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# TAYLOR WIDES ELECTION LEAD

## Adlai Seems Assured for Demos' Win

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago, Aug. 16 (UP)—Adlai E. Stevenson was put in nomination at the Democratic national convention today as his handgoned rival tumbled to a first ballot victory in tonight's balloting. Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, a possible vice presidential choice, put Stevenson's name before the Democrats with a rousing declaration that he is the party's "best vote-getter."

That was a slap at former President Truman, who continued to back the doomed candidacy of New York's Gov. Averell Harriman. Mr. Truman has argued that Stevenson is not a good vote-getter. Kennedy, youthful and handsome and serious, pleaded with the delegates to pick Stevenson as the man best qualified to lead the nation "out of this crisis of complexity."

"The man is here and he is ready," Kennedy said.

Stevenson, apparently sure nothing else was in his mind, had irritated a number of southern delegates earlier by saying he would be happy to pick Stevenson as the man best qualified to lead the nation "out of this crisis of complexity."

## Former Solon Has 100-Vote Lead and 7 Precincts to Toll

Former Sen. Glen H. Taylor pulled into a lead of nearly 100 votes over Boise attorney Frank Church for the Democratic senatorial nomination Thursday with the discovery of an error in tabulation of ballots.

Sam Tunks, Bear Lake county clerk, reported that one of his tally clerks had mistaken a 75 for a 15 and thus shorted Taylor 60 votes. Tunks said he discovered the error while making a routine check of tally sheets.

With only seven precincts still to be heard from, Taylor had 27,276 votes and Church 27,176, after correction of the error. Earlier unofficial returns showed Taylor leading by 28 votes with 27,148 votes and Church 27,120. The number of precincts still to come was trimmed when officials at Mackay in Idaho county reported that no voting took place in their precinct.

There was talk of a recount Wednesday as returns trickled in from the state's closed election in history.

Taylor said Wednesday that there should be a recount no matter who wins.

Church said he would wait for the official returns to come in before making any statement.

"This could be three or four weeks. The county totals must be in the hands of the secretary of state by Monday for certification by the state board of canvassers Aug. 25. It would be a long time before a tally said that in past elections, I have taken several weeks for the last precincts to be in a 48-mile county board until the total is complete."

## Big 3 Asking U.N. Controls On Vital Suez

LONDON, Aug. 16 (UP)—The western big three proposed today that the operation of the Suez canal be made the responsibility of an international board, including Egypt, linked to the United Nations.

## Court Refuses Stop Order on Idaho Dam

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (UP)—Supreme Court Justice Hugo L. Black refused yesterday to order a halt in construction of Idaho Power company's first Hells canyon dam. His refusal was embodied in an order which rejected a request by the National Hells Canyon association which had urged that the work be stopped pending outcome of appellate court litigation. The association which favors one large federal dam in the U. S. court of appeals has a federal power commission license issued to Idaho Power company to build three dams in the Hells canyon area of Snake river along the Idaho-Oregon border.

Black, who indicated on Aug. 1 that he would decline to halt work on the project if the company met certain requirements, said after Idaho Power put up a three million dollar bond. This will reimburse federal cost of Idaho Power's license-a clause later to be invalid and the government would be required to pay down the dam and restore the river's course.

The company also posted a \$50,000 bond to protect the United States on expenses and court costs in event of a company suit against the government.

The Court of Appeals here also refused not long ago to order a halt in construction of the dam pending outcome of the litigation before the court.

At a hearing early this month before Black, counsel for Idaho Power said a shortage of electric power in the Pacific Northwest would be remedied by the company to proceed at once with construction of its first dam.

Black was told also that a stop order at this time would result in a million dollar loss to the company and disruption of the lives of about 2,000 persons connected with the project.

Commission Chairman L. W. Hawkins said he and Commissioners Frank Palmer and Henry Crow, expected to have the official count for Twin Falls county complete by 2:30 p. m. The state statute provides that commissioners have until Aug. 20 to canvass returns.

Silvers said Wednesday an unofficial estimate of the votes indicated there were 1,009 more ballots cast Tuesday in the primary election than in the 1954 primary. He estimated Tuesday's votes at 9,107 against 7,198 in 1954.

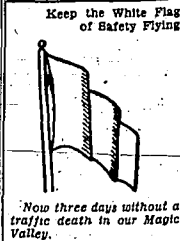

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### Bad Usage of Flow Claimed In River Suit

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 16 (AP)—Ralph L. Meeker, 78-year-old Arizona water engineer, has charged California's Imperial irrigation district with "improper use of water" while testifying in the California river water suit. At the time, Harry W. Hutton, attorney for the Imperial irrigation district, was cross-examining him.

Meeker said a report by him, which was placed in evidence, was aimed at showing an excess diversion of water from an area of water between 700 and 800 acres of water between 1935-36.

He described the excess as an "improper use of water" that was allowed to flow into the Salton river. The trial was recessed early to let the 78-year-old witness rest. After the recess, Meeker and Hutton agreed to call him back only during the morning sessions until the cross-examination is completed, Hutton said.

### Demos Defeat North's Move On Hot Plank

CHICAGO, Aug. 16 (AP)—Democratic moderates and southerners defeated early today a bid of the North to put over a stronger plank than the South.

The Democratic national convention adopted a proposal of those northerners to place the issue to carry out the supreme court decision outlawing segregation in public schools.

The convention then adopted a lengthy campaign platform containing a compromise civil rights plank that required the supreme court decision as the law of the land. This plank was adopted with nothing about enforcing the decision, except that in any event force should not be used.

Former President Truman joined with party moderates in urging adoption of the compromise on civil rights in the interest of party unity. This put Mr. Truman at odds with many supporters of Gov. Averett Harrison whom he had backed unsuccessfully for the presidential nomination.

Party leaders were jubilant over the compromise action. Rep. John W. McCardell, D-Iowa, national committee chairman who led the fight for the compromise, said the sound action of the party means unity and victory in November.

Democratic National Chairman Paul Butler called the compromise demonstration of unity and solidarity in the party.

HOOLIGAN NATIONALISM In the 19th century the growth of nationalism was hailed as one of the great marks of human advancement.

Men of common custom and tradition, linked by an emerging sense of collective identity called "nations." This was the period when America struggled out of infancy, when Italy and Germany put together patchworks of smaller states, when Britain and France enhanced their strength.

Nations were looked upon as mechanisms ideally suited to serve men's highest aspirations. Indeed, the desire for nationhood was and still is called "self-determination."

During and after World War II, nationalism found new expression in the upsurge of colonial peoples in Asia and Africa, India, Burma, the Philippines, Libya, and Indonesia.

Because nationalism is cherished as a legitimate expression of human aspiration, that does not mean it may be used to justify or cloak gross breaches of international law or morality.

We regard the family as a sacred institution, but we do not allow men to rob or kill to advance a family's welfare. By the same token, the world expects budding nations, like established countries, to observe proper respect for their obligations.

Underdeveloped lands, lacking their own capital funds, often invite or permit capitalist countries to come in and develop potential natural resources. The concessions under which the outsiders operate are in effect contracts of international contract.

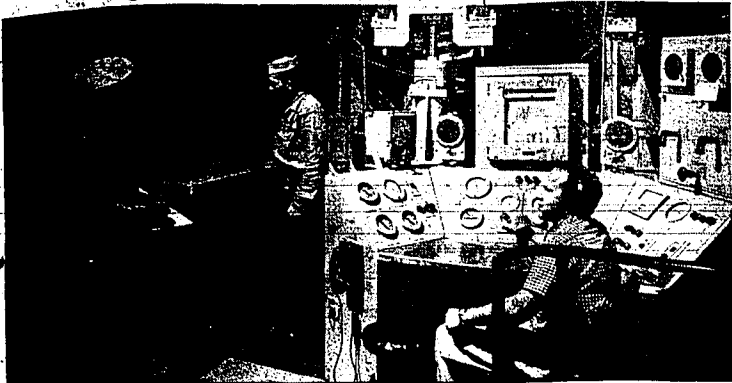

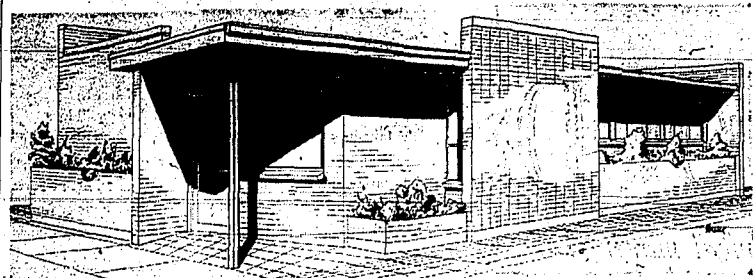

Medical Care Shows Large Rise in Costs

NEW YORK, Aug. 16 (AP)—The cost of medical care has risen the biggest in any line on the coast. Getting well again now comes at a higher price than six years ago. The Bureau of labor statistics says its medical care category now puts its medical care at 1947-48 levels at 132 per cent of the cost for the entire consumer price index, also at a record high.

Attorneys sought detailed information from seeking more medical attention than ever before and keeping them without question. The cost of the hospital and doctor bills have jumped a "red-hot" one. The cost has become one of the most spectacular trends in the insurance industry.

The Health Insurance Council, a federation of eight insurance associations, reports that health insurance programs are running one-fifth higher this year than last. The total cost under these plans in 1955 for hospital, surgical and other medical expense plus loss of income benefits topped three billion dollars.

The cost estimate for record 110 million Americans are now covered by hospital insurance—a gain of 10 million in a single year. The cost is as many as in 1941. Hospital charges paid for them last year topped \$1 billion dollars, with the insurance companies and the Blue Cross-Blue Shield plans paying the bill fairly evenly.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Russians have licked the problems of launching ballistic missiles from submarines. As a matter of fact the Germans licked them during World War II. The Russians just took over the technology after the war.

These containers, launched, now believed to be mass-produced by the Russians, were first suggested in early 1944 by Dr. Dickmann of the famous Vulcan Works in Berlin, Germany, under the code name "Project Stalin." "Vest" and "Project Stalin" were designed for V-2 missiles.

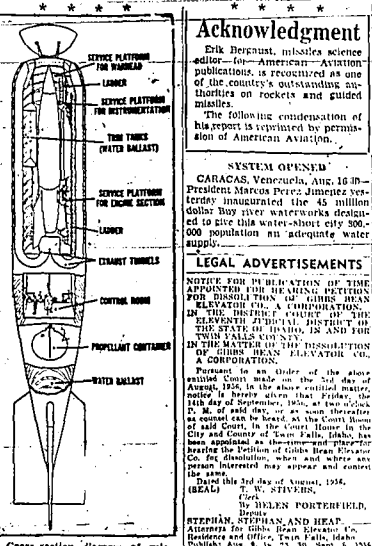
The net weight of the launcher was to be mass-produced by the Russians and accessories represented 35 tons. The containers could be towed in submerged position by one submarine at 15 miles per hour. One launcher could be towed at 20 miles per hour. The range was limited only by the fuel supply of the submarine.

A series of problems were experienced during the first German test. The launcher could not be used to keep the launcher stable under fire of the missile. Large rudders were used to maintain stability during horizontal operations.

It took the Germans only two years to solve the problems. The Russians have been able to solve whatever problems the Germans did not have time to solve. A conservative estimate indicates the Russians have built at least a half dozen launchers in the last year.

Water in the upper ballast tanks will be pumped out, the launcher slowly tilts into vertical position, and only the nose is above the surface. ## Five Million Americans Face Sneez Season; No Cure Cited

By HAIL HOYLE  
 NEW YORK, Aug. 16—The "sneezing" season in America, exceeded in number only by heart ailments and influenza, is expected to last longer than ever before because of the time of year.

Actually, the first hay fever symptoms were described by physicians in 1819 and it is generally believed that the time of year is the cause of the disease.

These ancient doctors prescribed remedies of arsenic and belladonna to ease the discomfort, and arsenic is still used in some patent medicines today in the form of Fowler's Solution.

Hay fever is peculiarly prevalent in America, oddly enough, because of its prosperity. It is caused by airborne plant ragweed pollen in Europe and Asia, where almost every acre of land is carefully cultivated. There is no place for ragweed to sprout and the incidence of hay fever is low. But here ragweed has flourished on acres spared from the plow, and attempts to stamp it out have failed.

Antihistamines, which at first seemed to be a satisfactory way of alleviating the discomfort of hay fever, turned out to have a drawback. The U. S. public health services estimated that over 25,000,000 lost work days each summer.

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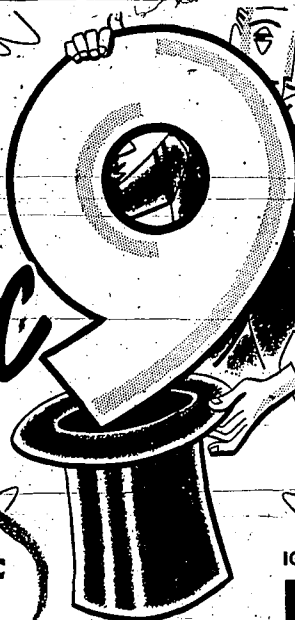

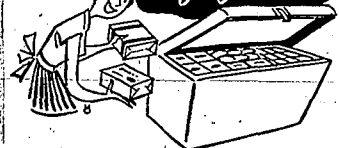
