nixon for re-election.

Stassen said, "less than one-third" of the delegates have made any kind of public declaration for Nixon's re-nomination, and less than one-sixth are pledged to vote for him.

Stassen, who took a four-week sabbatical as President Eisenhower's campaign manager, made these assertions in a statement to the press. He said they support his argument that the Republican convention is now definitely open on the vice presidential nomination and will remain open until the vice presidential election in November.

Stassen said support for his drive to nominate Gov. Christian A. Hoff in the place of Nixon is growing daily "and realization that I am sincere and that the time is not too late, is becoming widespread."

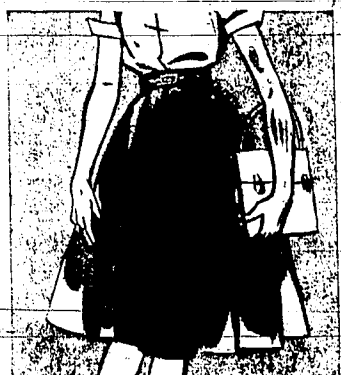

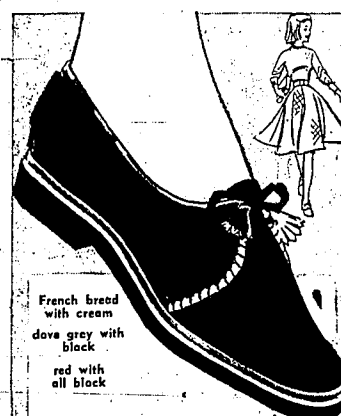

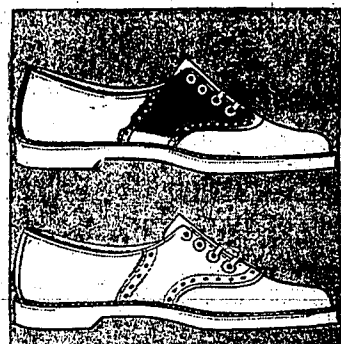

Magic Valley Tours Ghost Towns, Rich "Diggings" Noted In Trip to Blaine County "Gold Belt"

HAILEY, Aug. 11—Once known as the "Ore City," Bellevue, on highway 33 just south of Hailey, today retains its "ghost" town character in Blaine county's extensive mining area.

The community, which some say was called Blyville at one time, boasted some 2,000 to 10,000 population in the 1880s and 1890s and the Minnie Moore-Queen and the Hills mines were in full operation.

With Bellevue's mining tradition, it seems well to start a tour of Blaine county's "diggings" from there.

Turning left from Bellevue, a drive through the "river bottom" of one mile offers the first stop. Broadford, The Silver Star-Queen Mining company currently is attaining a comeback on the Minnie Moore-Queen mine. A new winch runs back into the Queen of the Hills property and another 250-foot shaft takes them to the ore veins. Total production of the Minnie Moore mine in the early days was \$2,447,800.

Each gulch along the road from Broadford north to Hailey has a mine with a glamorous past. Up the Colorado gulch, the last before reaching Hailey—the Goose mine also is staging a comeback. At present, a bridge is being erected across the Big Wood river where the old Colorado bridge was washed out during the spring floods.

In traveling along Hailey's main street, a left turn onto Bullion street makes it possible for a lunch stop under the large trees in the city park.

While prospect holes dot the mountains on either side of the road, "real mining country" is not reached before coming to the Hot Springs ranch just west of here.

Democrat gulch, where an early day politically-minded prospector panned a claim, is reached by a right turn just before reaching the Hot Springs ranch house. Other diggings in the area are the Idaho Democrat and the Idaho Republican mines, scarcely a timber remnant of the once-tidy mining camp on Lamb's gulch, tributary to Democrat.

From a point near the ranch may be seen the Climax mine with its see-saw road. In the mountains to the left and back of the Climax

Some 110 employees are working at the Triumph concern at the present time, with 52 patented claims as many or more patented claims worked by the company.

While the main ore is silver, lead and zinc are two end products.

Both the Independence and North Star mines have been worked since the 1890s.

The claims have produced much rich ore and there is an abundance of drifting ore on their dumps.

Despite continued prospecting, the area was not settled until 1870. The greatest obstacle to development of the area was the Banrock Indian tribe which regarded the mountain ranges as their hunting grounds and the "Gama-grute" or "Big Wee" as their "farmland." Here they gathered the canna roots each summer for their winter flour.

An alternate to the Rock creek road is a right turn up Bullion gulch leading into territory that contains more than 100 mining claims stretching over the summit into the Deer creek area on the other side of the mountain.

Only one of the several towns established in the gold belt which now appears on Blaine county taxrolls is Dupplin, which was established in the early 1880's about 12 miles west of Hailey and flourished for 20 years. While there are no

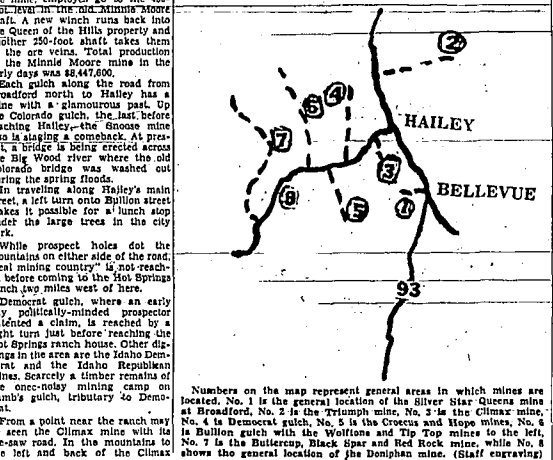

Editor, Times-News: Have you ever corrected your statement in Magic Valley tours where you say the Oregon Trail crossed Little Salmon river at Balanced Rock?

Answered Rock: The Oregon Trail followed the Snake on the south side to three miles crossing below Glenn Ferry and then kept on to the John Day country and Walla Walla.

There never was a road across Little Salmon river at Balanced Rock till my father, O. P. Calhoun's brother, Leon Calhoun, my uncle John Boyd, Lawson Blackwell and Harold Bailey built the grade on the west in 1850. They made it to haul wheat to Blue River when they were drilling for water. In 1860-62, Mr. Calhoun made the trail to the east side and helped put in the bridge across Salmon.

The Oregon Trail crossed Little Salmon river about one mile south of Salmon river's confluence with the Snake, about six miles above Upper Salmon Falls.

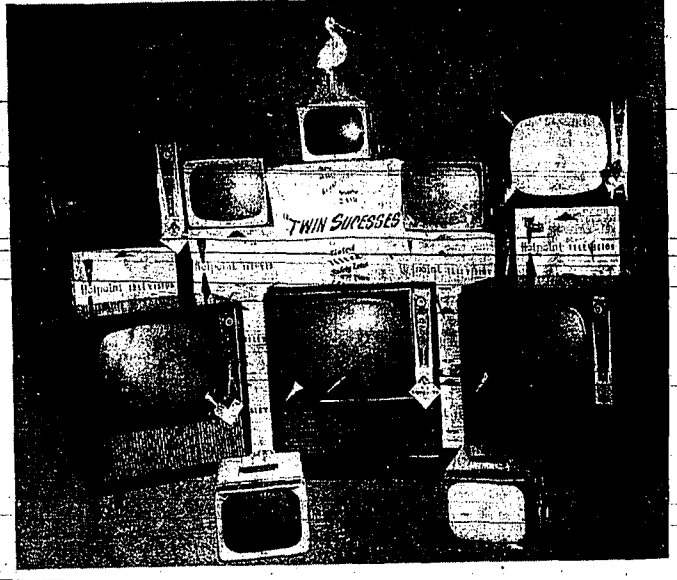

However, the land areas of Bikini and Eniwetok atolls and the water areas immediately adjacent to them remain off limits to vessels and aircraft which do not have specific clearance.

The restrictions removed today had covered 275,000 nautical square miles.

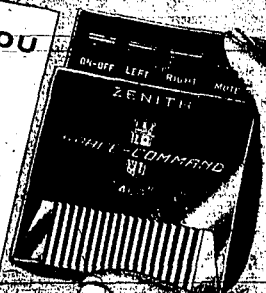

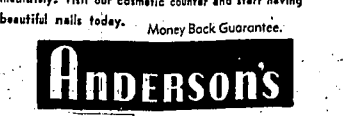

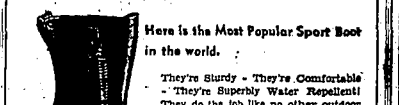

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—Senator Kefauver, D. Tenn., has charged certain present and former high officials of the Eisenhower administration with "conspiring to conceal from Senate investigators the facts about the Dixon-Yates private power company."

"I believe . . . it is clear that the Dixon-Yates deal involved actions on the part of public officials which should be presented to a grand jury," Kefauver said in a statement yesterday.

Sanborn Aide Raps 'Rubber Stamp' Solons

An attack on "rubber stamp candidates, who will support the administration 100 per cent" was made yesterday by Hugh D. Sanborn, chairman of the Sanborn-for-Senate committee.

The release states a supporter of William Holden, Idaho Falls, who is running for the Republican nomination, had criticized Idaho's junior senator for supporting the administration on 48 per cent of his measures.

"We would prefer to have a man in the senate who is capable of doing his own thinking and who would vote with the administration when he thought it was right and against it when he deemed it wrong," the release asserted.

Sanborn is the only candidate on the Republican ticket, except for the incumbent, who has had legislative experience on the federal level. He is the only candidate that we have heard who has publicly come out in favor of the Bricker amendment," the release says.

During all of the year of the present campaign, no candidate on either ticket has had the temerity to attack the record Sanborn made during his four years in congress as a representative from Idaho.

Idaho Project Killed in Veto

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—A \$5-million dollar Idaho project has been wiped out by President Eisenhower's veto of a bill which would have authorized 1.8 billion dollars in flood control and rivers and harbors improvement.

The bill contained pet projects of many congressmen.

The bill would have authorized the outlay of 25 million dollars for a shut on Bruce Eddy dam as a flood control measure in the Columbia river basin.

It also called for spending \$500,000 for flood control on the Weber river and its tributaries in northern Utah.

Russia Approves Workers' Rights

GENEVA, Aug. 11 (AP)—Russia has ratified three international conventions giving workers and employers the right to organize freely and bargain collectively.

Russian delegates at the June international labor conference here were the object of numerous western attacks charging that they did not represent free-organized labor groups.

Ratification of the three conventions means that the Russians have now obligated themselves to report regularly to ILO commissions, submit to international questioning, and perhaps accept fact-finding commissions to investigate their operations.

POCATELLO, Aug. 11 (AP)—Natural gas arrived in Idaho yesterday.

Joshua Work, resident manager of the elemental phosphorus plant of Westco Mineral Products division, turned a valve and the first natural gas ever to be delivered in Idaho flowed into the plant west of here.

The gas came from the San Juan basin in New Mexico over the 1,487-mile pipeline built by Pacific Northwest Pipeline company. The pipeline eventually will stretch to the Canadian border.

Domestic users in many parts of southern Idaho are also scheduled to start receiving the fuel next fall.

The Westco plant is the first of many Idaho firms which are expected to convert to natural gas, the mountains.

Idaho's name comes from the Indian "Edah Ho," meaning "light on the mountains."

Fuel Injection Systems Eyed For '57 Autos

DETROIT, Aug. 11 (AP)—Fuel injection systems are coming to the auto industry but they will be available in only a few models in the 1957 model year is expected.

Every major car maker is experimenting with fuel injection. In all instances the tests reportedly have confirmed the efficiency and economy of the new system.

Still expensive, however, the units still cost more to produce than the conventional carburetors. The cost of the 1957 model year even if the auto builders could save even a few cents on the fuel injection system would be higher than the cost of the carburetor.

So the fuel injection system will appear only on some limited production models. And even in these instances they probably will not be ready for an announcement with the production of the new models in October-November.

One of the cars being tested is the Cadillac's new luxury model, the Eldorado Brougham.

The Brougham has been redesigned several times since it first was announced in 1955.

It will be another public showing at the National Auto show in Detroit this Thursday.

Most auto makers will boast of any refinements, some of which will come in standard equipment, though they do represent added cost to the car maker.

Among these are the 1 1/2 inch diameter tires, more push-overs, an average 10 per cent increase in horsepower output, higher compression ratios, and a slightly lower altitude for most cars.

The industry will stick to its policy of avoiding "revolutionary" changes. The car makers in this respect is that "revolutionary" changes are hazardous for the consumer who invests millions of dollars in any new model.

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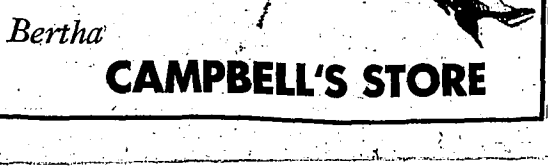

THE FARM PICTURE

Production and marketing of farm commodities is complex. Anyone who offers a pat solution in a single package is either deceitful or unaware of what farming is all about.

Ballots Distributed; Election Rules Are Cited for Polling Places, Voters

Delivery of ballots and ballot boxes, with accompanying instructions, was nearly completed Saturday in preparation for Tuesday's primary election. The election supplies were distributed to all precinct polling places Friday and Saturday by county employees.

The polls will open at noon Tuesday and remain open until 8 p.m. County Clerk T. W. Silvers says the Idaho code provides "no adjournment or interruption whatever shall take place during the election until the polls shall be closed, the votes counted and the results publicly announced."

He further pointed out that the code prohibits any persons electioneering on election day within any polling place or building in the vicinity of the polling place.

The state statute provides that no person shall do any electioneering within 100 feet of any polling place. Any person guilty of electioneering within the prescribed limits is subject to a fine not to exceed \$100 or less than \$25.

Persons going into booths are assured privacy and freedom from interference by law. Voters are further protected from offers of bribe and by threats of violence, threats of withdrawing custom or dealing in business or trade.

However, the voter has his obligations. The election laws of the state provide stiff penalties for any voter who registers illegally, who casts more than one vote or who is guilty of placing placards in voting booths urging others to vote for a particular candidate.

Section 24-102 of the Idaho code provides an amnesty for persons fearing arrest by going to the polls on election day. The section reads: "Elections are privileged from arrest except by treason, felony or breach of the peace during their attendance on elections."

According to Idaho law, a voter is not permitted to occupy a voting booth or compartment already occupied by another, nor to remain within the booth more than 10 minutes. In the event all the voting booths or booths are occupied and other voters are waiting the voter will be permitted to occupy the booth only five minutes.

The election judges are authorized to challenge any voter whose qualification as a voter they have reason to doubt.

In the event a voter spoils a ballot he may return it to the distributing clerk and if the clerk is satisfied the ballot was inadvertently spoiled, issue him another.

A voter should exercise care in marking his ballot. The Idaho code provides that "any ballot or part of a ballot from which it is impossible to determine the voter's intention shall be void and shall not be counted."

However, the code is ambiguous regarding this section because it further says that "when a ballot is sufficiently plain to gather therefrom a part of the voter's intention it shall be the duty of the judges to count such part."

As a final warning to voters the Idaho code says you cannot, be on the results of an election. "Every person who makes, offers or accepts any bet or wager upon the results of any election . . . is guilty of a misdemeanor."

Virus Theory of Cancer Sets Research Projects in Motion

BERKELEY, Calif., Aug. 11 (AP)—A bold new theory pointing to viruses as the cause of cancer has set in motion research projects with dramatic and revolutionary possibilities.

Behind the idea are recent findings about the chemistry of intricate living particles of matter which go into the makeup of living things. These particles, although not living in the usual sense, have the power to reproduce themselves and latent ability to work great changes in cells.

Inside the cell they form proteins and other substances which allow the cell to live, function and multiply. They play a major role in virus formation and they are important in the life of a cancerous cell.

Some of the intracellular viruses they form or promote apparently are not strictly normal parts of the cell, but rather things which resemble viruses, or even genes, the carriers of heredity. Apparently they can lie dormant in a cell for generations after generation, causing no signs of abnormality or disease. But the other known causes of cancer, such as radiation, coal tar compounds and other chemical irritants, seemed far from the virus concept.

Recent work by Dr. Stanley and his colleagues as well as by researchers elsewhere has changed the picture. Much of it involved new facts about the mysterious particles, which are nucleic acids.

Putting together a pile of findings change, whatever it is, the "virus" theory is on a rampage.

What they do may depend upon several things: the age of their host, his nutritional status or his hormone balance, the number of particles present, and possibly whether they are in a "resting" or "active" state of the uprising.

The inanimate particles may take over the cell's activity. Sometimes they destroy the cell. At other times they may let the cell live and multiply, but it will be different from before—abnormal or perhaps cancerous.

This virus-cancer hypothesis is advanced by Dr. Wendell M. Stanley, Nobel prize winner and head of the University of California's big virus research laboratory.

Heretofore the virus theory of cancer has been a nebulous thing in the minds of researchers. They had known for a long time that some viruses could produce cancer in certain animals and could combat a few kinds of malignancy in other animals and one variety in humans.

But the other known causes of cancer, such as radiation, coal tar compounds and other chemical irritants, seemed far from the virus concept.

African Meets Searching for Cancer Cause

KAMPALA, Uganda, Aug. 11 (U.P.)—Twenty-five medical specialists from 14 countries are convening soon on this town in the heart of Africa, seeking new clues to the cause of cancer.

Statistics produced by the Kampala cancer research committee in a conference here Aug. 2-30 may give a new lead on the disease that ranks second only to heart ailments as a killer among civilized nations.

No Disease of Civilization

Until recent years it was believed cancer was a disease of civilization—that people with a more primitive way of life suffered little from it.

Now it has been discovered that cancer is as common among the Africans around Kampala as it is in Europe and America.

This, in itself, would not advance knowledge of the disease greatly. But types of cancer and parts of the body affected in Africans are startlingly different from the situation among whites.

Common in Africa

Cancer of the liver, for instance, is three times as common among Africans. Cancer of the lymphatic glands is twice as prevalent.

Other types are correspondingly less frequent. Despite their unhygienic food and the parasites which infest their intestines, Africans are only half as liable as Americans to suffer from intestinal cancer.

Some of the reasons for the discrepancies can be pinned down by comparing African and, say, American diet and living habits, some of the causes of cancer may be revealed.

Idaho People Lag in Use of Polio Vaccine

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (Special)—Idaho parents have sought polio vaccine shots for only 26 per cent of the most susceptible groups, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis said here today.

These groups are children, young people under 19, and expectant mothers. They comprise 75 per cent of all polio cases.

The survey was made in the last part of July by Maxine D. Eames, representative in Idaho. It did not take into account what may have been done since then.

Blair O'Connor, national director of the foundation, said that in the U. S., out of 87,000 children, young people and expectant mothers, less than 31,000,000 had even started the series of shots at the time the survey was made.

O'Connor said, "Unless there is a swift and sustained increase in vaccinations, there will be many crippled by polio at a period when—for the first time in history—man has a means of preventing it."

There is still time to prevent many crippling deaths in 1950, inasmuch as the peak of the polio season does not occur until late August or the first weeks of September.

"Vaccine supplies now are ample, and shots are not held in line in ordering of vaccine since federal allocations were terminated the first of the month."

"Commercial vaccine is now flowing without restriction," he said.

Interesting School Shoe Lines Invite Misses, Young Gents

For little boys: Leather shoes with a definite masculine look, yet lightweight; moccasins and grained leathers predominant; many versions in the low top line pattern.

The low top line is particularly popular among teen-age boys who tend to follow the styles set by Dad.

Male teen-agers have advanced from the sloppy stage popular a few years ago, and have branched out into smartly styled slacks, shorts, jackets, etc. This trend is carried into footwear.

Particularly for school they want snappy but simple shoes, such as two- and three-eyelet-bucklers-in-plain and moccasin toes in the new crushed grain and smooth leathers.

For dress wear they seem to be favoring cordovan and black leathers in wing-tips and oxfords in both smooth and suede leathers. All of these—and more—are available in the shops.

The teen-age girl has special demands and the shoe and leather people have taken pains to satisfy her. Chief among them are dress shoes which are versatile and not too extremely styled, so that they can be worn with a variety of costumes.

For school, you will find a staggering variety of leather flats and low heels, which look well with socks, as well as oxfords.

A particular boon for teens are the new leather pumps with mid-heels so artfully designed that they look like high heels but don't require precarious balancing.

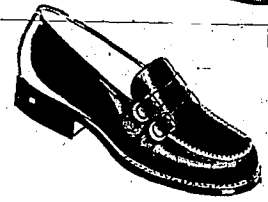

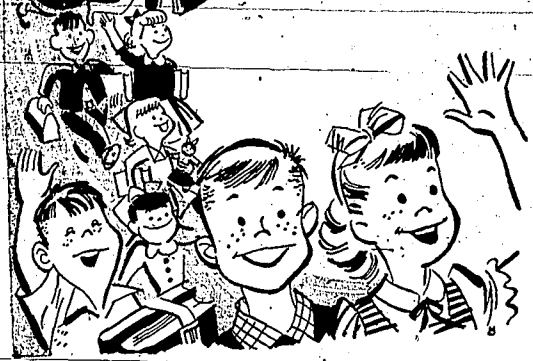


