Harriman Band Viewing Defeat In Surprise Act

CHICAGO, Aug. 15 (U.P.)—Adlai E. Stevenson apparently won the Democratic presidential nomination. Two big northern delegations, Michigan and New Jersey, were released today by their favorite sons in his favor. They were followed in early afternoon by 20-vote Arkansas. With his man driving toward an apparently sure first ballot victory, James A. Flinnigan, Stevenson campaign manager, said the situation "looks marvelous".

And one of the managers of Gov. Averell Harriman of New York, currently running second, said privately that Stevenson "apparently has enough votes" to win.

Harriman headquarters issued a statement denying that they were conceding defeat.

Compromise Bill on Civil Rights Drawn

CHICAGO, Aug. 15 (U.P.)—The Democratic platform committee formally approved today a compromise civil rights stand affirming the supreme court's school integration ruling as "law of the land" but rejected use of force to carry it out. A platform submitted by the 108-member group to the party's national convention, for ratification tonight, also would pledge schooling "without discrimination" for all American children regardless of race.

Former Gov. John S. Battle of Virginia said the platform group at a closed session approved "with no major amendments" a platform draft recommended by a subcommittee.

This was the civil rights formula developed to try to head off a split between northern and southern factions of the Democratic party.

"Southerners did not like it but indicated most would accept it," northern liberals indicated they would lead a fight on the convention floor to try to amend the compromise commitment. It appeared these northern factions, headed by leaders of the Harriman camp, would be defeated in any such effort.

Sen. John L. McClellan, D. Ark. said the plank "seems to be some what in the middle. It could have been better and it could have been worse."

Indians Slash All Bonds for U. S. Controls

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Some 2,100 western Oregon Indians started life on their own yesterday, shed the tribal group to end its dependence on state and federal governments.

Interior Secretary Fred A. Sesson extended "warmest commendations" to the group for its historic decision to free itself from federal control.

The proclamation covers the entire Oregon country, but the tribe's reservation is under the Grand Ronde community vander the new way of life.

Under their new way of life the Indians may manage their own property and take advantage of all the rights of a citizen. On the other hand, they must forgo all benefits established by the government for the Indian war.

The Alabama and Coushatta tribes of Texas also have severed their ties with the federal government. But they transferred property trusteeship to Texas.

The property held in common by the Oregon Indians may be handled for the formation of a corporation by a private trustee, or by sale to individual members, or by sale and distribution of the proceeds.

T.F. Native Finds No Wide Resentment Against Americans During World Trip

A native of Twin Falls, visiting here on the return leg of an around the world tour, contradicted recent reports of a general resentment throughout the world against Americans.

"Although they perhaps don't understand us and we don't understand them, foreign people basically like us," said John G. Milner, associate professor of social work at the University of Southern California.

On special leave from the university for his six months' tour, Milner is no stranger to the Twin Falls area. Born and raised here, he still owns a farm near Kimberly. His father, Harley O. Milner, built Milner dam.

"People throughout the world are basically friendly toward Americans," he said. "I received the greatest consideration and courtesy while abroad."

Milner was in Twin Falls for three days before leaving Thursday for a week at Ketchikan. Following his stay there, he will return here before leaving for California.

"I'm anxious to return to teaching," he said. "That's the thing about travel; it gives you an appreciation of your own country and community."

Milner, who was in Twin Falls two years ago, reported that "crops here look especially good" when compared to crops he has seen in other countries. He also noted a "great development" in Twin Falls' residential areas and public schools since his last visit.

Leaving San Francisco, Milner, who had previously been around the world during World War II, visited the Philippines, Japan, Formosa, Korea, China, India, Egypt, Italy, Germany, Switzerland, France, England and other countries on his trip.

"I was eager to revisit these countries and note the changes which had taken place since the war," he said.

Milner reported that he tried to avoid most of the tourist attractions and instead spent his time visiting people. While on his tour, he looked up many of his former exchange students.

"Students in all the countries visited were especially friendly," he said. "They all seem to look to the United States for leadership in education."

Milner will return to California Sept. 1 to take up his teaching duties.

Morse Lauds Demo Ideals, Own Change

CHICAGO, Aug. 15 (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, who switched to the Democratic party after the 1952 presidential election, said today he never had it as good as he had a Republican.

Morse stood last night on the speaker's platform of a national political convention for the first time in his 35 years. He was an honored guest of his new Democrat party. It was his first oration which he said was a "thrilling, emotional experience."

Later, he said that he had been a Republican most of his life, but the GOP never had accorded him the respect he received from the Democrats.

Clara Espartero "You have to be in my shoes to experience my feelings," he told the United Press. "It is an experience I'll never forget. I think this was a very generous spirit of friendship. It moved me very much."

When Morse was introduced to the convention last night, he was greeted with a demonstration by the Oregon delegation and several other groups. But his appearance also prompted part of the Oregon delegation to walk out.

Winete Dykes, a member of the Selection, told a reporter the Oregonians disliked Morse's attitude toward civil rights and "we don't have to stay here and listen to this."

Another delegate who declined to use his name as a Republican, said he never loyal to his own party so why should we listen to him. Morse has been one of the Senate's most outspoken advocates of strong civil rights legislation.

In his speech Morse told his fellow Democrats that when he found he could not accept membership in the Republican party, "right or wrong," he acted according to his ethical principles by resigning.

"I have no regrets," he told the cheering audience. "One of the greatest evils in American politics today is the growing practice on the part of too many politicians to let party officials and economic pressure groups tell them how to vote."

"That I have not done, and will not do under any party level. I accepted the invitation of the leaders of the Democratic party, both state and national, to join the Democratic party and I am happy with my decision."

Morse said he actually did the "White House" a lot of good by becoming a Democrat because without the control of the senate by the Democrats, the President's legislative program would have been rejected even more than it was."

Tributes Paid To Noted Vet For His Talk

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago, Aug. 15 (AP)—The Democratic party paid tribute to America's war veteran Harold Russell last night and he praised it for providing "the best years of our lives."

Russell's appearance before the Democratic national convention was preceded by the showing of a two-minute scene from the motion picture "The Best Years of Our Lives" in which he had a prominent role. As he walked to the rostrum to receive a standing ovation, he waved aloft his famous "hook," the artificial hand that he has demonstrated countless times to help rehabilitate other disabled veterans.

"The true story, like the Hollywood film, had a happy ending," Russell said the audience. "I married the girl and we now have two wonderful children—a boy and a girl."

He then delivered a short speech, larded with criticism of the Republican administration. Russell, who has traveled widely in his veterans work, said he found that "the great name of America has been tarnished" in other countries.

He also lashed out at Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy for their campaign tactics.

"Who," he demanded, "gave Richard Nixon, or Joe McCarthy or any other Republican the right to tell me we (the Democrats) love our country any less than they do?"

Then, gesturing with his mechanical hand, he added: "You've gone too far, Richard Nixon. . . in your unbridled ambition."

Russell was introduced by Richard and Richards, Democratic candidate for U.S. senator from California. The California delegation elected a woman to prison terms of 12½ to 18½.

The land, located in San Bernardino, Riverside, and Imperial counties, will be open Saturday to application for entry under the public land law.

It has been reserved for 25 years for the Colorado river storage and reclamation project. The land now is surplus and is no longer needed for these two projects.

The land is steep and rugged and without agricultural value with the exception of scattered areas. There is no timber but portions of the land may be valuable for manganese, gold, and silver.

The land will be opened to entry under mining laws on Nov. 30. It is open to mineral leasing while under reclamation withdrawal.

Montana to Split Delegate Ballots

CHICAGO, Aug. 15 (AP)—Montana delegates to the Democratic convention decided today to give 10 of their 10 votes to Adlai Stevenson and 8 to Averell Harriman.

The decision came in caucus moments after Harriman had completed a 30-minute appeal to the Montanans for their votes.

Study by Traffic Engineer Discloses Driver Failure Is Chief Crash Cause

An official report compiled by State Traffic Engineer Ellis S. During April 17 persons were killed and 314 injured, with 640 property damage accidents reported. In May, 18 persons lost their lives and 314 injured. A total of 727 property damage accidents were recorded.

Arab 'Crisis' Is Old, Going Back at Least 1,300 Years

BY WILLIAM L. RYAN

The Arab crisis is 1,300 years old. For more than a dozen centuries of the Arabs, their civilization reached its apogee in the seventh century when it was conquered and been converted into the ideas of history's sectarianism.

It is far from settled now. It is not really one world but at least two—the Arab world which one day will be united.

Today the heart and center of the world is Egypt, and Egypt has set the Western world's nerves on edge. Nationalization of the Suez Canal, focus of the immediate crisis, is not the only Western worry. Arab ambitions, tempers, frustrations and hatreds have spread ferret from the Persian gulf to the Atlantic.

Egypt's President Nasser, central figure in the latest crisis, collection, induced by the flow of foreign

oil royalties, covers centuries-old feudal systems.

The so-called Fertile Crescent—the area formed by Syria, Lebanon, Iraq, Jordan and Palestine—cradle of modern civilization and the cradle of Western religions, is yet another world of some 13 million Arabs.

It is almost 30 million Moslems of Egypt and Sudan, occupying a big patch of east Africa, are a third of the Arab world.

People who call themselves Arab occupy Morocco, Tunisia, Algeria and Libya in north Africa. Their religion is Moslem but in the midst of the century the eastern Arabs have been lost.

All these countries have their own cultures, some tied to Europe. Many Arabs are Christians, particularly in Lebanon and Syria.

The new Egyptian Constitution calls Egypt an integral part of the Arab nation, meaning the vast area in which at least 70 million who might be described as Arabs are linked by religion and language.

There is little racial significance in the word "Arab." In Algeria, Syria and Lebanon there are fair-skinned, fair-skinned Arabs who have little removed from Western civilization. Arab is half westernized, half nomadic, the Bedouin tribes little removed from Bible days. In the Sudan there are black Arabs. In the Arabian peninsula, swarthy black-haired Bedouins trace their lineage back to ancient Carthage, in Algeria to ancient Rome. In Morocco the Berbers date back many centuries before the arrival of the conquering Arab hordes which swept all the way into Spain.

Cook said investigation of the case began after more than 100 letters concerning the "new regime" were handed to federal agents following the death of a former U. S. Army officer of German descent.

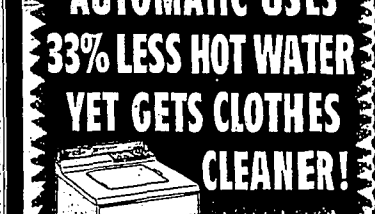

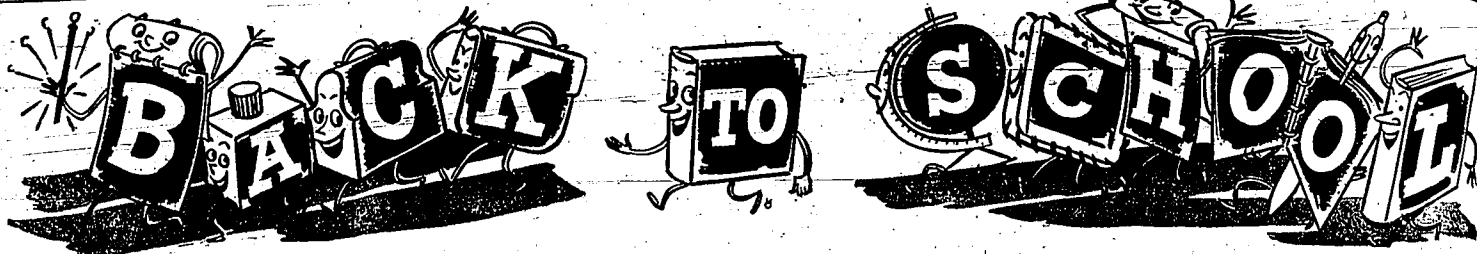

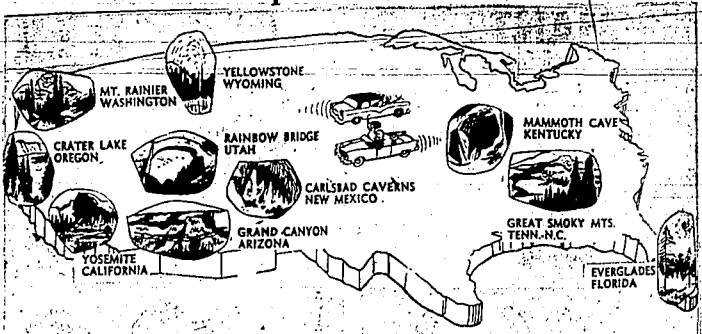

Program of Payment to Disabled U.S. Worker Is Readied; Details Announced

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (U.P.)—A new program of payments to totally disabled workers, rounding out the series of basic programs for the nation's families envisioned when the social security law was set up 20 years ago, goes into effect next year.

The program is provided under the social security bill passed by congress just before it adjourned last month, and signed by President Eisenhower. The disability provision was sponsored by Democratic leaders.

The new program's workings will be of importance to millions of Americans from 65 per cent of all employed and self-employed persons are under the social security law, but possibly in line for disability benefits if serious accident or illness strikes.

Nevertheless, sponsors of the program fear that some persons will be disappointed to find they are not eligible to receive payments.

Stringent requirements must be met by a disabled person to qualify. The law was written that way because congress wanted to be sure it did not jeopardize the needs of the much larger social security retirement program.

However, despite these tough provisions, experts in the social security administration estimate 300,000 disabled persons will receive payments in the first year, and that in 25 years one million will be on the rolls.

The first checks will not go out to the disabled until next July. However, local social security offices will begin receiving claims for benefits on Oct. 1 this year. Persons already in line for disability payments are being urged to apply early since lengthy processing may be involved.

The first requirement is that the applicant must be at least 50 years old. Then he must meet a strict test of disability defined in the law this way:

"Inability to engage in any substantial gainful activity by reason of any medically determinable physical or mental impairment which can be expected to result in death or to be of long continuing and definite duration.

The monthly checks will not start until the disability has been in effect six months.

Finally, the recipient must meet all of three requirements of social security coverage in a job or in self-employed work for which social security taxes were paid. These are:

1. One and a half years of coverage in the last three years.
2. Five years of coverage in the last 10 years.
3. Coverage for half the time since 1950, or, alternatively, for 10 years.

A person in covered employment for the last five years thus would meet all three tests.

A worker disabled some time ago and now 50 or over can apply at once for payments. In his case, the social security coverage requirements would run in the years preceding the date of his disability. The applicant must furnish proof of his disability. At the local social security office, he can find if he has the necessary coverage and if his disability is severe enough to make him potentially eligible.

If he passes these preliminary tests, he will be given medical reports from which he can have filled out by his physician, a hospital, his employer and other sources.

When his file is complete, the local office will send it to the state agency which, under the law, has the responsibility for making the determination of disability. This is expected to be the state vocational rehabilitation agency in most states; in some it will be the agency which administers the present public assistance disability programs.

As a final step, the state agency sends its findings to the Baltimore office of the social security administration. This office has power to reverse a state determination that disability exists. But it cannot re-

verse a state ruling against the individual. Baltimore will notify the applicant of the final decision.

If this decision is adverse, the individual can appeal to a referee of the social security administration, who has the right to go on to federal court.

The federal agency will fix standards for determination of disability, but officials emphasize that each case will be determined individually.

In general, however, personality defects, alcoholism or drug addiction will not qualify an individual. He will be blindfolded if the applicant is able to engage in "substantial gainful activity."

The burden of determining disability does not fall on the applicant's doctor since he is not asked to certify that his patient is permanently and totally disabled. His role is limited to reporting medical facts.

On the other hand, benefits would be continued during the first year of return to work after rehabilitation so as to enable the individual to get firmly on his feet.

The monthly payments will be the same as the primary retirement benefit for the individual under social security, ranging from \$20 to \$108.50 a month. They are expected to average \$70 to \$80 a month.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (U.P.)—The United Steelworkers union said today its negotiators stand ready to resume peace talks if and when the strikebound Reynolds Metals company offers to meet their terms.

Bargaining sessions here broke off Monday night after a union official said the company refused to eliminate a wage differential existing between Reynolds and the Aluminum company of America.

A company spokesman said a contract similar to one that ended the Alcoa strike last week was offered.

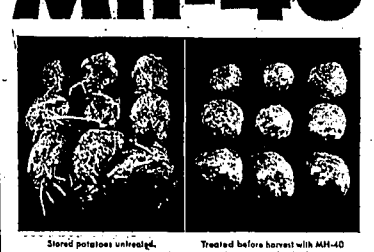

Women Eligible May Soon Get Social Security Payment at Age of 62, Not 65

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—as to the best choice of a retirement time. For one group of women, widows covered by social security retirement payment at age 62 in the first break from the age of 65 deadline fixed when the program was set up 20 years ago.

The change, sponsored by Democratic leaders, was embodied in the social security bill passed by congress on the day it adjourned and since signed by President Eisenhower.

The bill makes no change in age 65 retirement for men.

Social security records show that married men reaching 65 are, on the average, four years older than their wives. Until now, however, the wife could not start receiving her payments until she herself reached 65, even though her husband had retired.

Thus the average couple had a lower income in the first years of retirement, in cases where the husband went on the rolls at 65, than it did in later years. The wife's payment is half of the husband's.

Under the new law qualified women between 62 and 65 will be able to begin receiving payments starting in December.

However, the age 62 retirement is optional and women nearing 62 or between that age and 65 will want to examine their situation carefully

ment is an important one, because the lower payment rate continues throughout the lifetime of the recipient once she elects to begin receiving payments before she reaches 65.

A wife going on the rolls at 62 if her husband was entitled to the maximum payment of \$108.50 a month, would get \$40.50 instead of the \$54.30 which she would be paid if she waited to age 65.

The bill does not change the present limits on what a man or woman may earn and still draw social security retirement payments. A recipient may earn \$1,200 a year and receive all of his or her benefits. Each \$80 earned above \$1,200 causes the retiree to lose one month's social security check.

Like Due for Late Summer Potato Yields

BOISE, Aug. 15 (AP)— Idaho's late summer potato producers are expected to reap 2,000 more 100-pound sacks of spuds this year than last, according to the U. S. department of agriculture.

The department said yesterday it expects this year's crop to total 1,635,000 sacks, compared to 1,635,000 sacks produced last year.

Idaho's late summer crop is west of Oregan and south of McCall. The department forecast 250,000 more sacks, compared with 100 in 1955. Harvest of red spuds was practically completed by Aug. 1 when they are not under way.

Forecast Given

In Malheur and Morrow counties in Oregon, production of the late summer crop was forecast at 2,200,000 100-pound sacks, compared with 1,600,000 last year.

Idaho's fall potato crop, grown at King Hill and north of McCall primarily, is forecast at 34,010,000 sacks, almost the same as the 33,000,000 sacks of the 1955 crop.

Onions Fall

Idaho's onion crop was forecast at 125,000 40-pound bags or about 15 percent less than the 1955 production.

Production for the famed Idaho-Kentucky county area was forecast by the department at 1,700,000 bags, compared with the 1955 crop of 5,200,000 bags and the 1954-55 average of 4,748,000.

Disgusted Farmer Hands Out Beans

BALTIMORE, Aug. 15 (AP)— A frustrated New York farmer gave away two truckloads of string beans last night during a monotonous two-hour shift at the foot of a busy street.

Beans spilled from broken bags, crates and bins scattered along lower Broadway as Robert Castle, route 1, Baitington, N. Y., handed out the spuds. There were 700 bushels.

Castle was quoted as saying a packing firm bought 420 bushels, then tried to cut the price for the rest of his load contrary to agreement, saying the quality was low.

"It was a wonderful crop," said Castle. "I'm disgusted. I'm going back and sell my farm."

Rising Cost of Living Is Not 'Inflation,' Strictly Speaking

NEW YORK, Aug. 15 (AP)— The purists say that inflation is the wrong word for what's opening today to the cost of living.

The rise in the price of materials and finished goods and the hike in the cost of labor and of services should, they say, be called by some other name.

But most men, noting that the monthly bills are higher than they were a year ago, probably will go right on calling it inflation.

What the economists mean by inflation is the blowing up of the supply of money. As the supply multiplies the value of money goes down — as in the case of any other commodity. When you call today's dollar a 50-cent dollar you don't mean that it doesn't have 100 cents as always, but that it will buy only 50 cents worth of goods because of the depressed dollar.

Economists lay most of the blame for this to the putting up of bank credits and the money printing during World War II and the Korean war. This is a favorite device of govern-

will carpets and shoes and beer. Freight rates may go up again. Faced with a stiffer demand on his pocketbook, his natural instinct is to try to get more money into that pocketbook to meet higher prices.

It does little good to tell him that if he demands a higher wage he will just add to the forces that are pushing prices up. What matters to him is that somehow he must have more money to provide the goods and services his family's appetites demand.

The wage-price spiral isn't necessarily inflation, the purists say, and in time it may be self-correcting through competition and greater productivity and excess industrial capacity.


But to the average man monetary inflation and wage-price hikes add up to the same thing: The dollar buys less than it used to, whether of labor or of goods.

Governor for Oklahoma to Launch Drive

CHICAGO, Aug. 15 (AP)—Averell Harriman announced today that Gov. Raymond A. Chandler of Oklahoma has named him to be the first governor to come out for him as president. That was last December.

In making the announcement, the New York governor scoffed at the position reports his campaign was dragging. He contended that on the contrary it was picking up steam.

Harriman also discounted the appeal by ex-candidate Estes Kefauver to his followers urging them to support Adlai Stevenson, the front runner.

"When the smoke has cleared away, I think you'll find most of the Kefauver delegates turning to me," he said that "by and large" the Kefauver delegates supported the Tennessee senator because they favored liberal principles "they thought by Mr. Harriman said that he would not be running for president because he favored such principles.

To a question whether his campaign was losing momentum, Harriman said "no" that he was getting more and more pledges of support.

He said former President Truman's endorsement of him as a qualified candidate in the liberal tradition made a number of delegates "wop and think."

Stevenson to Get Vote of Alaskans

CHICAGO, Aug. 15 (AP)—Chairman J. P. "Boss" Bartlett of the Alaskan delegation to the Democratic national convention said today that his fellow delegates are "solidly" for Adlai E. Stevenson.

"We're as rock-ribbed for Stevenson as Vermont is for the Republican party," he said.

Bartlett made the statement after a direct plea from Gov. Averell Harriman for their support in his quest for the Democratic presidential nomination.

"Harriman expressed an interest in seeing us," Bartlett said, "and we'll be very happy to see him. But we'll tell him that we're solidly for Stevenson."

NEW YORK, Aug. 15 (AP)—Irving Heller, president of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, said yesterday that "women know nothing about men's clothes, care less and are basically interested only in their own appearance rather than their man's."

"Subconsciously," Heller said, "the average woman doesn't want her husband to look too well-dressed because there are a shortage of men and a surplus of women in this country."

Japan Reverts to Pre-War "Old Days"; Government by Threat May Be Revived

TOKYO, (NEA) — The regular withdrawal of American security forces from Japan is reverting to the pre-war days, and this nation is rapidly returning to its pre-war form.

Signs of a return to the "old days" are obvious to one coming back to Tokyo after a six-month absence.

Police have just ordered that in carrying passengers must be lighted inside at night. The reason given was to protect drivers at night from hijackers. The reason understood was to permit police a quick passover check at road blocks throughout the city.

An informed Japanese quick to note will be more than a year or so until government by assassination and threat—at which the Japanese were formerly adept—may be resurrected to resolve political differences.

One socialist leader was recently shot at while riding a train and another key government figure who advocates a quick peace treaty with Russia is being threatened with a U.S. threatening letters from ultra-nationalist groups.

Fukushima, a foreign expert of long standing, was for a number of years the behind-the-scenes policy adviser for the Times. His assumption of active office put the paper right back where it was 10 years ago—an instrument of opinion for the government.

WHY WE CALL IT... Antelope Island

Editor's Note: This is one in a series of stories on the origin of the colorful old, sometimes whimsical names of places and things in Idaho and Utah.

The largest of the islands in Utah's Great Salt Lake got its name—legend says—because it once provided sustenance for an explorer.

Capt. John C. Fremont who visited the area for the second time in 1845, writes in his memoirs:

"On the island we found grass and water and several bands of antelope. Some of these were killed and eaten."

The island is 13 1/2 miles long and 5 1/2 miles wide. Its mountains rise 2,000 feet above the surface of the surrounding lake.

Two Cornell Medical college scientists discovered, by amplified buzzing, that mosquitoes from different localities have different calls. Their bites are all the same.

Many occupation changes and reforms seen dated to remain but become a part of Japanese culture. Women are clinging to their new-found rights, freedom and suffrage, although they are more vocal than influential. Western dress has a permanent place in the wardrobe beside the kimono.

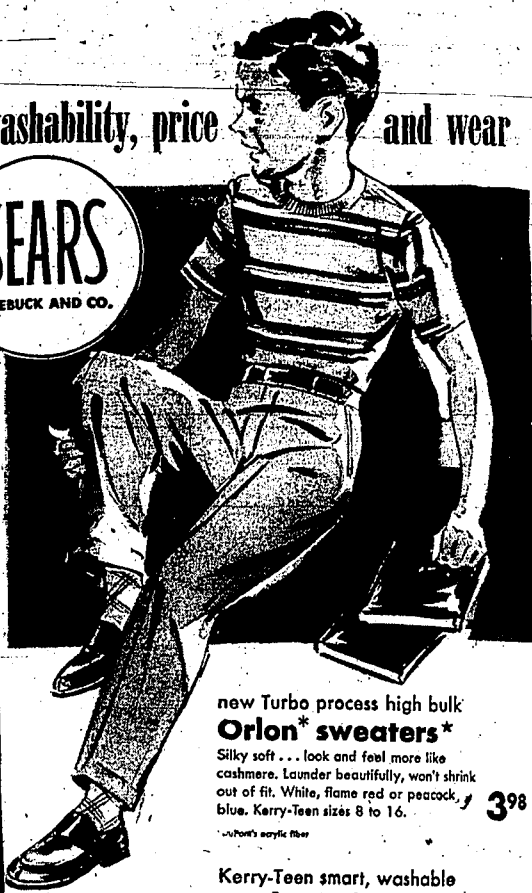
