Judging by the way the Democrats reacted, it was one of the most popular speeches ever heard at a political convention.

She emerged as a sort of elder statesman of the party, with her plea for new youth and vigor, which came after her endorsement of 66-year-old Adlai E. Stevenson (Republican) for president and former official of both the "new deal" and "aid deal" administration.

upper and lower ends out on 200, Monticello.

Seven men, including 47 Monticello also indicated that the diners had no warning of the violent blast.

The cafe's glass block front hit the ground, and the building was shattered for a block. Several cars parked in front of the cafe were crushed.

There was no fire. Many of the dead and injured were wrapped under the cave-in roof or flattened walls.

Every community in southeastern Utah and southwestern Colorado sent ambulances to the disaster scene.

Injured were taken to hospitals as far distant as Price, Utah, 160 miles from Monticello. Volunteers drove shells to the town's small airport so headlights could light the airstrip for mercy planes.

Water Supply In Reservoirs Is Held Good

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—The federal irrigation bureau said yesterday that water supplies in reservoirs will be sufficient to meet the needs of the West.

The exception will be in the Southwest where continuing drought will necessitate pumping of groundwater for crops.

Conditions in the West showed little change from a month earlier, the bureau reported.


Normal above-normal irrigation water supplies were available in the Pacific Northwest and in California, the north of the San Joaquin valley, the north of the Colorado river.

In the Southwest, from Texas to Arizona, stored water supplies were low and pumping from wells.

The report said water storage in the Los Angeles basin is about half the available capacity.

The outlook for power generation at Hoover, Davis and Patrick dams was only fair, it said, though ample water was available for irrigation needs of the American canal system and the Yuma project.

Soviets Deny Holding Men

LONDON, Aug. 14 (AP)—The Soviet Union denied yesterday it is holding any personnel of the U. S. air force or navy, shot down in planes.

The Soviet foreign ministry declared it was able to make this statement after "careful investigation" requested by the United States in a note to Moscow July 16.

A foreign ministry statement broadcast by Moscow radio said officials of the investigation leave no doubt that the assumption U.S. aircraft are being held in the Soviet Union is baseless and erroneous.

The United States in its July 16 note accused the Soviet Union of holding a number of American airmen, some missing more than six months. It demanded information about them and others.

State Atomic Reactor Sets Tests Record

IDAHO FALLS, Aug. 14 (AP)—The atomic energy commission yesterday announced that its land-based prototype of the submarine Nautilus atomic reactor ran at full power for 68 days.

Had the Nautilus done it, it would have set a full speed record around the world and about 1,000 miles more.

The AEC said the reactor, at its national reactor testing station west of here, was held at top speed for the longest time in its or any other reactor's history, in order to obtain engineering data and demonstrate the feasibility of powering ships at high speeds without refueling for long periods of time.

The Nautilus prototype reactor here was first put into operation in 1953. The submarine has sailed under power from a similar reactor. This prototype has been kept in operation here for further research.

A prototype for a large ocean-going ship is also being built at this eastern Idaho facility.

The Nautilus prototype was shut off after 68 days and night on Aug. 8, said the AEC's office here.




